Opening of New Kewaskum Savings Office March 22

OPEN HOUSE TO BE HELD THREE DAYS NEXT WEEK

The new Kewaskum Savings office will officially open Wednesday, March 22, to serve the Kewaskum-Campbellsport area. The grand opening will be held Wednesday through Friday, March 22 through March 24, with an Open House all three days so that families of the Kewaskum-Campbellsport area can visit the new office, meet Kewaskum Savings' staff and get better acquainted with Kewaskum's newest business firm.

Kewaskum Savings is located at 114 Main Street in the former Kewaskum Mutual Insurance Company building. The entire building interior has been extensively remodeled and the savings and loan will use approximately 50% of the main floor, and Attorney Roger McKenna has leased the other half for his new law office. Additional rental quarters and a community room have been developed for the lower level.

The Savings and Loan office features a large, completely carpeted customer's lounge and lobby, a manager's office and two private conference rooms. In addition, a spacious community room has been developed in the lower level, capable of seating 40 people, with tables, chairs and a kitchen facility. This community room will be available to clubs, organizations and businesses for meetings at no cost.

Kewaskum Savings is being opened by the West Bend Savings and Loan Association as another full-service savings and loan facility, in keeping with their program of becoming a county-wide savings and home lending institution. They presently have offices in West Bend and in Germantown, and the new Kewaskum office expands their services in northern Washington County and southern Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties.

Richard Larson, West Bend Savings president, indicated that Dieter Bombien has been named manager of the Kewaskum-Campbellsport office. Bombien was formerly with a large Milwaukee savings and loan and had extensive experience in their mortgage loan department. He is also a United States Marine Corps veteran and served in Vietnam. Bombien and his wife, Christine, and son, Derek, have purchased a home at 1026 Hillside Drive, Kewaskum.

Coffee and refreshments will be served during the three day Open House at Kewaskum Savings and a special Charter Member Savings Club will be open from Wednesday, March 22 to April 30. Attractive free gifts will be given to all charter members opening accounts of \$300.00 or more, or adding \$300.00 or more to an existing account. In addition, drawings will be held for attractive door prizes for visitors registering.

Larson said that West Bend Savings officers and board of directors are very enthused by the support and interest shown in their new office and cordially invite people in the Kewaskum-Campbellsport area to visit and use their new savings and loan office.

Drug Misuse Film To Be Shown Here

APPROVE BUSING OF ST. KILIAN PUPILS

The Board of Education approved final plans for a building addition at the high school here, after going over the plans with architect Jack Fieweger of Schutte-Mochon, Inc., Monday night.

The 140 by 56 foot addition will be used to house students when all are in attendance in a split shift attendance plan that will go into effect at the start of the 1972 school year. Tentative plans call for it being converted into classrooms for home economics and shop when it may not be needed for split-shifting in the future.

Fieweger said the specifications for the building are completed and were to be sent to the blue-prints Wednesday. Sealed bids will then be called for and will be publicly opened before the board at 8 p. m. on April 10.

He said the plans include underground plumbing lines for the tentative home economics area. The building will be heated by a roof-top gas heating unit. It will be built of insulated removable metal panels and will have a built-up gravel surface pitched roof. The addition will be completely carpeted except for the passageway that will connect it to the high school. Specifications call for it to be completed by Aug. 18, 1972.

"I think we're going to have a nice looking addition," Fieweger observed.

The board also approved busing of pupils who now attend St. Kilian's School on R. 3, Campbellsport, and who live in the Kewaskum district, to St. Matthew's School in Campbellsport after St. Kilian's closes at the end of the school year.

The board was able to approve a request for transportation after receiving a list of the students to be bused and a map defining St. Matthew's attendance area and showing where those students live. Supt. Floyd Brenholt said as of now 22 students are listed to be bused. That number could change, he said.

The method of selecting a high school principal was discussed and it was voted to have Supt. Brenholt screen the full list of candidates down to about four. The board will then make the final decision after interviews with the final group. As of Monday night, there were 19 applicants.

Eugene Bohn of Kettle Moraine Agency discussed an all-risk insurance coverage policy for school properties. The matter was tabled.

The board approved a roster of 87 teachers and six specialists to whom contracts will be offered March 15. The contracts will be offered on the present salary schedule, pending final negotiations between the teachers and the board. Teachers must sign by

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
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

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NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE CONSIDERATION OF THE LOCATION AND DESIGN ASPECTS FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF HIGHWAY 41 BETWEEN THE RICHFIELD INTERCHANGE AND THE SOUTH WINNEBAGO COUNTY LINE WASHINGTON, DODGE AND FONDU LAC COUNTIES

All interested persons are advised that a public hearing for the consideration of the location and design aspects for the upgrading of Highway 41 to freeway standards from a point about one-quarter mile northwest of Mayfield Road, just northwest of the Richfield interchange, in Washington County, to the south Winnebago County line is being planned by the Wisconsin Division of Highways. This project will not involve the section of Highway 41 between Highway 151 and Melody Lane near the west side of the City of Fond du Lac. This section was discussed at a similar public hearing held in Fond du Lac in 1970. This project involves access control, the addition of frontage roads, grade separations and interchanges to upgrade this section of Highway 41 to freeway standards. The project involves about forty-two miles and is a part of the continuing implementation of the State Highway Plan for 1990.

The Wisconsin Division of Highways, acting through its Highway Commission, will hold a public hearing on the above matter, as provided by law, at 10:00 a. m., on Tuesday, March 21, 1972, in the Theresa Legion Hall, on Highway 175 in Theresa, Wisconsin.

As an informational service, staff engineers will be present at the Theresa Legion Hall from 4:00 p. m. until 8:00 p. m. on the day preceding the hearing, Monday, March 20, 1972, and on the day of the hearing, Tuesday, March 21, 1972, from 8:00 a. m. until the time of the hearing, for informal discussion of the proposal. A map of the proposed project will be on display.

All interested persons are invited

to attend and present concise, relevant, oral or written statements concerning the economic, social and environmental impacts and effects of the proposed construction and whether it is or is not in the public interest and consistent with the goals and objectives of such area planning as has been promulgated by the communities.

Provisions will be made for the submission of written statements or other exhibits in place of, or in addition to, the oral statements presented at the public hearing. This additional written testimony and exhibits may be filed with the Highway Commission if post-marked not later than midnight, March 31, 1972. 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
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Scrappy Indians Ousted by Ripon in Oshkosh Sectional; Neenah Wins

LOSE AGAIN TO MAYVILLE FOR CONSOLATION HONORS

A long season finally came to an end for Kewaskum's Sub-Regional and Regional champions when the Indians were defeated by a strong Ripon team (21-1) in the opener of the WIAA Class A Sectional Tournament in spacious Kolf Sports Center fieldhouse at Oshkosh Friday evening. The final score was 73-62.

The scrappy Indians gave a fine effort and battled Ripon tooth and nail for more than a half before falling to the Tigers. In fact Kewaskum was ahead of Ripon at the half by three points, 28-25, and scored the first basket in the second half to go on top by five. Then the Indians hit a cold streak and fell behind. Steve Stellmacher, the Tigers' ace dribbler and high scorer, who was held to two points in the first half, exploded for 16 points alone in the third period to turn the tide in Ripon's favor.

In the second game Neenah, (20-2), a runner-up in last year's state tournament, beat Scenic Moraine champion Mayville (20-1), 50-43, in another close contest in which the Cardinals let the game slip away in the final quarter. Mayville was ahead 33-29 after three quarters but at one time in the final period Neenah scored 12 straight points to put the game on ice.

This resulted in Kewaskum and Mayville meeting again for consolation honors Saturday night and the Cardinals downed the Indians for the third time this season, 65-51, although the game was tight until the final few minutes when Mayville pulled away from Kewaskum's crippled team.

In the championship tilt Saturday Neenah defeated Ripon, 65-53, and advanced to the state tournament for the fourth year in a row. This game was also close and the Rockets didn't pull away to win until the final quarter after leading by just one point, 42-41, at the end of the third period. Neenah, with two regulars, Crist and Hawley, back from last year's state tournament team, was rated 8th among the Class A teams in the state this year. Although they weren't, we think Mayville should also have been rated among the top teams as they had a 20-1 record in fast company and gave Neenah a real tight battle. Mayville was ahead of them much of the game and Neenah didn't appear much stronger than the Cardinals.

The Scenic Moraine Conference can take pride in having two representatives reach the Sectional after all other schools in the surrounding area were already eliminated. This conference was the only one to have two teams in the Sectionals. It was the first time Kewaskum got that far since 1955 when the Indians lost to Shorewood's Greyhounds in the Whitefish Bay Sectional. Both Mayville and Kewaskum received a great amount of publicity in the daily papers, on radio and TV through their participation in the Sectional.

Approximately 5,000 persons attended the games each night in the huge sports center which seats about 6,500. All of the tournament games were televised live and in color on Channel 34, KFIZ-TV, Fond du Lac, and though hundreds of Kewaskum people attended the games, many hundreds more watched them on TV here

and in the area.

In Kewaskum's game with a taller, favored Ripon team, both started out slow with Ripon leading 12-11 at the quarter. Kewaskum went ahead 28-25 at halftime and it appeared a major upset was in the making for the Cinderella Indians. Kewaskum was able to dominate the first half against the big Tiger forward wall, which averaged 6'4" through some good shooting, especially by Glenn Eichstedt. Mitch Misko widened the Indians' lead to five but then Stellmacher got hot and scored 16 points by himself in the third quarter. On many of his baskets he dribbled right through the middle of the Indian defense for lay-ups and also was deadly on free throws. At one point he scored 8 straight points and the Tigers went ahead 53-44 after three quarters. Ripon's outstanding guard is probably the best the Indians faced all year and added 8 more points in the final period. The Indians closed the gap to 7 points with a little over a minute remaining but the Tigers scored the last 4 points to win by 11.

Coach Williams said Ripon was the best team they had faced all season with size and shooting ability. The officials (from Madison) let the Tigers get away with everything short of murder. The Indians were used to the officials calling them close in their conference but in the Sectional they failed to call many fouls, and the Tigers were getting by with their hands on the Kewaskum players consistently, hacking, blocking and shoving.

Stellmacher wound up high scorer with 26 points, followed by Sather with 19 and Ripon's big center Wiggs with 15. Eichstedt's 20 were tops for Kewaskum and Tom Theusch had 12.

In the consolation game with Mayville Saturday both teams appeared weary but the Indians gave the Cardinals their closest battle of the three this year. The contest was close until the last few minutes when Mayville pulled away.

Kewaskum played most of the game with two of its best players out. Theusch had an injured instep and had to watch much of the game from the bench. Eichstedt got into foul trouble in the first half and was removed and then in the third quarter he came down from a jump shot and suffered a badly sprained ankle which finished him for the game.

The Indians jumped off to a 4-0 lead but paced by Dan Heim, top scorer in the Scenic loop, the Cardinals were on top at the quarter, 10-7. Mitch Misko made good on 4 of 4 shots he took, most from long range, and added 2 free throws to put the Indians on top again but Dennis Toellner hit on 2 buckets right before the buzzer to give the Cardinals the lead at the half, 29-25. Mayville increased its lead to 9 points but Eichstedt cut it to 6 before his ankle injury forced him to leave. With him went the Indians' chance of rebounding against 6-4 Jeff Stieve and 6-3 Heim. However, Kewaskum did rally to regain the lead at 39-38 but Mayville again went ahead 42-41 at the three quarter mark. The Cardinals' height advantage took its toll in the last stanza and Stieve and Heim combined for 22 points to pull away. This pair scored 20 points apiece and Stieve snared 20 rebounds.
