Record Vote of 1134 Cast in Village; Park Referendum Passes, 687 to 410 Promote Koepke At Regal Ware Village Seeks Assessor, Building Inspector; Other Matters Acted On

A record vote of 1,134 was cast in Tuesday's General Election in the Village of Kewaskum. The previous record was 964 in 1972. The voter turnout was so heavy that the village ran out with its 1,000 ballots. The sample ballots had to be used and after that more ballots had to be run off on a copy machine.

On the issue of whether to borrow \$360,000 for completion of the new park the vote wasn't even close. There were 687 voting for the park financing, 410 against and 37 blanks.

On the presidential ballot, President-elect Jimmy Carter ran nearly 200 votes behind President Gerald Ford in the village. Ford received 644 votes to 450 for Carter. There were 26 scattered votes on the Independent ticket, with 16 going to Eugene J. McCarthy, 7 to Frank P. Zeidler and 3 to Roger L. MacBride. In the Town of Kewaskum it was close as Ford bested Carter by only 33 votes, 264 to 231.

Incumbent Democrat U. S. Senator William Proxmire scored a resounding victory over Republican Stanley York. This term will give him the longest senatorial tenure in the state's history. In the village Proxmire defeated York by nearly a 2 to 1 margin, receiving 675 votes to 367 for York. In the town Proxmire was given 321 votes to 155 for York.

For Representative to Congress in the 9th District, incumbent Robert W. Kasten, Jr. defeated his opponent, Lynn M. MacDonald, by a 2 to 1 margin. Locally Kasten won over MacDonald by 280 votes, 680 to 400. In the town it was 301 for Kasten to 199 for MacDonald.

In the State Senate race, 2nd District, incumbent Thomas E. Petri was handily re-elected over Democratic challenger Ken Bowman, ex-Green Bay Packer. In the village Petri won over Bowman by more than 200 votes, 648 to 420. It was also Petri in the town, 290 to 198.

For Representative to the Assembly, 6th District, incumbent Chilton legislator Gervase Hephner was re-elected to his sixth term by a big margin over Earl Lintner. Village voters favored Hephner by over 200 votes, 627 to 421. In the town it was 296 for Hephner and 195 for Lintner.

For Washington County offices, traditionally hard for Democrats to crack, Frederick Fink became the first Democrat elected to the courthouse over Republican opposition since 1938. He defeated Republican Kenneth Guy for District Attorney by al-

most 2,000 votes. He will succeed incumbent James Schwalbach, who was not a candidate for re-election.

For all other county offices, incumbent Republicans and Republican hopefuls made a clean sweep. Newcomers elected are Leo Scholtz as county treasurer and Jon Sanfilippo as Clerk of Circuit Court. County Clerk George Nehrbass was re-elected over James Panawash — village Nehrbass 675, Panawash 372; tn. Nehrbass 304, Panawash 186. Scholtz was elected County Treasurer over Arlene Hoerig—village Scholtz 581, Hoerig 460; town Scholtz 243, Hoerig 241. Sheriff Clarence Schwartz was unopposed for re-election—village voted 759 for Schwartz; town 353. Coroner Robert Boltz was re-elected over Robert Cross—village Boltz 619, Cross 440; town Boltz 280, Cross 210. Sanfilippo won over Dorothy Sieber for Clerk of Circuit Court — village Sanfilippo 641, Sieber 420; town Sanfil-

Kewaskum Village Board decided at their meeting Monday evening to place ads in local papers for the positions of assessor and building inspector. The late Ed Brandt was the village assessor and had been hired for an indefinite period. A new law had been passed requiring assessors to pass a state exam and had Brandt lived the village would not have had to worry about the law until late in 1977. A new assessor has to be appointed before May 1, 1977. Until that time the services of an assessor from Sheboygan will be used.

President Charles Miller suggested that maybe some local real estate agents, who now do private assessments might be interested in the job. As for building inspector, Hank Becker has been temporarily filling in, but had been inquiring as to when the village would be hiring a permanent replacement, thus bringing up the need for the ads.

Approval was given Fairmont Dairy to erect a 9 foot by 40 foot silo type structure on their parking lot for storage of polyurethane resin to be used in construction their own milk cartons. Also approved was a building permit submitted by Elroy Eger for remodeling of a property he has purchased which would span a period of six months.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty requested permission to advertise for bids for a new squad car. He explained he wanted to beat the year-end price raise and would use the same specs as last year. He was told to get information ready for the Nov. 15 meeting since this was not part of meeting agenda so the board could not give permission at this time.

Miller stated he was happy to report to the board that a new contract satisfactory to both parties had been negotiated with the Police Association and would be ready to sign shortly.

Village employees have requested two way radio equipment be purchased for seven village vehicles. A price has been obtained of \$853.38 excluding installation, which would include seven mobile units, two base stations and two antennas. This was referred to the Equipment Committee for study since it would have to be included in the 1977 budget.

Charles Miller and Commissioner William Martin attended a Town Association meeting. It was brought up that only the Towns of Farmington, Wayne, Kewaskum

and the Village of Kewaskum do not computerize their tax records and billings. The cost would be \$722.00 for the first year billing and \$200 per year thereafter. The Village is considered to have approximately 800 parcels of property. The system would compute the previous year's tax bill and then the towns or village would have to fill the appropriate envelopes. This would also give a more detailed breakdown on the tax receipt. This too would have to be included in the 1977 budget and would not be ready for this year's tax period.

A letter was read from Lehman Rosenheimer in answer to a request from the village for permission to cross thirty feet of his property with a ditch for run off water from the proposed park area. He had originally granted permission but changed his mind. In the letter he states he would donate a two acre parcel, 67 feet in width which would be along the possible extension of Forest Ave. along the north end of the park. His donation would come with

the stipulation that should Forest Ave. be extended that the village pay one half of the sewer, water and street improvements on the extension. Matter was tabled until the Nov. 15 meeting.

Roger Strack informed the board of his committee's proposal for the sidewalk from Bel-Ric Acres. The proposal would put a tar sidewalk on the south side of Hwy. H to Milan Drive, down Milan to an area between the AMPI building and the A & W Drive-In, then cross Hwy. 45 to the east side in front of the proposed Sison Medical Clinic and then into the village. Police Chief Hlavaty stated it was too dangerous to cross Hwy. 45 at this area where the speed limit is 45 mph. He stated he requested a lower speed zone in that area from the state and his request was denied. Strack replied that this was only a proposal for discussion. The board will discuss the matter further.

Dan Schmidt, Park Committee chairman, wanted a discussion on park funding should the referendum pass. The board decided to go with negotiated bidding with Valley Bank of Kewaskum and First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee given a chance for bidding. No formal action can be taken until results of voting are known.

Gregor Nigh stated he had received the winter recreation schedule from Director Tom Larson. This schedule runs through Dec. 18. A schedule cannot be made beyond that point because the high

school does not have a schedule made out for the use of the gyms. The program will go through the Christmas holidays to see the number of adults participating and whether it is worthwhile to continue.

Discussion followed on park referendum on Tuesday's ballot with a member of the audience questioning the printed facts on a leaflet which was left in his door. The discussion centered on the cost in dollars and cents to the taxpayers. It was explained that at this time it is not definitely known if the rate per thousand will be forty cents per thousand as stated in the leaflet or \$2.45 per thousand as stated at the public meetings. The board stressed the need to vote, then after results are known, the board will be able to know the amount according to financing.

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Dual Program Presented to Junior Women

Judging from the comments heard following the dual program presented to Kewaskum Junior Women's Club members at their monthly meeting on October 11, members and guests alike thoroughly enjoyed the program.

Introduction of the speaker from the Milwaukee Blood Bank and his presentation opened the evening's agenda. He presented some background material on the operation and function of the Blood Bank, showed a film entitled "Three Plus You," and answered questions following the film. Among other interesting items he mentioned was the fact that any persons residing in areas outside of Washington County (such as those in Fond du Lac, Dodge County, etc.) and giving blood at a center in Washington County, will not receive "free blood credit" with the Milwaukee Blood

Center. These persons should donate blood at centers within their own counties, and receive such "free blood credit" then through the Red Cross. It was obvious that a lot of people at the meeting were not aware of this.

As our second part of the program, we had the pleasure of hearing the Kewaskum Park Development Committee members, Dan Schmidt, Dave Nigh and Bob Danielson, who did an excellent job of relating how the new Kiwanis Park was developing. Each member and guest was the recipient of a detailed map of the park, as it should look in its final stages, along with a description of its origination, development, tax basis, and projected costs of operating. Many of the failures we ascribe to contemporary education are, in fact, failures of our society as a whole. A society that is indifferent to its

A society that slurs over fundamental principles and takes refuge in the superficial and the short-lived, cannot demand that its schools instruct in abiding moral values. A society proudly preoccupied with its own material accomplishments and well-being cannot fairly expect its schools to teach that the snug warmth of security is less meaningful than the bracing adventure of freedom. In all this, to reform our schools is first to reform ourselves!

There is no better place to start caring, to recommit ourselves to making America's schools better, than in our community's schools. Citizens who visit their schools develop a better understanding of what is being taught and how it is being taught than do those who obtain their information secondhand. The Kewaskum Junior Women's Club urges all citizens to observe American Education Week during Open House on Nov. 8 and 9 in all Kewaskum District Schools.

State's No. 1 Team, Hartland's Champs, Roll Over Indians, 35-6

Hartland Arrowhead, a team that hardly needs charity, got a lot of it anyway Wednesday night as it ripped Kewaskum, 35-6, in the Scenic Moraine Conference finale here. The Indians wound up second last with a 1-6 record, for one of their worst seasons. Their overall mark was 4-6. After winning their first four games handily, Kewaskum lost its last six.

The Indians didn't do too badly against Hartland, considering they were playing the top rated Class A school in the state in the WIAA ratings. Arrowhead has held the No. 1 spot practically all season. Hartland is 9-0 overall and 7-0 in conference and is the only team to beat Hartford's undefeated Little Ten champions in a pre-season game by two touchdowns, knocking them out of the WIAA grid playoffs. Hartland will face Menomonee Falls East in the first round of the WIAA playoffs at Oconomowoc this Friday evening.

Hartland scored all of its points against Kewaskum in the first half. The Indians held them scoreless in the second half, while putting six points on the board themselves. Very few, if any, opponents have held Arrowhead scoreless for a full half of play this season.

The state's top team turned three interceptions and a fumble into touchdowns in the first half. Take away the second quarter, in which the Warhawks scored 28 points, and it would have been a close game.

The Indians started good, stopping Hartland on their first two offensive series and forced them to punt. Kewaskum then got three first downs and moved to the Warhawk 30. The Indians went to a spread formation because of injuries to their top halfbacks and seemed to confuse Arrowhead. But then after a bad pitch out cost 15 yards, linebacker Bob Dewey intercepted a pass and the Warhawks took over. Five plays later Dean Olson burst through the middle for a 31 yard touchdown.

After a short punt, Hartland scored its first of four TD's in the second period in six plays, with Steve Hollenbeck going over from the 3. An interception returned to the 2 yard line set up Olson's second TD. He gained 124 yards in 18 attempts and 1,015 for the season. A fumble recovery was responsible for a third touchdown by Randy Dibb and Dibb's pass to Rick Schramek on the last play of the half scored another. Schramek, one of the best high school kickers in the state, made good on all five conversions right through the middle.

Hartland substituted freely in the second half. The Indians kept plugging away and once they drove from their own 6 to the Warhawks' 25 before fumbling. Then in the closing minutes they drove 50 yards to their only score by Jim Donath from one yard out. Soph Mike Schaub led

Kewaskum with 51 yards in 7 carries. Paul Brenholt had four catches for 42 yards. Gary Gavin and Mike Perkins had fine defensive efforts.

In other final games Grafton claimed second place by whumping Slinger, 34-0, third place Germantown edged Kettle Moraine, 18-16, and Mayville topped winless Pewaukee, 28-6.
