## Board OK's Bond Referendum For Addition to Wayne School

BREAKFAST PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS APPROVED

The Board of Education voted unanimously Monday night to proceed with holding a bond referendum that would authorize borrowing funds to construct a four-room addition to the Wayne Elementary School.

It also approved a budget of \$2,176,794 for presentation at the annual meeting July 24. The proposed budget calls for a mill rate of 18.844 and based on an anticipated enrollment of 1,971 students, sets the cost of operation per student at \$849.09. This compares with a state-wide anticipated average of \$888.

The decision to call for a referendum came after an advisory petition, bearing 94 signatures, was filed with the board. Most were of persons in the Wayne area.

The petition asked that a referendum be held on the question of building an addition in preference to moving the two relocatable classrooms from Kewaskum, and to delay moving them until after a referendum is held and the wishes of the district voters are known. Leander Herriges said the petitions were left in business places, that there was no door to door canvass for signatures.

The board will meet in special session at 8 p. m. Thursday to pass the necessary resolution to borrow. It was noted that the addition would probably cost around \$193,000 and the resolution will probably ask for \$200,000. The referendum will be held on July 24, the day of the annual meeting.

The proposed addition is the same one that was included in a package plan that voters turned down three times last year. The portable classrooms have been used for kindergarten classes in Kewaskum for several years. The board voted at its May 15 meeting to move them to Wayne to ease overcrowding there. An addition currently underway at the high school here, and going to split shift attendance next school year, will open up space for kindergarten.

A breakfast program for students in Grades 10-12 was approved, in view of the fact that the high school will go on split shifting. Because high schoolers must report for classes at 7:30 a. m., it will mean many will have to board busses well before that time.

Supt. Floyd Brenholt reported "it appears we will be able to get some state and federal aids; we will arrange prices with aids so that the program will be pretty much self-supporting." He said the breakfasts will be simple ones. The cafeteria staff is on duty anyway and breakfast would be available possibly between 8 and 9:30 a. m., whenever a student has a free mod. Prices will be set when it is known what aids are available, Brenholt stated.

He also reported it will be necessary to extend the high school split shift day to "probably 1:30

p. m.," instead of 12:30. He said schedules were run through a computer three or four times and it has not been possible to fit the split shift schedule into the present number of mods.

After hearing a report that Mrs. Joe Garman of R. 2, Kewaskum, was released as a bus driver by Baumann Bus Co., Campbellsport, because she appeared before the board to report on mechanical failures on a bus she was driving, and that Baumann felt he lost the bus contract because of this, board members went on record that the deciding factor in the change in bus contracts was monetary and not because of suggestions or comments by any individual.

Due to added responsibilities and work loads following the resignation of Edward Connors as principal in January, the board approved additional pay of \$1,200 to Ernest Mitchell and \$600 to Paul Schoenberger. In addition, Mitchell was hired for three additional work weeks at \$250 each.

Also approved was a new salary schedule and guide for salaries of non-professional employees which reflects an increase of 4.35 per cent for cutodians, 5.4 per cent for cafeteria workers and 4.9 per cent for secretaries and teacher aides. It provides sick leave at two days a year for the first 10, then one day a year up to an accumulation of 15 days.

A teacher contract was approved for Delores Dvoracek for Grade 5 at Wayne School. It was decided to call for a roll call vote in the future on all expenditure items.

## Village President Proclaims July 4th Bell Ringing Day

Village President Cyril Wietor proclaims July 4th as Bell Ringing Day. The members of Joseph Marest Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution hope to establish a community project for the Bi-Centennial years, of Ringing of Bells on Independence Day.

Mrs. Harry E. Koch, Bi-Centennial chairman said, in June 1963 the U. S. Senate passed a resolution proclaiming that bells should ring at 2 p. m. Eastern Daylight Saving Time, 1 p. m. our time, observing the ringing of the Liberty Bell and the signing of the Declaration of Independence, July 4th, 1776. We are asking that every church and business that has bells, as well as every resident who has a bell, please ring it for two minutes starting at 1 p. m. July 4th. This commemoration of the ringing of the Liberty Bell should come as a reminder of what the Fourth of July stands for, challenging each of us to remember the men and women who have pledged their lives for 196 years to maintain our freedom and a reminder of how hard this freedom was won and how easily it can be lost.

## Annual Firemen's AFS Student Picnic on Sunday, Coming Here July 9, in Park Is From Peru

The annual Kewaskum Firemen's Picnic will be held in the village park on Sunday, July 9, and plans have been completed to make this year's event another outstanding one.

The picnic will be highlighted by and get underway with another excellent parade at 12:30 p. m. sharp Sunday. Featuring the parade will be the Milwaukee Continental Cadet Band (75 members), Milwaukee Continental Youth Band (140 members), Chordaliers Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee (60 members), other drum and bugle corps, bands, and musical organizations, drill teams and Milwaukee Civic Riders Motorcycle Club. The parade will also include orchestras, beautiful floats, baton twirlers, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, comic entries, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations, and numerous other units.

Hundreds of persons will participate in the parade, which will continue for approximately one hour. The parade will form at the high school athletic field, parking lot and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up at noon. Cash prizes will be awarded the best floats and children's entries.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps and other live music in the park. From then on there will be continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening. Music will be supplied on the stage and in the popular beer garden by Two Hits and a Miss and Syl's Polka Dots.

The usual water fights will be held at 6:30 p. m. with several neighboring fire departments battling for honors and prize money.

Adding to the entertainment, there will be rides, concessions, games and refreshments, including tasty brats and hamburgers. Ninety-two valuable merchandise prizes will be awarded in conjunction with the picnic. Everyone is invited to come for a real good time at the annual Kewaskum picnic.

## A. Bunkelman, 17, Dies of Auto Crash Injuries

Arthur Steven Bunkelman, 17, of R. 1, Eden, an employee of Buehler's Meat Market in Fond du Lac, died early Monday morning, June 26, at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, of injuries suffered in an auto crash on Scenic Road about three miles south of Eden on Sunday night. He was rushed to the hospital following the accident.

According to witnesses at the scene of the accident, Bunkelman was passing another auto when his car got off the side of the road and struck a tree stump about four miles from his home. Police said he was driving west on Scenic Road when his car struck the four-foot high stump which was about six feet from the edge of the road.

Bunkelman, who was alone in his car, was thrown from the vehicle. He told police that he had no idea what happened. The 1966 auto was demolished.

His father, Arthur G. Bunkelman, who formerly farmed near Kewaskum for several years, preceded him in death on Jan. 13 of this year.

Young Bunkelman was born Aug. 19, 1954 at Fond du Lac and was a 1972 graduate of Campbellsport High School.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ann C. Bunkelman, (nee McIves), of R. 1, Eden; four sisters, Jane Ann and Jo Anne at home and Nancy and Lila of Milwaukee; one brother, Timothy, at home; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Meives of R. 1, Waldo; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Bunkelman, Sr. of R. 3, Campbellsport; uncles, aunts, cousins and other relatives and many friends.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Thursday at Immanuel Ev. Lutheran Church, Campbellsport, with Rev. John Baumgart, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park in Kewaskum. Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home in Kewaskum was from 3 p. m. Wednesday until 11 a. m. Thursday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services.

**M. Martins Attend  
Kiwanis Convention

Marvin A. and Minerva Martin of Kewaskum attended the 57th annual convention of Kiwanis International in Atlantic City, N. J. June 18-21. 




