Stoffels Attend Grandson's Ordination



Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Stoffel of Kewaskum were in Cincinnati, Ohio, (suburban Green Hills) on May 7 when their grandson, James Nicholas DuPont, was ordained a priest in the Glenmary Home Missioners.

Father Jim, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert (Dolores Mae) DuPont of Greenfield, Wisconsin, is the fifth of 38 Stoffel grandchildren. His mother

is the oldest of their four children and they also great-grandparents of eight.

Mr. Stoffel, 85, and his wife Dela, 88, drove 400 miles to attend the ordination.

Two of Mr. Stoffel's brothers were ordained to the priesthood. Father Clarence Stoffel, ordained in 1927, is now retired and lives near Madison, Wisconsin. The other brother, Father Roman Stoffel, was ordained in 1920 and died in 1973. A chalice which was presented to Father Roman by his parents (Father Jim DuPont's great-grandparents) was passed on to Father Jim in the ceremonies on May 7. The chalice was consecrated by Bishop Andrew McDonald of Little Rock, who presided at the ordination in Our Lady of the Rosary Church, Green Hills, Ohio.

Father DuPont has been assigned to the Glenmary four-county mission based in Winfield, Alabama.

Glenmary Home Missioners, founded in 1939 to establish the Catholic Church in rural America, now ministers in 88 counties of 12

states of Appalachia and the South.

Community Has Tornado Scare

Dark, threatening skies and tornado warnings for Washington County on radio and television stations sent many area residents scurrying for shelter last Wednesday night. The storm missed this area, however, and went around to the south. An "all clear" was received about 9:15 p. m.

There were unconfirmed reports of tornadoes south of Kewaskum and there was another report of a tornado in the Sunburst area near Kewaskum, heading toward the village. Seconds later the Kewaskum fire sirens sounded a tornado warning, sending many local residents to their basements and other shelters. Others hearing the reports watched from their yards and two additional unconfirmed reports by village residents of seeing funnel clouds were reported.

County Civil Defense Director Sherman Carr said winds were very high, between 80 and 100 miles an hour in some spots, causing damage. West Bend and Allenton fire fighters were called to homes where lightning had apparently hit.
