Final Resolution for Curb and Gutter in Bel-Ric Acres Approved

The final resolution leading to installation of curb and gutter in the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision was approved by members of the Village Board Tuesday night. Property owners will be so notified. Costs of the project will be shared by them on a per-foot basis, which may be paid in cash or in four annual payments with 8 per cent interest on the unpaid balance, or 9.6 per cent if delinquent.

Project approval came during an adjourned board session which also was a reorganizational meeting for newly elected Village President, Charles Miller. Daniel Schmidt and Roger Strack took their places as new village trustees.

Miller appointed the trustees to the following committees: Administrative: Elmer Yoost, chm., Alfred Kral, Strack and Gregor Nigh. Protection and public safety: Nigh, chm., Schmidt, Yoost and Raynor Herges, Public services: Yoost, chm., Schmidt and Strack. Public works: Herges, chm., Strack, Kral and Nigh. Schmidt was appointed the village board representative on the library board.

With board approval, Miller augmented the police commission by appointing Edgar Jones and Everett J. Lieske, former members of the Milwaukee police force who now reside in Bel-Ric Acres. Re-appointed to the police commission are Roland Pledl, Donald Mlodzik and Donald Seil.

Present members of the Plan Commission were re-appointed but at the suggestion of Village Atty. Roger McKenna, their terms of office will be staggered. L. N. Peterson was appointed for one year; Vernon Butz and Charles Schultz for two.

GUST REPORTS REDUCED INSURANCE RATES FOR CAMPERS, MOTOR HOMES

Richard Gust, Kewaskum, American Family Insurance Agent, reports that insurance rates for camper units and motor homes have been reduced an average of 12% by American Family Mutual. Safe driving by policyholders which resulted in lower losses than anticipated was cited as the reason for the rate reduction.

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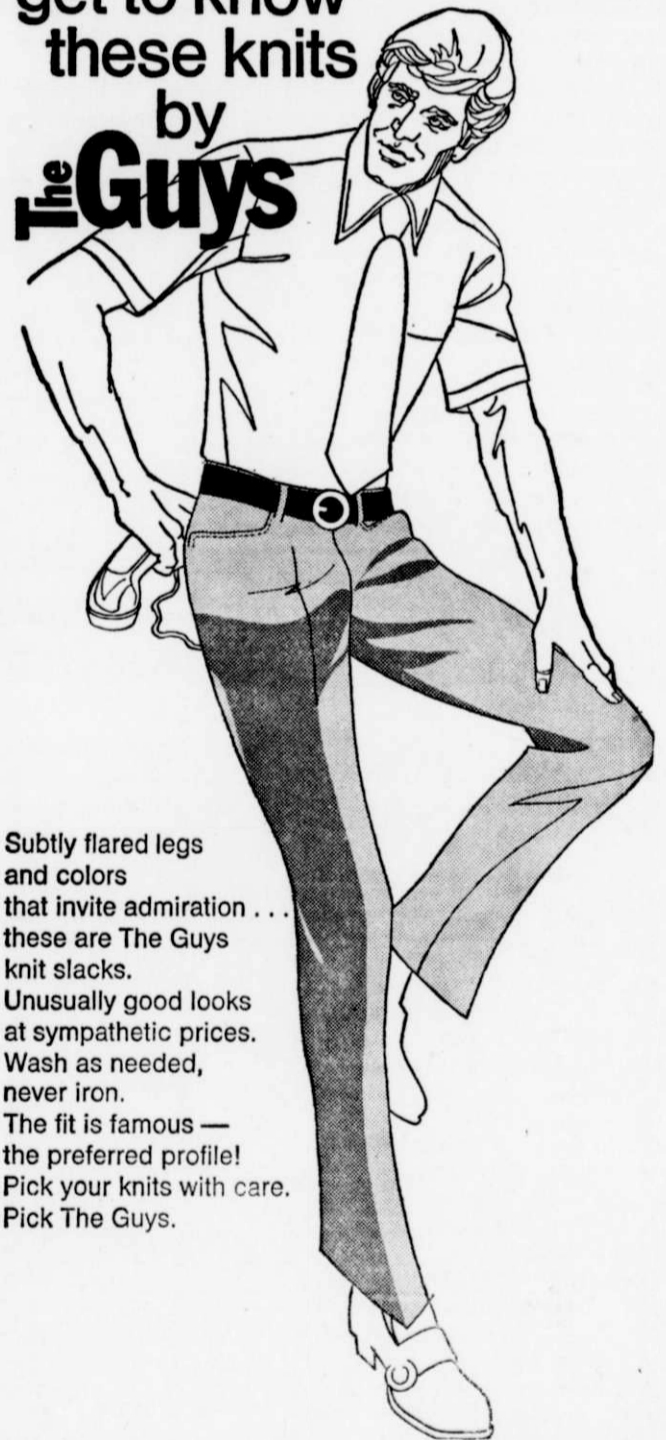
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Joins Regal '25 Year Club'

Postal Week to Be Celebrated

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced plans today for "Postal Week" to be celebrated here April 29 through May 5.

On April 30, the Kewaskum Post Office will highlight this observance with activities that dramatize the important roles performed by postal people as they move the mails. Postmaster General E. T. Klassen said the Postal Week observances are "an appropriate occasion for recognition of the vital responsibilities assigned to the mail service and a valid time to take stock of the challenges which must be jointly met by postal people and by the millions of citizens throughout America who depend upon the mail as an essential part of their personal and business lives."

As part of the observance, the Kewaskum Post Office will join with the nation's 31,000 other post offices in issuing 10 special stamps honoring postal employees. The Kewaskum Post Office will mark the occasion with special First-Day-of-Issue observances, simultaneous with similar ceremonies to be held in

Washington by Postmaster General E. T. Klassen. The new postal people stamps will be placed on sale here in conjunction with the local observance.

The attractive new stamps—the first such comprehensive set specifically honoring postal people—will be on sale at the post office. Postmaster Koch disclosed today that customers attending the Kewaskum "Postal People Day" observance at the local post office April 30 will be given attractive free souvenir envelopes.

Ceremonies will be held April 30 for issuance of a unique new set of ten 8c postage stamps honoring two-thirds of a million postal people across the nation, including the Kewaskum Post Office employees.

These souvenir envelopes, to be available in a limited quantity on a "first come" basis at the local post office April 30, will be imprinted or "cached," in addition, the postmaster said a quantity of cached envelopes will be prepared bearing all 10 postal people stamps. These "first day" covers as they are known to collectors, will be postmarked by hand with the local post office postmark and will be sold for only the actual charge for the ten stamps, or 80c, as long as they last.

In designating Postal Week, Postmaster General Klassen said, in part: "Every community in the United States is linked to the nation and the world by our national mail service. The welfare of every citizen, every business, on every street and across the countryside, is dependent

upon this vast communication network, available to all our people the year round, at a cost everyone can afford."

As the postmaster general said in his message, we need the "informed understanding, cooperation and support" of every citizen. "I think that we have this to an exceptional degree in the Kewaskum postal area, and part of the purpose of Postal Week will be to show our appreciation," Postmaster Koch said. "The Kewaskum Post Office employees wish to express our appreciation to our customers, for the continued cooperation and support throughout the years," Postmaster Koch also stated.

- B. All property fronting on both sides of Lin De Lane from Bel Ric Drive to the West edge of the Village limits approximately 340 ft. on each side.
- C. All property fronting on both sides of Lazy Lane from Bel Ric Drive to the East edge of Memorial Drive approximately 850 ft. on each side.
- D. All property fronting on both sides of Pleasant Wood Drive from highway "H" to the South line of Block 7 approximately 1,280 ft. on each side.
- E. All property fronting on both sides of Memorial Drive from highway "H" to the South line of Blocks 7 & 8, approximately 1,280 ft. on each side.

and has heard all persons desiring audience at such hearing; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum as follows:

- 1. That the report of the Village Engineer pertaining to the construction of the above-described public improvements, including plans and specifications therefore, is hereby adopted and approved.
- 2. That the action relative to and the advertisement for bids and to carry out the work of such improvement in accordance with the report of the Village Engineer is approved.
- 3. That payment for said improvements be made by assessing the cost to the property benefited as indicated in said report.
- 4. That benefits shown on the report are true and correct, have been determined on a reasonable basis and are hereby confirmed.
- 5. That the assessments for all projects included in said report are hereby combined as a single assessment.
- 6. That the assessments against any parcel may be paid in cash or in four (4) annual installments to the Village Commissioner, deferred payments to bear interest at the rate of 8% per annum on the unpaid balance. Installments or assessments not paid when due shall bear additional interest on the amount due at the rate of 1.6% per annum.

The 3rd Kewaskum Indian Golf Invitational, which was postponed because of snow on April 13, and was re-scheduled for Easter Monday, April 23, was almost called off again due to the heavy rains over the weekend. The meet was played, however, but because of puddles and wet spots on some holes, the meet was confined to driest holes, which the golfers played twice in a unique 12-hole tournament.

Plymouth took first place in the abbreviated meet at Hon-E-Kor, the course being opened just for this tournament. The Panthers, with a 221 total, beat 2nd place Kewaskum by just two strokes. The Indians, runner-up for the 2nd year, had 223, followed by Horicon and Campbellsport. Scores were above average because of the wet conditions.

Jeff Pelischek of Campbellsport and Steve Kaiser of Horicon tied with 51's, 7 over par. Pelischek won the playoff for the first place individual trophy on the 2nd sudden death hole.

A few bad holes lost the meet for the Indians. Jeff Koth was top man with a 55. Tom Hensler had problems on the last 4 holes and his score was not counted. Soph Scott Koth surprised in his first varsity start with rounds of 29 and 24 for a 53. Other Indian counters were Chuck McClain 57 and Jim Gaffke (who just returned from Germany Sunday night with 40 other KHS students) 58.

Included in the group of just over 20 who reported for golf are 3 varsity regulars from last year, Gaffke, Hensler and Jeff Koth. Spots left by graduated Jay Tessar and Glen Eichstedt probably will be filled by front runners Scott Koth, McClain and Steve Spoerl.
