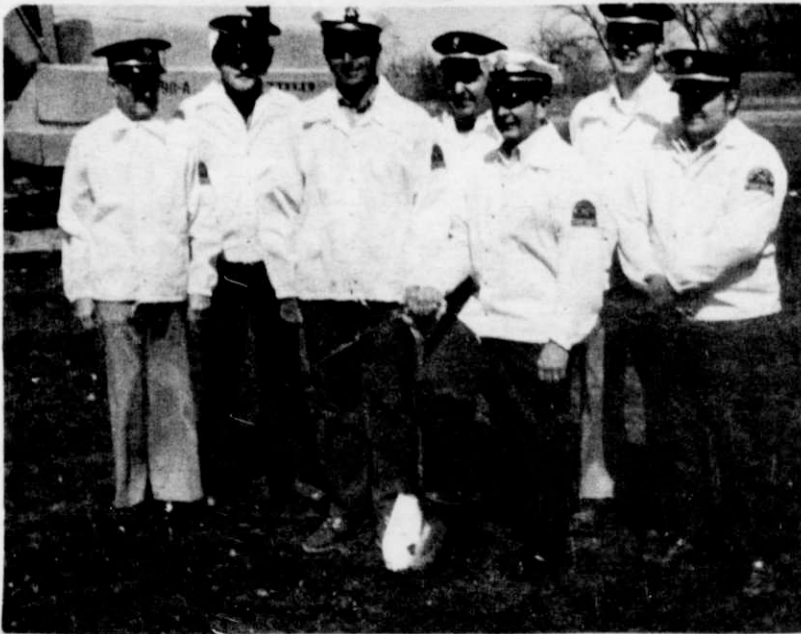

Ground Broken for New Fire Station



Ground was broken at a brief ceremony Monday afternoon for construction of Kewaskum's new fire station just off South Fond du Lac Ave. Excavating and pouring for the foundation is now underway and it is expected the project will be completed by early fall.

Village President Charles Miller turned over the first shovel of dirt. Fire Chief Augie Bilgo and Assistant Chief Rick Boden also put a little pressure on the shovel.

All members of the village board and some of the available fire department officers took part in the ceremony, as did Gary Petri, the archi-

tect on the project from Tesch-Tesch & Associates, Fond du Lac, and Jim Kummer, representative of Badger Structures, a division of A. L. Wagner, Sheboygan, general contractor on the project.

The structure should be up by the end of July, with the completion date for finish work set late in September of early October.

The new fire station will cost just over \$230,000 and will contain approximately 13,400 square feet of space with a 94-foot frontage. The one-story building will have

space enough for all of the equipment the department now owns plus the new Tele-Squirt pumper due to arrive this year. Besides the equipment area, there will be a training room, fire chief's office, conference and meeting room, dispatch office, first aid room, toilets and various equipment storage areas.

Staffing for 1976-77 Is Major Topic at School Board Meeting

Staffing for the 1976-77 school year was the major topic at the Monday meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education.

Special education staffing was again discussed. Two programs were proposed for fall in addition to the program for emotionally disturbed at the secondary level which was already approved. A program for learning disabilities at the secondary level and one for pre-kindergarten-kindergarten students were those again proposed and discussed. No action was taken by the board. Further information on future projections for the special education program as well as availability of teachers was requested.

The board also delayed action on the question of adding one staff member to the Middle School staff. Consideration was requested because of some classes of over 30 in the social studies department and larger than desired science classes. An added staff member would also eliminate six-class assignments for some teachers in the Middle School.

A request by Mr. Stradtman and Mr. Zemlicka to have driver education removed from their contracts was discussed. The board felt they wanted to do whatever was possible to relieve them of the extra assignment, but did not agree to remove the assignment at this time. It was felt that the district could not run the risk of not having anyone to take behind-the-wheel driver education for next year. Efforts will be made to make other arrangements for this in-

struction.

The Kohlsville Cruisers Snowmobile Club was given permission to use the Wayne School grounds for a private gathering of the club and invited guests and to serve but not sell beer. It was also stipulated that no alcoholic beverage of any kind be in the building.

It was decided to hold a kindergarten class at Beechwood next year, with three sections in Kewaskum and one each in Farmington and Wayne. The question had been raised concerning Beechwood because of a small enrollment. Eight or nine kindergarten students are anticipated at Beechwood, and this number can be raised to 11 or 12 by sending three students close to the attendance border to Beechwood. These three students would normally attend the Kewaskum School.

A resignation was accepted from Katherine Koch who teaches chemistry at the high school. Ms. Koch has accepted a teaching position in Minnesota. It was also announced that Sharon Grabarczyk has resigned her position as fifth grade teacher at Wayne.

In other business, the board approved installation of the paint spray booth in the shops at an installation charge not to exceed \$2,000 without further board action. A motion was passed thanking all those who worked with the North Central application and evaluation. The high school has received notice that it has been accepted as a member of North Central.

Kewaskum High School Accredited By North Central Association

Kewaskum Community High School, has been granted accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

Official announcement of the institution's accreditation was made during the 81st annual meeting of the Association held in Chicago, March 28 to 31, at which Clark A. Pearson, Principal, represented Kewaskum Community High School.

The North Central Association serves educational institutions in a 19-state region spanning the mid-United States from Arizona to West Virginia and the Overseas Dependents' schools operated for children of American military and civilian personnel. Its more than 4,700 member schools, colleges, and universities cooperatively establish standards for quality education.

Primarily a catalyst for change, the N.C.A.'s principle tools are: 1. accreditation, the process by which schools demonstrate their willingness and ability to meet NCA's standards, and 2. evaluation, a self-help process through which the school examines its

stated goals, then appraises the extent to which it is meeting those goals.

Every level of education from elementary through university is included in the voluntary, nongovernmental league of educational institutions comprising the North Central Association.

As stated in its Articles of Incorporation, the North Central Association seeks "the continued improvement of the educational program and the effectiveness of instruction" with its member schools, colleges, and universities. It does this by offering a framework within which the profession may establish educational standards. These standards provide a foundation for good education, and membership in the NCA denotes recognition of the quality of an institution's program.

Sgt. Mertens Speaks To Junior Women, Senior Girl Guests

Sgt. Donald Mertens of the Washington County Sheriff's Department enlisted the attention of the Kewaskum Junior Women's Club and their guests, the senior girls of Kewaskum High School, with his program on "Self-Protection and Awareness," aimed primarily at teaching the "weaker sex" (that's us gals!) how to handle themselves in the event of a (sexual) assault.

Since "the ink is barely dry" on the most recent and greatly amended rape laws, many situations will have to be handled differently than had been true in the past. Sgt. Mertens displayed a cache of weapons which, he related, had been apprehended on suspects taken into custody by our very own Washington County Sheriff's Department, including brass knuckles, a revolver, spiked ball and chain, and a veritable arsenal of other deadly weapons.

Following a slide presentation, he enlisted the aid of one of the high school seniors in a demonstration of a simple, never-fail method of breaking an attacker's grip. He also related and demonstrated various other techniques that a person can use to disengage an assailant, pointing out specific body parts which are especially vulnerable. In addition, various articles were described which a person normally has on or about one's person that provide excellent means of defense. A more enraptured audience could not have been found anywhere on Thursday evening, April 8. A special "thank you" to Sgt. Mertens and his department for this very timely program!

Tessar Questions Board on Progress of New Village Park

John Tessar of 541 Habeck St. appeared before the Kewaskum Village Board last week to ask about the progress on the Kewaskum Village Park.

He wondered if we were "going backwards" with the project, and wondered if it was true that no village funds were budgeted for it. He felt that it was important that something be done soon "for the benefit of the children of this town." Board President Charles Miller said that he did not want to address himself on the matter at that time, but did say that the village would meet with the DNR on Monday to discuss the matter, and promised that from now on things will proceed at "a rapid pace."

Miller also reported that he attended a meeting in West Bend concerning federal aid for municipalities affected by the recent ice storm. He did not file a claim on behalf of the village, but instead declared his intent to file at a later date. Superintendent of Public Works August Bilgo was designated to meet with the team of engineers who will come to Kewaskum to survey the damage.

Dr. Cesar Sison appeared at the meeting to find out what was delaying the approval of his annexation petition. In the near future, he plans to bring another doctor into the community, but his present offices are not adequate. The response from the board was that one parcel of land bordering it will form

an island if it is not annexed and so it will be forced to add to the petition.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty requested that the board hire an additional part-time patrolman to work when one of the fulltime patrolmen is not available. Tom Bauer, representing the Kewaskum Patrolmen's Association had no objection to the idea, as long as the contracts of the present patrolmen and their shifts would be unchanged. A meeting between the union, chief and village board was scheduled to be held prior to April 19, which is the board's next scheduled meeting date, so that a decision can be made at that time.

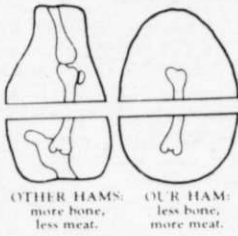

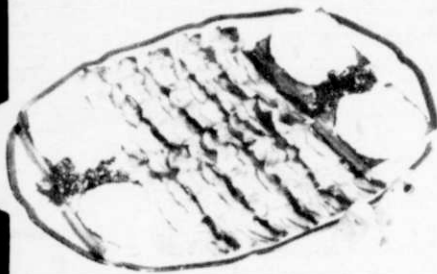

Flintlocks For America

The British Regulars gazed with contempt at the 70 odd farmers and small shopkeepers on the Lexington Green. Old Jonas Parker, heading up this small group of patriots, had no intention of giving a serious challenge to the forces of the crown. It was too brief to be called a battle. Eight patriots died there and ten more were wounded. Some who died were bayoneted as they lay wounded. One British private was slightly wounded.

Contemptuous of any possible danger from these backwoods farmers, the British strode purposefully toward Concord. At the North Bridge "the embattled farmers stood, and fired the shot heard round the world."

The retreat to Boston became a rout. Minutemen farmers swarmed like angry bees and fought the only way they knew how to fight... from behind trees and stone fences... and these were stark riflemen. The flintlocks took terrible vengeance for the patriots' losses at Lexington. The British had 373 casualties including 73 dead. The Minutemen were no soldiers... not yet. They were fighting farmers, defending their own homes and land. The mighty British Empire was to discover more about their courage in the years just ahead.

Old Israel Putnam was called "a nearly illiterate farmer" but there was nothing wrong with his will to fight. The Battles of Breeds Hill and Bunker Hill were mostly his idea. Backed by tough farmer-backwoodsman John Stark of New Hampshire, and more like him, in a single night fortifications were thrown up on the crests of the hills. The British Com-

mander remarked that they accomplished more in one night than his entire army could have done in a month. American farmers knew how to handle a spade!

The battle goes into the books as a victory for the British. Well, we only know that the patriots' losses were small but the attacking regulars lost 1,054 men including every officer on Howe's personal staff. Farmers' flintlocks again forced a terrible price from the invaders.

A gentleman farmer from Virginia was called by his country to take command and to build an army out of independent backwoods farmers and small town merchants. George Washington was equal to the task. Along the way a hot-headed Vermont farmer named Ethan Allen gave the colonies their first great victory at Ticonderoga. The death of another farmer-general, Richard Montgomery, within the historic walls of Quebec was partly responsible for the failure of the invasion of Canada.

The war went on. Frontier farmers joined the cause and heroic wives and children faced alone the dangers of hostile Indians and all the hardships of wilderness living while their men-folk used their flintlocks for freedom. It was a long and weary road for the "embattled farmers," from Bennington to Cowpens, Vincennes to Monmouth, Trenton to Saratoga, to end at last at Yorktown. In every battle, large or small, farmer-generals and farmer-privates fought the good fight. Later they would work toward building a new world but in those first years they offered their lives and their "Flintlocks for America."

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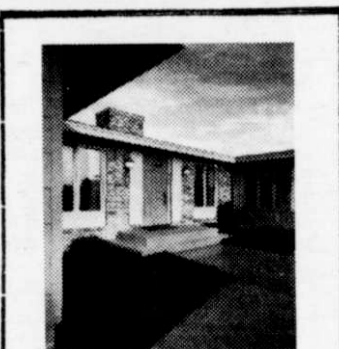

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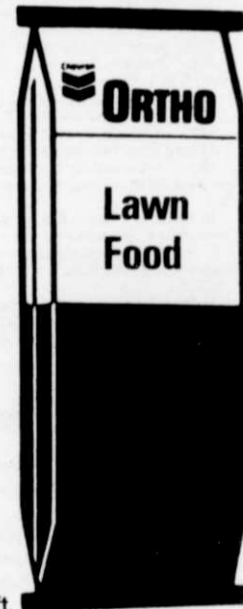
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Bremser Ace in Indoor Scenic Split Meet Here
