## School Board Approves Using Turnkey Approach in Building

Buildings and the 1973-74 school calendar were the major items of business on the agenda of the Board of Education meeting held Monday evening.

The board approved using a turnkey approach in building. General building requirements will be worked on at a special meeting which will be held March 19. Also on that date the representative from First Wisconsin, financial advisors, will be present so that the board can approve the sale of notes. It is anticipated bids on the notes will be received, opened and accepted on May 10.

The school calendar for 1973-74 was discussed at length. By a 4-3 vote the board failed to accept a calendar in which school began before Labor Day for students. Members of the board will now meet with teacher representatives to iron out differences in the calendar.

Approval was given to issuing teacher contracts. Mr. Esser will be in a position next year and half-time agriculture teacher and half-time Local Vocational Education Coordinator. Paul Redig will be increased from 80% to 100% teaching time in agriculture. Mrs. Cook, who teaches business education, will be increased to full time, while Mrs. Felt, who taught part-time in home economics, will not be rehired because of a decreasing need in that subject. The board also okayed an additional assistant wrestling coach.

A request by the local Land O' Lakes Conference baseball team to use the school diamond for a slow-pitch tournament, including a beer concession, was tabled pending further investigation.

A time schedule for next year for the junior and senior high schools was approved. To eliminate one more period when all students are in the building, the day will be extended. Grades 10-12 will begin at 7:20 and grades 7-9 will begin at 10:52 next year. Dismissal times will be 1:05 for Senior High students and 4:37 for Junior High.

An executive session was held following the regular meeting to discuss salaries.

Some 107 young people graduated from the University Farm and Industry Short Course Saturday, March 10, at the University Stock Pavilion in Madison.

A total of 160 students attended this year's Short Course. Of the 107 students graduated, 96 received 2-year completion certificates. Two-year certificates signify successful completion of an equivalent of two years of Short Course study. Many students earn credit for participation in agricultural programs while in high school. ## Historymobile To Visit Local Schools March 21

The State Historical Society's Historymobile, this year featuring an exhibit on Black history, will be shown at the Kewaskum Schools on Wednesday, March 21. Students will view the traveling museum during school hours.

The society and a citizen's committee composed largely of Blacks cooperated in planning and building the exhibit, which was shown in the State Historical Society's Museum in Madison before being reassembled in the Historymobile.

Entitled "The Black Community: Its Culture and Heritage," the exhibit uses dioramas, photographs, and artifacts to recount the heritage and experience of the Black people, beginning with their African ancestry and continuing through their enslavement, resistance to repression, and accomplishments as Afro-Americans.

After its showing in Kewaskum, the Historymobile will be exhibited in Hartford. This school year the "museum-on-wheels" is traveling through communities in eastern Wisconsin on the first leg of a three-year tour which will take it to most of the schools in the state.

The curators of the Historymobile are Barb and Phil McMahon, both natives of the Walworth-Lake Geneva area. Phil holds a bachelor's degree in American studies from the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and has completed two years of graduate study at the University's Madison campus. Barb is majoring in music and education and has attended Alverno College in Milwaukee, the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and, most recently, the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Barb and Phil enjoy traveling and meeting new people. They should get plenty of both this year as they pilot the Historymobile through the southeastern portion of Wisconsin, and speak with thousands of school children and adults on the subject of Black History.

## Name Miss Nolting As Foreign Study League Counselor

Jennifer Nolting, daughter of Dr. F. E. Nolting of Kewaskum, has been appointed counselor for the Foreign Study League's 1973 Summer Program for High School Students. Miss Nolting is an elementary teacher at College Park School in Greendale. She has been in the field of education for three years. She will direct the enrollment of students from area high schools who wish to travel overseas during July and August of 1973.

## Corporation Counsel Aldwin Seefeldt Resigns

Attorney Aldwin H. Seefeldt, who has served as Washington County's first Corporation Counsel since Jan. 1, 1970, submitted his resignation to the county board at its meeting on Tuesday (March 13).

The resignation is to be effective on May 1, 1973 when Seefeldt will become a member of the West Bend law firm of Schloemer, Schlaefer and Alderson, S.C.

In his letter of resignation, Seefeldt reviewed his three years of service with the county as "a period of considerable innovation and development for the county." Among the items regarded by him as the county's "notable achievements and undertakings" were county board reapportionment, the adoption of a new civil service system for the sheriff's department, the development of a positive and professional posture toward labor relations, and the adoption of shoreland, building construction and land division regulations.

Recognized as an authority on county board reapportionment, Seefeldt made presentations on that subject to the 1971 and 1972 conventions of the Wisconsin County Boards Association. He also served on the Association's Reapportionment Committee and was actively involved in the unsuccessful Supreme Court challenge of the state legislative reapportionment plan last summer.

Seefeldt, who serves as the county's labor negotiator, is president of the Wisconsin Association of County Labor Negotiators and a director of the Wisconsin Association of County Corporation Counsels.

A native of Kewaskum and a graduate of Lakeland College and of the University of Wisconsin Law School, Seefeldt returned to Washington County in January of 1967 to serve as assistant district attorney for three years. During that time he was also engaged in the private practice of law in West Bend and Kewaskum.

Attorney Seefeldt presently serves as president of the Lakeland College Alumni Association, treasurer of the County Bar Association, as a member of the Governmental Affairs Committee of the West Bend Chamber of Commerce, and is a member of Our Savior's Lutheran Church and the West Bend Kiwanis Club.

Seefeldt lives with his wife Karen and two daughters at 306 S. 16th Ave. in West Bend.

Essays entered in the scholarship contest were reviewed by a panel of Wisconsin educators. Themes were judged for their thought content and logical development, Mason said.

The two state scholarship winners, who will be announced Mar. 30, will be selected on the basis of their essays, scholastic records and high school extra-curricular achievements.

Established by Thorp in 1957, the Thorp Finance Corporation scholarship foundation has provided \$30,000 in scholarships and more than \$15,000 in Savings Bonds to Wisconsin high school students.

He also presented cost estimates on alternate waste disposal methods such as the village operating their own land fill site, hauling the refuse to a commercial land fill site using village employees for pick-up and delivery to a commercial site or contracting with a private concern to do the pick-up and disposing of the waste.

After considerable discussion the following motion was made by Trustee Nigh and seconded by Trustee Herriges: Effective as of March 1, 1973, the Village of Kewaskum shall discontinue operation of its present incinerator as ordered by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and shall for a minimum period of 30 days haul its solid waste to the Acme landfill site located in the Town of Polk at a quoted price of \$9.60 per compacted load. Village employees and equipment shall be used for pick-up and delivery to the landfill site. A daily cost account shall be maintained during the trial period.

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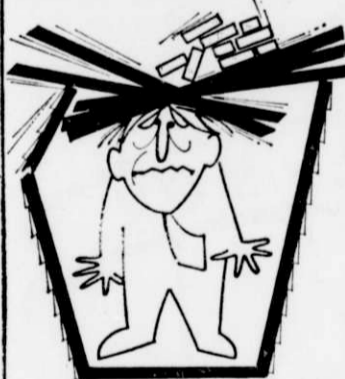
