Gregory "Chickie" Fellenz Passes On

Gregory M. "Chickie" Fellenz, 55, of R. 6, West Bend, died Monday, Dec. 25, at 10 p. m. at St. Mary's Hospital, Milwaukee. He owned and operated "Chickie's" Bar on South Main and later on Fifth Avenue in West Bend and since 1969 operated "Chickie's" Bar in Fillmore.

Mr. Fellenz was born March 23, 1917 in the Town of Barton. On Oct. 28, 1939 he married Bernice Krueger of the Town of Auburn at Immaculate Conception Church, West Bend, and lived in that city until moving to R. 6, West Bend.

Surviving are his widow, six children, Gregory Jr., (Sally), West Bend; James (Jeanne), Hartford; Jerry, Madison; Thomas, Milwaukee, Mary (Mrs. Paul Peters) and Michael, both of West Bend; seven grandchildren, and four brothers, George, Anthony, Theodore and Robert, all of West Bend. Mr. Fellenz was a member of the Loyal Order of Moose, West Bend Lodge 1398 and the Washington County Tavern League.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 9:30 a. m. from the Schmidt Funeral Home, West Bend, and at 10 a. m. at Holy Angels Church. Rev. Warren Schmitt officiated and burial was in Holy Angels Cemetery. Visitation at the funeral home was after 3 p. m. Wednesday.

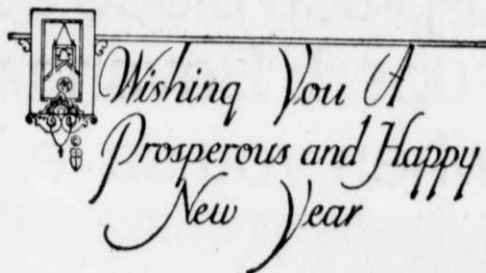

Hitchhiker Fined For Threatening Local Woman

A 24-year-old man from Milwaukee was fined \$43 and \$7 costs for disorderly conduct last Wednesday for threatening the life of a 22-year-old Kewaskum woman who had given him a ride as he was hitchhiking on Tuesday evening.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty reported that Joseph J. Carroll of 839 N. 19th St., Milwaukee, was hitchhiking just north of West Bend when the Kewaskum woman stopped about 11:10 p. m. to give him a ride. He said he was headed for Kaukauna.

Driving into Kewaskum on Hwy. 45, Carroll asked the young woman if she would drive him to Hwy. 41 because he felt he would have a better chance of getting another ride. She agreed, and after she had driven about one mile west on Hwy. 28, Carroll pulled a rat tail comb from his pocket and held it to her throat saying she would be dead if she did not pull her car over.

Frightened, the young woman pleaded with her hitchhiking companion. He relented and told her to drive back to Kewaskum. At the junction of Hwys. 45 and 28, Carroll got out of the car and started walking north. The young woman notified Chief Hlavaty immediately. Carroll was picked up shortly after as he walked north on Hwy. 45.

Carroll was held in the Washington County jail in West Bend over night and was to be held for 24 hours pending further investigation. He appeared before Judge Robert J. Stoltz in Branch 2 Wednesday where he was fined.

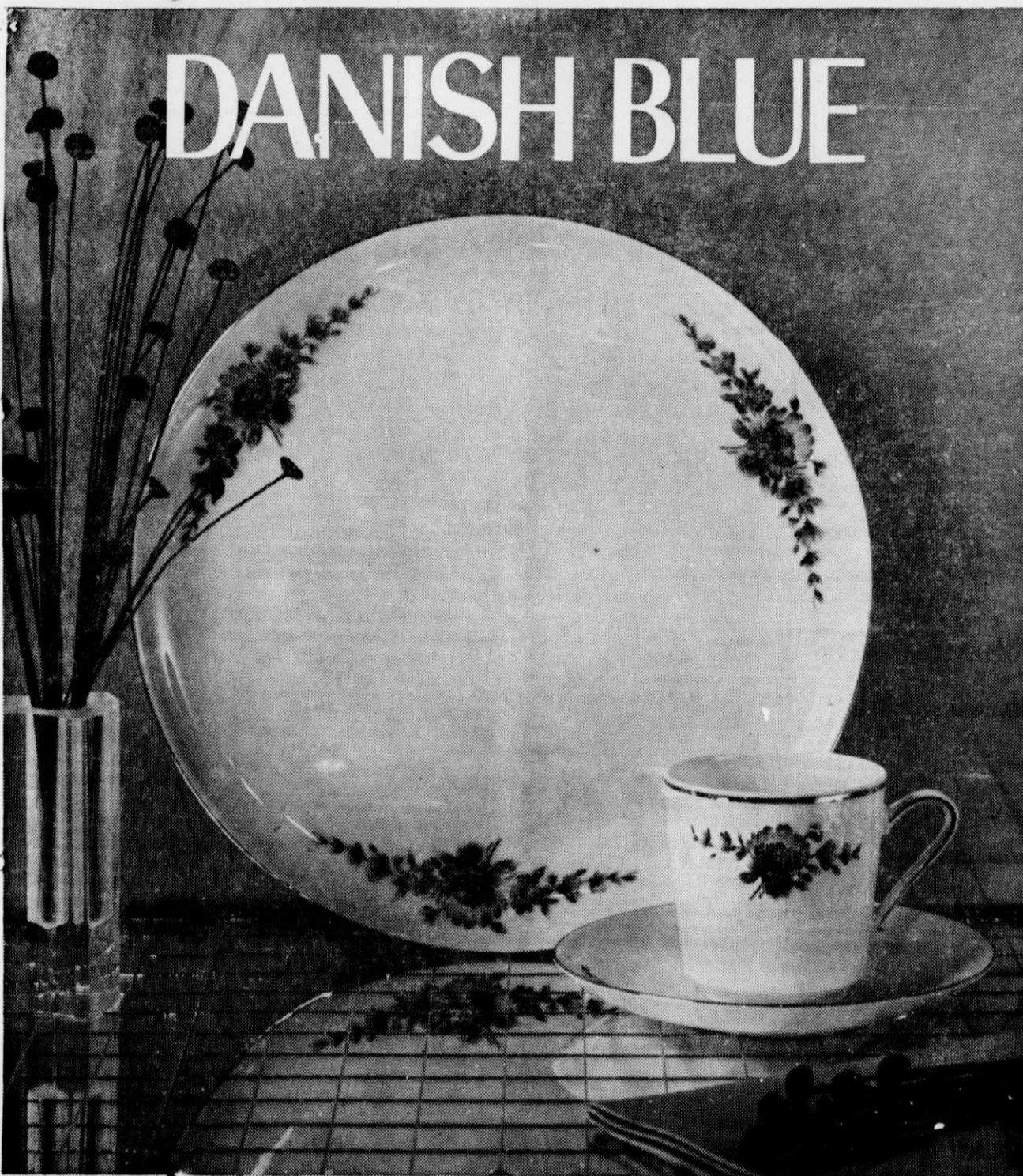

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Wietor presided and all Board Members were present.

The following letter of recommendation was presented:

Re: Sub-Division & platting Ordinance

The Village Plan Commission has reviewed the Sub-Division and Platting Ordinance as finalized by Attorney McKenna and has approved the same. We would like to point out that members Orval Behnke, Roger Strack, and Wayland Tessar do take exception to the \$200.00 figure for park purposes stated under Section 31.081 for reasons expressed by Behnke and Tessar at a joint meeting with the Village Board recently. In addition to the feeling that the charge may be high, all three members feel that setting a flat rate can leave the rate outdated as economic conditions change and as the Village Board changes it is questioned whether this will be kept updated. Basing the charge on a percentage basis

Upon motion by Trustee Behnke, seconded by Trustee Herges and duly carried, the Board approved the action taken by the committee in negotiating a curbing easement with William Edwards at a cost of \$100.00.

Upon motion by Trustee Herges, seconded by Trustee Kral and duly carried, the Board adjourned subject to call by the President.

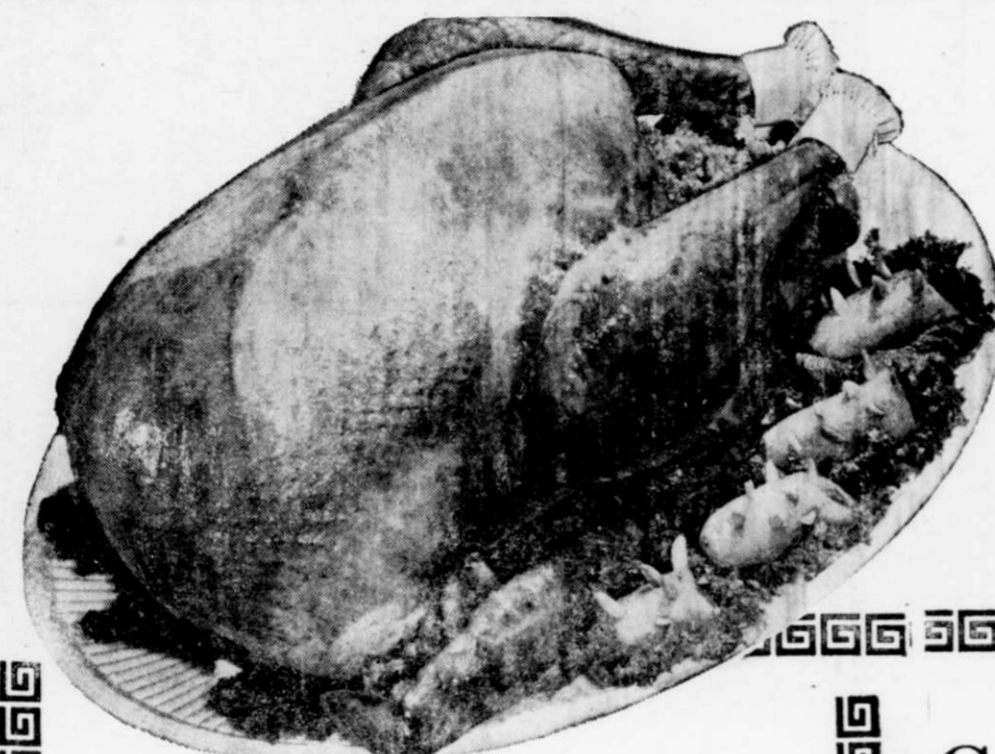

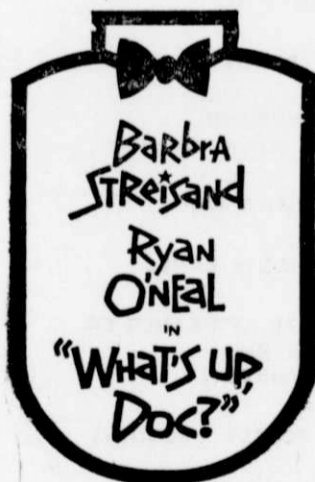
