Preliminary Plat for 14-Lot Subdivision Approved by Board

GRANTED EXTENSION FOR INCINERATOR USE

On a vote of 4 to 2, members of the Village Board Monday night gave their approval to a preliminary plat for a 14-lot subdivision located along a proposed extension of Stark Street, north of Main.

According to plans, the extended street will end in a cul-de-sac. Developers are Jan Rosenthal and Howard Zemlicka of Kewaskum.

The "no" votes were cast by Village President Cyril Wieter and Trustee Elmer Yoost. Wieter said, in casting his vote, that he feels the cul-de-sac should be eliminated to make the street a continuous one.

The developers said they feel it should end in a cul-de-sac because of a hill in the area. Wieter replied that hills are no longer a problem in land development.

Fred Fehlhaber, who lives near the proposed subdivision, asked what types of homes are going to be built there and he specifically asked "if it will be a bunch of 235's." He also asked about the lot sizes. Fehlhaber said, "I don't want to stop progress but it means a lot to me as to what types of homes will be built there."

Zemlicka assured him that "there will absolutely be no 235's" and that "we should probably set a square footage requirement to eliminate 235's." The lot sizes will be anywhere from 78 to around 90 feet frontage. Depth will be up to 135 feet.

The plat calls for a street running east and west from Stark St., ending in a cul-de-sac at the east end. The Plan Commission has approved the plat after asking developers to make three changes. The next step is for Rosenthal and Zemlicka to present a final plat to the village.

On recommendation of the officers of the Kewaskum Volunteer Fire Dept., liability coverage will be taken out for its ambulance attendants to protect them from any possible suit charging mishandling of an ambulance patient. The fire department will pay the premiums which will run about \$268 per year.

Faced with having been told by the Department of Natural Resources earlier this year that the village incinerator does not meet the new air pollution emission standards, members of the Village Board are looking into possible alternatives for disposing of refuse.

Present at the meeting was Phil Majerus who operates a landfill site in the Lomira area. He was asked to give a quotation on the cost of disposing of refuse from the village of Kewaskum, which would have to be hauled to his site by village crews.

He said he was at the incinerator Monday to take a look at the amount of refuse picked up on a collection day and said he will have a cost quotation in the hand of the village commissioner by the end of this week.

Collections would not include refuse from private industry, how-

ever, Majerus said. Industry would have to contract with him separately, he said.

The village was ordered by the DNR to abandon its present incinerator by Oct. 1, but a one-month extension was granted. The DNR will grant further extensions if the village decides to install a new incinerator, but there must be proof that definite plans are in the making. If it is the board's decision not to put in a new incinerator, then there must be an alternate plan for refuse disposal by the Nov. 1 deadline.

Operators' licenses were approved for James Tessar and Mrs. Kathryn Warner.

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Fire Prevention Week Is Oct. 8-14

CHIEF URGES, PRE-PLAN FOR FIRE EMERGENCIES

To help protect your family from the hazards of fire, pre-plan escape routes from every room in the house.

This is a special recommendation from Fire Chief Armin Oppermann for Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 8-14.

"During this week, especially, give some thought to the possibility of a fire in your home. Plan ahead specifically for fire during the night, when most of the family is asleep, since records from the National Fire Protection Association show that most dwelling fires break out during the nighttime hours," the chief urges everyone.

Here are some rules to follow to avoid being trapped by fire:

- Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from each room in the house, especially bedrooms.
- Rehearse exit plans with every member of the family. Make

sure each person knows what to do, and arrange for assistance in escaping for young children and elderly members of the household.

3. Always keep exit routes clear. Don't place stoves or space heaters near doors, or tall, heavy furniture in front of windows which might be needed for escape. Make sure bedroom windows are large enough and low enough to serve as emergency exits.

4. Be sure everyone, especially the children, understands the rule "Once out, stay out!" Re-entering a house where there is fire is extremely dangerous.

5. When the house is clear of people, notify the fire department. Know how to do it quickly and correctly, from a neighbor's home or a street alarm box. The Kewaskum Fire Department fire and ambulance number is 334-5588.

He was born Sept. 9, 1926 at West Bend, and was graduated from Holy Angels School in West Bend in 1941 and attended St. Lawrence Seminary at Mount Calvary from 1941 to 1946. He joined the Capuchin Order in 1946 and was ordained into the priesthood Aug. 27, 1953.

His first assignment was at St. Francis Brothers School at Calvary from 1954 to 1956. Father Goeden also served at parishes in Milwaukee, Appleton and Michi-

gan. All schools of the Consolidated Parochial Elementary School system will be closed Friday afternoon in respect for Father Goeden. The five schools will be closed so that the faculty may attend the funeral. He was a member of the board of education of the school system since its creation in 1969.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Goeden of West Bend; two brothers, Edward of Chicago and Herbert of Elgin, Ill.; two sisters, Mrs. Alfred Huffer of West Bend and Mrs. Ralph Schmidt of Kewaskum; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Richard Goeden, West Bend; 9 nieces and nephews.

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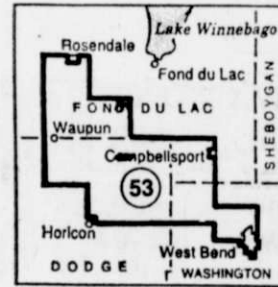

Indians Edge Slinger Before Homecoming Crowd, 6 to 3

FACE HARTLAND TONIGHT IN FIRST PLACE BATTLE

In an uphill defensive struggle here Friday night the Kewaskum Indians came from behind in the last quarter to shade Slinger, 6-3, and send a large homecoming crowd home happy. The Indians have now won 5 straight without a loss, 3 of them in the Scenic Conference, and are tied for first place with Hartland Arrowhead.

After a scoreless first half, Mark Mueller kicked a field goal early in the third quarter to put Slinger ahead, 3-0. In the 4th period, a 38 yard return of an intercepted pass by Jeff Ketter set the stage for Kewaskum's winning touchdown. Jeff Koth scored on a 3 yard pass into the end zone by Dale Luedtke with 7½ minutes remaining. The kick for extra point was blocked.

It appeared the Indians would score at the start. They marched up the field from their own 33 but Slinger stopped the drive and took over on their own 2 yard line. After holding the Owls Kewaskum advanced the ball again to Slinger's 16 yard line in the first quarter but again the Owls held. After these 2 opportunities failed, the Indians did not get a chance again to score until the final period.

The Indians suffered a tough blow early in the 2nd quarter when their leading ground gainer and scorer, all-conference Jim Gaffke was injured and had to leave the game. He never returned. He had gained 41 yards up to the time of his injury. Jim had scored 10 touchdowns and gained 442 yards, and was leading the conference with 4 TDs in 2 games when he was hurt. The word is out that Gaffke's leg has been placed in a cast and he will

not be able to play in the Indians' crucial game tonight against Hartland and this will greatly hurt Kewaskum's chances.

Slinger's field goal came when the Indians fumbled on their own 33. They put together a couple of first downs and then Mueller kicked it through the uprights from the 26 yard line. A 2nd attempt by Mueller later was short and wide.

On Kewaskum's TD, Ketter intercepted on his own 30 and returned it to the Slinger 32. After a face mask penalty the Indians got a first down on Slinger's 8. The Owl defense held for 3 downs but then Luedtke's pass to Koth in the end zone provided the winning score. A final Slinger threat with minutes left was stopped when Gary Marx intercepted a Brian Miller pass and returned it to the Owls' 25 where they ran out the clock.

Slinger had a slight edge in the statistics. They had 12 first downs

to Kewaskum's 10, trailed in yards running, 157-138, but led in yards passing, 43-16 and in total yards, 181-173. Kewaskum completed 6 of 16 passes and the Owls only 4 of 19. Kewaskum had 2 interceptions but lost the ball on 3 fumbles.

Tonight the Indians will host Hartland in an all-important game which will settle the first place deadlock between the 2 teams. Both are 3-0. Arrowhead upset Mayville last Friday, 13-7. Kewaskum will be hurting badly if their acc. injured Jim Gaffke, cannot play. Other games are Pewaukee at Mayville and Kettle Moraine at Germantown (Friday) and Grafton at Slinger (Saturday).
