Village Home Is Badly Damaged By Fire Friday

A Kewaskum family was made homeless by a ravaging fire which badly damaged their residence at 126 Prospect Ave. Friday afternoon. The home is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Louis Ebert and children.

The Eberts have seven children, four of whom are still at home. They are Dolly 10, Terry 13, Patsy 17 and Allen 18. Another daughter Mary has an apartment and one son and daughter are married.

The fire was discovered about 3:15 p. m. by a neighbor, Mrs. Marlene Shepherd, who saw smoke coming from the north gable. She called the fire department, then ran next door to assist Mrs. Ebert, who is deaf, from the residence. Mrs. Ebert was reading downstairs and was unaware of the fire upstairs. A door leading to the upper floor was closed and she did not smell the smoke. The entire upstairs area of the home was burned out and the family lost most of their personal possessions.

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann reported the fire was a bad one and said fire and smoke were coming out of the north gable of the home when firemen arrived at the scene. No immediate estimate of the loss could be given but the loss was extensive from the fire, smoke and water. Much of the downstairs also was damaged by water. Oppermann said the blaze apparently started in an upstairs hallway but the source of the fire could not be pinpointed.

Twenty-nine firemen fought the blaze for more than an hour in the frame, story-and-a-half building. Some of the furnishings were carried out but most of the personal belongings were lost. A fire adjuster was not available until Tuesday and damage estimates were to be made at that time.

Mr. Ebert is employed at Regal Ware, while the oldest boy at home is working at the Threshold Sheltered Workshop in West Bend. The Ebert family was taken in by the Shepherds until they could make other arrangements.

The fire occurred on the eve of one of the Eberts' daughter Mary's wedding but despite the disaster, the wedding was held as scheduled at 1 p. m. Saturday at St. Matthew's Catholic Church, Campbellsport, where Mary was married to Ronald Giese.

Mike Gutjahr, 21, Killed in Two Car Crash

Michael Gutjahr, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Gutjahr of R. 2, Kewaskum, was fatally injured in a two car crash on CTH H about a mile west of US Hwy. 45 near Kewaskum at 2:13 a. m. Saturday. Gutjahr was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

The county sheriff's department report of the accident said the Gutjahr auto, traveling east on a knoll, veered into the west-bound traffic lane and struck the left front and side of a car driven by Kenneth Zehren, 22, of R. 3, Campbellsport.

The Gutjahr auto, a 1972 model, was demolished in the crash. Gutjahr was reported wearing seat belts according to Coroner Robert Boltz while Zehren was not. Gutjahr reportedly suffered massive head injuries. Zehren was treated for minor injuries and released. Both drivers, who were reported alone in their cars, were removed to the hospital in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

Coroner Boltz said the death was the 18th traffic fatality in the county this year.

Michael Gutjahr was born Jan. 29, 1951 in West Bend, the son of Glen and Arline Krieser Gutjahr of R. 2, Kewaskum, who moved here recently from the Town of Wayne. A graduate of Kewaskum High School, he was employed as a construction worker by Super Excavators, Inc. of Menomonee Falls.

Gutjahr was a member of Salem United Church of Christ, Wayne, and belonged to the Kohlsville and New Fane Sportsmen's Clubs.

Surviving are his parents, four sisters, Mrs. Michael Schmidt of R. 1, Allenton, Mrs. Robert Behnke of Mayville, Joan and Cindy at home; four brothers, James Gutjahr of Wayne, Ricky, Gregory and Timothy, all at home; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Gutjahr, of Allenton, two brothers-in-law, one sister-in-law, and other relatives.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Salem United Church of Christ, Wayne. The Rev. R. G. Beck, pastor, officiated and burial took place in the church cemetery. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, from 3 p. m. Monday to 11 a. m. Tuesday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services.

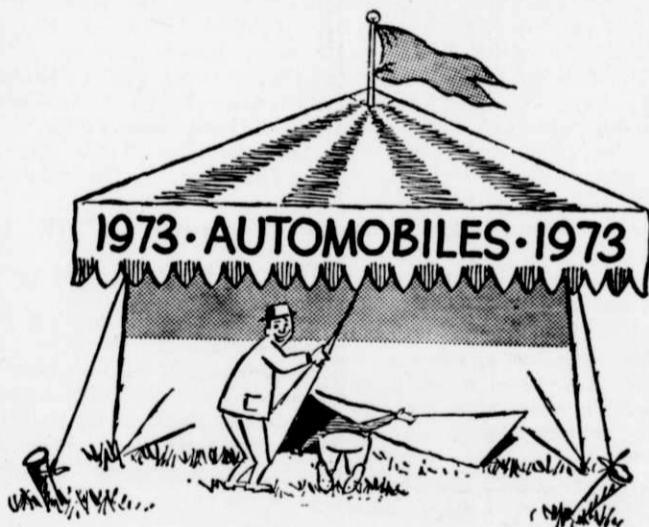

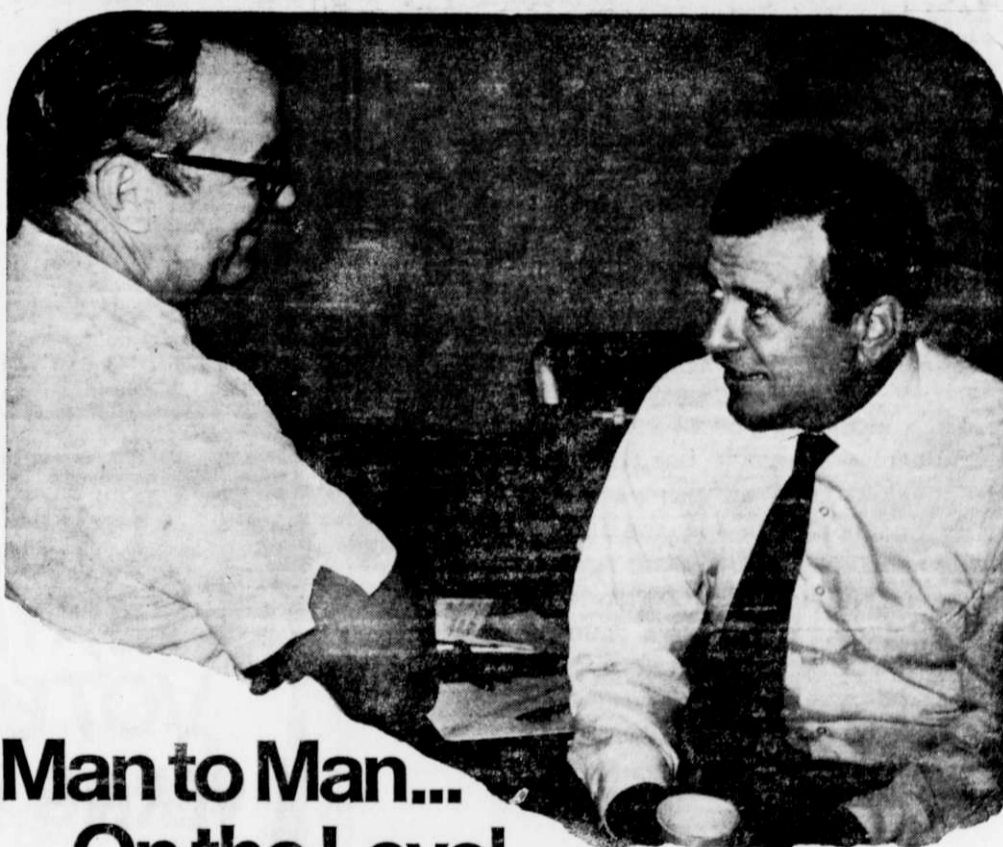

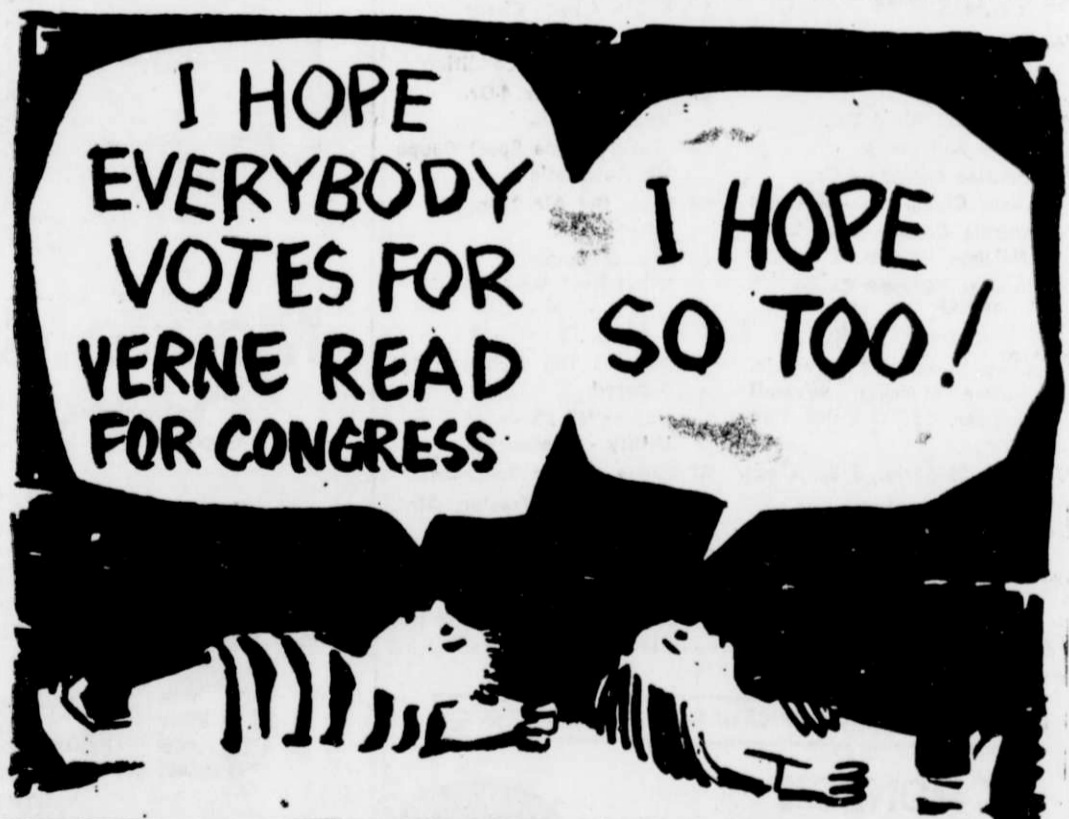

Indians Roll Over Campbellsport In Football Opener Friday, 41-7

Displaying a lot of strength on both offense and defense, the Kewaskum Indians bombed Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference in their opener there Friday night, 41-7. Although the big Cougars were expected to make a closer battle of it, the victory was even more decisive than last year when Kewaskum beat the Cougars, 45-13.

Kewaskum amassed a total of 442 yards, while holding Campbellsport to a mere 131. Of this total, the Indians rolled 314 yards on the ground and 128 in the air. The Cougars gained 81 yards rushing and 50 passing.

Jim Gaffke, last year's all-conference choice both ways, started where he left off last season. He started by scoring 3 touchdowns and 2 extra points, even though he played only the first half on offense. Jim gained 61 yards on 15 carries.

Another veteran, Gary Marx, also stood out. He was the leading ground gainer with 125 yards on just 12 carries. He also scored 2 TD's on runs of 66 yards and 2 yards. Quarterback Dale Luedtke carried 4 times for 55 yards and hit on 10 of 15 passes, although he also sat out much of the second half.

After building up a 15-0 half-time lead, the Indians added 20 points in the 3rd quarter to make it 35-0. Coach Joe Harlow used mostly reserves the rest of the way.

Leading ground gainer for Campbellsport was Al Beck, who ground out over half of his team's

ground yardage with 42 yards on 10 carries.

The Indians put together a 60-yard drive early in the 2nd period with Gaffke going in from the 2. Soph Ed Koepke added the extra point. After another 60-yard drive, paced by Jeff Koth's catches, Gaffke went in from the 1.

To start the second half Marx took the opening kickoff and rolled 66 yards for a quick TD behind good blocking. Shortly after, Gaffke intercepted a Cougar pass and ran it back 57 yards for another score. With reserves in the game, Marx scored his 2nd TD and reserve quarterback Doug Bilgo also scored for the Indians in the last quarter.

Campbellsport's only touchdown resulted from a blocked punt recovered by Dwyer in the end zone and Gilboy made the kick to put the Cougars on the scoreboard. This was the only time in the game Kewaskum was forced to punt.

Though outweighed by much, the Indians' offensive line made gaping holes for the runners. The defense was also tough, holding the Cougars to just 12 yards rushing and 17 passing in the first half.

Scott Koth, only a sophomore, had 3 interceptions. His older brother Jeff paced all receivers with 82 yards on 6 receptions.

In other weekend games, Scenic Moraine Conference teams also fared well. Slinger blanked East Troy, 25-0, Kettle Moraine lost to Mukwonago 16-2, Hartland Arrowhead was downed by Waterford 16-0, Pewaukee shaded Ozaukee 16-7, Grafton defeated Lake Geneva 25-12, and Mayville bested Horicon 20-14.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians play their first home game, hosting Random Lake at 7:30 in another non-conference affair. The Rams were beaten by Lomira last week. Grafton opens the conference season here on Friday of next week, Sept. 15.
