School Board Favors Building Addition at Wayne School

The Board of Education voted unanimously Monday night that they are in favor of a building program at Wayne Elementary School but wish to wait with their official decision to some time not later than the first board meeting in November, at which time district electors will be made aware of the building needs of the entire district.

The motion was made by Richard L. Edwards. About 50 persons turned out to hear the board's decision.

It had been voted in May to move two relocatable classrooms to Wayne from Kewaskum but a group of electors followed with a petition asking that a referendum be held on borrowing and that moving be held up until the wishes of the district are known.

An advisory referendum was held on July 24 and 265 voted in favor and 268 against borrowing. A "no" vote was to have meant the classrooms would be moved. However, an advisory motion was made from the floor at the annual meeting, and passed, that the classrooms not be moved.

The board sought a legal opinion from Atty. Roger McKenna on whether that motion is binding and his answer came in the form of a letter Monday night. In it he stated he had studied Wisconsin statutes and he is of the opinion that the advisory motion is binding. He followed with the statement, "you now have two alternatives—do nothing or borrow the money."

Edwards took issue with that statement saying "it was out of line" in that only an opinion was asked for. He charged that McKenna's suggestion to borrow was "an unnecessary one."

Edwards said he feels the problem of what we need and where should be studied between now and November. "We don't know how split shifting will work out or what public reaction there will be to it. There might be a complete difference of opinion after two months of school," he said. He added "we would be jumping ahead of ourselves by voting only for Wayne and not considering the entire district. It won't harm Wayne's prospects to wait two months until we see how split shifting will work. We may or may not have a solution with it."

Board member Gerald Zimmer countered with "we already have two classes in the Wayne gym. We don't need a study to know that classrooms are needed."

The Wayne addition would not be ready until the fall of 1973 anyway, if it is approved now or two months from now, said Edwards.

Brenholt observed there is no excuse for this district with its resources to have classes in a gym. Either people aren't interested or they don't care. A woman in the audience observed that "people do care" but when they speak out at a board meeting they are ridiculed after the meeting. Asked by Edwards if she cared to be more specific, she replied, "no".

Board member Richard Theusch suggested looking into a building built of metal rather than the proposed brick "to see if we can't build it cheaper." One elector suggested some "belt tightening" by avoiding frills and fancy. Another, referring to taxes, asked "how much more can you take from us?"

Board chairman Thomas Gundrum said he believes a \$200,000 addition could be put up and still keep the budget in line as was done with the present high school addition. The mill rate will be down in spite of it, he said.

Bussing Wayne's fifth and sixth graders was suggested as an alternative. "Bussing is not the answer," replied Supt. Floyd Brenholt. "We would immediately out Kewaskum Elementary at capacity level. We need a solution to keep the students at Wayne. Now that moving classrooms is voted out, there is only one good solution and that is to build."

It was pointed out that Wayne teachers have spent much time developing the Individualized Guided Education program (IGE) in which students work at their individual levels without regard for class levels. Bussing 5th and 6th graders would damage the IGE which will be initiated at Wayne this school year.

Edwards noted that when candidates for a new administrator were interviewed last year, the board probed each one's philosophy on education as the board had agreed to hire one who would tend toward IGE. Brenholt favors IGE and believes it should start at the elementary level, Edwards stated.

Board members accepted a bid from Barton Dairy to furnish Grade A homogenized milk at .0595 cents per half pint, low bid among four and approved moving the administrative offices to the portable classrooms. Present offices will become science classrooms.

Rev. Schowalter Gets Master of Divinity Degree

Youth Is Slugged As He Surprises Burglar in Home

A Kewaskum youth was slugged and knocked unconscious when he walked into his home and surprised a burglar Sunday evening.

The entire Henry Weddig, Jr. family of 1450 Bilge Lane was away attending a birthday party for their grandmother. Shortly after 7 p. m. the Weddig's son Steve and his girlfriend stopped at the house to pick up Steve's sun glasses. His friend waited in the car while he went inside. When he failed to return, she went in and found Steve on the floor unconscious.

He came to and told his girlfriend to get out of the house because someone who had hit him over the head was still possibly in the house. She ran for a neighbor and as the neighbor entered the rear door, someone left from the front one. According to the family, no one, however, saw who had left the residence.

They said the burglar had placed his hand on Steve's shoulder and then knocked him unconscious, possibly with a large hair brush which is missing from the house. Steve had picked up his sun glasses and had just stepped into the living room when he was hit.

The person also took \$12 out of Steve's wallet and left the wallet lying open on a table. Nothing else except the hair brush was found to be missing. Some drawers were also found ajar in a bedroom and the family dog was evidently led down in the basement and given some meat to keep him quiet.

The family said Steve is sure his assailant was a man because of the big hand which grabbed him. They also feel that it was someone who was either watching the place or who knew the place very well.

Kewaskum police are working on the case.
