Lions Chicken Barbecue Sunday In Village Park

The Kewaskum Lions Club will hold its first chicken barbecue this Sunday, Aug. 27, in the village park. Serving will be from 11 a. m. to 7 p. m. Refreshments, including pitcher beer and soda, will be sold.

School bells will begin ringing in all Kewaskum Schools on Monday, Aug. 28. Schedules for the various grade levels have been published earlier, and bus students have received notices of the time they will be picked up the first morning. Students in grades 10, 11 and 12 should report to school for a 7:30 beginning. Elementary students (grades K-6) will begin in Kewaskum and Wayne at 8:15 and in Farmington and Beechwood at 8:30. Junior High students (grades 7, 8 and 9) will report to the high school to begin at 9:48.

With the split shift going into effect, students will find a number of changes this fall. The primary one will see the seventh and eighth graders in the high school instead of the elementary, and they will be combined with the ninth grade to create a Junior High School.

Because the elementary schools are no longer tied to a high school schedule, they will be able to run a more practical school day. Total class time will not be changed, but noon hours will be shortened so that smaller children can be sent home earlier.

One of the bigger problems to be resolved this fall is that of bus schedules. In an attempt to keep routes somewhat reasonable in length, and yet balance this against cost of more routes are added, some students are being asked to walk to pickup points. By holding the mileage reasonable, the total route time can also be held to a reasonable length. With the early high school starting time, this problem becomes a big one.

Once the system begins, a close look will be taken at all bus problems, and some decisions made. Every effort is being and will be made to provide reasonable transportation for all students. While bus times have been announced, it is hoped some of the earliest times may be changed somewhat once it is certain as to the time it takes to run the route.

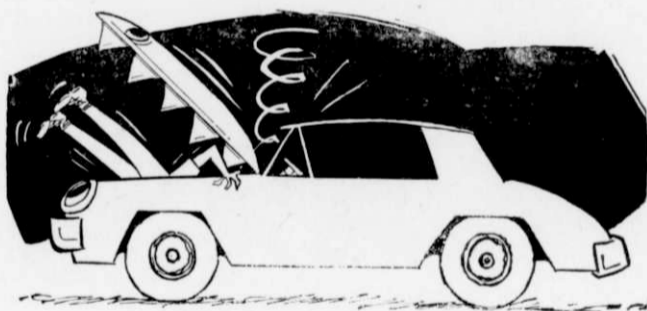

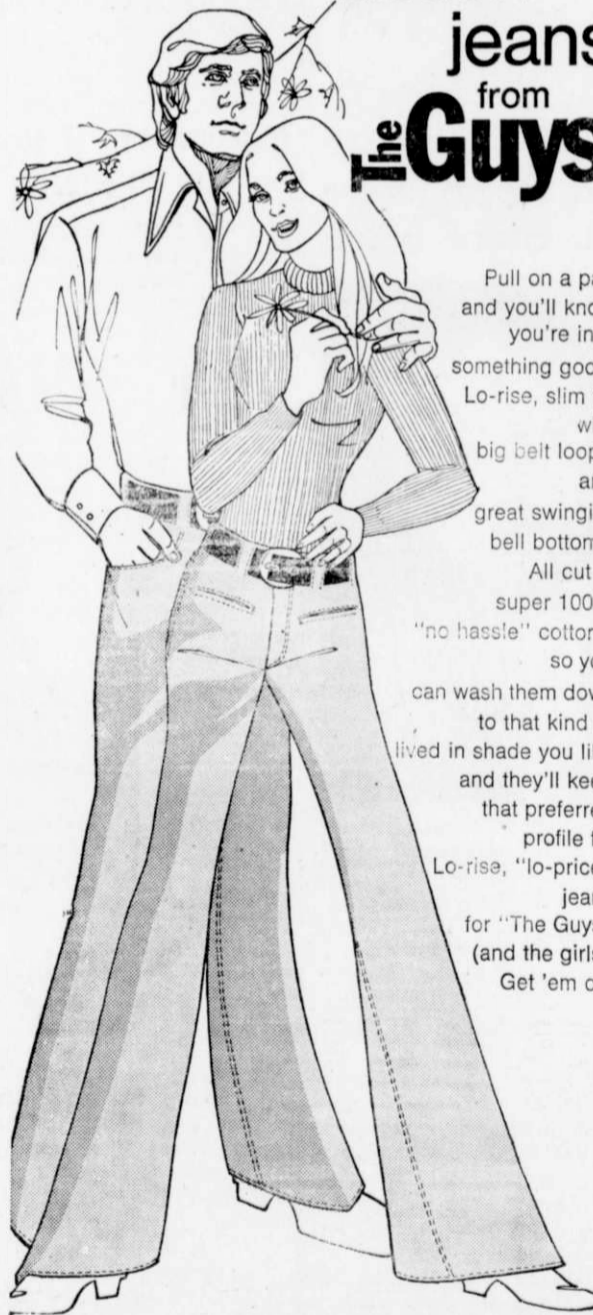
