To Borrow \$1.6 Million School Board to Go Ahead With Building Program

Major Project New Middle School Here

Construction of a new middle school for grades 7 and 8 was the major portion of a building program approved at the Monday meeting of the School Board. The total building program will also include additions at Wayne, Farmington and Kewaskum Elementary Schools and at the high school. The vote on this approach was unanimous, with all seven board members present and voting.

Once the decision on the building program was made, the board then considered a resolution to borrow \$1.6 million for the required construction, remodeling and equipping. This resolution was approved by a 7-0 vote of the board following discussion with two representatives of First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee. The money will be borrowed on promissory notes to be repaid in full in ten years. The board discussed repaying a \$47,300 note coming due on the present Beechwood school rather than refinancing this note as had originally been planned. With this amount included in debt service this year, the additional impact of the new building program would be .62 mills, or 62c per thousand dollars of equalized valuation.

The mill rate for debt service this year was 2.50 (3.13 with repaying the total Beechwood note). With the new buildings, the rate would be 3.75 next year. Using conservative estimates of total valuation increases, Tracy Hanson of First Wisconsin projects a 3.65 mill rate the following year, 3.47 the next, etc. The entire debt would be paid in 10 years, and at that time virtually all other existing debts would also be paid. In terms of existing debt, the district at that time would be virtually debt free.

The building program adopted was based on decisions to retain grades K-6 in the elementary schools and to utilize the present high school, with additions, for four grades rather than three. The program is designed so that the shuttling of students between the Beechwood and Farmington areas can be ended as the district moves to more ungraded educational programs.

Since the board chose to borrow the money by resolution on promissory notes, there will be no referendum on the matter unless residents of the district submit a proper petition for a referendum within 15 days of the date of official publication of the resolution. The official publication date is February 2, so the deadline for submitting a petition is Saturday, February 17.

In other business, the board approved hiring American Building Maintenance for cleaning at the two schools in town. The bid would amount to approximately

Two West Bend Men Join Local Police Force

Hiring of two new patrolmen for the Village of Kewaskum has been announced by Police Chief Donald Hlavaty. They are Richard L. Knoebel, 22, and James A. Wichtoski, 24, both of West Bend. Both were sworn in as members of the Kewaskum Police Department at a ceremony at the municipal building at 9 a. m. Thursday and began working as patrolmen.

Hlavaty reported that 30 applications were taken out for the position with 22 returned completed. Eighteen were given the written examination and eight were personally interviewed. From these Knoebel and Wichtoski were chosen by the village board and the Civilian Police and Fire Commission.

Knoebel had been attending college, studying in the conservation field to be a game warden. Wichtoski has had two years of experience in the Armed Forces Military Police. Neither man is married.

The two new patrolmen fill vacancies in the department. One was created when Patrolman David St. Louis resigned recently to join the Washington County Sheriff's Department. The other will fill a vacancy left by George Allman, who had served in a part-time capacity on the force. The position has now been expanded to one of full-time stature.

SIREN BELLS SOUND PEACE CELEBRATION

The signing of the peace treaty to end the Vietnam war Saturday at 6 p. m. was celebrated in Kewaskum by the blowing of the village's fire siren and ringing of the church bells and chimes. The siren sounded in a steady blast for three minutes and all local churches rang their bells or chimes.

30 NEW HOMES, APARTMENT BUILT IN VILLAGE IN 1972

In a check made this week it was learned that building permits were issued for 30 new homes and one apartment building containing 10 housekeeping units which were erected in Kewaskum during 1972.

These permits do not include another 16-unit apartment building now under construction at the corner of First and Railroad Sts. and the new Bank of Kewaskum building going up on Fond du Lac Ave.

Miller Alone for President; 6 File For Trustee Posts

The deadline for filing papers for village offices to be elected in spring was 5 p. m. Tuesday, Jan. 30.

Charles Miller is the only candidate to file for village president to succeed Cyril Wietor. Owner of Miller Electric and Studio, Miller is presently a trustee, whose term expires in April. He has served nearly 15 years on the board and has held the office of president once before. Wietor is not seeking re-election after four years as president and 10 more as a trustee.

Six candidates filed for three trustee posts to be elected. Alfred Kral, an incumbent, and Daniel Schmidt filed early in January. Roger Strack filed Jan. 22 and three more names were added to the list Tuesday: John Tessar, Robert Staehler and Ken Neldner.

Kral has spent over 10 years on the board and is employed by Regal Ware. Schmidt, an unsuccessful candidate a year ago, is employed by the Wisconsin Electric Company. Strack, owner of Rog's Service Station, is seeking the office for the first time. Tessar, employed by Regal Ware, and Neldner, with Fairmont Foods, also are first time candidates. Staehler, also unsuccessful in seeking the post a year ago, is with Weasler Engineering.

Melva Moths Is KHS Homemaker Of Tomorrow

Melva Moths, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Moths, R. 1, Kewaskum, is Kewaskum High School's 1973 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. Selected by achieving the highest score in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken by senior boys and girls on Dec. 5, Melva received a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for American Homemakers of Tomorrow. In addition, Melva remains eligible for state and national honors.

Ketter Promoted By Regal Ware



Phillip J. Ketter has been promoted to the position of Forecasting Coordinator of Regal Ware, Inc. according to an announcement by James D. Reigle, president of the company. This newly-created position involves complete responsibility for the implementation, coordination and administration of computerized sales forecasts.

Prior to his appointment, Ketter was a Senior Systems Analyst for the Kewaskum, based cookware manufacturing firm. He joined Regal in 1968, shortly after completing a tour in Vietnam with the United States Army. Ketter is a graduate of St. Norbert's College, West De Pere, Wis., and achieved a Masters Degree in Business Administration at the University of Indiana, Bloomington, Ind.

He, his wife, Barbara, and their two children reside in Campbellsport.

After four long years of anxious waiting, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Fickler of Kewaskum finally got the bad news in a phone call Saturday that the name of their missing son, Capt. E. James Fickler, USMC, was not on the list of 555 POW's released by the Communists.

Capt. Fickler was missing in action in Southeast Asia since Jan. 17, 1969. His parents were overjoyed at the announcement of the ceasefire and hoped their son's name would be among the list of prisoners of war. But Saturday's message was what they dreaded to

hear, that Capt. Fickler's name was not on the list of POW's turned over to Secretary of State William Rogers. The phone call came from Marine headquarters in Washington relayed through the Marine office in Milwaukee.

There is still a possibility that he might be among the men held in Laos, for whom a list was not released. But Capt. Fickler was shot down over Vietnam on a mission four years ago.

Mrs. Fickler said that recently she did not have much hope that her son was alive. Her next hope is that she may receive further information when some of the returning POW's are debriefed about her son, who was the pilot of a fighter plane on a night mission. It is believed that he was downed south of the demilitarized zone on Jan. 17, 1969. Also downed with the 29-year-old flyer was his navigator. No word has been received about him either, nor was his name on the list of POW's.

Mr. and Mrs. Fickler have been active in the National League of Families of American Prisoners and Missing in Action in Southeast Asia. Mrs. Fickler faithfully wrote to her son as often as permitted in hopes of receiving word from him or about him. She discontinued writing during the past year as hope waned.

Capt. Fickler graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1961 and the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point in 1965. He enlisted in the Marines in February of 1965 on an inactive status. He left for Vietnam in April of 1968.

OLDEST CIVIC GROUP IN KEWASKUM

Woman's Club Observes 60th Anniversary of Its Founding

Sixty years of service to Kewaskum as a civic organization were recognized Saturday evening when the Kewaskum Woman's Club observed the 60th anniversary of its founding. The club has the distinction of being the oldest civic group in Kewaskum.

Hon-E-Kor Country Club was chosen for the annual Founder's Day dinner attended by club members and their husbands. Also guests were Mrs. John Heinsohn, sixth district president of woman's clubs and Mr. Heinsohn of Neenah. "If 50 years is honored with gold, then the Kewaskum Woman's Club must be better than gold," said Mrs. Heinsohn as she addressed the group.

She outlined the six areas of activity in the work of woman's clubs, stressing the diversity of programs. "There is a place for every woman to find her own satisfying field among the areas of public affairs, international affairs, the arts, conservation, education and home life," Mrs. Heinsohn said. "Yet, as the largest single membership of any wo-

man's organization, we represent a unity that can be awesome," she added.

Mrs. Gerald Stoffel, president of the Kewaskum club, was mistress of ceremonies. Mrs. O. E. Behnke was in charge of arrangements. A prayer was offered by the Rev. Dan Schowalter.

Following a 7:30 p. m. dinner, past presidents were introduced and a short Charlie Chaplin film dating back to the 1913 era, was shown to musical accompaniment of Mrs. Henry Rosenheimer.

Also, under her direction, a special chorus of club members sang songs associated with the 1913 era, interspersed with items that were on the national or local news

scene at the time.

Chorus members included the Mes. Eugene Panzer, Lloyd Etta, Robert Kroncke, Gerald Stoffel, O. E. Behnke, Earl Buswell, Ray St. Mary, E. E. Miller, Dan Schowalter, R. L. Edwards, Walter Bade, Robert Schmidt, Donald Wendt and Vincent Groh. In observance of the peace treaty that went into effect Saturday night, all in attendance joined in singing "America the Beautiful."

The finale was presented by Mrs. Robert Kroncke and Mrs. Buswell as they sang two delightful German "lieder" found in very old song books. Rev. Dan Schowalter offered a prayer.

The Kewaskum Woman's Club was founded on Jan. 13, 1913 by the late Mrs. D. M. Rosenheimer. She and a small group of charter members took as their first project, establishing a library for Kewaskum. In the beginning, the

clubwomen staffed it. A few years later they turned it over to the Village of Kewaskum and it became the Kewaskum Public Library.

Bake sales and card parties were never more important as they were then, for they raised funds with which to buy books for the library. Today, the club supports all civic projects and

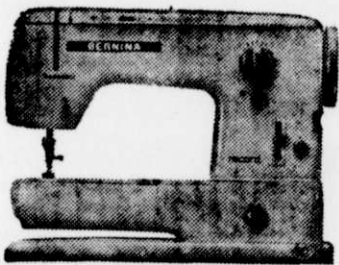

Stewart Bohn Dies Saturday

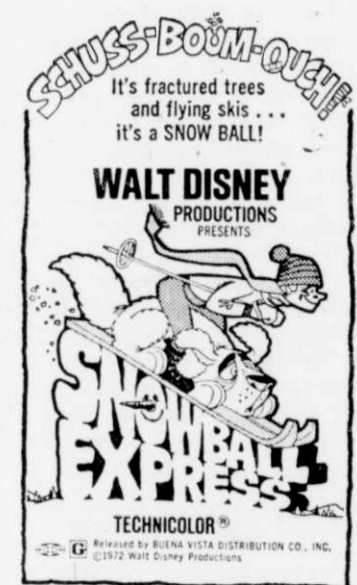
Stewart F. Bohn, 61, of Allenton, agent in Allenton for Standard Oil, died Saturday, Jan. 27, at his home.

The Indians 2 young sophomores Scott Koth and Mike Koepke, both of whom were in the top 5 in conference scoring, were held to 10 and 8 points respectively but led their team. Koth's brother Jeff also contributed 8 points. With Scott and Mike only sophs and being among the top scorers in the conference, things should be looking up for the Indians next year.

In other Scenic contests Friday Grafton outlasted Hartland, 86-75, to retain its first place tie. Mayville won a defensive battle over Kettle Moraine, 38-25, and Slinger held off Pewaukee, 73-66.

Kewaskum's JV's beat Germantown, 67-54. Randy Koepke led the way with 22 points, followed by Don Gruber with 18, Paul Petri with 11 and Tom Timblin with 10.

This Friday Kewaskum goes to Pewaukee to settle the cellar position. Winless Pewaukee is last with 0-9, while the Indians are one up on them with 1-8. A win will keep the Indians out of the basement.

This time the match didn't ride on Donath's shoulders but he went out anyway and put away his 240 lb. opponent, Tom Hagel.
