Winners of J. O. Reigle Scholarships

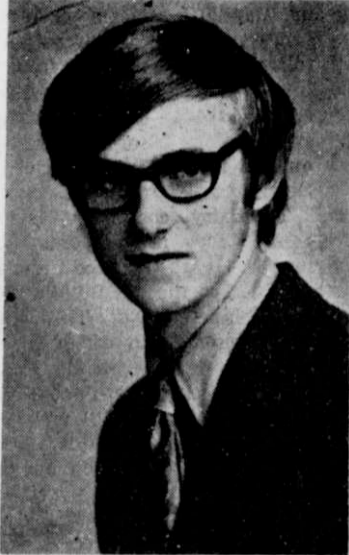


Doris Beimborn

Regal Ware, Inc. has announced that Doris Beimborn and Tim Ryan have been chosen as recipients of the J. O. Reigle Scholarships for 1972. The awards, offered each year to the graduating class of Kewaskum Community High School, have a value of \$2,000 and will provide each student \$500 per year during a four year college course.

Doris, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reinhard Beimborn, R. 6, West Bend, will be graduating with high honors. In addition to maintaining a perfect four point scholastic average, Doris was active in student affairs. She served as school newspaper reporter and was a National Scholarship Qualifying Semifinalist. Other school memberships included Forensics, FHA Historian, AFS, GAA and German Club. Her outside activities include 4-H membership, a full church youth program and part-time work at St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend. Her ambition is to become a nurse or a doctor after studying at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

Announce New Shopping Center for Area; Dave Skrentny Is Principal Developer

WILL HOUSE 12 STORES AT LOCATION SOUTH OF HERE

An announcement of the new North Point Shopping Center for the West Bend and Kewaskum areas has recently been made public by officials of the project. The site is located on the west side of U.S. Highway 45 approximately one mile north of West Bend on the northwest corner of the intersection of Town Hall Road and Friendly Drive.

Foundation construction of the first of several buildings will start on June 1, and it is expected that this building will be completed by Sept. 1. When completed, the shopping center is scheduled to house approximately 12 stores in four buildings which will be connected by covered walks.

The first phase will be the new home of Dave's Music Center of Kewaskum. Dave Skrentny, owner, is the principal developer of the project and owns the land. In addition a liquor and beverage outlet, a health food store, cheese and sausage shop, antique and gift shop and a fruit market are anticipated to be located at this site. Other types of business to follow include clothing, supermarket, gift sport and hardware.

The site was selected because of the ease of access from Highway 45, ample free parking, and an enthusiastic response from local residents for an uncongested shopping center located on the north side of West Bend. The future development of the West Bend by-pass will eventually place this shopping center directly at the north access point to the new freeway.

Construction work will be supervised by Inland Steel Building Systems Company of Milwaukee with the financing provided by Bay Federal Savings and Loan Association of Brown Deer.

27.9 Mile Walk For Development Brings in \$1,000

164 STUDENTS AND 2 DOGS PARTICIPATE

Despite the cool, rainy weather, 164 students and two dogs participated in Kewaskum's Walk for Development Saturday. Students (and dogs) assembled at the high school at 7:30 a. m. The walk was a 27.9 mile hike over roads and trails in the Kettle Moraine area.

Some of the students, discouraged by the rain, gave up early in the day but between 90 and 100 students finished the route. Six students decided to run the whole distance. Randy Backhaus and Jeff Ketter ran the distance and were in by 12:15. Perry Nigh, Orrin Acker, Ken Wilson and Leroy Plautz came in about an hour later. However, most of the students didn't come in until 4 p. m. The last walker staggered up to the high school to be checked in at 6:45. Even the dogs made it in. Patty Roe, pulled by Brandy, her St. Bernard, and Susie Gruber, with her dog Bozo, finished the entire route.

All money from the walk is to be turned in to the Bank of Kewaskum no later than May 26. Students failing to turn in the money will be contacted. The exact amount raised by Saturday's walk has not been determined but it is expected to be around \$1,000.

The Kewaskum Student Government would like to thank all those who donated time, money and property for checkpoints. It took a lot of time and energy on the part of many students and adults to make it a success.

Widen Search for Missing Pilot, Formerly of Here

Searchers for the missing plane piloted by Harold Carlson of West Bend, formerly of Kewaskum, widened their efforts during the week to locate any possible sign of the 1943 Stearman biplane lost on what appeared to be a routine flight from the Oshkosh area winter storage quarters of the plane to the West Bend airport.

The plane, with a yellow fuselage and silver wings and tail section, disappeared about noon Saturday when Carlson was flying it to the Aerial Blight Control, Inc. hangar at the West Bend airport. It was feared that Carlson may have depleted his supply of gasoline in looking for an opening in the overcast and fog which covered the area or crashed due to other trouble.

Carlson and his wife, the former Margaret Muenk, are both former residents of Kewaskum and were educated in the local schools. Mrs. Carlson called the county sheriff's department about 6 p. m. Saturday when she could

not find out if the plane had returned. Officers called the Winnebago County Sheriff's Dept. which dispatched a squad car to the airport at Oshkosh and they found the plane had left about 10:45 a. m. but not returned.

Carlson, 50, of 839 Lincoln Drive W. in West Bend is manager of West Bend Automotive Supply. A former employee of Aerial Blight Control, Inc., he had gone to Oshkosh to fly a stored crop dusting biplane to the West Bend hangar. He was an experienced pilot.

No sign of the plane has been found since and searchers this week continued checking out every possible new lead. A massive search by air and land and even on area waterways was under way since Saturday. Helicopters from the Wisconsin Army National Guard unit based in West Bend as well as planes from the West Bend airport, Milwaukee, Waukesha, Fond du Lac and the Wisconsin-Illinois border have been aiding in the tireless search. The coast guard conducted a search of the entire Lake Michigan shoreline north and south of Port Washington, sheriff's department, deputies, horsemen, boaters and citizens of a wide area are continuing the search on land, water and in the air, under the direction of the Civil Air Patrol. Searchers included about 30 to 40 volunteers from the West Bend and Kewaskum area.

Officials reported getting many reports from residents stating they saw or heard the plane but all of them were fruitless.

"Someone broke into my wife's car," said the man, "and stole \$40 worth of groceries — out of the glove compartment."

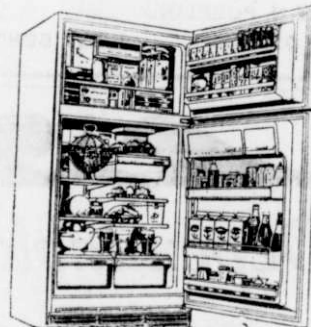

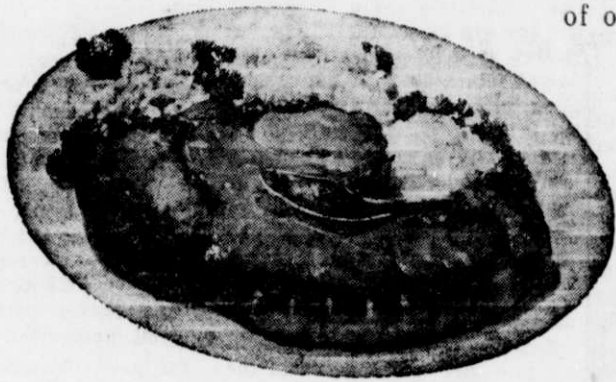

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School Board Votes to Move 2 Portable Classrooms to Wayne

The Board of Education voted Monday night to move the two portable classrooms from Kewaskum to the Wayne Elementary School to ease overcrowding there. The portable buildings are now used here for kindergarten classes.

The meeting was held at Wayne School, and led by Principal Timothy Leader, board members toured the four-classroom school before the meeting. Wayne already has one portable classroom which is used for kindergarten in the morning and band or music afternoons.

Grades 1-4 meet in the regular classrooms and Grades 5 and 6 in the gym, which one year ago was converted into an open concept teaching area. Enrollment for Grades 1-6 is 140. Leader said when he came seven years ago, it had 70 students, grades 1-8.

The portable classrooms will be moved to the rear of the school which is located on a 20-acre site. Existing playground equipment will not have to be moved. Plans call for removing the glass doors at the rear of the school proper and constructing a breezeway, connecting the main building with the portable rooms which are 24 by 44 feet each. The gym will then no longer be used for classes.

Tentatively, the portables will house first and second grades at Wayne. The cost of moving, hooking them up and getting them set is about \$7,000. That figure is based primarily on bids, according to Supt. Floyd Brenholt.

According to present plans, the Kewaskum kindergarten classes will move into the lower portion of the present junior high building when junior high moves to an 8,000 square foot open concept building addition now under construction at the Kewaskum High School. It is to be ready by August.

Board members voted 5 to 2 in favor of moving the portables with Richard Theusch and Gerald Zimmer casting the "no" votes. But the decision came only after a discussion once again of a possible building program and referendum.

At the suggestion of Henry Misko, a Kewaskum village elector, the board approved holding an activities awards banquet to honor not only the school's athletes, but also those who have excelled in music, debate and forensics. It will be the first such event held at the school and will be held either May 31 or June 3. The school will provide one trophy for one outstanding person in each

Village Board Adopts New Policy On Handling Business of Public

At a special meeting Tuesday night, members of the Village Board adopted a new policy on how they will handle business brought before them by the public.

Persons having business for board consideration must notify the village commissioner of the nature not later than the Friday preceding the meeting so the matter can be placed on the agenda. Copies of the printed agenda will then be mailed to the board members prior to the meetings which are held regularly on the first Monday of the month.

At the meetings, the board will take up only what is on the agenda, except for emergency matters and it will be up to the village president to decide what business items constitute an emergency. Since the new policy also applies to those persons seeking building permits, it was decided to notify all persons in the area connected with the building industry.

The suggestion for the new policy came from Trustee Charles Miller who said he feels the length of future meetings can be cut considerably because of it.

Village Attorney Roger McKenna reported on what he termed "the only realistic approach" to determine exactly where the north village limits are to resolve existing discrepancies. He said he has arranged a meeting with Robert McManus of the engineering firm of McMahon and Associates of Menasha and Theodore Meilahn, Washington County surveyor. Previously, each had come up with a different description of where the section line is.

The area in question is pie-shaped, beginning at the rear of the Otto Ramthun, Jr., home and increasing to about eight feet on the Clarke Werner property. One year ago property owners in that area appeared before the village board and asked that the village determine where the line is.

A partial survey behind the Werner home established the section line about eight feet farther south than is shown on the vil-

category at a maximum total of \$75. Included in the approval was that the district subsidize expenses if the event is not self-supporting financially. Tickets will be \$3 for adults and \$1.50 for students under age 12.

The board formally approved the contract for Clark A. Pearson to become high school principal July 1. Announcement of his being chosen was made last week.

McKenna stated that McManus was the surveyor who did most of the work on the assessor's map when the McMahon firm was employed by the village as consulting engineers. McManus and Meilahn will compare their field notes to study how they arrived at their individual lines and try to determine why there is a difference. Said McKenna, "we will proceed from there. If there is a grave dispute, we may call in a third surveyor as a mediator." In the interest of the village, James Elder, its present engineer, will be present.

McKenna continued, "the question is not who owns what but rather where is the section line. It is a technical question which could be a serious one. It could affect the entire east side of the village, up to the bridge."

The board approved a contract with Tom Schumacher of Milwaukee under which he will investigate any erroneously allocated income taxes which might possibly be due the village under the state's state shared tax plan. The board decided to draw up specifications and advertise for bids for a one-half ton pick-up truck for the sewage department.

Trustee Orval Behnke suggested the building code be amended to lower the cost of a building permit for industrial or commercial buildings which come under jurisdiction of state building inspections. He contended that the amount of inspection the village inspector will need to give will a-

mount to no more than on a home.

The present rates are \$1.80 per cu. ft. for business or institution and \$1 per cu. ft. for manufacturing and industrial. "I think our rates are too high," said Behnke. "We're going to drive industry and commercial builders away from the village." Trustee Gregor Nigh commented that the code might need to be amended but that he "didn't buy" the reasoning regarding the state inspection. It was decided to find out what other communities are doing before making a decision.

A bid of \$3,395 from J. R. Grant and Associates of Lake Mills for lab equipment in the sewage treatment plant was accepted. It was the only bid received when bids were opened May 1. An operator's license was approved for Aloysius Staehler of 1270 Brooklane Drive.

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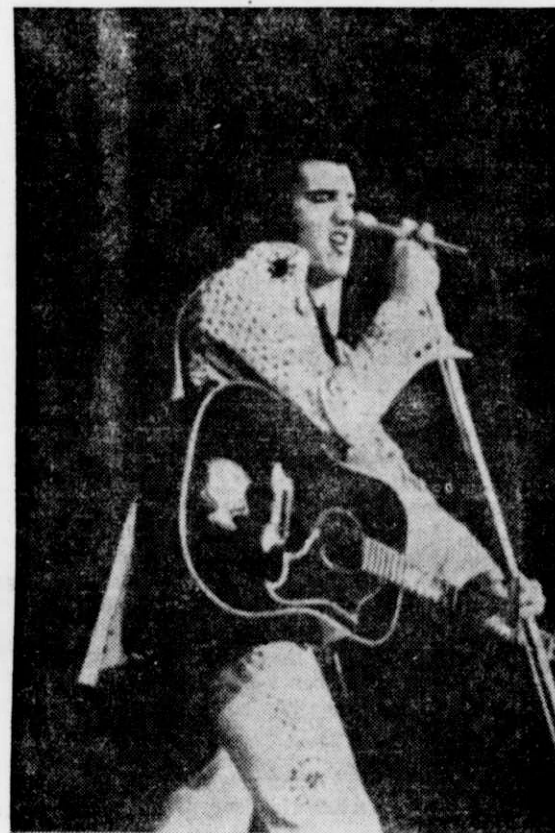
