Board Accepts Ambulance, Mower Bids, Tables Action on Waste Disposal Bids

Members of the Village Board took action on bids for an ambulance and a power mower but tabled action on bids for solid waste collection and disposal during an adjourned board session Monday night. All bids were opened June 4.

Pierce Mfg. Inc., of Appleton was awarded the contract for a Horton ambulance mounted on a Dodge chassis on its bid of \$13,653, on recommendation of the fire department which maintains the ambulance service. The bid was not low among four submitted but Chief Armin Oppermann said it was selected because the Pierce firm specified a 45 day delivery. The other bidders could not guarantee delivery until 120 days after they received the chassis.

Inasmuch as the fire department is scheduled to receive a \$6,200 federal grant and the grant expires in February, 1974, Oppermann said he and his committee felt they should choose the Pierce bid to insure delivery before the grant expires. He also said the Pierce bid specified 10 ply tires compared with 8 ply from the other bidders.

The board accepted the bid of Laubenstein Garden Mart, Kewaskum, to furnish a John Deere riding mower for \$1,318.38 cash, the low net bid among four. The village will retain its present mower for auxiliary use.

Since the closing down of the village incinerator Feb. 28 on orders of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), board members have been seeking the most economical way to dispose of refuse.

Forrest Robinson of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers, reported that the low bid, among three, of \$1,090 per month submitted by A-1 Disposal Service, Inc. of Germantown provides the village with the information it needs to make a cost comparison. The bid excludes industrial establishments.

The cost of operation during the month of March when village workers collected solid waste and hauled it in village-owned equipment to a private landfill site near Slinger was \$890.32, according to records kept. This figure does not include employe overhead costs such as vacations, sick leave and insurance. So in effect Robinson observed, the two costs are approximate.

The bids from commercial firms were based on collections from 635 residential units, 68 commercial and six schools and churches. The lump sum bid of \$1,090 figures out to \$1.54 per unit per month.

Robinson's report indicated that "if the village decided to collect and dispose of industrial accounts on a per cubic yard charge basis, then a source of revenue would be generated that would bring the village ownership down and a fair savings would result." If the vil-

Woman Killed, Five Hurt When Car Hits Trees

One person was killed and five were injured Sunday afternoon in a one-car accident on Forest View Road two miles southwest of Beechwood on the Sheboygan-Fond du Lac county line.

The Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department investigated the accident and according to police, Susan M. Radish, 20, R. 1, Big Bend, was killed in the mishap. She was pronounced dead Sunday afternoon after being transferred from St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, to Columbia Hospital, Milwaukee.

Police said that the car was traveling north on Forest View Road when the accident occurred. The car went off the road and into a cluster of trees. The accident was discovered by a passing motorist at 1:15 p. m. The driver of the car was not immediately determined.

Three of the injured were taken to St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, while the other two passengers were taken to St. Joseph's, West Bend. Peter and Michael Kossow, ages 19 and 16 respectively, were listed in satisfactory condition at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Patricia Kossow, 19, wife of Peter, Lorrie List, 15, and Kenneth Lang, 19, were taken to St. Agnes Hospital. Mrs. Kossow was listed in stable condition; Miss List, excellent condition, and Lang, satisfactory condition. Those injured have Milwaukee addresses except for Lang, who is from Lake Villa, Ill.

Injured persons were taken to the hospitals by two private ambulance firms and a forestry service station wagon. Sheboygan County police had not determined the cause of the accident Monday but were planning to meet with those injured to complete details.

lage were to contract with a commercial firm, it should expect the contract will increase about five per cent per year, Robinson said.

Turning over refuse pick-up and disposal to a commercial firm would free two village employes for other work and replacement of an expensive vehicle with only one use would be eliminated, Robinson pointed out.

A-1 Disposal also had submitted an alternate bid for furnishing a compactor to be located at the present incinerator site and hauling from it one time per week at a monthly cost of \$860. Village workers would collect and haul to the compactor. A-1 would remove the compactor unit when filled and replace it with an empty.

No action will be taken until board members can discuss A-1's proposals with a representative and also determine for what length of time the bid is firm.

The village is under orders of the DNR to remove phosphate from its sewage effluent and voted June 4 to reject all bids for equipment and an enclosure to house it because of the limited number of bids and the cost spread between them.

William Winkler of Stone and Robinson suggested Monday night that the present incinerator be removed and that the phosphate removal storage tanks be installed in that space. He

said he believes the DNR and Environmental Pollution Abatement agency would look favorably on the idea. The project is one subsidized by a federal grant.

Building permits were approved for two homes to be built by Jos. Schneider; a private garage for Donald Mlodzik; an addition to a private garage for Edward E. Miller; and a storage shed for K & R Carpets.

1973-74 School Year Budget Is Near Completion

INTERVIEW DATES SET FOR FIRMS SUBMITTING BUILDING PROPOSALS

The 1973-74 school year budget neared completion Monday evening at the Board of Education meeting. Discussion was held concerning capital outlay items as well as one or two categories.

This was the third meeting of budget discussion. The budget will be adjusted with final changes prior to the meeting of June 25. It is expected the budget will be adopted at that meeting for presentation to the Annual Meeting in July.

Approval was given for Paul Redig to spend up to 30 days on summer work in the Agriculture Department.

A contract was approved for Joseph Kolodzinski as an additional fourth grade teacher for next year.

The board voted to cancel the meeting normally set for the last Monday in July since there will be two July meetings without that.

Tentative open dates were set for interviews of firms which have submitted building proposals. The two committees are reviewing the proposals. It is hoped that a decision can be

reached by the end of July. Nine complete or partial proposals were submitted. They came from Marshall-Erdman and Associates of Madison, Thern Associates of Oshkosh, R. J. Prosen, Inc. of Waukesha, Schutte-Mochon, Inc. of Milwaukee, Quasius Bros., Inc. of Sheboygan, Metal Structures, Inc. of Oconomowoc, Bray-Cravillion-Zeiner and Associates of Sheboygan, Mark F. Pfaller Associates, Inc. of Milwaukee and PKR of Milwaukee.

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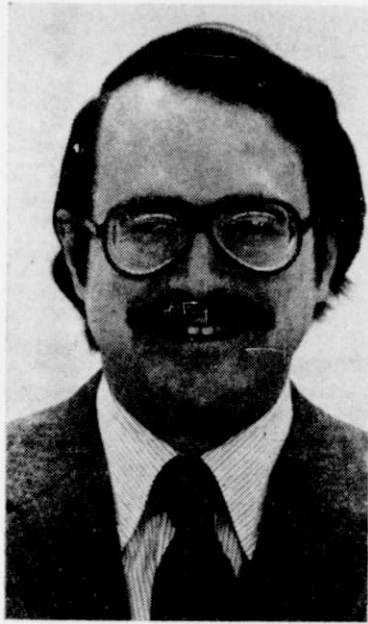
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Candee Named Gehl Assistant Export Manager

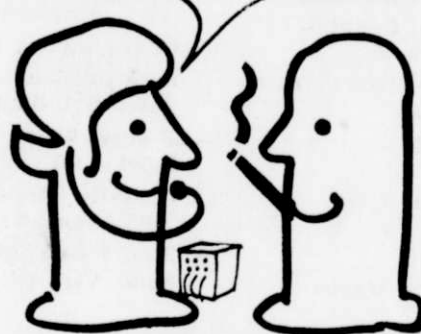

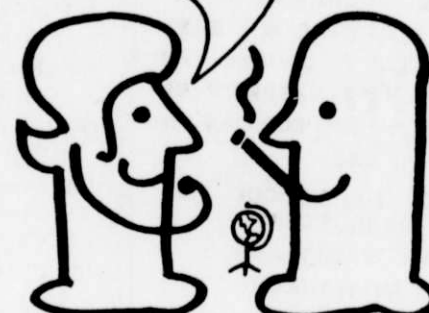
