## Beach Opening Delayed

### SIGN UP JUNE 12 FOR SWIM LESSONS

The official opening of the Kewaskum beach will be slightly delayed this year. Guards and equipment will not be present at the beach until further notice is given in the Kewaskum Statesman, West Bend News and over WBKV. Parents are strongly urged not to allow their children, especially young non-swimmers, to visit the beach until the lifeguards are on daily duty.

The orientation meeting for swim students on June 14 has been postponed. However, there will be registration for swim lessons on Saturday, June 12, at the Kewaskum Municipal Building on First Street from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. The tentative

schedule of classes is: 10:00, 10:30, 11:00 and 11:30 a. m.—beginners; 12:00 noon—advanced beginners; 12:30 p. m. intermediates and swimmers combined.

Classes for lifesaving or adult beginners will be arranged when and if there is sufficient interest. All lessons will be conducted Monday thru Friday in 2 sessions of 3 or 4 weeks each.

A fee of \$1.00 for village residents and \$2.00 for non-residents is payable at the time of registration. This will cover both sessions.

When the beach opens, hours will be from 10:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. daily and on Saturdays. Sundays the hours are from 12:00 noon to 8:00 p. m. A "Beach Closed" sign will be displayed whenever lifeguards are not present.

## Ked-Web, Frozen Foods Granted Conditional Use Permits by Board

Conditional use permits for Ked-Web Sales and Kewaskum Frozen Foods were granted by the Kewaskum Village Board on Monday.

Both variances had the approval of the Kewaskum Plan Commission prior to their approval. No opposition was offered at the public hearing held prior to the meeting.

Ked-Web plans to build an addition to its building on Fond du Lac Avenue, which would come within 3 feet of the lot line, 22 feet closer than the zoning normally allows. Kewaskum Frozen Foods also plans an addition to a building that is already operating under a conditional permit, so it must have a second one.

A refund request by Robert Zarling for repairs made to his driveway, caused by curbing being put in at a lower grade was referred to the public works committee for study.

Elroy Egerer, owner of an apartment house at the intersection of Main Street and Parkview Drive offered a letter of objection to the board, since his property is zoned commercial. The letter, which requests a zoning change to residential, will be forwarded to the plan commission for study. Should over half of the building be destroyed it could not be rebuilt for use as a residence, under its present zoning.

The auxiliary police were given permission to buy a van at a cost of \$300 to transport equipment to their functions. They had hoped to purchase one for some time, and will do much of the ne-

cessary repair work themselves.

\$1,050 was donated by local service organizations for the purchase of Christmas decorations for the village. The board approved the purchase of \$1,400 worth of decorations, with the remainder to be paid out of village funds.

Commissioner Bill Martin was granted permission to attend a seminar for clerks and finance officers from June 15 through June 18.

Lee Stoffel, a member of the Kewaskum FFA Alumni Association, was the host to the 1975 Alice in Dairyland, Deborah Ann Del Balso, and a group of West Bend and Kewaskum residents.

The group was shown the milking parlor in action, free stalls, feeding and the entire dairy operation. In addition, cheese and crackers, provided by AMPI, were served.

Each member of the tour received a FFA key ring and FFA litter bag courtesy of the Kewaskum FFA Chapter, who helped conduct the tour. The guides were Paul Redig (advisor) and Pat Hanrahan (reporter).

## School Board Discusses Property Transfer, OK's Teacher Contracts

The Kewaskum Board of Education met briefly Saturday morning to discuss an upcoming hearing on a property transfer and to approve some individual teacher contracts.

The property transfer involved a request to change a 160 acre parcel from Plymouth to the Kewaskum district. The board position was three-fold: 1) Kewaskum will accept the decision of the Agency School Committees, 2) Kewaskum does not wish to get involved with appeals or any other action in the matter and, 3) Kewaskum is not looking to add any territory from other districts.

In other action, the board approved four teacher con-

tracts. Robert Getter, was approved to take the position open in music with Clyde Brehm's resignation. Getter is a graduate of Whitewater and has two years of teaching experience at Hustisford. Ann Nelson will teach fifth grade at Wayne. She is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin - Madison, and is a beginning teacher. Sue Burgard was approved for the newly created learning disabilities position at the secondary level. She graduated from Oshkosh and is a beginning teacher. Gerald Gosa will be the new science teacher at the high school. He is also a graduate of University of Wisconsin - Madison, and is a beginning teacher.

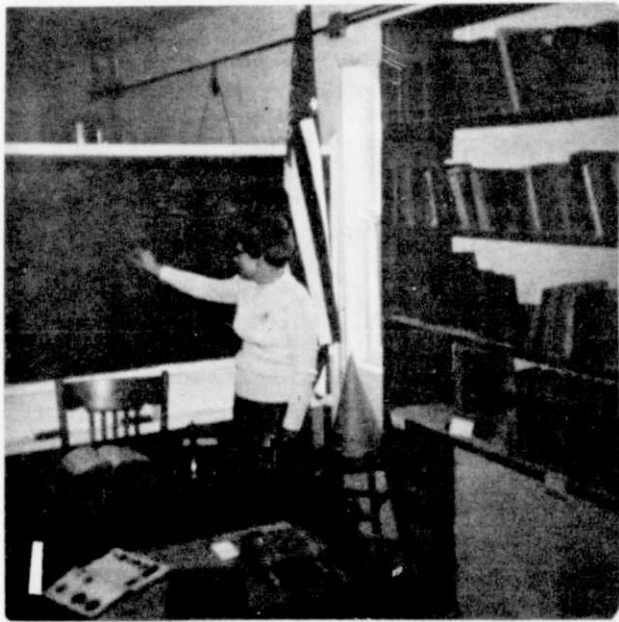

The Kewaskum FFA joined with all Wisconsin FFA Chapters at the State FFA Convention held Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week, June 8 - 10, at the Baptist Assembly in Green Lake.

Kewaskum's FFA Chapter and its members were recognized in several important areas. Each year only two per cent of all FFA members are eligible for the Wisconsin Farmer Degree. 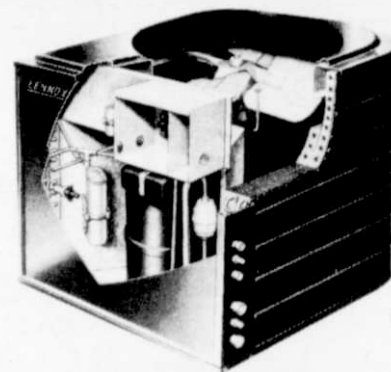

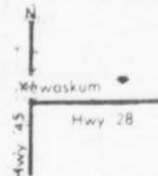

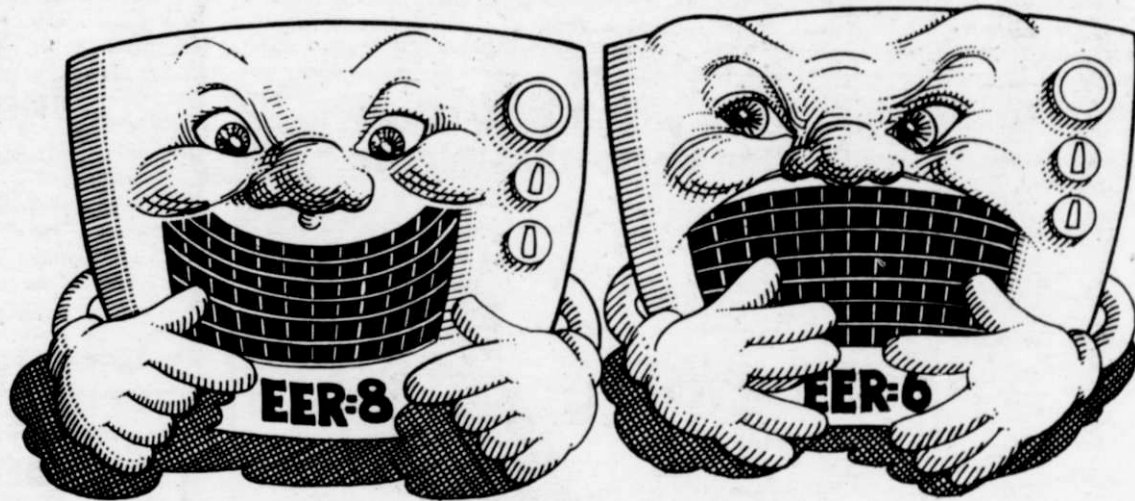

# Carrie Kempf First in State in Record Time

Kewaskum's Carrie Kempf, small in stature but a giant on the track field, brought home the first individual state championship for the local school in the 100 yard dash in the Class B state track meet at Madison Saturday. And in doing so she also broke an existing state record.

The old record of 11.68 was set in 1974. Carrie had broken it in trials with 11.5 and in the state meet she hit the tape in 11.4, just .1 of a second faster than Jenny Lind of Weyauwega, and yards ahead of the rest of the field. This is quite an accomplishment, even though girls' competition in track is still comparatively new.

Kempf also barely missed a double win in the 220 by inches as she was nipped by Lind in a photo finish. Both were given 25.5 clockings with Carrie's having a plus

behind it. The 220 was also a state record, the old one of 25.89 being set by Jane Ubbelohde of Unity in 1974.

And that's not all. Carrie had placed 5th in the long jump Friday with a 16-8 1/4 (which was below her 17-foot leaps in the conference meet and the Regional). All by herself she earned 20 points which was good enough to put Kewaskum in 6th place in the team competition. Finishing ahead of Kewaskum were Prairie du Chien 64, New Holstein 28, Waterford 24, Lake Mills 23 and Tomahawk 22.

Kempf, only a junior, has been to state three years, having been on relay teams her freshmen and sophomore years, and in the 100 as a soph. Both these teams took second, and she was second last year in the 100. This year she brought home a title for her coach, a happy Connie

Von Schoyck.

Kewaskum's two male qualifiers to the state also placed high. Dennis Bremser's 1:59.5 took third in the 880. He lunged at the tape and fell to the track to take third. Bremser, a senior, will be missed as in some meets this year he won or placed high in four events.

Keith Mueller took fourth in the shotput on Friday with a heave of 50-2. Mueller, also a senior, got off his best effort on his last try. He had won the Scenic shot title as well as the Washington County Outdoor. This was the second straight year Kewaskum had a shot putter place in state. In 1975, Mike Koepke took third.

The Indians placed 23rd in team competition in the boys' class B with 8 points. The winner was St. Francis with 38.

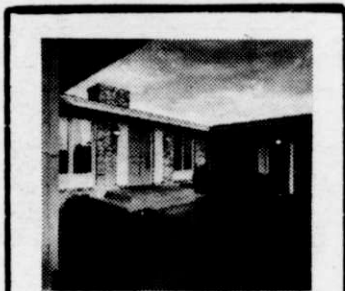

**Open House at Threshold Sunday**

A new sign, on the facade of their facility, made and installed by Threshold staff member, Chuck Stehlik, is an invitation to the general public that we plan to have an open house, related Horst Wagner, Director.

The event shall be this coming Sunday, June 13, from 10:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.

The Threshold, located in West Bend, was built with funds obtained entirely from a 1973 county-wide fund drive which enabled construction of the present 20,000 square foot facility. To date, most pledges have been received. Within one year after all pledges are received the facility will be completely paid for.

"The Threshold's last open house occurred 3 years ago. Since that time numerous services and program have been added, modifications of their physical layout have al-

so been made," remarked Wagner.

"The real purpose of the open house is to orientate residents of our county and to enable those whom missed the open house 3 years ago to the services and programs for handicapped children and adults served by the Threshold."

The Threshold now serves 31 children in its pre-school and 125 adults over age 18. In addition, a special 6 week summer recreation program for school aged handicapped children is provided.

In 1975, 24 residents from the Kewaskum vicinity received direct services.

For adults, job training services include: work and vocational evaluation, on going counselor services, job training in service, occupations, production and machine type jobs.

Competitive job placement into industries is one of Threshold's major purposes. Another is to provide a sheltered workshop consisting of

daily ongoing work activities and enrichment programs for those who are unable to obtain gainful employment.

Driver Education training is available for those having potential for this program.

Sheltered work plus instruction is available in: Basic Living Skills, Recreation, Speech Therapy, Ceramics, Arts & Crafts, Gardening and Basic Education.

All adult trainees and clients are bussed daily if needed from anywhere in Washington County. At present 4 vans and a 32 passenger bus are in use.

Another service provided to the community is that of obtaining industrial sub-contract work from county firms. This service to firms enables them to meet last minute production rushes and other delays of normal operation.

It enables trainees to earn as they learn and help in their personal daily self sufficiency.

The Threshold likewise be-

nefits, for sub contract income enables them to be more self-supportive and reliant. Hence, they do not have to rely on as much public funding through the CCSA and the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation of Wisconsin.

Twenty percent of their operational expenses are deferred from sub-contract income, seventy percent from local and state funding sources and five percent from community contributions such as United Fund, Kiwan-Club of West Bend and individual donations from private citizens and service clubs.

The general public is encouraged to attend the open house this Sunday. Threshold's programs are unique for those they serve. This is a credit to the community for their continuous concern and support.

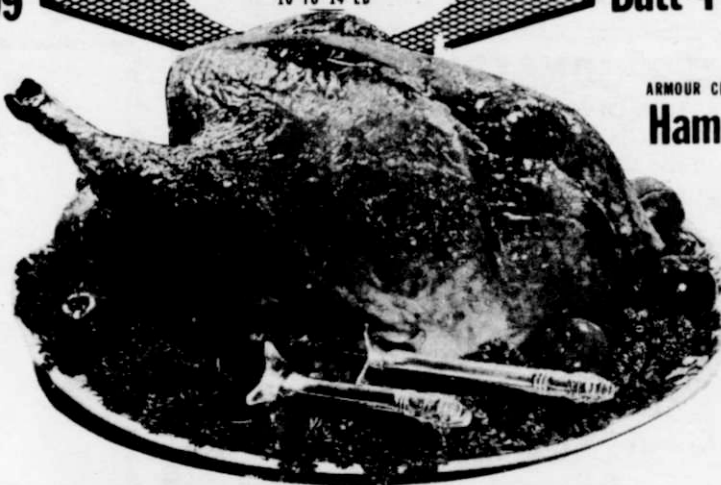
