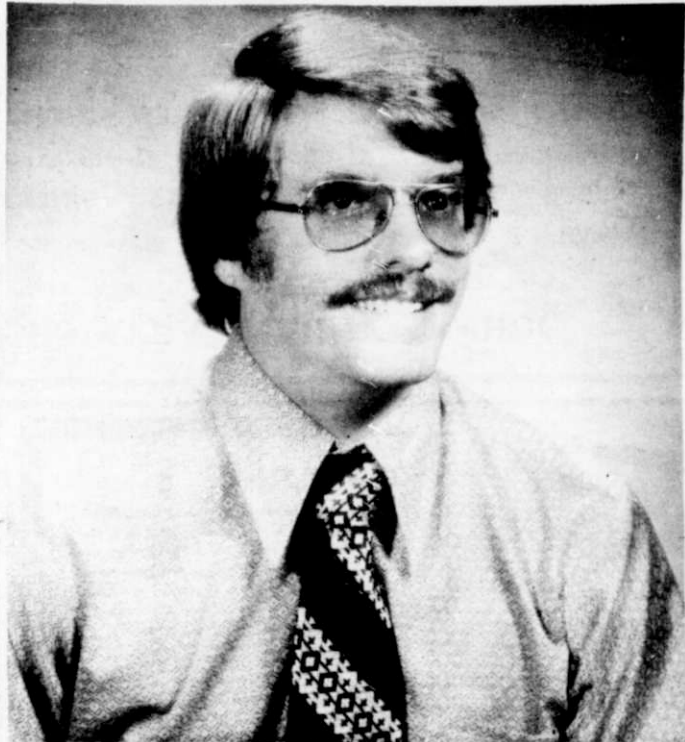

Filzen Named Manager of Kewaskum Savings Office



West Bend Savings and Loan Association has announced the appointment of Dan Filzen as manager of the association's Kewaskum Savings office. Filzen was also named an assistant secretary.

Filzen, a native of La Crosse, joined West Bend Savings in July as a loan officer. As manager of the Kewaskum office he succeeds Dieter Bombien who headed the Kewaskum Savings Office for two years before leaving West Bend Savings for a Milwaukee position.

Just recently \$77,000 was donated to the village for the purchase of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park site. Money

has also been used to provide tennis courts, swimming beach improvements, scholarships, and countless other community projects.

The Dr. Edwards Recognition Convocation program will also trace his interesting 43 year medical career in the Kewaskum area. There is no admission charge, and the public is urged to attend.

Young Man Dies When Cycle Strikes Dog Near St. Kilian

A R. 3, Campbellsport, young man was killed Sunday afternoon when his motorcycle went out of control after hitting a dog on Badger Lane in the Town of Wayne.

James Lee Emmer, age 21, suffered massive head injuries in the crash. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where he was taken by the Kewaskum rescue squad.

Emmer was westbound on Badger Lane, about one-fifth mile west of Skyline Drive just west of St. Kilian in the far northwest section of Washington County and near the Fond du Lac County line, when a dog ran in front of the cycle. Emmer lost control of the motorcycle he was driving as he swerved to avoid the dog. The cycle struck and killed the dog, owned by Ronald H. Norman, and Emmer was thrown from the vehicle.

Norman, the dog's owner, was a witness to the accident, which happened at 4:07 p. m. Emmer was wearing a motorcycle helmet.

Coroner Robert Boltz said

the death brought the county's 1975 traffic toll to nine, compared with 12 deaths on county roads by this time in 1974.

James Lee Emmer was born April 7, 1954, in the Town of Ashford, the son of Roman and Florence Theisen Emmer. He was a graduate of St. Kilian Parochial School and of Campbellsport High School in 1972. He attended Moraine Park Technical Institute of Fond du Lac. He was employed by California Canners and Growers of Lomira. He was a manager of Angelo's Hut football team.

He is survived by his parents; two sisters, Mrs. Robert Campagna, Campbellsport, and Karen at home, and his grandmother, Mrs. Adela Emmer, Ashford.

Visitation was after 3 p. m. Tuesday at the Twohig Funeral Home, Campbellsport. The funeral was held at 10 a. m. Wednesday at the funeral home and at 10:30 at St. Kilian's Church, St. Kilian. Rev. Adrian Trost officiated and burial was in the church cemetery.

School Board Approves Oil Bid, Salaries, Teacher Contract

The Kewaskum Board of Education met on Monday, August 25, at the Administration Office at 1450 School St. Dr. Ogi, the Board President was unable to attend the meeting and in his absence, the school board clerk, Jim Oelhafen, presided over the meeting.

The Board unanimously approved to accept the bid from Quickflash Oil Co. of West Bend to furnish the oil for this school term. The salaries for the School Psychologist of \$14,000 and the Asst. High School Principal of \$18,272.91 were also unanimously approved. No action was taken on the matter of preparing the school lunches at the Wayne Elementary School. Jack Sutton, Services Manager for the school, had contacted the Food Service Program in Madison and reported to the Board what the present requirements were. Because of the cost of the items needed, the Board suggested that the possibility of preparing food for the hot lunch program at Wayne be brought up again for the 1976-77 school year. (The food is presently being prepared at the Middle School in Kewaskum and transported to the Wayne School).

The Board unanimously approved the contract for Miss Judith Ann Bartels for the EMR teaching position at the Kewaskum Elementary School.

The Hot Lunch Policies for free lunches and lunch ticket prices for the new school term were approved. The students may buy a lunch for 65c per day, or \$2.40 for a

five-meal ticket in grades 1 through 6, or \$2.65 for a five-meal ticket in grades 7 through 12, and an extra half-pint of milk for 4c.

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown on the family size income scale are eligible for a free meal and one additional half-pint of milk.

The Board went into executive session following the regular meeting to discuss negotiations.

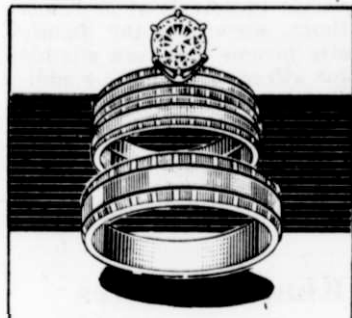
Lions Bar-B-Que Winners Named

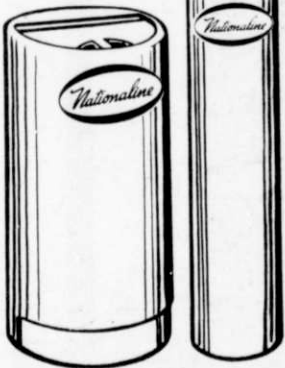

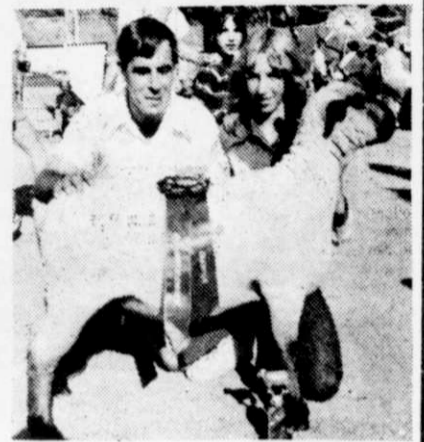

Indians Roll Over North Fondy In Non-Conference Opener, 40-12

The Kewaskum Indians were masters of the big play as they scored four of their six touchdowns on plays of more than 40 yards to blast North Fond du Lac of the Flyway Conference, 40-12, in their non-conference opener here Friday night.

Slippery Dennis Bremser, a track star in the spring, at defensive halfback, picked off two passes, returned a punt 46 yards for a score, and ran 60 yards from scrimmage for a second touchdown. Quarterback Jim Bilgo scored twice, first on a 45-yard option run and then on a 47-yard punt return. Bilgo also completed a 15-yard TD pass to end Leon Laatsch.

Paced by linebackers John Sekeres, Tom Rohlinger and Laatsch, the Indians checked the Orioles, picking off four passes, three in the first quarter. They sacked the North Fondy quarterback five times and held them to 19 yards rushing in the second period. The Indians led at halftime, 26-0.

Bremser was the whole show in the initial quarter by making his first interception and then three plays later making a 60-yard touchdown scamper. Seconds later he stole his second pass and returned it deep into Fondy territory. A couple plays later Laatsch made his TD catch.

Bilgo led the way in the second quarter. Taking a punt, he raced down the sidelines 45 yards for the score. A minute later, he fielded another punt and ran

47 yards for another score.

In the third quarter Bremser ran his punt back and in the final period reserve back Ray Reindl capped a 38-yard drive with a four yard plunge for the final score.

The Indians failed on four of six two-point conversions, while Gary Schmidt succeeded on two. Both Oriole scores were made by Sam Hendrickson on runs of 7 and 5 yards.

Kewaskum took advantage of North Fondy mistakes by their special teams. Ironically the Orioles held Kewaskum to four first downs while picking up nine themselves. The Indians had six fumbles but recovered four. Fondy was held well in check by a bigger Kewaskum line, being outgained, 192-62, on the ground.

In other early games involving Scenic Moraine teams, Pewaukee blanked Notre Dame, 20-0. Germantown was defeated by Brown Deer, 25-13, and Mayville lost to Horicon, 20-6.

This Friday the Indians have another home game when they host rival Campbellsport, also of the Flyway Conference, in more non-loop action. Game time is 7:30.

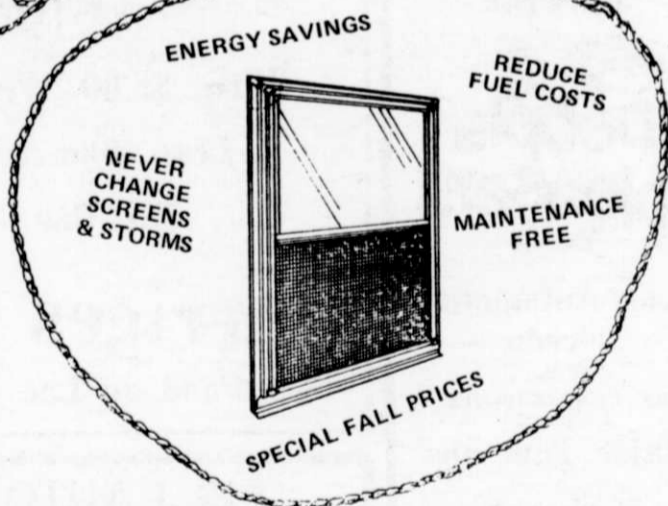
