Kiwanis Club Observes 25th Anniversary

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club celebrated its 25th anniversary Monday night, April 24, at a banquet held at the Wigwam. Dinner was served at 7:30 p. m. with a program following.

Roy W. Davis, vice president of Kiwanis International, greeted the 150 local and area Kiwanians, wives, charter members and guests who gathered for the occasion. Davis, of Chicago, was an honored guest along with R. P. Merridew, International secretary, also of Chicago; Martin J. Young of Green Bay, governor of Wisconsin-Upper Michigan, and Paul R. Hollrith of Grafton, lieutenant governor of Region 7-S.

As speaker of the evening, Davis saluted the Kewaskum Kiwanians for the moral fiber and stamina that helped the club to weather "the difficulties that were encountered through the years and to come out on top." "All of us wearing a 'K' have something going for us as we work together for the same goals and objectives," Davis continued. "Kiwanis gives us something we wouldn't have otherwise—a big prospective devoted to making the community a better one in which to live. Plans, Objections Discussed for 20 Unit Apartment

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Foundation formally offered the Village of Kewaskum funds for an outdoor swimming pool when the village board met Monday night.

Kiwanian Gerald Stollenwerk appeared and read a letter addressed to Village President C. N. Wieter which stated that the Foundation's commitment would be "dependent on the presentation of a suitable site and construction plans to the Kiwanis Foundation's board of directors" and a request from the village.

Stollenwerk indicated the letter validated what had been previously discussed verbally. Wieter said the trustees are working on obtaining a site for the pool. Several locations are being considered. "We will try to make a speedy effort to obtain a site," Wieter said.

Several years ago the Kiwanis Foundation offered funds for a pool on the high school site if the school district would provide an enclosure. Those plans were abandoned when electors turned down a referendum to borrow needed funds.

Daniel Schmidt of 402 Main St. appeared to voice his objections to the proposed plans of Richard L. Edwards to erect a 20-unit apartment complex at the corner of Railroad and First Streets. Plans call for cutting down the present Remmel Mfg. building to eight feet and erecting the complex to include four two-bedroom, 13 one-bedroom and three efficiency apartments.

Schmidt said he has noted that Edwards plans 30 parking stalls of 10 by 19 feet each but in checking on parking area requirements with the Washington County zoning commission he found that the state requires a 20 by 30 foot parking area for each apartment. This is not a parking space but a parking area, which includes space to turn around, Schmidt said.

He suggested denial of a building permit by the village because an apartment building at that location "would be a detriment to the village." He said he foresees traffic problems with the fire department, police department and municipal building across the street and with Fairmont Foods, Regal Ware, churches and schools in the area. For the children who must walk in that area it would be "a hazard," Schmidt observed. His brother Richard of 309 First St. also spoke against the proposed building.

"Would you rather see the old building there," asked board member Raynor Herriges. "No," replied Daniel, "but I can't see putting too large a building there."

Edwards has appeared before the village plan commission several times. Points of consideration have been whether there would be ample parking space and am-

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KHS Junior in Top 1% in State Math Contest

Kewaskum High School junior, Nina Wulff, has placed in the top one per cent of a statewide contest conducted by the Wisconsin Section of the Mathematical Association of America (M.A.A.) on March 25. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Wulff of R.R. Allenton.

Out of 1,152 contestants from 232 schools, Miss Wulff achieved a score of 99 to place her as one of the top 12 per cent in the final

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contest. Nina also attained the highest score in the preliminary test given earlier this year.

The final essay-type test was given at more than two dozen centers throughout the state. It was scored on the basis of correctness of solutions, method of attack, evidence of ingenuity and insight, inventiveness, and soundness of reasoning. It is designed to identify and reward outstanding mathematical students early in their careers, so they can be encouraged to continue their studies in mathematics or related fields.

Also rating highly in the preliminary contest (top 25 per cent) from Kewaskum: sophomore Bruce Markelewski, juniors Lance Schultz and Ned Stoffel, seniors Perry Nigh and Mike Petri.

Other top one percent achievers from the area are John M. Herder from Mayville and Richard H. E. Smith from West Bend East.

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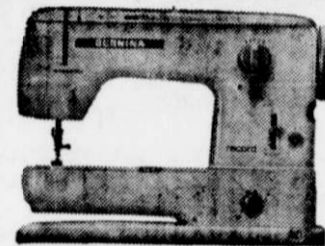
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Citizens Long-Range Planning Group to Poll Residents on Goals of Area Schools

The Citizens Long-Range Planning Committee for the Kewaskum school district has prepared an "educational goals survey" in questionnaire form, with the purpose of ascertaining what the public feels should be the goals of the Kewaskum Public Schools.

To get a sampling opinion, each committee member is asking ten people to complete the questionnaire. They are to be returned by May 11 when the group will meet again and make any changes deemed advisable before a district-wide survey is made.

Every household in the district will then receive the survey questionnaire from the second printing. They will be picked up by students in Dean Roe's social studies classes, hopefully the third week in May, according to Mrs. John Hubbell, general chairman of the committee.

Mrs. Hubbell asks all district residents to watch their mail closely for the questionnaire, making sure it is not carelessly tossed into the wastebasket. She stresses it is important that each one is filled out.

Wayne Rimmel of Kewaskum has been elected general chairman of the group which has had its second meeting and has organized itself into sub-committees. With Gary Gerhartz of the school faculty as chairman, sub-committee I will deal with the future. It will interpret the results of the questionnaire and compare them with information obtained from sub-committee II on assessment

of the present situation. Al Ciha and student James Gaffke are on this committee. This group will then make recommendations to the school board.

Under the chairmanship of Al Bremser, committee II will work to assess the situation as it is presently in the regions of physical facilities, curriculum, staff needs,

overcrowding, etc. They will then submit a written report on their findings. Lee Kempf, Stanley Woolman and Ralph Eisenmann are on this committee.

Supt. Floyd Brenholt has suggested it would be beneficial for committee members to tour all schools in the district, individually, so that each might have the opportunity to observe differently.

 ple lawn space. By making some changes, Edwards arrived at the 30 parking stalls. However, he appeared toward the end of Monday night's meeting and said if four parking stalls were taken out of the plans, 20 by 40 feet would be added to the grass area and it would save cutting down a big tree.

The lawn situation was discussed at the April 17 board meeting. Edwards said then that in view of the fact that 71 per cent of the lot is taken up either by building or parking lot, he realizes there is not enough lawn space according to state recommendations. However, there is no ruling on it, he said.

Wietor told Edwards Monday night that the plan commission recommends a 16-unit building because of the limited space. Edwards said, "If we don't get 20 units, we'll make it into a warehouse and the old building can stay forever." Richard Schmidt then asked Edwards, "are you trying to pressure the village?"

Wietor said "our decision will be based on the recommendation of the plan commission and state approval of Edwards' plans unless there would be a lot of pressure

from groups." Wietor said there have been some objections. Edwards' plans have been approved by the state. He and a brother-in-law Gerald Mehlos, are going into this together.

It was pointed out that the village plan commission is in a quandary. A new zoning ordinance is in the making, and except for area requirements, Edwards' plans would pass under it. But it is not yet in effect. Five variances would be needed to approve the plans under the present ordinance.

Village attorney Roger McKenna suggested "the only other thing is to repeal the present ordinance." The village would then be without one until the new ruling is adopted.

Edwards said he believes the building would be "a valuable asset to Kewaskum" and that the variances could be waived. He noted the structure is more on the deluxe side when it comes to building costs. One bedroom units have 600 square feet of area. "We are not building it to sell," he said.

Board member Orval Behnke noted that the village will be required to hire a zoning administrator and that the job will take a great deal of time and study. It was decided that each board member submit one or two names.

These will be screened before final appointment.

The board voted to proceed with plans for a 14-foot addition on the blower building at the sewage treatment plant to house the phosphate removal equipment. Village engineer James Elder discussed phosphate removal through use of a dry or liquid chemical. It was decided to go with the liquid process and a 4,000 gallon capacity tank is needed. The village is under federal orders to remove phosphate from its sewage effluent.

Also authorized was a new screen for the stack of the incinerator following a complaint of a considerable amount of fly ash in the area. A request from Harold Westerman to erect an 8-family apartment building on Stark St. north of the Lloyd Westerman home was referred to the plan commission for an answer within 10 days.

Complaints were registered by Elroy Egerer, Mrs. Kathryn Gruendeman and Daniel Schmidt about the big jump in sewage charges. Egerer said it means an increase of about \$100 per quarter for his 9 apartments. He suggested the village revert to its former policy of basing sewage charges on water consumption. He said raising his rent is out of the question because rents are competitive and his are as high as he can go for what he has to offer. Mrs. Gruendeman said she is being charged double—once for her home and once for her beauty shop. Schmidt said he is being

charged \$21 for the barber shop in his building because it is rated commercial, yet contributes little sewage.

Wietor reminded the audience that a public hearing was held on the proposed rates before adoption and that industry came but only one residential couple came. However, he said this was "the first time around" on the new rates and they will have to be studied and "we will work from there," probably making some adjustments in rates.

Board member Charles Miller consoled those with complaints: "you are not alone—and holding up a list of names said, "I will add you to a list of complaints. You'll hear from us later on."

A building permit was approved for Wimmer-Blatter and Leroy Zipperer.

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DOG ORDINANCE

It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor or permit to remain about his premises any dog for which no license exists and for which one is required.

It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog to permit such dog to enter and roam on the premises of another, unless accompanied by the owner or keeper, and the owner or keeper has obtained permission to enter and trespass on the property.

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor within the limits of the township any dog which frequently or habitually barks, yells, or howls.

Any person violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than one dollar (\$1.00) nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00). Each day that the provisions of this ordinance or any part thereof or violated shall be and constitute a separate offense hereunder.

This ordinance was passed and adopted on the 25th day of April, 1972 by the Town Board, Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, State of Wisconsin.
