## Regal Announces Three Promotions

James D. Reigle, President, Regal Ware, Inc., has announced three administrative promotions for the Kewaskum based cookware and electrical appliance manufacturing company. William G. Crooker was named Vice President & General Manager of the Kewaskum plant; Jerome Gjertson, Director of Production Planning and William Cullen, Director of Industrial Relations.

Crooker, who was formerly Manager of Manufacturing and Engineering for the firm's Kewaskum plant, brings an outstanding background of experience and accomplishment to his new position. In his capacity as Vice President, he will direct manufacturing operations and engineering at the home plant in Kewaskum and will also be responsible for engineering at Regal plants located in Wooster, Ohio; Flora, Mississippi; Peoria, Illinois and Orangeville, Ontario, Canada.

As Director of Production Planning, Gjertson will be responsible for coordinating forecasting, master scheduling, detailed planning, design and implementation of systems controls for the five Regal plants. ## Win Conservation and Outstanding Farmer Awards

Plaques were presented by Ken Erickson, president of the Kiwanis Club. Roy Esser, chairman of the Kiwanis farm-city program, showed slides of the award winners' farms. The Theusches, with their sons, Frank, Don and Jim, operate a 390-acre dairy farm, about four miles west of Kewaskum on

County Hwy. H. A substantial portion of the cropland is in contour strip cropping, which can be seen from the road. In 1960 Walter Theusch signed up as a cooperator with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District. Since then he has applied 113 acres of contour strip cropping which holds water on slopes and keeps sediment out of streams and lakes. Over 100 acres are in conservation crop rotations, 2,900 feet of surface drain and one acre of grass waterway has been constructed. The Theusches have 87 acres of managed woodland which is protected from fire and grazing and eight acres of wetland habitat for wildlife. A wildlife and recreation pond was also con-

structed.

Harvey and Ed Klumb have the top dairy herd in Washington County, consisting of 43 Holstein cows. The herd averages almost 19,000 pounds of milk and 735 pounds of butterfat per year. Harvey and Ed operate 280 acres in the Township of Barton. In 1967 the Klumbs signed as cooperator with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District and by 1969 they completed their conservation farm plan by applying 165 acres in conservation cropping rotation, 100 acres in contour tillage and 19 acres in contour strip cropping. Over 16,000 feet of tile drains have been installed on the farm to improve wet areas in crop fields.

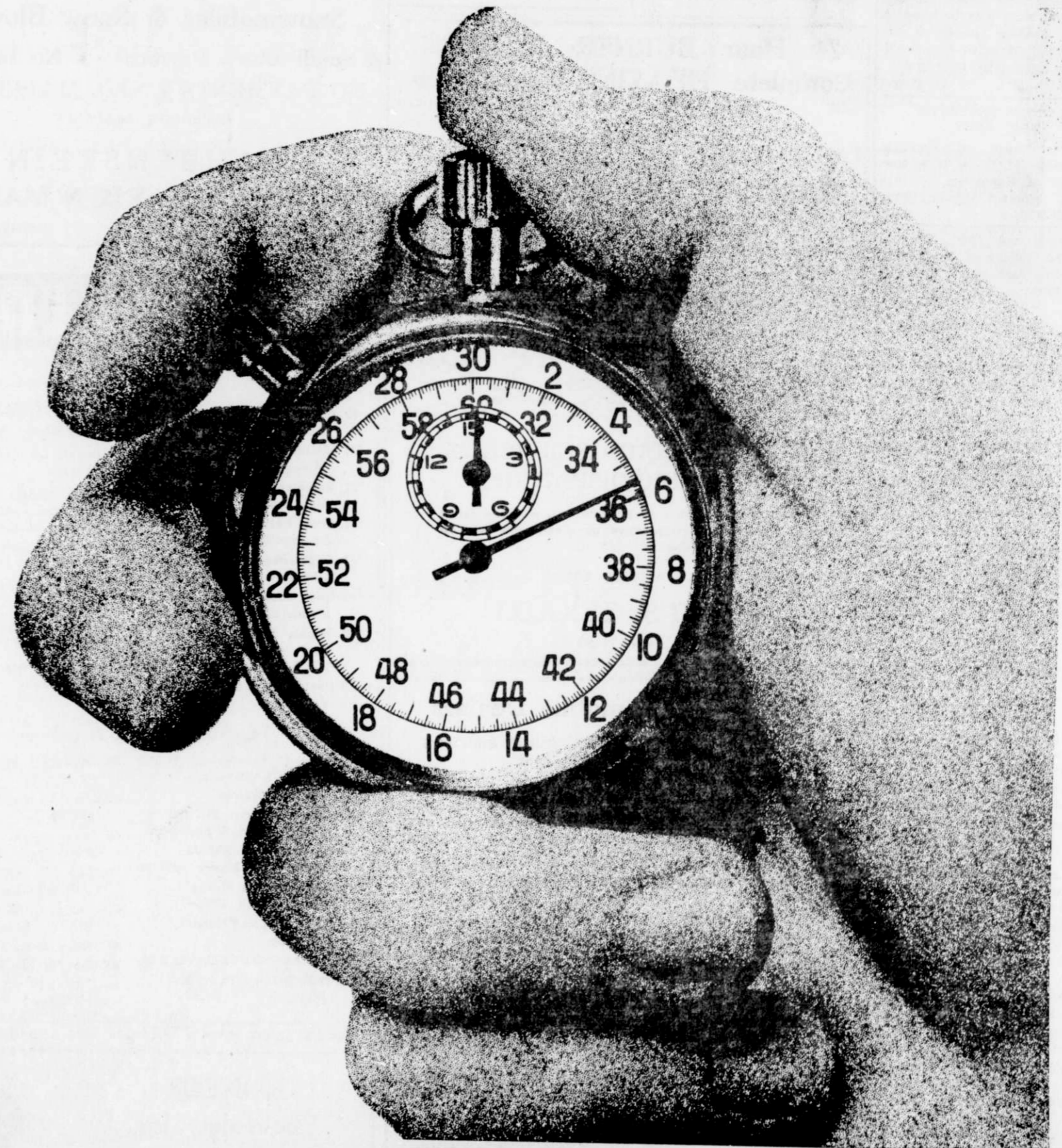
