## Application for 20-Unit Apartment Building Denied by Village Board

The application of Richard L. Edwards to construct a 20-unit apartment building on the corner of Railroad and First Streets has been turned down. Appearing at the regular meeting of the Village Board Monday night, Edwards was told that the denial was based on the findings of the village Plan Commission after much study and although the members of the Village Board had not voted on the matter, it is their opinion also that the application should be denied. Village President C. N. Wietor said the Plan Commission has gone on record that it might consider a 16-unit complex. His application was tabled.

Edwards' plans call for cutting down the present Remmel Mfg. Co. building to eight feet and erecting an apartment complex to include four two-bedroom, 13 one-bedroom and three efficiency units.

Edwards wanted to know on what facts the objections are based. Wietor said the area is too congested with the fire and police departments and municipal building across the street and for reasons of parking. "Where will the apartment visitors park?" asked Wietor.

"I have been here several times," Edwards told the board. "Why didn't you tell me this six months ago?" Wietor responded with, "I'm sure it was brought to (Continued on page 3)

## Young Couple Found Dead in Parked Auto

The deaths of a young couple found dead in a parked car have been ruled due to accidental carbon monoxide by Sheboygan county coroner Richard W. Suscha.

The victims were Nancy Zak, 23, of R. 1, Cascade, and John Zwick, 20, of Milwaukee, formerly of R. 1, Adell.

The bodies were discovered by Arthur Neumann of R. 1, Adell, who saw the car parked in a corn field about one-fourth mile from Maple Tree Road in the northwest corner of the Town of Scott, near Crooked Lake. This was about 2 p. m. Sunday and Sheboygan county authorities were called to the scene. Miss Zak's mother said the couple left on a date Friday night.

Coroner Suscha ruled that the couple was overcome by poisonous fumes as they sat with the windows rolled up in the air-conditioned car belonging to Zwick.

John Michael Zwick of 4618 West Eggert Place, Milwaukee, formerly of R. 1, Adell, was a carpenter apprentice. He was born March 10, 1952 in Milwaukee. He attended Kewaskum High School for two years and graduated from Twenty Nine Palms High School in California. Zwick served two years in the U.S. Marines, part of which were spent in Vietnam. He was vice president of Crooked Trails Snowmobile Club.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Ellis Krahn, of R. 1, Adell; two sisters, Christine and Leslie, at home; his father, John Zwick, and a half-brother, Paul Zwick, both of Germantown; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Mary Przybylowski of Milwaukee, and other relatives and friends.

Visitation was at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, from 7 to 9 p. m. Tuesday. There was a closed casket. Rosary vigil was held at 8 p. m. Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Wednesday from the funeral home and at 10:30 at St. Matthias Catholic Church in the Town of Auburn. Rev. Walter Morgan officiated and burial took place in the parish cemetery.

## Loot Vending Machines in Village, Area

Two outdoor soft drink vending machines were looted in the village during the early hours of Tuesday and Kewaskum police are investigating.

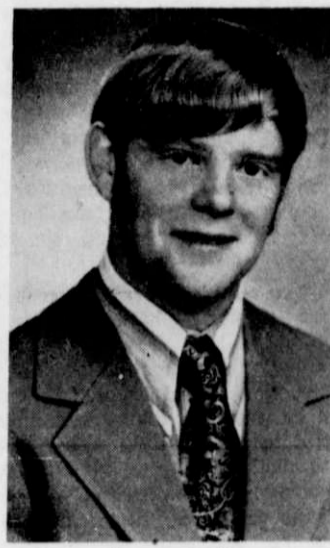
## Awarded Kiwanis Scholarships

## Two Youths Hurt, Commencement Car Destroyed by Fire in Collision At KHS Tonight

Two teenage drivers were injured, two cars were demolished, one of which caught fire and was totally destroyed by the flames in an accident on CTH H about one and a half miles southwest of Kewaskum late Sunday night near the Carl Volm rural residence.

The crash occurred when a car driven by Mark L. Strobel, 18, of 331 Clinton St., Kewaskum, collided with the rear of an auto driven by Michael P. Krell, 17, of R. 6, West Bend, which investigating sheriff's deputies reported, was illegally parked on the roadway. Krell was charged with illegal parking on the roadway.

The Krell auto burst into flames in the roadway and the Kewaskum fire department was summoned to put out the blaze. Twenty-eight firemen spent about an hour at the scene dousing the blaze and cleaning up the roadway. The fire department ambulance was also called and conveyed the injured to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

Strobel incurred cuts on the chin and left side of his face. Krell suffered minor injuries in the crash which occurred at 10:56 p. m. Sunday.

It occurred some time between 5:30 and 7 a. m. as one of his patrolmen stopped at one of the machines just before 5:30 a. m.

Roger's Service Station located on Hwy. 45 near the south village limits was also visited by the thief or thieves. There also a machine was broken into and coins were stolen.

Business places in West Bend and area also reported lootings of vending machines.

## Beach, Swim Program to Open June 17

The Kewaskum beach will officially open for the year on Saturday, June 17. The beach hours will remain basically the same: Monday-Friday, 10 a. m.-5 p. m.; Saturday, 9 a. m.-5 p. m.; Sunday, 1 p. m.-5 p. m.

As was the case in past years, if anyone uses the beach at times other than the above listed times, they will be swimming at THEIR OWN RISK—the lifeguards will be on duty only during the hours listed.

One big change will be in the time of day when lessons will be held. Because of a past conflict with summer school, and hoping to take advantage of warmer water conditions, the lessons for this summer will be held in the afternoon according to the following schedule:

12:30-1 p. m.—Advanced Beginners  
1-1:30 p. m.—Beginners, Green  
1:30-2 p. m.—Beginners, White  
2-2:30 p. m.—Intermediates  
Lifesaving—Time to be determined if enough interest is shown.

Since the lessons will be in the afternoon, the beach will be available for open swimming during the morning hours and those hours in the afternoon following the lessons. There will also be open swimming during the time of the lessons, but on a somewhat restricted basis—open swimming will be permitted during lessons ONLY IN those AREAS of the beach NOT BEING USED for lessons.

The beginner group is for those learning to swim. This may include someone who has had no previous instruction, or it may include those who have previously had some swimming instruction but still need to remain in shallow water for review and practice. The designation of green and white does not refer to ability. Both groups will receive the same instruction, but with two groups the size will be smaller than one large group and the level of instruction more individualized. In order to sign up for beginners, a youngster must be at least 7 years old or have completed the first grade.

The advanced beginner group is for those who have some swimming ability. Those youngsters who sign up for this level of instruction should be able to enter deep water, by diving or jumping, and then be able to swim safely to shallow water. This class will provide the youngster a chance to improve on his basic swimming stroke and allow him to become

more relaxed and at home in any depth of water. A youngster should be at least 7 years old and have the ability mentioned above before signing up for this level of instruction.

The intermediate level of instruction is for those who can swim well on their stomachs and/or back. The class will provide the youngster a chance to learn 3 different types of swimming strokes. A youngster should be at least 6 years old and be able to swim 50 yards in deep water and float on his back before signing up for this level of instruction.

A class in lifesaving will be held if there are enough people interested and enough people sign up for the class. Those who sign up will be asked to choose a suitable time for their class to meet.

All of the lessons meet daily Monday - Friday for their scheduled half hour. The lessons last for a two week session and then a new set of lessons, a new session, begins. The sessions are as follows:

June 19 - June 30  
July 3 - July 14  
July 17 - July 28

July 31 - August 11

Sign up sheets for swimming lessons are available at the municipal building until June 16. On June 17 and 18 they will be available at the beach and an instructor will be present on those 2 days to answer any questions.

These swimming lessons are offered in order to provide all youngsters a chance to learn how to swim. After having completed certain tests, at each ability level, as specified by the Red Cross, some youngsters may qualify for certificates from the Red Cross. However, providing this opportunity to learn how to swim to a large group and not merely awarding a certificate to a few, is the real goal of the program and the real reason for its inclusion in the summer recreation program.

In order to provide safe swim-

ming conditions, the same rules and regulations will be in force at the beach as in past years and one in particular. Anyone under 7 years old must be accompanied and supervised by someone 16 years or older if they plan on using the swimming area.

your attention."

At this point Village Attorney Roger McKenna said that the Plan Commission found Edwards' plans as presented in violation of the present zoning ordinance "and there is nothing we can do about that, unless variances are allowed."

Violations include side yard, rear yard and set-back regulations; auto parking and total square feet area per unit. A new village zoning ordinance is in the making. Wietor said he believes it should be ready by July 15 but even under the new code, variances will have to be applied for on side yard and set back regulations.

Edwards wanted to know if the fact that the apartment building will be an asset was considered. He was told it was considered, along with the tax revenue it would bring to the village.

Edwards asked if the matter can be brought to the board of appeals. He was told that it could but that the board of appeals must stand on its own two feet; that it must consider what is on the books right now. "The key issue is that the plans submitted do not fit into the village regulations," McKenna stated, adding that "there has been no application for variances. It is not up to the board to ask for variances—the board does not take the initiative."

"At this stage, you're putting the cart before the horse. You are spinning your wheels to go to the board of appeals now without first applying for variances," McKenna continued. The site in question is now zoned light industrial. Under the proposed new code it will go to R4, which is multiple family housing.

Edwards wanted to know who decides on such applications, the Plan Commission or the Village Board. McKenna informed the Board. McKenna said that all plans are presented to the Plan Commission. It then makes recommendation to the Village Board which reviews the entire matter. On an over-all basis, the Village Board denies or approves an application. If an individual feels he has been "hurt," he can appeal to the board of appeals.

Edwards' plans have been state-approved. On the question of whether the foundation will meet requirements of the state safety inspector, Edwards said, "we know the northwest corner is poor; if some areas are not strong enough, they can be repaired or replaced. I was told that is an argument between the designing engineer and the state safety inspector."

A request from William Ruth, realtor, to have the village straighten a creek that runs through the former Wallace Geisdel farm was denied. Ruth and Al Tennies

of the Ideal Land Co. had first appeared before the board with the request at the May 1 village board meeting.

There were no objections to installation of curb and gutter in various parts of the village at a public hearing held on the matter preceding the regular board meeting. A total of 27 property holders are involved.

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## School Board Approves Remodeling, Tables Hiring of Student Aides

After lengthy discussions Tuesday night, the Board of Education approved some remodeling projects among Kewaskum schools but tabled a proposal to hire 13 students for teacher aides. Because of the drawn-out meeting, the board also postponed action on removing carpeting at Wayne School and installing it in its classrooms and on carpeting the media center, first grade and kindergarten rooms at Kewaskum Elementary.

Projects approved include one estimated to cost about \$2,000 to remodel and replace equipment in the high school language lab; one estimated at \$1,100 to remodel the high school library and one expected to cost about \$5,000 to open areas and put in carpeting in the Beechwood School. Teachers have requested these areas be opened up to move toward an open concept type of teaching. The board will take up the tabled items at its next meeting at 7:30 p. m. on June 12.

The proposal to hire 13 students for teacher aides carried with it a request to increase the hours of the present six adult teacher aides from a present maximum of 30 hours per week to 35½, with a five per cent pay increase, and add two half-time persons. Elementary Director Richard Zarling made the proposal.

If his requests are granted, it will mean the cost of the teacher-aide program will go from the present \$12,000 to \$31,600. The student aide program is expected to cost about \$8,300 per year. The students would be chosen from high school students who must be 16 years of age, who carry a full academic load and who have an employment certificate on file. They would have to apply for the afternoon jobs.

Each would be paid \$1.20 per hour. Zarling said "the federal government will back us" even though it is a unique program. No school in the Midwest is using it, he said. The student aides would not necessarily be chosen from the above average type but also from those "who have been turned off on school," Zarling stated.

He also feels it would be a good idea to choose from the athletes groups inasmuch as elementary students would have a "hero worship" of them. The increased pupil-teacher ration is a big reason for his request. Zarling said the present ration is 29.8 pupils per teacher. The ideal ratio is 25-1, he said.

Each student, because of his involvement in his own particular school activities, would work only part of the school year, possibly as little as six weeks to a maximum of several months. Zarling noted that "dollar for dollar we

will get a lot out of a program like this" adding that "we can have 13 student aides for the cost of three adult aides or for the cost of one additional teacher."

It was pointed out that the aide is not taking the place of a teacher but is guided closely as he works under the teacher. Aides do clerical work, typing, handle lunch monies and in some cases work with children who have a learning problem. It doesn't take a bachelor's degree to listen to a child read," Zarling observed.

Board member Allen Tessar commented that he wouldn't like to see a teacher sluff off difficult to teach children to aides. Gerald Zimmel questioned whether "we will use up all the teacher aide time."

Zarling said the present six adult aides have worked out very well and substitute teacher Mrs. Janet Hubbell, in the audience, substantiated his statement by saying aides were "invaluable."

Tessar said he is not opposed to aides and "would probably go along with it if voted on tonight" but asked for an evaluation plus a report on job descriptions. "Are the people sold on aides—are we going to have to educate them?" he wanted to know.

Zarling said job descriptions are listed in the aide hand books and there are about 60 tasks listed. Board member Richard Theusch said "we must start thinking about taxes," adding that the proposal called for a good bit of money.

A suggestion to start with 10 aides, allow about \$20.00 to \$24,000 in the budget and keep present aides at 30 hours per week came from board member Thomas Gaudrum.

Board member-elect Dr. Charles Ogi said he has had the "25-1 pupil-teacher ratio tossed at me a number of times" and he would like to see studies on why it is the ideal one.

Zarling said there are 14 elementary classrooms that have

more than 30 pupils in each. The student aides would save money and offer more helping hands than if one teacher were hired for the same cost.

Supt. of Schools Floyd Brenholt noted that "everything we are talking about here tonight is included in the budget. I don't think Kewaskum taxes are high in comparison to other Wisconsin communities." He said the average mill rate, statewide, is 21.5 and "we are at 19.5."

Board member John Jadro said he would like more information on how the figure of 13 student aides was arrived at, inasmuch as it comes out to the cost of one teacher. Brenholt said "it is a case of either a teacher or teacher aides. It looks like a big request but a teacher would have been added in the last few years if we had had the room."

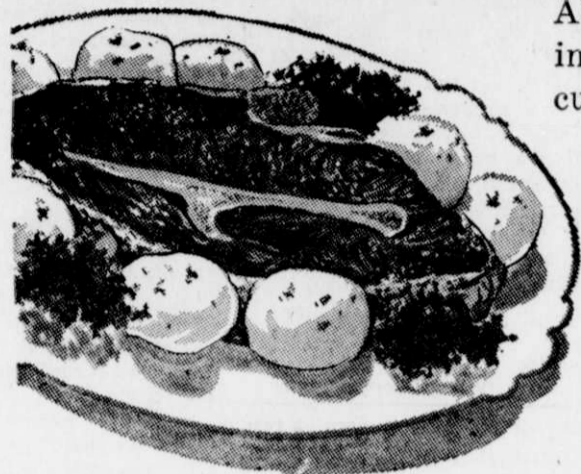
