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A letter from Scot Cullen of the Water & Sewer Bureau of the Public Service Commission was received by Charles Miller, Village President. Cullen used a 5.75% rate of return on an estimated rate base of \$96,939. It was noted that the overall increase is \$21,298, of which \$17,344 will be from general service customers and \$3,954 from public fire-protection charge.

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Miller stated that this is only the second time in history of the water utility that there has been a raise, the first coming to regulate residence and business rates.

Village Clerk, William Martin, stated the last adjustment was in 1947.

A hearing will be held on March 1 regarding Kewaskum's request for a rate increase and whether permission from the Public Service Commission will be granted.

## Indian Uprising

# Kewaskum Wins Over Pewaukee, Grafton for First Scenic Victories

After losing their first six games in the Scenic Conference, the Kewaskum Indians finally hit the victory path with two big wins over the weekend. The double wins lifted them out of a tie for last place and left winless Pewaukee there all by its lonesome. Kewaskum is now 2-6.

On Friday at Pewaukee, despite playing without their second highest scorer, Mark Tessar, who was out with an elbow injury, the Indians squeezed out a 59-58 victory. Then on Saturday night to start off the second half of the season, Kewaskum came through with a surprisingly easy win over a pretty good Grafton team, 75-58.

In spite of their lowly positions, Kewaskum and Pewaukee have the two top scorers in the conference. The Indians' Leon Laatsch, top scorer, was pitted against George Peterburs, second best in the conference. The two put on quite a display with Peterburs coming out best. He scored 30 points, over half of his team's total, with Laatsch close behind with 27, 14 of them in the last quarter.

The Indians pulled the game out in the last quarter. Trailing at the end of the third period, 38-36, they fell behind 48-40 with about six minutes left. Led by Laatsch, Kewaskum closed the gap and it was Leon who scored the go ahead basket with about 3½ minutes left. The Indians went ahead by seven points but Pewaukee made three straight baskets to come within one point. Then time ran out for the Pirates.

Kevin Darmody contributed 12 points and Jim Donath 9 for the Indians. Kewaskum made good on 19 free throws to Pewaukee's 10 and this saved them. Besides his 27 points, Laatsch had a 17-rebound effort. Roger Rezel also did well in rebounding. Darmody and Donath also played good floor games.

Once the Indians got a taste of victory, there was no stopping them on Saturday night when they stunned Grafton, which was tied for first place earlier in the season, 75-58. Kewaskum's defense and quickness helped give them a surprisingly easy victory. The Indians were ahead by about 20 points most of the way and led by 24 at the end of the third quarter, 60-36.

Laatsch, Tessar, playing with an infected elbow, and Donath got the Indians off to a fast start. Laatsch scored eight and Donath six in the first period. Donath's came on easy layups after steals. By the end of the quarter it was 24-11 and by halftime 42-22. Grafton just couldn't get going and had four starters in foul trouble by the intermission.

Laatsch had another great game with 25 points, about his average, and 13 rebounds. He missed only six shots the whole game. Donath and Tes-

sar were next with 17. Donath also added 9 of 10 free throws for a new high point total for him. Scott Fitzgerald paced the Blackhawks with 12.

The loss was Grafton's 4th in a row after winning the first four.

In other games Friday Slinger defeated Grafton, 57-48. Mayville edged Germantown, 71-68, and Hartland won over Kettle Moraine, 66-54. In other Saturday contests Slinger took over the undisputed lead by downing Hartland, which was tied with the Owls, 74-64. Germantown swamped Kettle, 70-42, and Mayville won again over Pewaukee, 72-62.

The Kewaskum varsity girls also won their game from Grafton Saturday.

On Friday the Indians travel to Hartland, which is 6-2 and in second place

and agriculture will continue as they were last year. A question was raised about expanding the program, but the board indicated there had been no requests by citizens to them to begin the program again.

An aide was approved for the elementary school class for emotionally disturbed children. The request and approval were prompted by the enrolling of a new student who requires nearly one-to-one attention.

In other business, the board approved repairing a scrubber at a cost of about \$1,000, and then adjourned to closed session for a staff evaluation by the building principals.



## Nickels, Pamperins Presented Kiwanis Conservation Awards

Mr. and Mrs. Roland Nickel and Arthur and Lloyd Pamperin were presented with the "Outstanding Conservation Farming Award" by the Kewaskum Kiwanis at their banquet held on Dec. 27 in Kewaskum.

This award is presented each year by the Kiwanis to area farmers who practice soil and water conservation on their land. Both the Nickels and Pamperins are cooperators with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The Nickels have been operators since 1961. Since then they have been very active applying conservation practices on their 176 acre farm located three miles north of Nenno. They have installed 1850' of grass waterways and 3300' of diversion terraces since 1975. Practices such as these will protect the lowlands from sediment runoff. Fifty-two acres of strip cropping, a conservation cropping system, and minimum tillage have been fol-

lowed on some fields to keep soil erosion to a minimum.

Arthur Pamperin has been a cooperator for ten years. His son Lloyd has joined his father in their operation located south of Kohlsville. They have established sixty-two acres of contour strip-cropping. The strips are laid out in alternate sections of crops and grasses. This practice will hold the water on the slopes, thus greatly reducing runoff. 500' of diversion and 1050' of grass waterway have been constructed on the Pamperin farm since 1975.

Practices such as strip-cropping, grass waterways and diversions not only benefit man by reducing sediment runoff, but will create many new areas where wildlife can thrive.

These two co-winners of the "Conservation Farming Award" are prime examples of how good farming and conservation can work together.



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

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. ### DNR Schedules Meetings to Receive Comment on Ice Age Reserve

The Department of Natural Resources has scheduled three public informational meetings to receive public comment on the Preliminary Environmental Report (PER) and plans for the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve.

The meetings are scheduled to begin at 8 p. m. on the following dates and locations: Feb. 8, at the Campbellsport High School; Feb. 16, at the

Chippewa Falls High School, and Feb. 21, at the University of Wisconsin Center - Baraboo theater.


The PER, released on Jan. 13, outlines the existing environment of, and plans for, the Reserve and assesses the major impacts of the proposal.

The Ice Age reserve is a joint National Park Service and State of Wisconsin ven-

ture encompassing some 39,000 acres in nine separate units across the state. The purpose of the reserve is to preserve, protect and interpret the nationally significant glacial features found in Wisconsin.

The nine units include: the 25-acre Two Creeks unit near the Town of Two Creeks; the 80-acre Sheboygan Marsh and the 20,340-

acre Kettle Moraine Unit near Sheboygan; the 3,695 Campbellsport Drumlins unit near Campbellsport; the 160-acre Cross Plains unit near Cross Plains; the 9,810 Devil's Lake State Park unit; the 875-acre Mill Bluff State Park unit near Camp Douglas; the 4,000-acre Chippewa Moraine unit near Bloomer; and the Interstate Park Unit near St. Croix Falls.



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


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
