Record 964 Votes Cast in Village; Hephner Only Democrat to Win

An all-time record 964 votes were cast in the village in Tuesday's General Election. This beats the previous high of 807 in the last Presidential Election four years ago by a sizable 157 votes. This could be expected as 18 year olds could vote this year and many young people turned out at the polls.

A surprise in the village was that a Democrat, Gervase A. Hephner, assembly candidate in the 6th District, defeated his opponent, Wilbert Halbach, 473 to 452. Republican candidates formerly won by large margins locally. Several other Democratic candidates gave their GOP opponents fairly close runs, especially for the county clerks' office, where incumbent Anton Staral only defeated Jon W. Sanfilippo by 74 votes, 507 to 434.

A large number of voters voted a split ticket. This is proven by the fact that in some cases GOP candidates defeated their opponents by better than a 2 to 1 margin, in others the balloting was fairly close, and in still another a Democrat (Hephner) won. There were 354 Republican straight ticket votes and only 188 Democrat and this made a big difference.

On the presidential ballot Richard M. Nixon beat George McGovern by a goodly margin of 244 votes, 589 to 345, in the village. In Washington County Nixon also ran well ahead, 15,338 to 10,434.

In the county races all of the Republicans were elected or re-elected. The only new face will be Clarence Schwartz, winner in the sheriff's race following the retirement of GOP incumbent Paul Humbel. Glenn R. Davis, Representative in Congress, 9th District, won over Ralph A. Fine, and Thomas E. Petri, candidate for State Senator, 2nd District, defeated James N. DeLorme. But the Democratic candidate for Representative to the Assembly, 6th District, Gervase Hephner, won over Republican Wilbert Halbach.

In the 53rd Assembly District, which includes the Town of Wayne, James Lewis, Republican, was the winner over Democrat Lee Eichstedt.

A large picture of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Fickler of 524 Habeck St., Kewaskum, appeared in the Oct. 27 issue of Life Magazine, one of the nation's leading magazines. The photo covered almost a full double-page spread on pages 8 and 9.

The photo was taken at a convention for families of POWs and men missing in action, which Mr. and Mrs. Fickler attended. It showed them studying a picture of an American POW and trying to decide whether the man in it could be their son, Captain E. James Fickler, a Marine Corps pilot missing in South Vietnam since 1969. In the end they were still doubtful. It was not the first time their hopes had been raised.

President Nixon also came to the convention, where he made a strongly political speech. The President and Mrs. Wesley Ratzel, whose son, Air Force Lieut. Wesley D. Ratzel, has been missing since May, were also shown in smaller pictures on the same page.

Fire Dept. Again Conducts Muscular Dystrophy Campaign

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann will head the 1972 Muscular Dystrophy canister campaign conducted by the members of the Kewaskum Fire Department it was announced by Ray Barczewski, President of the Milwaukee Area Chapter Muscular Dystrophy Association of America, Inc.

This will be the 4th year Kewaskum firefighters have sponsored the M.D. canister campaign.

Since 1954 helping in the fight against muscular dystrophy has been one of the fire fighters favorite projects. Fire fighters have helped raise funds, served as chapter officers and helped provide recreation for muscular dystrophy patients on the national, state and local levels.

Muscular dystrophy is a chronic disease which gradually destroys the voluntary muscles of the body. It is found in all parts of the world. Approximately two-thirds of the known victims are children. The exact cause of the disease is not known. There is no cure.

Kewaskum is in the Milwaukee Area Chapter, which has seven counties to serve. The chapter is one of over 300 in the United States that provide wheel chairs, braces, other orthopedic appliances, physical therapy and educational and recreational programs for muscular dystrophy patients.

In the past 15 years the Milwaukee Area Chapter has spent \$292,890 to help local M.D. patients with orthopedic equipment, free clinic examinations and consultation, physical therapy and recreation, especially summer camp. Milwaukee area patients are able to attend a special free summer camp designed around their specific needs and limitations. South-eastern Wisconsin high school students volunteer as attendants to enable M.D. patients to go swimming, horseback riding, canoeing

Regal Announces Establishment of Canada Plant

The establishment of Regal Ware, Inc. in Canada was announced by James D. Reigle, President of the Kewaskum cookware manufacturing firm. The expansion was made possible through the purchase of the former Filtro Electric Ltd. plant in Orangeville, Ontario. Filtro is a subsidiary of Sunbeam Corp. (Canada) Ltd.

According to Reigle, manufacturing of cookware at the new Canadian plant will begin immediately under the direction of Jock Donnelly, who was appointed Vice President and General Manager. Donnelly of Markham, Ontario, formerly was Regal's Canadian Sales Manager. He will be making his home in the Orangeville area in the very near future.

Simultaneously, Reigle named two Orangeville residents to top management positions. Marcus J. Powell was made Work Superintendent of the 55,000 square foot plant, and Mrs. E. "Betty" MacLeLan, Office Manager.

Donnelly stated that the new operation will produce a quality line of top-of-stove cookware and will also better serve Regal's many Canadian customers. Regal cookware and electrical appliances have been distributed throughout Canada since the company began in 1945.

Sno-Chiefs Club to Hold Informational Meeting for Public

The Sno-Chiefs Snowmobile Club of Kewaskum will conduct an informational meeting at the Kewaskum High School on Nov. 15 at 7:30 p. m. The purpose of the meeting is to explain rules, regulations and laws pertaining to snowmobiling, also the new safety program that will go into effect this season.

The panel will consist of the chief of police of Kewaskum, a member of the Washington County Sheriff's Department and a representative of the Kettle Moraine State Forest.

This will be a public meeting. Everyone is welcome from the Kewaskum area, especially the young people from ages of 11 years on up, whom the new safety law affects the most. There also will be a short film on snowmobile safety and a question and answer period toward the end of the meeting.

All snowmobilers of Kewaskum and surrounding area should attend, whether you belong to a club or not, also anyone else who is interested in snowmobiling.

and any outdoor activity possible at summer camp.

The Village of Kewaskum will investigate the possibility of obtaining state funds toward purchase of land to be used for a proposed park.

Village Commissioner William Martin told members of the village board Monday night that funds for such projects are available through O.R.A.P. The village is in the market for park land suitable for, among other things, an outdoor swimming pool. The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club went on record earlier that it will provide a pool if the village comes up with a suitable site.

Martin told the board that in his investigation of O.R.A.P. funds he learned that the first requirement is that the village must have a comprehensive park plan. As of now, it does not have one. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) would draw up such a plan if so requested or one can be drawn up by a professional firm.

The DNR would draw one up for about \$250. However, Martin said he was told it would not be as "polished a plan" as could be done by a professional firm. Village President Cyril Wietor, along with several board members, will seek an appointment with the DNR for firsthand information.

According to Martin, acquiring state funds follows this procedure: The village must approach the land owner and ask for his permission to have an appraisal made by a disinterested person. If he agrees, the village can then approach the owner after appraisal and try to negotiate an option.

The purchase price cannot be more than 10 per cent above the appraisal price. If it is, there must be a good explanation of why, Martin explained. However, if the land owner is a dedicated, loyal and benevolent citizen, he may sell his property for less than the appraised price. All of this information must be put into what the DNR calls "a statement of just compensation," Martin said he was told.

He also said the DNR has prepared comprehensive park plans for the Village of Slinger and the City of Hartford which may be seen free of charge. Village Attorney Roger McKenna suggested Kewaskum officials talk with officials from Slinger and Hartford on the matter.

In official action, a zoning ordinance was adopted by the board. Their action followed a public hearing on Sept. 27 when none of nine spectators voiced comments for or against. The ordinance regulates future land use within the village.

Roger Schmitt of 310 Braatz Drive asked whether the village has taken action on providing an access road to Highway 45, one that would lead from a proposed subdivision on the former Wallace Geidel land. Schmitt presented a petition to the board in July which held 46 signatures of persons in the area asking that the village refuse to issue building permits in that area unless an access road is provided.

The petition noted that all traffic to and from that area would have to go via North and Western Avenues. It contended these streets are inadequate to handle such traffic.

Wietor told Schmitt that the subdivision in question has not been approved by the state, the village or its plan commission and that William Ruth, the developer, was asked to re-vamp his plans. "As of now, his first plan is rejected," Wietor stated. The village has asked the state for an access road to Highway 45 but no reply has been received.

McKenna commented that "you're putting the cart before the horse," explaining that the subdivision plans given to the board were turned over to the plan commission and to date have not been acted on.

He suggested that Schmitt and other concerned residents give their views to the members of the plan commission. "It is up to them how this fits into village plans," McKenna observed.

Schmitt also said he believes there should be stop signs at the intersection of North and Western Avenues now, as even at this time, there is a heavy flow of traffic. The matter was referred to Police Chief Don Hlavaty who said he will observe the traffic pattern at the busiest times.

The village will crack down on patrons of the public library who are keeping books beyond the due date and not responding to telephone calls or letters from librarian Mrs. Milton Borchert.

Orval Behnke, board representative on the library board said about 40 books are involved. Some have been out from five months to one year. Books are lent free of charge to any resident of the Kewaskum school district. A fine of one cent per day is charged from the date the book is to be returned to the library.

The schools have agreed to retrieve books from students. But adults within the community who are holding overdue books and not responding will receive a letter from Police Chief Don Hlavaty. It will ask that the books be returned within a specified time. Those who do not respond, should be dealt with accordingly, the village board decreed.

Admission will be \$1.25 per person.

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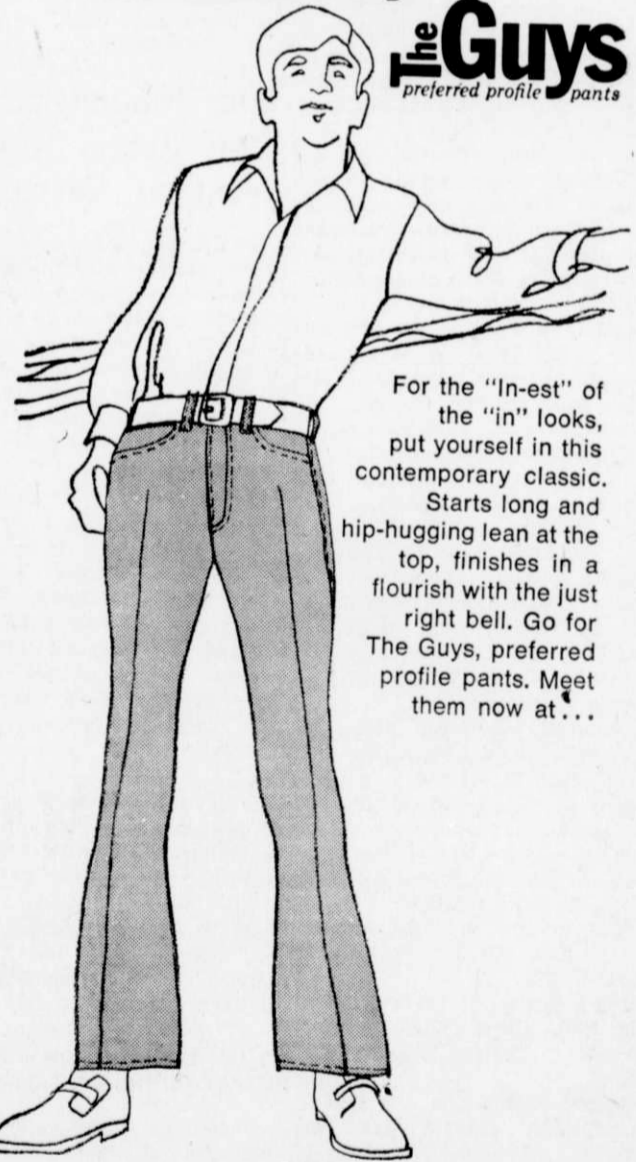

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Put a Thief Out of Business

"Operation C.O.D.E." is a protective measure being introduced to the Village of Kewaskum by the Auxiliary Police in cooperation with local police. The idea was introduced in Monterey Park, Calif. in 1963 by Police Chief Everett Holladay when homeowners responded to a Police Department circular and began engraving their driver's license number on all of their valuable possessions to identify them if stolen.

The local plan is encouraging citizens to stop by the Municipal Building and borrow an electric engraver at no cost that will engrave on any surface. The tool will be on loan for 5 days during which time driver's license numbers or other identifying information can be marked on clocks, radios, tape recorders, TV sets, record players, cameras, bicycles, power mowers, and other items that appeal to would-be thieves. This makes all stolen valuables immediately traceable to their

owner. The identity of the licensee and his correct address is available to any law enforcement agency immediately upon request via telephone or teletype. When apprehended a thief, therefore, cannot claim stolen property as his own.

After engraving all valuables with a driver's license number, the engraver is returned to the Police Dept. along with a list of items, marked for filing in the police dept. Each citizen will be given an "Official Window Decal" proclaiming, "all items of value on these premises have been marked for ready identification by law enforcement agencies." The Window Decals also act as preventative measure. Once a burglar knows that the items in a house are marked and can easily be traced, he is likely to think twice about breaking in. In addition, the middleman, or "fence" who buys and sells stolen goods is wary of items that can be traced. If a "fence" won't buy an item, the thief has lost his market.

At present, more than 150 cities and communities across the na-

tion have started this program. We urge all Kewaskum households to get on the bandwagon now and put thieves out of business.

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Gaffke, Luedtke, Schmidt, Staehler, Koth Kewaskum Dominates Scenic All Conference Team with 5 Selections

The Kewaskum Indians, who ended up in a 3-way tie for 2nd place, and champion Hartland Arrowhead dominated the Scenic Moraine All Conference team, each having 5 players named to the squad. The All-Conference selections were made at a meeting in Mayville last week.

Kewaskum's first team selections were running back Jim Gaffke, quarterback Dale Luedtke and guard Kerry Staehler on offense and interior lineman Al Schmidt and linebacker Jeff Koth on defense.

Gaffke was a repeater from last year, when he made All Conference on both offense and defense, and led the league in rushing. He no doubt would also have been the leading rusher this year were it not for an injury which kept him out of 2½ games. Jim wound up 6 league touchdowns (12 altogether) and 469 yards in 92 carries for a 5.09 average.

Luedtke was selected at the quarterback spot and the backfield was rounded out by Hartland's Pete Gutchenritter, a unanimous choice, and Brian Meunier of Grafton. Luedtke rushed for 383 yards in 67 carries for a 5.4 average. In passing he completed 36 of 77 for a fine .467 percentage.

The Indians' third offensive player named, Staehler, at guard, was not one of the bigger linemen, although stocky, but he was a fantastic blocker.

Kewaskum's Koth, selected as a linebacker, was tabbed the Indians' best defensive player. He also did the punting and played slotback. Later he played tailback when Gaffke was injured. Jeff caught 12 passes and scored 3 TD's, including the one which won the Slinger game.

One of two juniors named to the first team was Kewaskum's Al Schmidt, a defensive tackle. He gave opposing quarterbacks fits with a good pass rush. Al also recovered 3 fumbles and averaged 15 tackles a game. Coach Joe Harlow is probably looking ahead already to Schmidt's return next year.

The Indians' Gary Marx missed making the team as a linebacker by an eyelash. He and Kettle Moraine's David Steward tied for honors with Steward winning in a run off. Marx, who received an honorable mention, had 2 interceptions, 2 fumble recoveries, and was never beaten deep on a pass play. Another Kewaskum player on the honorable mention squad was 6-2 Mike Koepke, the only sophomore to be picked. He led the conference in passes with 15. Big Mike will be back for 2 more years of competition which should greatly please his coach and he is still growing.
