Village Board Readies Nuisance Ordinance

After receiving a letter and many verbal complaints, an ordinance is being readied pertaining to nuisances in the Village of Kewaskum.

Many of the complaints dealt with improper use of minibikes within the village limits, with one letter discussed at the board's semi-monthly meeting on Wednesday. The ordinance would pertain to anything making excessive noise, including minibikes, snowmobiles, automobiles, barking dogs and others.

This was deemed to be the type of ordinance necessary

since some of the citizens who complained stated that it would be unfair to ban minibikes without doing the same to snowmobiles. President Charles Miller reported that another ordinance is pending which would set restrictions on what types of pets can be kept inside the village limits, in light of complaints about chickens being raised at one home and others in recent months.

In other action, the Kewaskum Junior Women's Club was given assurances of being allowed to continue their glass recycling project in their present location below the Kewaskum Historical So-

ciety's museum on Parkview Drive. Trustee Dan Schmidt said that he would be opposed to allowing them to move into the present fire station after the new one is completed, since it is a public building, but that they were more than welcome to remain where they are presently located.

Permission was given for superintendent of wastewater treatment Peter Albers to purchase some equipment to test bacterial content in the Milwaukee River at a cost not to exceed seven hundred dollars. Building permits were approved for two residences on Edgewood Road.



Board Approves Early Payment On Fire Station

Early payment of \$49,950 to Badger Structures for work done on the Kewaskum Fire Station was approved by the Kewaskum Village Board on Wednesday.

The funds will be used to pay subcontractors so that they can take advantage of discounts on materials that will be available this month. Fire Chief August Bilgo reported that they need the money by June 10, and that more than that amount of work has been completed already, which included backhoe digging, pouring footings, bulldozing, and some

plumbing work.

Board member Robert Danielson noted that immediate payment of the funds would result in a loss of \$100 in interest money to the village. The funds will be paid to the contractor by the deadline, having been approved for payment by Tesch and Tesch, architects for the project.

The release of \$9,600 in funds being held by the village, belonging to Ideal Land Corporation was tabled until June 7, since the village's attorney could not provide an answer concerning whether or not the time had arrived for them to be released. They are being held in escrow to guarantee work being done in their subdivision on the west side of the village, but there is disagreement as to whether or not final approval for their work has already been received.

Board member Raynor Herriges was appointed to replace Elmer Yoost on the Board of Review, and Mar-

lene Erickson was appointed to the library board, replacing high school principal Clark Pearson.

and directly into the three large shuttle fringe bus lots.

At the three shuttle bus parking lots — located at RFK Stadium, the North Parking Lot/Pentagon and at Fort Myer South Post — motorists will park free, purchase Metrobus tickets on the lot — and will shuttle bus at special family rates by Metrobus to and from the Mall — the focal point for Bicentennial activity in the Washington area.

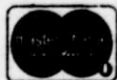

Kewaskum Girls Set Three Records to Repeat As Scenic Track Champions; Boys Fourth

The Kewaskum High School girls track squad repeated as Scenic Moraine Conference outdoor track champions at Germantown Friday afternoon.

Slinger took the runnerup spot but the anticipated tight duel with the Indians did not materialize at the end as the Indian girls gained a 21-point win. However, the Owls were ahead by one point, 58-57, until the last four events. Kewaskum and Slinger had tied in an earlier triangular and the Owls won the Scenic Relays by a single point.

Junior Carrie Kempf was the individual star for the Indians as she piled up 30 points in addition to anchoring the winning relays. Carrie won the 100, the 220 and long jump.

Kewaskum set three conference records — Kempf's 25.7 in the 220 trials, her 17-6 1/2 in the long jump and the 880 relay (Pam, LuAnn and Carrie Kempf and Jenny Schaub) of 1:47.8.

They had two other school records — Carol Spaeth's 2:26.8 in the 880, six seconds better than her old record, and the 4:19.5 mile relay, as Jill and Joy Zarling, Jackie Coulter and Sue Nigh bettered the old mark by over six seconds.

A key second place was earned by Amy Schmidt in the high jump. She went 4-10 to give the Indians 8 points and take some from Slinger.

In the boys' meet, Kettle Moraine repeated as S-M champs in a runaway with 144 points. Kewaskum placed fourth with 69, just one point out of third. Slinger was a very weak last with 1 1/4 points to end a long season.

Dennis Bremser was a double winner for the Indians. Bremser won the 880, had no misses in the pole vault at 12-6, took second in the mile and called it a day. His 880 marked his first sub-two minute effort of the year.

Keith Mueller had the only other Indian win in the shot put. Paul Brenholt got a third in that event. Jack Kern picked up a second in the high hurdles and 4ths in the lows and shot.

Coach Neil Denniston would have liked to pick up two more points so his squad could have finished third in the meet, which would have given them a third in conference standings.
