Lawrence E. Wallenfelsz, 67, of R. 1, 35 Garden Terrace, Port Richey, Fla. died Tuesday, Aug. 7, at the home of his son-in-law and daughter at Auburn Lake.

He was an electrical contractor and was in business in Kewaskum until 1954 when he and his wife moved to Port Richey, Fla.

He was born in Marieta, Ohio, Feb. 4, 1906, the son of Lewis and Anna Wallenfelsz, and married Anna Metz of Kewaskum Aug. 28, 1928. He was a member of the Loyal Order of Moose, Lodge 1398, Port Richey, and a life member of the Moose Lodge of West Bend. He was also a member of the Knights of Columbus, Council 5869 of Port Richey.

Surviving are his wife, two daughters, Mrs. John Odekirk of Auburn Lake and Mrs. George Wallner of Milwaukee; nine grandchildren; two brothers, Harold of West Bend and Edwin of Manitowoc, and one sister, Mrs. Lloyd Hendershot of Marieta, Ohio.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 10:30 a. m. at the funeral home and at 11 a. m. at St. Matthew's Church, Campbellsport. Rev. William Lawrence Coulter, 56, of Holiday, Fla., formerly of the Town of Wayne and Milwaukee area, died suddenly Monday, Aug. 6, at his home. He had heart disease for several years.

Boy Killed When Mini-Bike Is Struck by Car

Dennis Hoerig, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Hoerig, R. 6, West Bend, died instantly of multiple injuries when he was struck by a car while riding his mini-bike Saturday. The car was driven by Allen Kreif, 18, R. 1, Kewaskum, and the accident occurred at 9:50 a. m. on County Trunk A in the Town of Farmington, one and one-tenth miles east of State Hwy. 144.

According to the sheriff's department, Kreif was headed west on County A when Hoerig rode his mini-bike out from the driveway without stopping and made a U-turn in the road. County Coroner Bob Boltz said the youth suffered a broken neck among other injuries. He was not taken to the hospital but rather directly to the Schmidt Funeral Home in West Bend.

The fatality was the 13th in the county for this year. There were no charges brought against the driver of the car.

Village Beach Report

The 1973 swimming season at the Kewaskum Village Beach was supervised by Debbie Behnke, Doreen Rumsey and Nancy Backhaus (instructors) and Kathy Ahl and Dick Butz (lifeguards).

Red Cross swimming lessons were conducted during the mornings and afternoons in two sessions. Kewaskum is part of the West Bend chapter, headquarters at Main St., West Bend. To encourage attendance, a registration fee was charged—\$1.50 for village residents and \$2.50 for those out of the village. Despite cool weather and water conditions earlier in the summer, attendance throughout both sessions was fairly regular.

The beginner classes had a total enrollment of 59 (three afternoon classes in both sessions), with 14 youngsters successfully completing the class. Many of the beginners were between the ages of five and seven. The games and simple beginning stunts helped to expose the children to the water and teach them to enjoy the experience of swimming.

Sixteen out of 30 advanced beginner students from both sessions passed this phase, and four out of five intermediates passed in the second session. One swimmer also enrolled and passed during the second session. Three junior lifesavers and one senior lifesaver completed the three week course.

Parental cooperation and consideration was lacking at times when the lifeguards were forced to discipline trouble-makers thereby making the lifeguarding job very difficult.

The beach was usually open from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily, except Sundays (1 p. m. to 5 p. m.). The beach will remain open until the end of this week or early next week, depending

Fire Destroys Rudzitis Barn; Several Overcome

Fire which broke out shortly after noon Wednesday destroyed the entire upper portion of the barn on the Rudy Rudzitis farm located at 3907 Highmount Rd., 2½ miles southwest of Kewaskum.

The blaze was discovered by Peter Ayer, instructor of music at the University campus in West Bend, who was taking instrument flying lessons. The airport radio tower was notified and the Station No. 2 West Bend fire department was dispatched to the scene. Kewaskum and Kohlsville firemen were also called and sent their tankers and several firemen to assist.

The alarm was turned in at 12:16 p. m. and the West Bend fire department was in service about eight and a quarter hours. Kewaskum and Kohlsville departments continued hauling water to the scene well into the afternoon from Kewaskum.

Several firemen had to be given oxygen by the rescue squad while fighting the fire and one, John Petite, was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by ambulance for treatment of smoke inhalation. Gishla Rudzitis was also taken to the hospital in the ambulance when she collapsed from overexertion. Petite was released shortly afterwards.

The firemen were able to confine the blaze to the upper portion of the barn by removing what hay was left. The fire is of undetermined origin and no estimate of damage was available.

GRASS FIRE CALL

Kewaskum firemen answered a grass fire call at 4:25 p. m. Saturday on property owned by Henry Timblin of Kewaskum just southwest of the village limits, west of the Bonne Belle Motel and east of Bel-Ric Acres. It is believed that the fire was caused by neighborhood children playing with matches. A small area of grass burned over before firemen put out the blaze with water and brooms. Police were called immediately and they questioned several children on the scene. This was the Kewaskum fire department's first call in months.

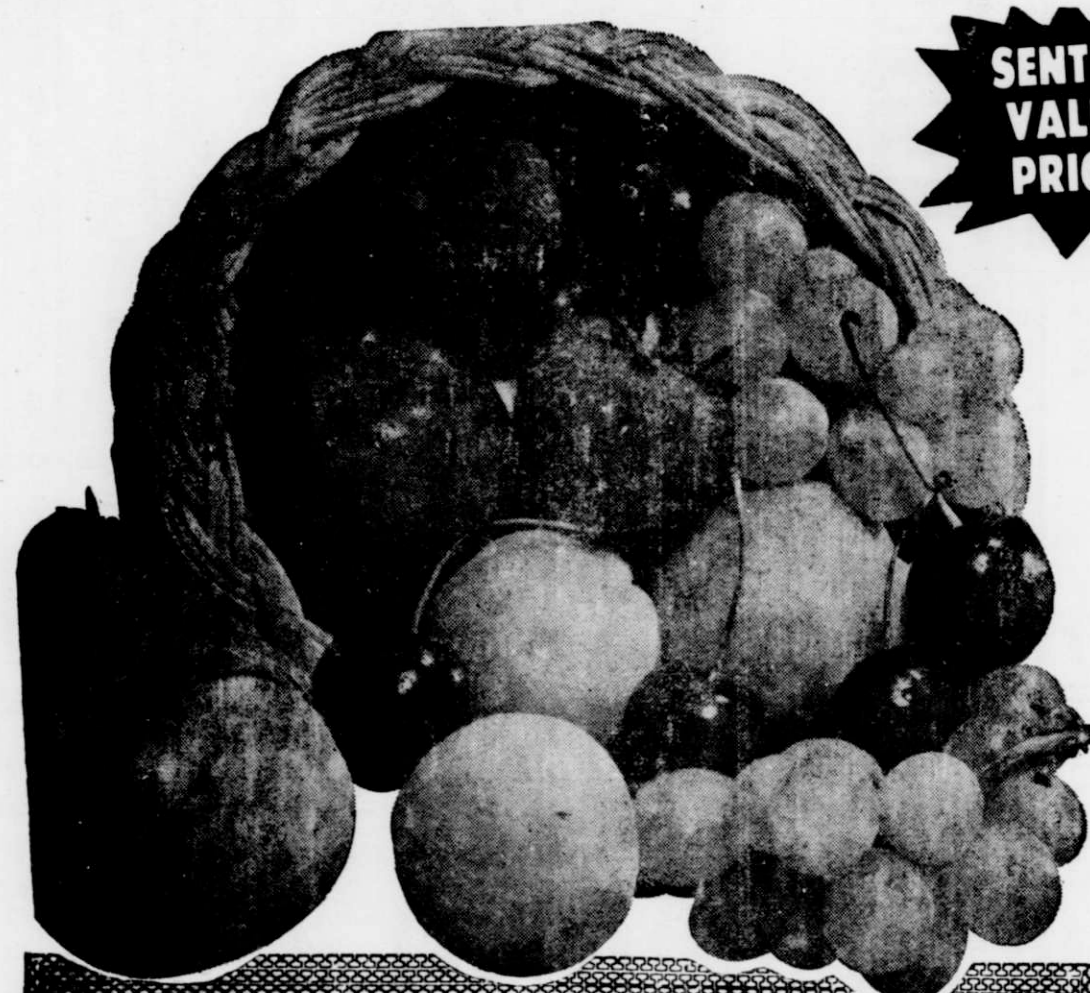
