On Sunday, Dec. 17, a German Christmas concert will be held at Immanuel Lutheran Church, Town of Scott, beginning at 7:30 p. m.

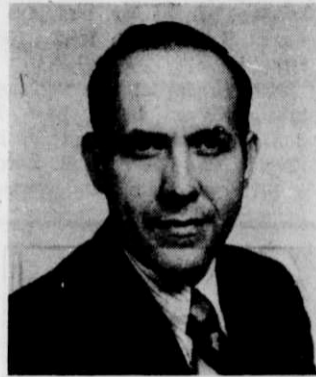

New Ceramics Studio to Open In Kewaskum

A new ceramics studio under the direction of Mrs. William P. Gruss of R. 2, Campbellsport, is scheduled to open Jan. 2 in Kewaskum.

Mrs. Gruss plans to offer classes in ceramics and paper tole, a method of creating three dimensional pictures, at her studio, which will be located at 230 Main St., in the former McKenna Law Offices building. It will be open from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. and evenings from 7 to 10 p. m. every day except Wednesday and Sundays, with no lessons given on Saturday.

Mrs. Gruss plans to offer a course in beginning ceramics which will include the making of such things as candlesticks, lanterns, and techniques in glazing. The charge for the beginning course will be \$10 for six lessons.

Mrs. Gruss said, "then at the end of the course the person can decide what they want to make next, because they will have had a little of everything." Other lessons for more experienced people will cost \$1 per lesson Mrs. Gruss said.

Mrs. Gruss, originally from England, came to this country eight years ago. She worked with ceramics for three years when she lived in Milwaukee and for a year and a half at Zuber's Studios in West Bend.

There will be room for eight people in each class and if anyone is interested in taking a course they may sign up now by calling her at 626-4771.

CHRISTMAS TREE AGAIN TOPS FEHLHABER'S HILL

A large, lighted Christmas tree has again been set up at the top of Fehlhaber's Hill on the east side of the village. The tree on the huge hill symbolizes the Christmas spirit and can be seen for miles around. The tree was erected Saturday and will shine out through the holidays.

Sunday, Dec. 10, was Armin Oppermann Day in Kewaskum.

On this day in Kewaskum celebration of 25 years of service as an employee and as superintendent of the Village of Kewaskum was celebrated at the Wigwam Hall with more than 100 invited guests in attendance. Guests present to honor Armin, who also serves as fire chief, included present and former village board members, active and retired members of the fire department, fellow village employees, friends and members of his family together with wives and lady friends.

The festivities began at 5 p. m. with a cocktail hour, followed by a buffet chicken and ham dinner at 6 o'clock. Highlight of the evening was a program honoring Armin after the dinner. Dancing was provided from 8 to 11 p. m. with music by Tiny Terlinden at the organ.

Highlight of the program, which was capably MC'd by Tom Latsen, was a "This Is Your Life" skit in which members of the village board, village workers, Pastor Paul Hoenecke and Armin's son David portrayed different events which occurred in the past 25 years of Oppermann's employment by the village and as fire chief. Also letters of congratulations were read from invited guests unable to attend.

Oppermann was presented with a gold engraved watch for his many years of service with the village by Village President Cyril Wiator as well as other gifts. Wiator commented that Armin is an outstanding and dedicated worker, who cannot say "no" to anyone, whether it is 4 a. m. in the morning or 11 p. m. at night when he is called out. A monetary table collection was taken and presented to him from the guests.

Armin was born on the farm of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Oppermann, and was one of 10 children. He attended school in Kewaskum, graduating from high school in 1941. He stayed on the farm until his marriage and then he and his wife "Ginny" moved to Kewaskum. On Sept. 1, 1947 he began working for the village. There was just two employees then, Oppermann and Bill Schaub. When Schaub retired, Armin took over as superintendent of public works, which he still holds.

Armin has also been a volunteer fireman since 1948, was assistant chief for eight years and has served as chief for the past 11 years. He was elected chief when the late Harry Schaefer retired. With the fire department averaging about 25 fires a year, Armin may have helped fight over 500 fires in his 24 years with the department. He has also been on the first aid team and rescue squad which operates the ambulance service.

Armin and his wife have two children, David and Debbe and two grandsons.

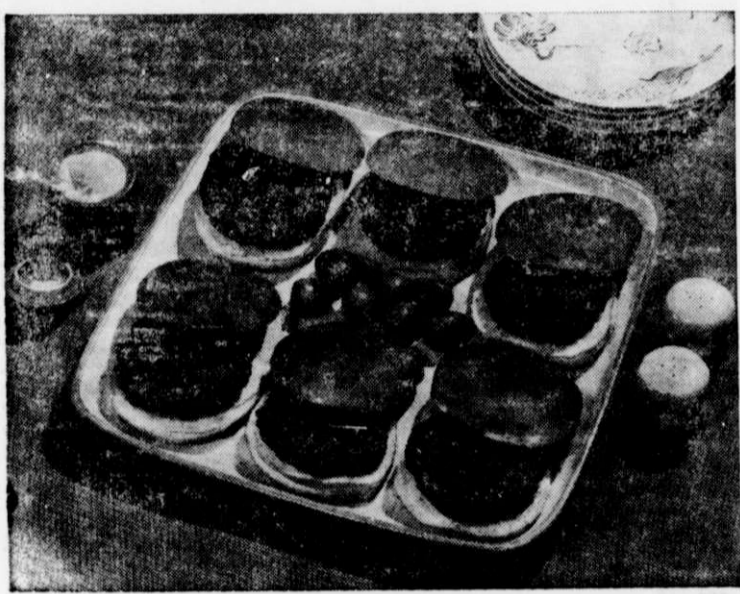

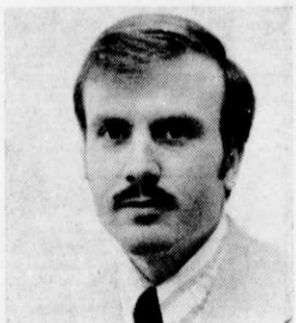

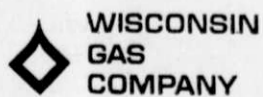

MINUTES OF VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

Regular Meeting
October 2, 1972
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Wietor presided and all Board Members were present except Trustee Nigh.

The minutes of the meetings of September 11, September 18, September 25 and September 27 were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Kral and duly carried.

Mr. Phil Majerus met with the Board to discuss his sanitary landfill operation near Lomira. Mr. Majerus was requested to submit to the Village a quotation either on a per ton or per load basis for refuse delivered to his landfill site.

Mr. Fred Fehlhaber appeared before the Board to ask questions regarding the proposed Zemlicka-Rosenthal Subdivision. Mr. Fehlhaber stated that if the area was being planned for a low income housing project, he would object to the approval of the plan. Mr. Zemlicka assured Mr. Fehlhaber that this was not the intention of the subdividers and that the lots as planned were purposely laid out in sufficient size to accommodate middle income homes.

Applications of James A. Tassar and Kathryn Warner for bartender's licenses were reviewed. There were no objections. Both applications were approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper licenses upon

payment of the required fee. Motion by Trustee Yoost, seconded by Trustee Herriges and duly carried.

A public hearing was scheduled for the evening of October 16, 1972, at 8:00 P. M. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building on the proposed installation of sewer and water mains and laterals on the extension of Forest Avenue between Hillside and Edgewood. Motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee Behnke and duly carried.

Change order number 3 in the amount of \$1,888.52 to Westra Construction for extra work on the Sewage Treatment project was approved upon motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee Yoost and duly carried.

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann reported that the officers of the Fire Department have recommended liability coverage on the ambulance attendants in the amounts of \$25,000 - \$50,000 - \$75,000 per run with the annual premium to be paid by the Fire Department. The recommendation was so accepted upon motion by Trustee Behnke, seconded by Trustee Miller and carried.

After discussion, motion was made by Trustee Behnke and seconded by Trustee Miller that the Zemlicka - Rosenthal Subdivision revised preliminary plat be approved as recommended by the Plan Commission. Plat approved upon roll call vote of 4 "aye" and 2 "naye."

The Commissioner was authorized to attend the League of Wisconsin Municipalities Conference at Milwaukee on October 25-27. Motion by Trustee Herriges, se-

conded by Trustee Behnke and duly carried.

Chief of Police Hlavaty reported that the Washington County Sheriff's Department is making plans to convert their county radio system to a Hi-band frequency. Needed necessary equipment will be 50% funded by the Federal Government.

Upon roll call vote, the Board unanimously agreed that the proposed Land Division and Platting Ordinance shall contain a section requiring the subdivider to pay for and handle all contracts for the installation of utilities and other improvements and to complete such installations or improvements within one year of the letting of such contract.

The following letter of recommendation was presented to the Board by the Vice-chairman of the Plan Commission.

To the Village Board, Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin. Attention C. N. Wietor, President. A meeting of the Planning Commission was held Wednesday evening immediately following the Public Hearing on the proposed zoning ordinance with the following action being taken:

There was a motion by L. N. Peterson, seconded by Vernon Butz, to recommend to the Village Board the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance for the Village of Kewaskum subject to the amending of Sections 2.3 and 10.8 as noted by the SEWRPC, and the completion of Section 14. A roll call vote was taken with the following members present and all voting "aye": L. N. Peterson, Vernon Butz, Charles Schultz, O. E. Behnke, W. D. Tassar. Motion carried

unanimously.*

Big Germantown Team Routs Cold Indians, 81 to 47

The Kewaskum Indians were downed in their 3rd straight conference game and 5th overall Friday night at Germantown where the tall, unbeaten Warhawks overpowered them by a one-sided 81-47 score.

The small Indians again were ice cold in shooting, hitting an unbelievably poor 15%. They didn't score a point until three-quarters of the first period had gone by.

Mike Henry, veteran 6-2 Germantown senior, who was out against Slinger the week before, returned to action and paced the Warhawks' scoring with 16 points. Terry Matson was close behind with 14 as 12 Germantown players broke into the scoring column. Soph Scott Koth was high scorer for the losers and the game with 17 points and Jim Gaffke was next with 8.

Germantown made 15 of 25 free throws for 60% to Kewaskum's 23 of 43 for 54%. The Indians were outscored in every quarter, 22-10, 15-11, 26-11 and 18-14. The halftime count was 37-21.

Germantown's JV's also won over Kewaskum in a high scoring encounter, 75-61. Christ Canter led the winners with 32 points, while Don Gruber was high for Kewaskum with 21.

The Indians' non-conference game at Hartford (Little Ten) Tuesday night was postponed due to the snowstorm and was rescheduled for Wednesday. Kewaskum will also host Pewaukee in a Scenic tilt tonight and entertain Horicon (Flyway) in another non-loop game Tuesday.
