School Board Discusses Physical Education, Summer School Programs

The Board of Education heard discussions of the district's physical education curriculum and the 1972 summer school program when it met here Monday night. William Wuebben, junior high physical education instructor outlined the activities in Grades 1-12. Supt. Floyd Brenholt said he asked Wuebben for the report in response to a request from board member Gerald Secor for such a report, including costs of the physical education program.

Wuebben said the program involves three basic parts and he asked the board to visualize a triangle with regular physical education at the bottom; intramural sports in the middle; and athletics for the superior athlete at the top.

He said there are five full-time physical education teachers, one for elementary, two for junior high and two for the high school. Grades 1-3 meet twice a week for classes of 20 minutes each; Grades 4-6 meet twice a week for 25-minute classes. Beginning with Grade 6, separate classes are held for boys and girls.

Wuebben said he believes that "athletics have a definite role in education, especially for the slower student." He added that "we have one of the poorest junior high athletic programs in the area."

Commenting on the cost of the physical education program, Supt. Brenholt noted that last year the program for about 2,000 students cost the district about \$38,000 or only about \$19 per capita. This includes teacher salaries, equipment and supplies but excludes intramural and athletics.

Stressing the values of the physical education program, Wuebben noted that it teaches students to control tempers, to get along socially and emotionally and it develops physical fitness and promotes good health. Noting that today there is more and more leisure time and many adults do not know how to use it, he said he would like to see the gym facilities opened up more often. This could possibly be in connection with the village-sponsored recreation program. He said it wouldn't cost too much and he believes the problems of vandalism and supervision can be worked out; that between the advisory committee on long-range planning, the school board and the physical education department, a community program could be worked out that would be willingly accepted.

Paul Schoenberger, director of the summer school program, discussed in particular the Title I segment which is 100 per cent federally funded, and covers pre-kindergarten through Grade 4. He said this year the Title I program will be evaluated extensively by a volunteer advisory council which he called for. Members will be Mrs. Frank Werhanowicz, Mrs. Joseph Garman, Mrs. Hartwell Paul and Mrs. John Coulter.

There will be some innovations Schoenberger noted. Team teaching will be one and "we hope to have the teachers try new teaching methods," he said. Though the

subjects in the Title I program are the same as previously—arts and crafts, field trips, group plays and games—the emphasis this year is shifted from remedial education to individualized education. He said a reading consultant has been hired and the aim is "a real diagnosis and identification of the problems."

Summer school will be held from June 19 to Aug. 4 with a recess from July 1-9. Schoenberger said there will be a pre-kindergarten screening of all district children who plan to enter kindergarten in the fall, from June 19-30. Each child's medical history as well as results of testing will be compiled into one book and given to his teacher.

The proposed summer school budget amounts to \$14,070 of which \$200 is the district portion of pre-kindergarten screening; \$10,270 is for 13 staff members for non-Title I; \$2,900 is the district's part of busing including field trips; and \$700 is for materials. The cost is covered in the current budget.

Mrs. Charles Trapp, a Town of Scott elector, said she questions whether renting quarters away from school for district offices is such a good idea. "In case of trouble at school, how would you handle it?" she wanted to know. The board has been considering renting space in the Kewaskum Savings Office and converting the two present offices into classrooms.

She was told that most districts have their offices apart from the schools and that in case of trouble, each principal is in charge of his school. At the conclusion of the meeting, the board toured the facilities available at the Kewaskum Savings. A room about the size of the two present offices, and a storage area is available for \$75 per month, including light, heat and custodial services. A community room for board meetings is available. No action was taken.

Youth Is Killed. Kewaskum Family Hurt in Crashes

Jeffrey, L. Stoffel, 15, of Campbellsport, a sophomore student at Campbellsport Union High School, who was active in athletics and school affairs, was fatally injured in an auto crash early Saturday in Fond du Lac County. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Agnes Hospital.

Stoffel was fatally hurt when the car in which he and another youth, Michael G. Gilboy, 16, of R. 1, St. Cloud, were riding left State Hwy. 23 about 3 1/2 miles southwest of St. Cloud, struck a culvert and a tree. Gilboy was reported in serious condition at the hospital. It was not known who was driving the car, reportedly owned by Lawrence Gilboy, R. 1, St. Cloud.

Stoffel was the son of Alois and Rita (Klumpy) Stoffel. He was a starter on the Campbellsport varsity basketball team and last

4 OTHER BALLOTS WILL BE CAST AT SPRING ELECTION

Next Tuesday, April 4, is Spring Election day in Wisconsin. Polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. in the village and area townships. Balloting in the village will be at the municipal building and for the Town of Kewaskum at the Labor Center in the village.

Three village board trustees will be elected and there are seven candidates for the three offices. The three incumbents, Raynor Herriges, Gregor A. Nigh and Elmer Yoost, are all on the ticket for re-election. They will be opposed by Daniel S. Schmidt, Robert A. Staehler, Alvin H. Wiesner and Richard E. Zarling.

Three school board members of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jr. School District No. 2, will also be elected. There are 11 candidates for the three positions. They include two incumbents, Allen A. Tessar and Gerald Secor. The third incumbent, John Jadro, is not seeking re-election. The nine other candidates are James D. Oelhafen, Charles Ogi, Orville Kern, Robert S. Zarling, E. Earl Howell, Joseph Sekeres, Sheila K. Parvin, Byron W. Gessner and Joseph J. Staehler.

On the county supervisory ballot, Charles E. Miller, trustee of the Village of Kewaskum and incumbent member of the Washington County Board for the Village of Kewaskum, District No. 10, will be unopposed for re-election.

But in District 9, made up of the Towns of Wayne and Kewaskum, John A. Oelhafen, incumbent board member and chairman of the Town of Wayne, is facing opposition from Carl A. Meilahn, chairman of the Town of Kewaskum for the Dist. 9 seat on the board.

On the ballot for judicial election, J. Tom Merriam is unopposed for re-election as Washington County judge.

Ballots will also be cast on a Presidential Preference Vote for candidates on the Republican and Democrat parties. Candidates on the Republican ticket are Richard Nixon, Paul McCloskey and John Ashbrook. Those listed on the Democratic ticket are Eugene J. McCarthy, Shirley Chisholm, Wilbur D. Mills, Patsy T. Mink, George S. McGovern, Samuel Yorty, Hubert H. Humphrey, Vance Hartke, John V. Lindsay, Edmund S. Muskie, Henry M. Jackson and George Wallace.

Voters will also vote on four referendum questions, numbered 1, 2, 3 and 4 on the ballot. Space does not permit the listing of these referendum questions but they can be referred to on the sample ballots now available.

played with the Cougars here in the Sub-Regional Tournament several weeks ago. Jeffrey was also active in football, track and baseball and other school affairs.

Survivors include his parents, seven brothers, five sisters, and his maternal grandparents. Funeral services were held at St. Matthew's Catholic Church, Campbellsport, Tuesday.

Six persons, five of them members of a rural Kewaskum family, were injured in a two car crash at the intersection of State Hwys. 45 and 60 near Jackson at 10:15 p. m. Sunday. The collision occurred when an eastbound auto operated by Robert DeLong, 31, of

R. 2, Hartford, apparently failed to stop for the intersection of 60 and collided with a northbound vehicle driven by Harold Bath, 42, of R. 2, Kewaskum.

Injured in the mishap were Mrs. Adeline Bath, 41, who was the most severely hurt with head injuries. She was transferred to St. Joseph's Hospital, Milwaukee, after all the injured were initially taken to the Hartford Community Hospital. Also injured were the three Bath children, Steven 14, cut on back of head and chin and bruised right leg; Connie 9, bruises to left elbow and leg and toe on right foot; Debbie 6, cut on right hand and lip and right leg injury, and the driver, Harold Bath, chest pains.

DeLong suffered cuts over both eyes and a possible fracture of

the right shoulder and cuts on the forehead. He was alone in his car.


