Allen Tessar Dies Wednesday



Allen A. Tessar, age 49 years, of 1325 Brooklane Drive, Kewaskum, passed away early Wednesday morning, Sept. 22, at his home.

He was born April 14, 1927, at West Bend, a son of Mrs. Lorinda Schaefer Tessar and the late Jack Tessar. He was married to Annabelle Grotenhuis Feb. 17, 1951, at St. Lucas Lutheran Church in Kewaskum.

He served his country in the U.S. Navy during World War II. He was a member of Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384, American Legion, served as a member of the Council of Peace United Church of Christ, was past president of the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum, an active leader of the Boy Scouts many years, a member of the Kewaskum Board of Education serving his fourth term, a member of the 25 Year Club at Regal Ware, Inc., where he was credit manager at the time of his death, a past member of the Kewaskum Fire Department, a Little League baseball manager, and a very avid sportsman.

Surviving are his wife; two sons, James Allen at home and Jack Edward of Fond du Lac; one daughter, Amy, at home; his mother, Mrs. Lorinda Tessar of Kewaskum; three brothers, Wayland and John of Kewaskum and Thomas of West Bend. He was the son-in-law of Dr. and Mrs. R. G. Edwards, and is also survived by sisters-in-law; brothers-in-law; aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, other relatives and many friends.

His father, Jack Tessar, preceded him in death on Dec. 6, 1975.

Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home will be from 4 to 9 p. m. Thursday and 9 to 11 a. m. Friday, then at Peace United Church of Christ from noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. Friday. Rev. R. G. Beck will officiate and burial will take place in the Peace Church cemetery. Military graveside services will be conducted by Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of The American Legion.

Vil. Board Declares Moratorium On Building Permits in Ideal

The Kewaskum Village Board declared a moratorium on future building permits in Ideal Land Subdivision at their Monday evening meeting.

Ken Leitheiser appeared before the board to receive an answer to his pending permit. In August 30 he appeared and his building plans were approved and he was told to proceed with his lot purchase in Ideal. He proceeded to purchase the property and on the 8th of September on advice from the village's legal council, the board decided to table any permits. Charles Miller, president, stated nothing further has been done, when asked what progress with Ideal has been made.

Leitheiser stated he has exactly five weeks before he has to move from his present home and time has been wasted since August 30. He felt he was in his present predicament because of board indecision in this matter.

Trustee Herriges stated it wasn't fair, first giving the go ahead, then saying no to his request. Trustee Danielson stated that Leitheiser did have his permit before the board's decision to table. Finally the motion was made and passed to grant the permit. Trustee Schmidt then made the motion to stop granting permits in Ideal until the village attorney gives the go ahead. Motion was passed and Trustee Dave Nigh stated "now we have a moratorium."

After decisive wins over North Fondy, Campbellsport and Milwaukee University School in pre-season games, Kewaskum's Indians extended their victory streak to four straight by whipping Pewaukee in their Scenic Moraine Conference opener there Friday afternoon, 32-6.

In the four games, the Indians have scored a total of 93 points, while the defense has held their opponents to 20.

Pewaukee stacked its defense to stop the Indians' run, but the Pirates forgot about the pass. Kewaskum added 2 more touchdowns in the second quarter. The first came when the Pewaukee punter was rushed and got off a short kick. The Indians took over on the 25. Jaeger dropped back and hit White on the one. Eichsteadt carried it in for the score.

With minutes left in the half, Pewaukee's Pete Opie dropped back to pass and was caught for a 10-yard loss by Eichsteadt. The Indians took the ensuing punt on their own 34. On the first play Jaeger hit White again, who went in for a 20-0 halftime score.

The first time Kewaskum had the ball in the second half they made it 26-0. Reindl caught a 42-yarder from Jaeger and two plays later scored from the 3.
