Rural Cascade Man Killed in Area Collision

A rural Cascade man became Washington County's first traffic fatality of 1977 following a two-car collision at State 144 and 84, Boltonville, early Saturday morning, Jan. 1.

John R. Mugan, 61, of R. 1, Cascade, died of internal injuries shortly after arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

Mugan's car struck a car driven by Larry L. Landvatter, 28, of 1339 Kewaskum St., Kewaskum. Landvatter told authorities he was going west on 84 and proceeded through the intersection with 144 after stopping at the stop sign and looking both ways. The Mugan car, which had been northbound, struck the Landvatter vehicle on the left side.

Landvatter received bumps and bruises. His wife Donna, 26, sustained cuts to the head and leg.

The injured were taken to the hospital by the Kewaskum rescue squad.

Regal Ups Park Gift for Ball Diamonds

Board Ratifies Wage and Salary Schedule for Village Employees

The Kewaskum Village Board ratified the 1977 wage and salary adjustment schedule for village employees at their meeting Monday evening. Salary for Chief of Police is \$1,205 per month, Superintendent of Waste Water Treatment \$1,160 per month, Superintendent of Public Works \$1,243 per month, Village Commissioner \$1,166 per month, Librarians \$2.70 and \$2.65 per hour, Part Time Mechanic \$3.25 per hour. The village crew's salaries range from \$5.14 per hour for man in second year of job to highest of \$5.50 per hour. This resulted in a .35 per hour increase from 1976. Part time police are paid at \$3.50 per hour and Civil Defense Chief is \$75 per year. School crossing guards are at \$9 and \$11 per day.

A letter was received from Ronald Reigle, Executive Vice President of Regal Ware stating that Regal Ware has determined to pay the cost of two ball diamonds in the new park, totalling \$27,732. The money has already been appropriated by the Board of Directors, consisting of L. N. Peterson, Chairman of Board; James Reigle, President and Chief Executive Officer; N. W. Sengpiel, Edna Oster, Honorable Milton Meister, Richard V. Reigle and Ronald O. Reigle. Reigle also stated that when the money is needed he should be notified and it will be available. Regals donation of the two ball diamonds results in an additional \$2,732 from the original \$25,000 donation.

A public hearing was held prior to the regular meeting on the application of William Kulas for a tavern license. No objections were heard at the meeting so the application was granted at the regular meeting. Mr. and Mrs. Kulas have purchased the Glacier Inn, assumed ownership on January 3, and opened for business starting January 4, Monday thru Saturday from 3:30 p. m. with dinners being served from 5:00 to 10 p. m. They will be closed on Sundays.

Charles Miller told the board that the plans needed for grants for the park had been personally delivered to Tom Blotz's office. A follow-up call will be made to make sure he has seen them.

August Bilgo, Superintendent of Public Works, was given the authority to purchase a new recording clock for pump house no. 1. He has priced several and the best price was \$700.

Robert Danielsen reported that the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club will be buying one new decorative deer to be placed at the "Entrance to Kewaskum" sign on Hwy. 45 south and will repaint existing deer.

Dan Schmidt reported that nine work orders were ready from Arthur & Arthur to prepare plans and specifications for the park. These would be for tennis courts and softball diamonds to give grade specifications. Charles Miller was given authorization to sign any work orders that are submitted so they can get back to Arthur without delay.

An interview with the two applicants for the position of building inspector will be held before the next regularly scheduled meeting on January 17. Tom Larson, Recreation Director, will be invited to that meeting also to discuss the recreation program.

Replacing of Highway 45 Bridge Approved

The State Department of Transportation's Division of Highways has received approval from the Federal Highway Administration of proposed replacement of the Milwaukee River bridge on U.S. Hwy. 45 north of Kewaskum on Fond du Lac County.

The approval is of the location and design aspects of replacing a sub-standard bridge located about 2.5 miles north of the Fond du Lac - Washington county line. The project would replace the existing bridge on the same location, with minor construction of approach roadways.

The division said approval was requested and granted following analysis of the social, environmental and economic effects of the project.

Interested people are invited to see maps, sketches and other information submitted in support of the request at the district office, 310 South West Ave., Waukesha.

The division said present plans call for the project to be constructed in the spring of 1977. The highway will be closed to traffic during construction.

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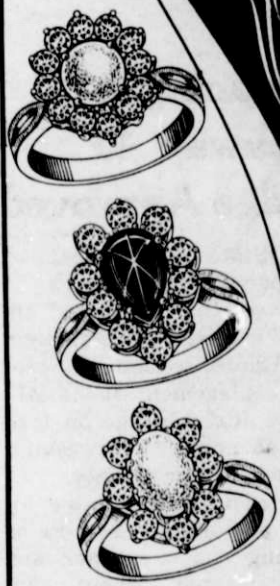

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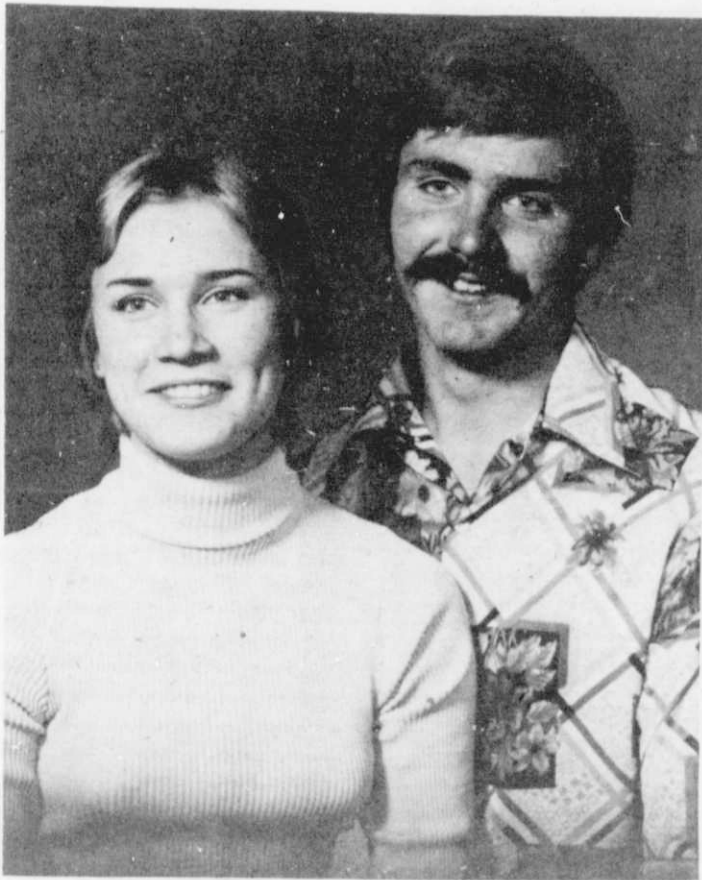
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Boegel - Flood

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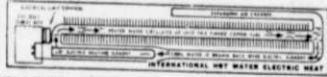

IRS offers tax help

Free assistance for taxpayers in preparing their 1976 tax returns is available in various formats from the Internal Revenue Service.

Knowing where to find assistance is particularly important this year, because of the changes in the tax law for tax year 1976 in such areas as child care expenses, income received during retirement, disability pay, and business use of a home, to name a few.

The IRS also provides help over the telephone for tax-

payers who cannot find answers to questions in their tax packages. Toll-free telephone numbers for IRS offices are listed in the packages. The best times to call are between 8:00 and 10:00 in the morning and 2:00 and 4:30 in the afternoon, when the lines are least busy. To help insure that the employees are providing quality service, the IRS periodically monitors its taxpayers assistance telephone lines.

Taxpayers who still have difficulty with their return after checking the instructions and calling the IRS, can visit the IRS office for free assistance. The Milwaukee office is at 517 East Wisconsin Avenue, Room 101.

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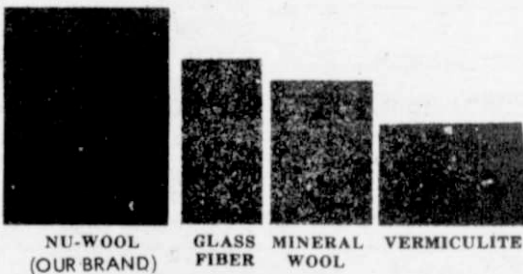

Delinquency, Juvenile Justice to be Topic at Women Voters Meeting

Kathy, 16, is found wandering the streets at 4 a.m. by the police. She is detained, and her parents are notified. Their response is, "Officer, we can't do a thing with that girl, we've had it. You do something about the problem. Keep her there." What should society do about Kathy? Is she a delinquent? And, what is the extent of delinquent behavior in our society?

An indication that delinquency is vastly more extensive than that which comes to the attention of authorities is the "hidden delinquency" revealed in self-reports of random samples of teenagers, says a release from the League of Women Voters of Washington County.

In a California study, 2,617 junior and high school students reported 23,214 delinquent acts over a six-year period, or 9.63 infractions per subject. Police reports for the period indicated that only about five per cent of these offenders were apprehended. In a similar study in Michigan, only about three per cent of the teenagers reporting delinquent acts were apprehended.

Further, whatever one concludes about the actual extent of juvenile crime - it is unquestionably true that children commit a great number of serious offenses and that they account for an extremely high proportion of arrests for certain kinds of offenses. According to 1974 statistics, 48 per cent of all apprehensions and arrests in Wisconsin were of juveniles 18 or under. (Children 0-18 account for 36 per cent of the population, and about half of these are under 10.)

Of the more serious crimes, juveniles constitute seven per cent of the "arrests" for murder, 16 per cent of the "arrests" for forcible rape, 41 per cent of those for robbery, 22 per cent of those for aggravated assault, 66 per cent of those for burglary, 64 per cent of those for theft and 77 per cent of those for motor vehicle theft.

Other crimes in which juveniles were the majority of those "arrested" were vandalism (84 per cent), arson (70 per cent), stolen property (56 per cent), and liquor law violations (76 per cent). Juveniles were also "arrested" in high proportions for other offenses such as weapons violation, disorderly conduct and controlled substances.

The subject of delinquency and juvenile justice will be the topic under discussion at the Tuesday, Jan. 11 meeting of the League of Women Voters - Washington County. At this meeting, beginning at 7 p.m. at the Marine Bank, West Bend, members of league will be concluding a two year, statewide study of the subject with the consensus process.

The consensus process implements the development of a unified position on issues targeted and studied by league members as being areas of concern.

To aid in reaching consensus on the subject of "juvenile justice" members will review the results of their two-year study, a publication entitled: "In the interest of..." Juvenile Justice in Wisconsin."

Statistics from the publication indicate that 23 per cent of the boys and 70 per cent of the girls in state correctional programs have been committed for status offenses.

One of the most critical issues today is whether "status offenses" - so termed because they are not crimes for adults (curfew, truancy, drinking) - should be removed from the jurisdiction of the court.

The conflicting claims of parent's rights to control their children versus children's rights to certain kinds of care and the power of the state to intervene in behalf of the latter, present some of the most difficult philosophical issues to resolve. The original concept of the court provided the opportunity for intervention, but according to critics, fell short in speci-

fying what care or treatment must be provided. Members will consider this information.

A second facet of the issue to come under discussion will be the subject of "Due Process" as it is applied to juvenile court. A major question under discussion presently is how far the juvenile court should go in adopting criminal court procedures, in both the adjudicatory and dispositional phases of proceedings.

Many persons believe that neither the juvenile court nor the adult criminal system are adequate to cope with the problems of the young offender and that this group should be accorded special treatment.

A current proposal for a new juvenile court which is designed to guarantee both the full constitutional rights accorded the adult and the extra protections and benefits that society owes those who are vulnerable and incapable of providing for themselves, is further explained in the league publication members will be using.

The entire outline of material to be covered in the league consensus is as follows: General principles - the adult vs. the juvenile

system; The Courts - jurisdiction and procedure; Treatment - diversion and alternatives of disposition; Administration and Evaluation, and Prevention - specific programs.

Interested persons are welcome to attend the meeting and observe the discussion and consensus process. Additionally, any person wishing a copy of the league study, "In the interest of..." Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.

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Winless Indians Stun Previously Undefeated Campbellsport, 78-61

The Kewaskum Indians, who had not won a game this season, and were 0-6 going into the contest, surprised high riding, previously unbeaten Campbellsport, leaders of the Flyway Conference with an overall 7-0 record, by a 78-61 margin on the Cougars' floor Tuesday night.

The win knocked the Cougars from the unbeaten ranks and the 78 points were 17 more than the Indians have scored in any game this year.

Kewaskum started out badly and it appeared the Cougars were going to run away from them, scoring the first 10 points. Finally Mark Tessar hit on a long shot but Campbellsport stayed well ahead until late in the period. Then a five-point play on two free throws by Tessar, another free throw by Mark on a technical, and a basket by Dale Poling after inbounding the ball, narrowed the margin to one point, 14-13. It was 19-18 at the quarter.

It was a different story in the second quarter, as the Cougars got into foul trouble and the Indians outscored them, 29-14, to take a commanding 47-33 halftime lead. After missing his first five shots, Leon Laatsch came up with 19 points in the second quarter. With Dan Gellings and Jerry Mueller on the bench with three fouls, Laatsch was able to go to the basket at will. He made seven baskets and five free throws and the rest of the team added 10 points.

The Cougars came back to dwindle the margin to seven points late in the third quarter, in which they outscored Kewaskum, 18-11. Then Laatsch and Tessar took over again and moved the Indians way out in front once more as they outpointed Campbellsport in the final quarter, 20-10.

Laatsch, the only starter back from last year's Scenic Moraine championship team, wound up with a game high 31 points, 17 rebounds and one blocked shot. Junior Mark Tessar was next best with 22 points. Kewaskum also got some improved guard play from Poling, Jim Donath and Kevin Darmody. Gellings, with 18 points, and Mueller, with 14, led the Cougars.

In some other games Tuesday Scenic Moraine teams won two out of three over Little Ten Conference schools. Slinger beat Hartford, 55-46, Hartland edged West Bend West, 64-63, but Grafton lost to West Bend East, 51-47.

The Indians resume Scenic Moraine action at Mayville Friday night. The Cardinals are 1-3 and Kewaskum 0-4 in conference.

DNR Code Spells Safe Snowmobiling

The Department of Natural Resources offers this list of 11 rules to promote safe snowmobiling this winter:

1. Be sure your snowmobile is in topnotch mechanical condition at the beginning of the winter season and throughout the months of use.
2. Familiarize yourself with the snowmobile you are driving by reading in detail the manual accompanying the snowmobile.
3. Wear sensible, protective clothing designed for snowmobiling.
4. Use a full size helmet, goggles, or visor to prevent injuries from twigs, stones, ice chips and flying debris.
5. Avoid wearing long scarves. They may get caught in moving parts of the snowmobile.
6. Know the terrain you are going to ride. If unfamiliar to you, ask someone who has traveled over it before.
7. Know the weather forecast and especially the ice and snow conditions in the area.
8. Always use the buddy system. Never ride off alone or unaccompanied.
9. Do not pursue domestic or wild animals. No true sportsman would stoop to such conduct. If you see a violation of this rule report it to the nearest law enforcement officer.
10. If you snowmobile at night, be sure you have a proper operating lighting system on the snowmobile.
11. Drowning is one of the major causes of snowmobile fatalities. When not familiar with the thickness of the ice or water currents, avoid these areas.

Tabloids will be distributed at spring sport shows, state tourist information centers and local chambers of commerce and businesses. Tourists interest in the guide is strong, as shown by last spring's supply of guides at three information centers being snapped up in less than three weeks.

"Another means of reaching potential tourists is at sport shows," states Joe Waters, Vice-President of the RRC. "Instead of trying to reach the public via mass media, those people seriously interested in vacationing come directly to you. Personal contact and an inviting brochure are two of the best ways to interest people in what Washington County has

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to offer."

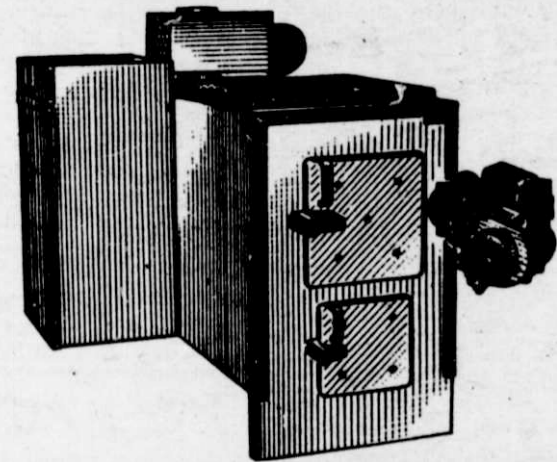
