Village Tax Rate of \$31.34 Per Thousand Adopted; Down \$4.58

A 1974 budget calling for a tax rate of \$31.34 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, which is \$4.58 lower than the 1973 rate, was adopted by the village board Monday night.

Contributing factors to the lower rate are an increase of \$1.9 million in the assessed valuation; a drop of \$15,201 in the levy for school district taxes; and a higher state tax credit. The tax credit amounts to \$6.19 compared with \$4.41 in 1973.

The budget totals \$1,044,984.20, just \$10,494 over last year, and calls for a tax levy of \$737,772. Broken down, state taxes amount to \$5,874 (up \$458); county taxes \$102,618 (down \$1,418); school district \$416,405 (down \$15,201); vocational school \$32,428 (up \$5,408); and local taxes \$180,646 (up \$31,875).

The budget was adopted at a regular board session which followed a public hearing. There were no comments of any kind from the dozen or so village residents who attended.

Village taxpayers must pay their taxes in full or if they choose may make the first payment of a split payment plan, on or before Feb. 28, 1974.

In other action, the board authorized purchase of a new truck chassis, dump box and hoist from Honeck Chevrolet, Kewaskum, at a cost of \$8,349.20, on recommendation of Raynor Herriges, chair-

Melzer, Panzer Presented Kiwanis Conservation, Dairy Farmer Awards

Robert Melzer, R. 1, Alenton, and Alvin Panzer, R. 2, Kewaskum, were presented the 1973 Conservation Farmer and Dairy Farmer Awards, respectively, by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club, at the Hon-E-Kor Monday night, Nov. 26.

Jim Hanson, president of the Kiwanis, asked that Mrs. Panzer and Mrs. Melzer accept the awards for their husbands, because he knows how influential the wife must be in the over-all farming operation.

Roy Esser, chairman of Kiwanis Farm-City Week and in charge of the program, pointed out that the farmer and the city person are dependent on one another and that no one is self-sufficient any more. He said that the farmer is a true environmentalist by conserving soil and water and being efficient in the production of crop and dairy products.

Board Approves Materials for Wayne Addition

At the school board meeting held Monday, Nov. 26, the board approved the use of vinyl asbestos tiling and block wall materials at the Wayne addition. They also approved payment of building fund invoices amounting to \$43,393.24.

Regular session actions included approval of minutes of the previous meeting and payment of general fund invoices and payroll in the amount of \$63,106.35, as well as holding the first reading of Policy No. 3542.42 to include the price of student extra milk at 2c, rather than 5c as the policy presently reads.

Board Options 34 Acres Of Land for Village Park

Members of the Village Board voted Monday night to take a 12-month option on approximately 34 acres of land for park purposes at \$2,200 per acre.

The parcel of land at the southwest village limits is owned by Mrs. Viola Spoerl of 1136 Fond du Lac Ave. The option was signed by her and village officials during the meeting. Mrs. Spoerl was given a check for \$3,000 for the option which will apply toward the purchase price if the option is exercised.

The gross purchase price is to be determined from a land survey which would be made after the option is exercised. If the parcel is exactly 34 acres, the purchase price would be \$74,800. The parcel of land was annexed to the village in August.

During the option period, Mr. and Mrs. Spoerl will have the right to continue to use the land for agricultural purposes.

Board members have been considering purchase of land for park purposes for several years and three sites were considered. The Spoerl land was one of them. The village is seeking funds through the state Outdoor Recreation Act Program (ORAP-200) toward purchase of land for a park which would be suitable for an outdoor swimming pool and other recreational facilities.

The first requirement by the state was that the village have a comprehensive park plan and it called upon the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to develop one. Village officials formally adopted such a park plan in September.

Adoption of the plan paved the way for the village to become eligible to participate in the federally sponsored Land and Water (LAWCON) program and the state-sponsored ORAP-200. Both of these are administered by the DNR.

The DNR has made a visual survey of the Spoerl property and has indicated that, by its standards, a tract of this type would be acceptable. However, the village must now get final approval of the DNR. Therefore, it was necessary to take a 12-month option.

Since most of Kewaskum's recent home development has been in the southwest sector, the DNR recreation plan recommends that a community park be developed there; that a minimum of 15 acres be devoted to the purpose and that the site be capable of offering a wide variety of recreational opportunities.

Will Not Light Decorations Until Dec. 20

Kewaskum will have lighted Christmas decorations on its business streets this year but for a shorter period than in other years, in keeping with President Nixon's request to conserve energies.

Following a discussion by village trustees Monday night, it was agreed to have them lighted from Dec. 20 through Jan. 2. In previous years, decorations were lighted in the first week of December.

In connection with the crisis, Trustee Dan Schmidt urged the department heads to ask the cooperation of all municipal workers in cutting down on gas and fuel oil usage as much as possible. He urged "more walking and less idling of motors."

The village board learned Monday night that Campbellsport will soon be without the service of its only two doctors, Cesar and Aurora Sison. The doctors have decided to discontinue services to that village and concentrate their efforts in Kewaskum only. The Sisons reside in Kewaskum also.

The Sisons recently had cut their service to the Village of Campbellsport to one day a week. The exact date that doctors services will end in the village was not released.

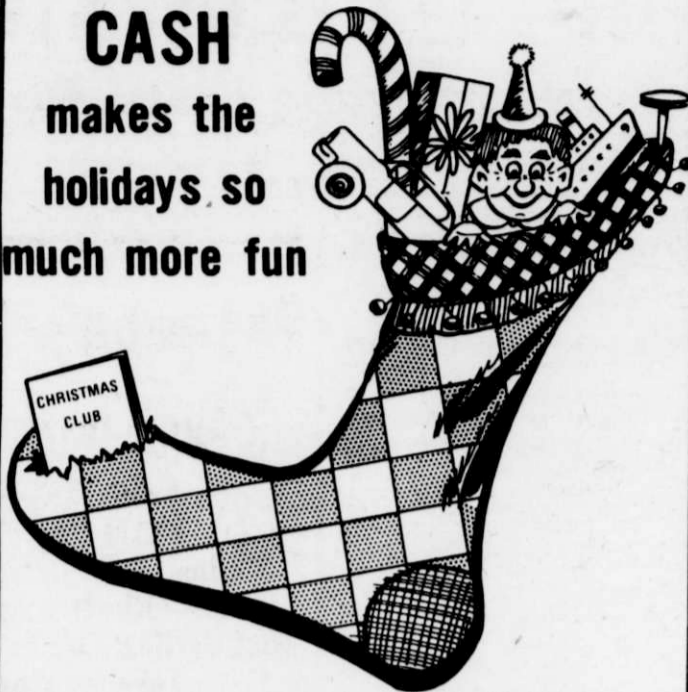

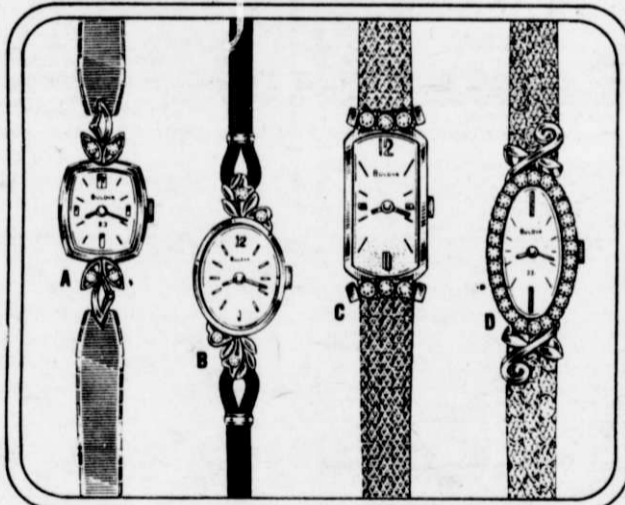

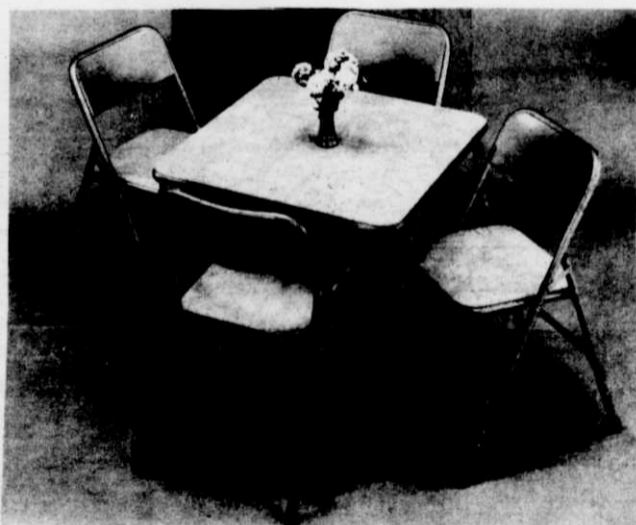

Will there be enough electricity this winter in southeastern Wisconsin?

You should understand the difference in the electric supply situation between southeastern Wisconsin and some other parts of the nation. On the East Coast, for example, electricity is made mostly from oil, which is in short supply. On the Gulf Coast, electricity is made mostly from natural gas or with oil when gas is not available. Both of these are in short supply. In the Pacific Northwest electricity is made by hydro-electric plants and that area has suffered an unusual shortage of rainfall.

About fifty-eight percent of the electricity Wisconsin Electric will make this winter will come from coal. Although coal is not in critical supply at this time, its availability may become limited in the future because of unduly restrictive mining legislation, unrealistic air quality criteria, and increased requirements as industries and other utilities convert from oil and gas to coal. Most of the coal we will need this winter is already on our docks.

More than thirty-five percent of the electricity for this winter will come from our Point Beach Nuclear Plant. More than a winter's supply of nuclear fuel is already in the reactors. Wisconsin Electric's thirty-five percent nuclear generation is well ahead of the national average... only four percent of the electricity made nationally is from nuclear energy.

Less than two percent of the electricity we will make this winter will come from oil. Much of this small percentage of oil we do use is to assure safe burning of coal in our boilers. Our boilers must be kept hot at night to pick up the morning electrical load. At night, we reduce the flow of powdered coal into our boilers. Burning could become erratic and delayed firing could result in an explosion. So we inject oil to keep the coal burning uniformly at the reduced flow. If necessary uses of electricity could be transferred from day time to late at night, we could keep the fires going with coal and further reduce our oil burn. We will also use oil this winter in emergency turbines, if necessary.

A small percentage of natural gas is also used in

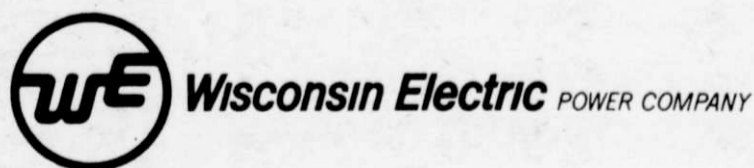
peaking plants and for the downtown Milwaukee steam heating system. About three percent of the electricity we will supply this winter will come from hydro-electric plants in northern Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Ground water levels in these watersheds are normal.

The purpose of this message is to provide you with facts concerning our present situation. Many very sincere people have expressed their worry to us. Many people are confused. Wisconsin Electric anticipates no blackouts or brownouts this winter. We do not expect that workers will be sent home from their jobs because of a shortage of electricity to run machines in their plants.

It is not our purpose, however, to detract from the energy conservation program. We believe that it is wrong to waste energy. And, we intend to assist other utilities whose fuels are in poorer supply to the best of our ability. Every kilowatt-hour of energy that our customers save this winter will save some basic fuel which will increase our ability to assist our neighboring utilities who are in a more unfortunate position and to increase the availability of these fuels for our system in the months to come.

Of course, ice storms this winter, or automobiles crashing into poles, and even a breakdown of one of our generators is possible. But other than for unforeseeable accidents such as these, or governmental action such as national rationing, we expect to be able to meet this area's electric needs.

If Wisconsin Electric is in better position than utilities in other parts of the nation, it did not come about by accident. Planning and commitments made in the 1960's placed us in this favorable position. The long court fights in obtaining license approval for Point Beach Nuclear Plant will really be won by our customers this winter. Planning and commitments now must be made to meet your necessary electrical needs in the late 1970's and 1980's.

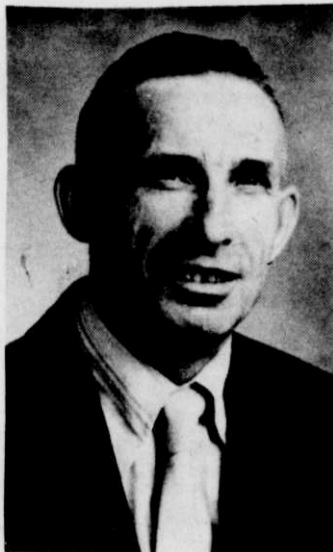

Will there be enough electricity this winter in southeastern Wisconsin?

You should understand the difference in the electric supply situation between southeastern Wisconsin and some other parts of the nation. On the East Coast, for example, electricity is made mostly from oil, which is in short supply. On the Gulf Coast, electricity is made mostly from natural gas or with oil when gas is not available. Both of these are in short supply. In the Pacific Northwest electricity is made by hydro-electric plants and that area has suffered an unusual shortage of rainfall.

About fifty-eight percent of the electricity Wisconsin Electric will make this winter will come from coal. Although coal is not in critical supply at this time, its availability may become limited in the future because of unduly restrictive mining legislation, unrealistic air quality criteria, and increased requirements as industries and other utilities convert from oil and gas to coal. Most of the coal we will need this winter is already on our docks.

More than thirty-five percent of the electricity for this winter will come from our Point Beach Nuclear Plant. More than a winter's supply of nuclear fuel is already in the reactors. Wisconsin Electric's thirty-five percent nuclear generation is well ahead of the national average... only four percent of the electricity made nationally is from nuclear energy.

Less than two percent of the electricity we will make this winter will come from oil. Much of this small percentage of oil we do use is to assure safe burning of coal in our boilers. Our boilers must be kept hot at night to pick up the morning electrical load. At night, we reduce the flow of powdered coal into our boilers. Burning could become erratic and delayed firing could result in an explosion. So we inject oil to keep the coal burning uniformly at the reduced flow. If necessary uses of electricity could be transferred from day time to late at night, we could keep the fires going with coal and further reduce our oil burn. We will also use oil this winter in emergency turbines, if necessary.

A small percentage of natural gas is also used in

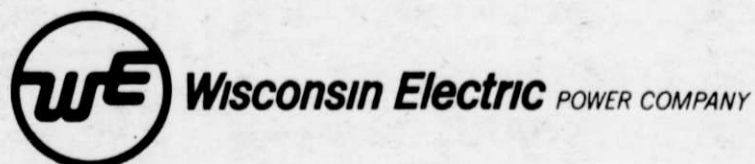
peaking plants and for the downtown Milwaukee steam heating system. About three percent of the electricity we will supply this winter will come from hydro-electric plants in northern Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Ground water levels in these watersheds are normal.

The purpose of this message is to provide you with facts concerning our present situation. Many very sincere people have expressed their worry to us. Many people are confused. Wisconsin Electric anticipates no blackouts or brownouts this winter. We do not expect that workers will be sent home from their jobs because of a shortage of electricity to run machines in their plants.

It is not our purpose, however, to detract from the energy conservation program. We believe that it is wrong to waste energy. And, we intend to assist other utilities whose fuels are in poorer supply to the best of our ability. Every kilowatt-hour of energy that our customers save this winter will save some basic fuel which will increase our ability to assist our neighboring utilities who are in a more unfortunate position and to increase the availability of these fuels for our system in the months to come.

Of course, ice storms this winter, or automobiles crashing into poles, and even a breakdown of one of our generators is possible. But other than for unforeseeable accidents such as these, or governmental action such as national rationing, we expect to be able to meet this area's electric needs.

If Wisconsin Electric is in better position than utilities in other parts of the nation, it did not come about by accident. Planning and commitments made in the 1960's placed us in this favorable position. The long court fights in obtaining license approval for Point Beach Nuclear Plant will really be won by our customers this winter. Planning and commitments now must be made to meet your necessary electrical needs in the late 1970's and 1980's.

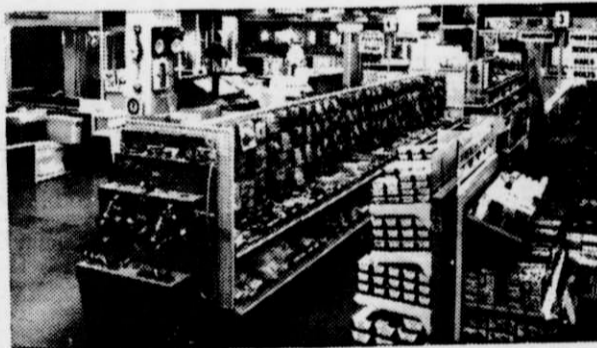

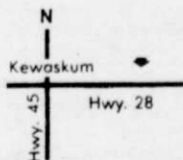

Mayville Beats Indians, 52-38, on Strong Defense

The Indians got started much too late and lost their opening conference game at Mayville Friday night to the rival Cardinals, 52-38, before a noisy crowd. It was the 3rd straight win for the unbeaten Cardinals and Kewaskum is now 1-3.

The game was taped by radio station WBKV in West Bend and rebroadcast Saturday morning to area fans.

An all-junior lineup started for Kewaskum which makes the future look bright for the Indians, who probably are a year away.

Mayville doubled Kewaskum's score in each of the first 3 quarters, outpointing them 12-6 in the first period, 17-18 in the 2nd (making it 25-14 at halftime), and 14-7 in the third stanza. The Cardinals were on top by 20 points going into the final period when the Indians spurred to outscore Mayville in the final quarter, 17-11, and cut the margin of victory to 14 points. Kewaskum's rally in the last period had Mayville worried and they went into a ball possession stall to ward off the Indians' threat.

Kewaskum's spurt came after Mayville's tough defense had already put the game out of reach. The Cardinals had the best defense in the conference last year and they seem to have taken over where they left off last season. Their man-to-man press defense kept Kewaskum from getting on the scoreboard until there was less than 3 minutes left in the first quarter. The Cardinals jumped off to an 8-0 lead and the Indians couldn't get rolling.

The Cardinals played a deliberate offensive game and got the job done. The Indians turned over the ball frequently, especially attempting to lob the ball over the Cardinals' heads.

Stealing the show was Mayville's sharpshooter and leading scorer, Lud Wurtz, who had a banner night with 23 points. Fischer was next with 12. Leading the Indians was Scott Koth with 15 and Don Gruber was next with 9.

A big 21-point 3rd quarter led the JV's to an easy 56-35 victory over Mayville. Jim Bilgo had 11 points and Tom Edwards 10.

In other opening Scenic games Germantown and Grafton both won. Germantown dumped Slinger 55-43, and Grafton downed Kettle Moraine, 70-51. In the other tilt Pewaukee won over Arrowhead in overtime, 59-57.

This Friday the Indians jump out of the frying pan into the fire when they host the big, defending co-champion Germantown team, which is picked as a favorite to repeat.

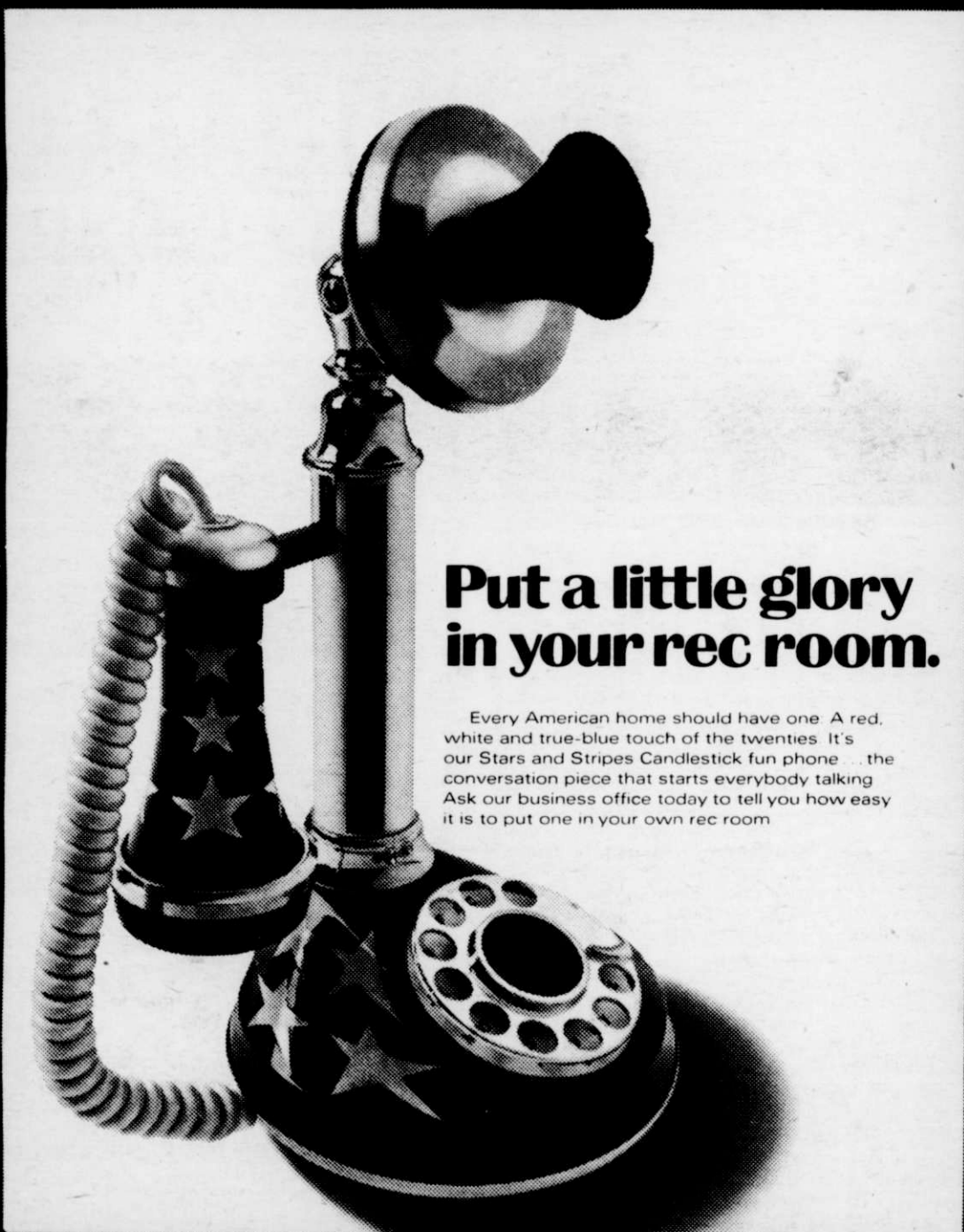
