## Honored for Dairy Farming, Soil Conservation Programs



Mr. and Mrs. Howard Proeber, of R. 3, West Bend, and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Matenaer of R. 1, Kewaskum, were honored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club, on Monday evening, Nov. 12, at the Hon-E-Kor Country Club, for their outstanding accomplishments in dairy farming and soil conservation programs. The Kiwanians sponsor the awards annually during Farm-City Week in cooperation with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District. Vince Groh, the president, presen-

ted the Kiwanis plaques to the winners. Roy Esser showed slides of their farms and Ivan Kumrow, Soil Conservation Service, talked about the proposed Environmental Agency, (E.P.A.) project in the Kewaskum Creek Watershed.

Ralph Matenaer owns and operates a 180 acre dairy farm near Boltonville. His soil and water conservation program consists of 95 acres of contour strip cropping, one acre of grass waterway and 660 feet of surface drainage, which was a part

of the Orchard Grove neighborhood drainage project. He is applying 152 acres of conservation crop rotations to coincide with the soil and slope capability of the land. Ralph has also provided for wildlife on his farm by preserving ten acres of wooded upland and 12 acres of wooded wetland.

Howard Proeber owns and operates a 250 acre farm near Kohlsville and rents several more farms. He was recognized as an outstanding dairy farmer as well as a cooperator in Soil Conserva-

tion program. His herd of 51 registered Holstein cows have an average of 17,961 pounds of milk and 680 pounds of butter fat. His conservation program includes: 14,700 ft. of tile with another 5,000 planned; 1,500 ft. of grass waterway, a pond, 6 acres of woodland management, 190 conservation crop rotation and 70 acres of strips on a rented farm.

## SUBSCRIPTION PRICES GOING UP

Due to ever increasing production costs and postal rates the subscription price for the Kewaskum Statesman will be raised to \$5.00 per year in the State of Wisconsin and to \$6.00 per year outside of Wisconsin beginning Dec. 1, 1974. Single copies are 15 cents at the three news stand outlets (Sentry Foods, Rosenheimer Store and Corner Drugs). This is the first raise in price in almost five years for subscribers although costs have increased steadily, making the raise necessary. Most other newspapers have already raised their price.

## Attends Farm And Industry Short Course

Two hundred and fourteen students are enrolled in the first session of the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences 1974-75 Farm and Industry Short Course at Madison, according to Maurice E. White, assistant dean and director of short courses.

These students have come from 49 Wisconsin counties, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Finland, Lebanon and Iceland.

The short course program is designed to prepare young people for careers in farming and in industries related to farming, White says.

The Farm and Industry Short Course is a certificate program which is divided into three 5-week terms. Classes began Oct. 18, and they'll continue until March 14. Students can attend one, two or all of the sessions, and they may earn two, three or four year certificates.

Nearly 50 courses in industry and all phases of agriculture are offered with some 20 to 25 courses offered during each of the three 5-week terms.

Now is the time to protect your family from a communicable disease.

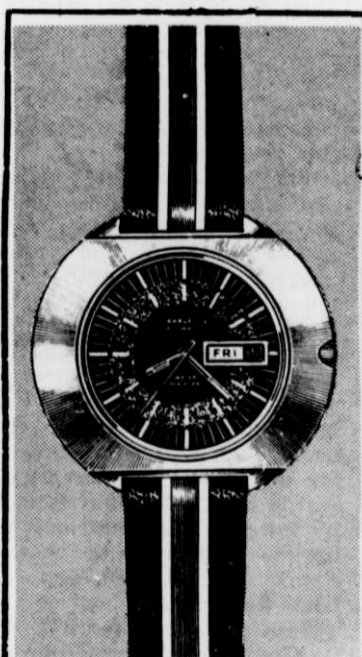

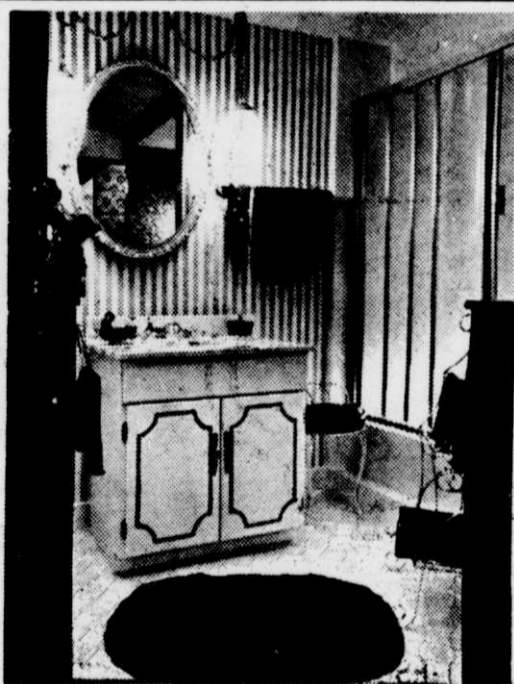

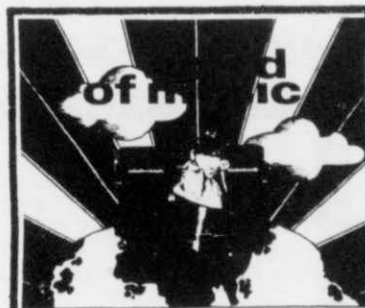
## Elected to College Physics Committee

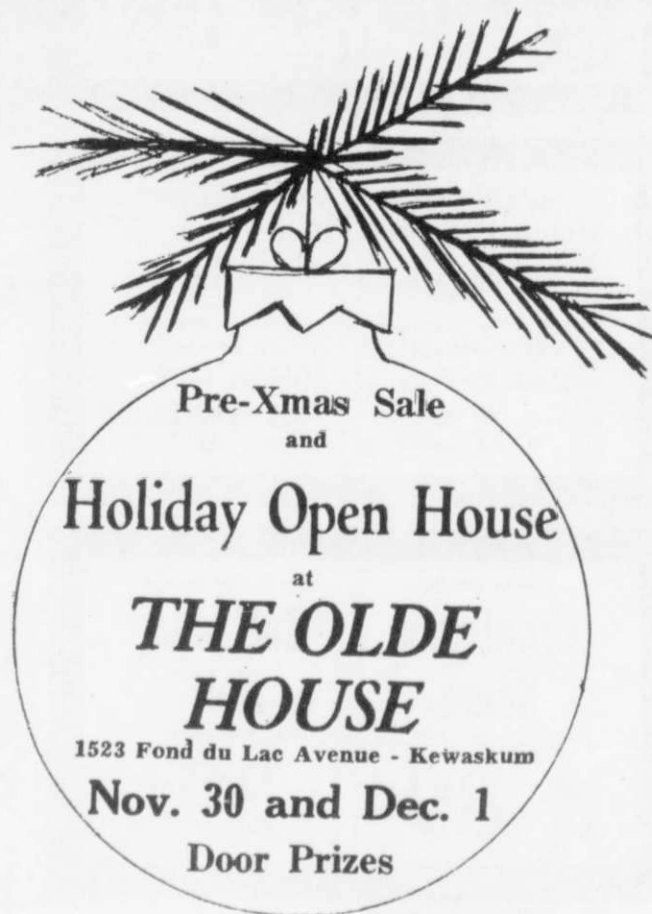

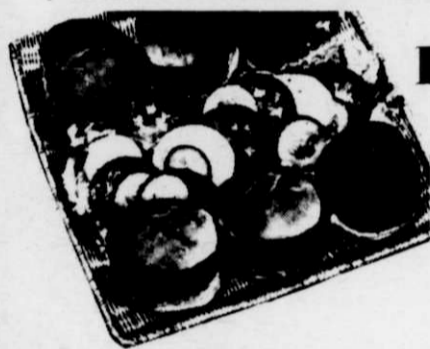

**Gov. Lucey Requests County Be Declared Crop Disaster Area**

Governor Patrick J. Lucey has asked the federal government to declare four more Wisconsin counties—Vernon, Ozaukee, Washington and Milwaukee—disaster areas because of crop losses this year.

Lucey's requests to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz were made so area farmers can receive low-cost disaster loans and other types of assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

In his letters to Butz, Lucey said:

\* In Vernon County, a wet spring, followed by summer drought and killing frosts on Sept. 21 and 22, affected more than 15,000 acres of corn and hay.

\* In Ozaukee County, killing frosts on Sept. 21 and 22 affected more than 23,000 acres of corn, soybeans, green beans and red beets.

\* In Washington County, killing frosts on Sept. 21 and 22 affected more than 25,000 acres of corn, soybeans and peas.

\* In Milwaukee County, killing frosts on Sept. 21, 22 and 23 affected more than 8,000 acres of corn, soybeans, fruits and vegetables.

The Governor has now requested disaster aid for 48 counties this year because of a wet spring, summer drought, hail and early, killing frosts.

Only five of those requests—for Green, LaFayette, Richland, Iowa and Sauk Counties—have been approved by Butz. Lucey has on many occasions, voiced displeasure over Butz's inability to move quickly on the re-

quests. "It is my hope the federal government acts promptly—and favorably—on my requests to help farmers in these counties," Lucey said.

"Millions of dollars in crop damage have occurred in many of our counties. In asking the federal government to grant us disaster status in these areas, we are taking what steps we can—as state officials—to minimize the financial impact of this unfavorable year on our Wisconsin farmers."
