Groundbreaking Ceremonies Held for New Bank



Groundbreaking ceremonies were held Monday afternoon (in between the raindrops) for the new Bank of Kewaskum building to be constructed on Fond du Lac Ave. on the block formerly occupied by the Kewaskum Liquor Mart, Francis Bohn home and Ervin Wanke (formerly Ed Schaefer) home.

Bank officials, including all members of the board of directors, were present for the groundbreaking. Shown in the above photo, left to right, they include: Jim Reigle, director; Suzanne R. Wells, director; Judge Milton L. Meister, director; Gladys C. Reis (with shovel), vice president and director; Wayland D. Tessar, president and director; Dr. Charles Ogi, director; and Gerald Zimmer, director.

Excavation began last week and construction work is now underway for the new bank building, cost of which is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$400,000. The bank will replace the present one on Main St. where it has been doing business for the past 60 years. The bank was founded in 1904.

The new bank will be of contemporary design. It will have a total of 6,200 square feet of space per floor in the basement and on the first floor. It will have eight teller windows and two drive-in windows, a spacious lobby area, three offices and four conference rooms. The basement will house a community room, lounge, storage and utility space.

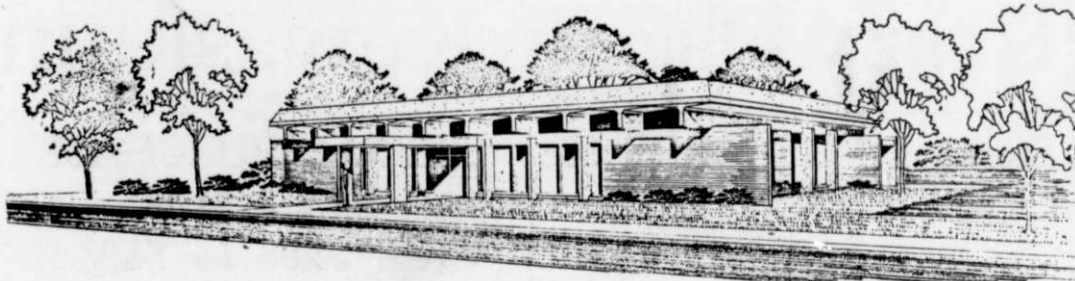
Extensive use will be made in the building of pre-cast concrete,

which allows a span of 68 feet in the lobby without the use of pillars. It will be of brick exterior and some brick interior. The windows will have all bronze tinted glass and frames.

The lot will cover over 52,000 square feet with off-street parking for a minimum of 42 cars. The expected completion date for the new bank building is April of 1973.

General contractor is A. J. Despina & Sons, Inc. of Green Bay. Purckhardt Electric, West Bend, was awarded the electrical contract and Joseph Wittig, West Bend, received the plumbing contract. Heating and ventilating contract was given to Hietpas Inc. of Little Chute.

School Board Accepts Bids of \$8,179 for 200 Attend Holy Trinity Picnic

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING, REFERENDUM MONDAY FOR WAYNE SCHOOL ADDITION

The Board of Education accepted bids for 1,352 square yards of carpeting and three air conditioners during its regular meeting here Monday night.

The bid for carpeting was awarded to Bud Walter Furniture of West Bend at \$6.05 per square yard for a total of \$8,179.60, the low bid among five. The others ranged from \$8,990 to \$12,052.30. The roll call vote among board members was 4 to 2 with Allen Tessar and Richard Theusch casting the no votes and Thomas Gundrum absent.

The areas to be carpeted include the newly created media centers in the Kewaskum Elementary and Farmington Elementary Schools; the music room and the areas being set up for kindergarten and first grades at Kewaskum Elementary; and all six classrooms at Beechwood Elementary.

The Walter firm also submitted a bid of \$231 to take up the carpeting from the gym at the Wayne School and re-lay it in two of its classrooms. That matter was tabled pending results of the advisory referendum next Monday when electors will be asked to indicate whether \$200,000 should be borrowed for an addition at Wayne. Voting hours are from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. at the high school. Absentee ballots are available from Clerk John Jadro.

If the referendum fails, two portable classrooms will be moved from Kewaskum to Wayne (Continued on page 3)

All tickets for children under 12 will sell for \$1.00 in advance and on the day of the event. Advance tickets are being sold to help determine how much chicken to order.

Rites Held for Howard Backhaus

Funeral services were held Saturday, July 15, for Howard Backhaus, 53, of 1550 Riverview Dr., Kewaskum. He died Thursday morning, July 13, at Hartford Memorial Hospital as a result of injuries he suffered in an industrial accident two weeks earlier while working as a carpenter with the W & B Corp. of West Bend in Hartford.

He was born Aug. 26, 1918 in Kewaskum and his marriage to Jeanne Wilcox took place at Berlin on April 20, 1946. He lived in Kewaskum all his life except for two years overseas when he served in the U.S. Army. He received

the Bronze Star and the Distinguished Service Cross.

He was a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion in Kewaskum and the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's Association of Kewaskum. He was a life member of St. Lucas Lutheran Church and served on the church board and several committees.

Surviving are his wife Jeanne; two daughters, Jody Irene and Ann Cheryl, and one son, Lyn Howard, all at home; his father, Otto Backhaus, of Kewaskum; two sisters, Caroline (Mrs. Milton Eisentraut) of Fredonia, and Harriet (Mrs. Reuben Martin) of R. 2, Kewaskum; his mother-in-law, Mrs. Chester Wilcox of Wautoma; seven brothers-in-law, four sisters-in-

law, and many relatives and friends. He was preceded in death by his mother and one sister, Irene.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Saturday at St. Lucas Lutheran Church, Pastor Paul Hoenecke officiating. Burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park in Kewaskum. Robert G. Romaine Post conducted military services at the grave site. Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home was from 3 p. m. Friday until 11 a. m. Saturday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services.

for use next school year and the Wayne gym will no longer be needed for classrooms. If the referendum is approved, the portable classrooms will not be moved and classes would have to be held in the gym one more year.

Burckhardt Electric of West Bend was awarded the contract for three room-size air conditioners with a capacity of 10,000 b.t.u.'s per unit at a total cost of \$700.35. They will be installed in the music rooms at the high school. Though specifications were sent to other firms, there was only one other bid, that from Montgomery Ward, West Bend, for \$654.69. Although it was not the low bid, the Burckhardt bid was accepted for reasons of service.

Also accepted was a bid from Carroll Haug and Sons, West Bend, to repair a leak in the roof of the main entrance of the high school building at a cost of \$1,640. It was reported this has been a troublesome leak for many years and numerous patch jobs have been attempted. The Haug firm will tear out that portion of the roof that leaks and replace it completely.

Teacher contracts were approved for Michael R. Miller, Kewas-

kum, to teach elementary physical education; Miss Kathleen Farrell of Wauwatosa for elementary special education and Mrs. Peggy Cook of Mayville to teach business education 2/3 time.

Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040. The regular semi-monthly meeting of the School Board of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2 was held at the Wayne Elementary School on Monday, May 15th with all members present. At 8 p. m. Mr. Tim Leader, Principal, toured the Wayne Building with the board members.

At 8:20 p. m. Richard L. Edwards called the meeting to order with all board members present. Also in attendance were: Warren Sekas, Richard D. Schlice, Mr. and Mrs. John J. Mention was made that fans be obtained for the high school gym to move the air on June 3rd for the Recognition Banquet.

Gerald Zimmer moved and Richard Theusch seconded to accept the resignation of Deri Ament effective the close of the 1971-72 school year. Motion carried.

Gerald Secor was appointed as the board member to issue diplomas at the 1972 graduation exercises.

Discussion was held regarding the 1972-73 budget. Items covered included:

- 1) Classroom space for Wayne—either moving portable buildings from Kewaskum to Wayne or possibility of a building addition.
- 2) The Special Education Program for 1972-73.
- 3) Changing room usage at the high school to provide additional science space to take care of the needs for next year.
- 4) The five year vocational-education program.

After discussion of the classroom space needed for Wayne with the alternatives of moving the portable buildings from Kewaskum to Wayne, adding a 2 classroom permanent addition or adding the originally planned 4 classrooms and library, Allen Tes-

sar moved to approve the moving of the two portable buildings from the Kewaskum site to the Wayne site. John Jadro seconded. The motion carried on a vote of 4 "yes" and 2 "no." Gerald Zimmer and Richard Theusch voiced the 2 "no" votes.

Gerald Secor moved to approve providing science classroom and lab space at the high school building by converting some other rooms to science usage. Gerald Zimmer seconded. Motion carried. John Jadro moved and Thomas Gundrum seconded to approve the Special Education Program presented for 1972-73 with the addition of one Special Disabilities teacher being hired, as well as providing of full time psychologist and social worker time rather than the present half-time. Motion carried.

Dr. Ogi presented the five year plan on vocational education providing information on present curriculum and facilities, as well as projected programs. Included were comments on needed future buildings to provide additional facilities. The board was asked to indicate their approval or agreement with the objectives as presented by the committee. Richard Theusch moved to approve the program as presented by Dr. Ogi. but after discussion withdrew his motion. John Jadro moved to approve the presented program, to include for 1972-73 the hiring of one additional person in the career education and guidance field. Allen Tessar seconded. Motion carried.

Mrs. Janet Hubbell stated it would be good to hire a woman guidance person if possible. Also it was mentioned to perhaps transfer the experienced person to Junior High guidance. A review is to be made and presented to the Board.

The second May meeting of the school board was set for 8 p. m. on Tuesday, May 30, 1972 at the high school.

Discussion was held relative to the Washington County Purchasing Committee program scheduled for May 23, 1972. Tom Gundrum

volunteered to attend. Gerald Secor moved and Gerald Zimmer seconded to approve payment of Mr. Gundrum's and Mr. Brenholt's dinner reservations from district funds. Motion carried. Tom Gundrum moved to adjourn. Richard Theusch seconded. Motion carried.

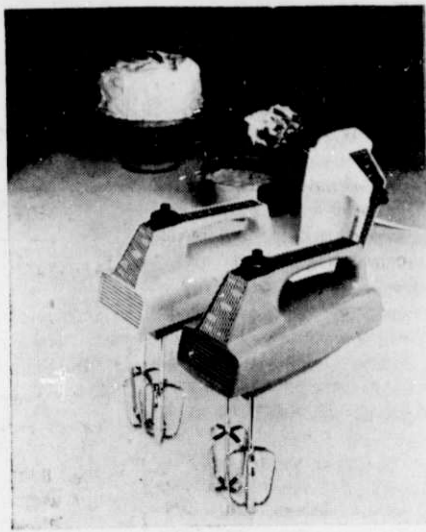

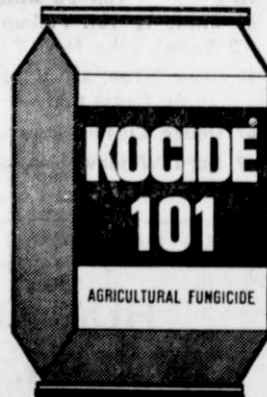
