## New Valley Bank of Kewaskum To Hold Open House Saturday

The new Valley Bank of Kewaskum is holding its formal open house from 1 to 5 p. m. Saturday, July 28, with the public invited to look over their beautiful new facility.

Construction is of brick and pre-cast concrete with large window areas providing a total of 6,200 square feet of banking space on the main floor. The pre-cast beams allow a spacious teller-lobby-open office area completely free of any supporting posts. The lobby is tiled with adjacent areas and offices all being carpeted.

There are eight teller windows in the lengthy paneled counter, plus two drive-in banking units, with provisions for a third unit. The large vault is in two parts, a file vault and the

cash and safety deposit box section. The capacity for boxes is about double that of the old bank. There are spacious safety deposit box booths adjacent to the vault.

All offices have a draped glass wall to the lobby side of the room. The open office area has space for eight desks plus a spacious waiting area. There are three private offices, a directors' room and three conference rooms directly off the lobby area.

There is a bookkeeping area and private office at the south end of the building conveniently located next to the teller area. There is a full basement with large storage areas, kitchen and lounge facilities plus a spacious community room that will be ready for use shortly. A large parking area will handle 42 cars, while the side street entrance and exit allows for traffic safety and considerable street parking. The lot is completely landscaped and a new time-temperature sign will be erected in a few weeks.

### Kettle Moraine Youth Camp Near Here Dedicated

Dedication ceremonies and an open house for the public were held at the recently completed Kettle Moraine Youth Camp on Tuesday, July 24.

The camp, operated by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), is located in the northern unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest on Fond du Lac County Highway "DD" about 5 miles northeast of Kewaskum.

DNR Secretary L. P. Voigt delivered the dedication address at 3 p. m. The Kiel High School band also participated in the ceremonies. An open house at the camp was conducted between the hours of 2 and 8 p. m.

Located within an hour's drive of 39 percent of the state's population, the camp will be operated on a year-around basis providing elementary and junior high school youth with educational, vocational and recreational opportunities. Dining and dormitory facilities to accommodate 110 overnight campers at one time are now in operation at the camp.

Offering an "outdoor classroom" experience, the camp program will be coordinated with area school outdoor programs and with Scout, 4-H and other youth group organizations.

The second of two six-week conservation work sessions for boys is now in progress at the camp.

A tax levy of \$1,717,112.60 was approved at the annual meeting of the Kewaskum Community Schools held Monday evening. The figure included \$1,361,021.93 for operation and capital outlay and \$356,090.67 for debt retirement. Total proposed expenditures were \$2,360,544.80. Because the state budget has not yet passed, no tax rate is available. Based on the figures passed at the annual meeting, the rate would be approximately 20.34 mills. This rate could drop to approximately 16.04 mills, or could be somewhere between, depending on final state legislative action.

Other agenda items were routinely approved, being resolutions which are acted on each year at the annual meeting. A long discussion was held on a resolution presented by Gene Akin, which would have directed the board to bid the new buildings and to accept the lowest qualified bidder. The reason given for the motion was that this would insure quality construction at the lowest cost. It was pointed out, however, that the board's responsibility is to get the most building for the money, and that if bids are taken by law, pay prevailing wage rates. On a turnkey approach, which the board has indicated it would probably use, the board would not be legally bound to pay these rates. The motion was defeated 65 to 9.

A round of applause was given Gerald Zimmei and Richard Theusch, outgoing members and Gerald Secor and Byron Gessner, new members of the board.

Following the annual meeting, a board meeting was held, primarily to elect officers. Tom Gundrum was re-elected President and Jim Oelhafen, Clerk. Byron Gessner was elected Treasurer to replace Gerald Zimmei, who did not run for re-election to the board.

The milk bid was awarded to John Engelhardt & Sons, Inc. No fuel oil bids have been received so there was no action taken. Steps are being taken to assure a supply of fuel oil for this school term.

A first reading was held on board policy on school lunch prices. For next year, these rates would be 60c for daily tickets, \$2.15 for a weekly student ticket, \$3.00 for a weekly adult ticket, 5c for extra milk for students and 7c for extra milk for adults.

The next regularly scheduled meeting will be Monday, August 13, 1973.

**Gaffke, Marx Make Scenic All-Conference**

Champion Hartland Arrowhead placed 3 players and Kewaskum had 2 repeaters on the Scenic Moraine all-conference baseball team selected last week. Slinger, Kettle Moraine, Germantown, Pewaukee and Grafton each had 1 player named among the 10 picks. Mayville had none.

Kewaskum players selected were Jim Gaffke as a catcher and Gary Marx, outfield.

Hartland had 2 picks in the infield, Pete Gutchenritter at 2nd and Rich Landwehr at short, and also pitcher John Daley with a 6-2 record. Highlight of the picking was the out-

field polling featuring the 4 top batters in the conference. Finis Bass (.429), Germantown, Jim Hansen (.417), Pewaukee, and Marx (.395), Kewaskum, emerged as the top picks from the talented group. John Bartlotta of Kettle Moraine, who batted .450, failed to make the top 3 in the tough balloting.

Marx, an all-conference short-stop last year, played a variety of positions. He pitched, caught, played short and outfield. Marx scored 15 runs, top in the conference, got 12 walks and 15 hits in 38 times at bat for his .395 mark. (Kewaskum statistics had Gary for 1 more hit, which would have given him a .416 average).

Kewaskum's other repeater, catcher Gaffke, batted .326, pitched 4 games and won all of them with an ERA of just over 1.25. But his main forte was his defensive work behind the plate. Jim cut down 4 players trying to steal and picked off 2 others.

Other players named all-conference besides those already mentioned above were Slinger's Charles Held, 1st base; Kettle's John Smart, 3rd, and Grafton's Don Haupt, pitcher. All were seniors except Smart and Haupt.

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### Kewaskum Beats West Bend and Cedarburg, 3 in Row

The revamped Kewaskum village team won 2 more games the past week to run their streak to 3 wins in succession and 4 out of the last 6. The victories were over West Bend and Cedarburg.

Kewaskum has been knocking the cover off the ball in their last 6 games, pounding out 75 hits and scoring 42 runs, for an amazing .332 team average. They are now 4-5 in the Tri-County Nite League, good for a 4th place tie, and 2-5 in the Northern Lakes circuit.

Kewaskum hosted West Bend in a Nite League game Thursday and changed the trend by knocking off the Lithias, 6-3. Paced by Merle Borkenhagen and Clem Jacak, each with 2 doubles, and Tom Theusch, also with 2 hits, including one double, Kewaskum outslugged West Bend, 11-7. Dick Burekhardt's triple and single led the Lithias. Winner Tom Theusch went the route on the mound, striking out 3 and walking 1. President Miller presided and all Board Members responded to roll call.

The minutes of the meetings of April 2, April 16 and April 24 were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Schmidt and duly carried.

The sealed proposals for a building addition and phosphate removal equipment at the waste water treatment plant were opened, publicly read and tabulated as follows:

**RESOLUTION NO. 73-4**

WHEREAS, certain areas of the Village of Kewaskum are subject to periodic flooding from the Milwaukee River causing serious damages to residential properties with these areas, and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 as amended, and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Village Board to comply with land use and management criteria regulations as required in said Act, and

WHEREAS, it is also the intent of this Village Board to recognize and duly evaluate flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood hazards, and

WHEREAS, the Village has authority in the accordance with 87.30 Wisconsin Statutes to adopt land use and control measures, for flood hazard areas.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Village Board assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it will take legislative action as follows:

(1) Enact a Flood Plain Zoning Ordinance, and maintain in force for these areas, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the criteria set forth in Subpart A of Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Regulations and Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 116.

(2) Take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program. Such actions will include but not limit-

ed to:

(a) Assisting the Federal Insurance Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the flood plain having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) After flood insurance is made available, furnishing representatives of appropriate Federal or State agencies or of the National Flood Insurance Association information, as requested, concerning new or substantially improved structures within the area of special flood hazard. This information will include floor elevations and, if there is a basement, the distance between the first floor and the bottom of the lowest opening where water flowing on the ground will enter.

(c) Cooperating with Federal, State and local agencies which undertake to study, survey, map and identify flood-prone areas as well as cooperation with neighboring jurisdictions with respect to adjoining flood plains in order to prevent aggravation of the flooding problem.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Board hereby appoints the Village Zoning Administrator, and Village Engineer with the responsibility, authority and means to implement the commitment made herein.

**RESOLUTION NO. 73-5**

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum has adopted and is enforcing a Zoning Ordinance, and

WHEREAS, Section 2.2 of the said Zoning Ordinance as adopted by Kewaskum prohibits any person, firm or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure without first obtaining a separate building permit from the Zoning Administrator, and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Administrator must examine all plans and specifications for the propose construction when application is made to him for a building permit, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Village Board, Village of Kewaskum, as follows:

(1) That the Zoning Administrator for the Village of Kewaskum when reviewing applications for building permits, including the plans and specifications for the proposed construction, will review all building permit applications to determine if the proposed construction is consistent with the need to minimize flood damage.

(2) That the Zoning Administrator shall review all building permit applications to determine if the site of the proposed construction is reasonably safe from flooding and to make recommendations for construction in all locations which have flood hazards.

(3) That the Zoning Administrator in reviewing all applications for construction in flood hazard locations within the Village shall require that any such proposed construction must:

(a) Be designed and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement of the

structure or portions of the structure due to flooding.

(b) Use of construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage.

(c) Use of construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

(d) Provide adequate drainage in order to reduce exposure to flood hazards.

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


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### Adelman Speaks To Kiwanis On Role of Congress

Milwaukee attorney, Lynn S. Adelman, spoke to the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum Monday night, July 23, at the Hon-E-Kor Country Club. Adelman spoke on the present state of relations between the executive and legislative branches of government. He states that in recent years the constitutional doctrine of separation of powers had been strained because Congress had not played a strong enough role in the decision-making process.

Adelman said that although Watergate had made the execu-

tive more vulnerable and had made Congress more assertive the problem remained a serious one. "Part of the reason for the unhappy situation today," he said, "was the sense in Washington that there were no meaningful checks or counterweights to executive power." "American government," he went on, "functions best when both the executive and legislative branches are strong and when there is a healthy adversarial relationship between them, a relationship based upon mutual respect."

Adelman singled out several particular areas in which it was important for Congress to be more effective. These included budget control and the area of foreign affairs. He said "it is

extremely important for the Congress to develop better mechanisms for controlling its own budget and to exert greater watchfulness in foreign affairs."

Adelman is a graduate of Princeton University and Columbia University Law School and lives in Shorewood.
