\$20,000 Added to \$3 Million School Budget

Approximately 50 people attended the one hour, 18 minute Kewaskum School District annual meeting Monday evening.

The resolutions were all passed with the exception of Resolution No. 9 which a member of the audience, Warren Schmidt, proposed to amend.

The original resolution called for a total of \$1,556,696 for operating expenses and capital outlay for the fiscal year of 1977-78 and a debt retirement of \$310,463.

Schmidt proposed adding \$20,000 to the budget for additional staff at the central administrative offices. He stated he had been following the school board meetings closely and felt with a 3 million dollar operation, there was too much work for one man. He stated "he needs help." Schmidt also stated that he did not think it would affect the mill rate or raise anyone's taxes.

Schmidt further stated that you have to give the man the tools to do the job.

The amendment was passed on a 29-7 vote. Attorney Gerald Kiefer stated that the people have the power to approve or disapprove a budget but do not have the power to tell the board how to spend the money.

No vote was taken on either the WIAA insurance or re-surfacing the high school track. The board will consider the track issue over the

next couple of years due to the cost of approximately \$40-50,000.

A meeting of the school board has been called for July 27 at 8 p. m. at the administrative offices.

Remaining Park Bids Rejected By Village Board

At a special meeting held July 20, the Kewaskum Village Board rejected all bids it received on the general construction and plumbing of the shelter house at the new park.

Village President Charles Miller informed the board that the bids had to be rejected "in order to rebid properly."

After checking with Village Attorney Gerald Kiefer, Miller was advised that in order to legally rebid, the board would have to reject the bids they already had.

James Arthur of Arthur & Associates and the board felt the bids for the general construction and plumbing had been high.

The two bids totaled almost \$96,000. The original estimate of the entire shelter house was \$54,000.

Neither of the two items are fundable, so the bidding will not hold up the projects.

The new bids will be opened Aug. 15.

Fair Book Dedicated to Roy Esser

Each year since 1956, the Washington County Junior Fair Premium Book has been dedicated to some person or persons for their outstanding service of contribution to working with youth through the Washington County Fair.

Maurice Hovland became secretary of the Washington County Junior Fair in 1956, when the premium book was

published. That year, Maurice, with the fair committee decided to dedicate the fair book each year. The first dedication was in memory of Earl Skaliskey, former Kewaskum High School principal, who was the agricultural agent and fair secretary for Washington County from 1936 until the time of his death, a time spent by him in outstanding service to his fellowmen, farmers, and urban dwellers.

This year, the fair book has been dedicated to Roy Esser, an enthusiastic support-

er of the Washington County Junior Fair since he has been teaching vo-ag at Kewaskum High School in 1960. He has served as superintendent of the livestock department and given of himself far beyond the call of duty. In most recent years, Roy has initiated, organized and chaired the Meat-Animal Sale Committee. Roy has aspired to incorporate the educational aspect into the sales program. His actions have always been preceded by one thought or idea, "What is the best for the young people?"

Girl Critically Hurt in Accident

A rural Campbellsport girl, 16, was in critical condition early Friday at Milwaukee County General Hospital, and a Campbellsport boy, 17, was in stable condition at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, following a car-motorcycle accident on Hwy. V several miles north of Kewaskum in the Town of Auburn Thursday afternoon.

Kathleen A. Betley, Elmore Drive, Campbellsport, a passenger on the motorcycle, was listed in critical condition Friday with multiple injuries including a severed left leg.

She and Terrance L. Wentz, 107 Fond du Lac Ave., Campbellsport, were taken to St. Agnes Hospital after the motorcycle they were riding collided with a car driven by Dawn J. Mixdorf, 143 Main St., Eden.

Terrance was reported in stable condition in the intensive care unit at St. Agnes Hospital after the accident. He suffered a broken leg in the mishap. Kathleen was transferred to County General from St. Agnes.

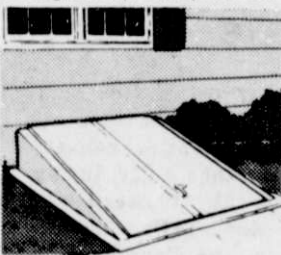

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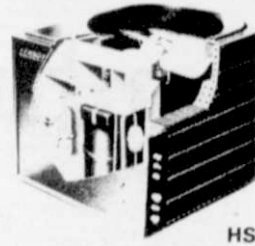

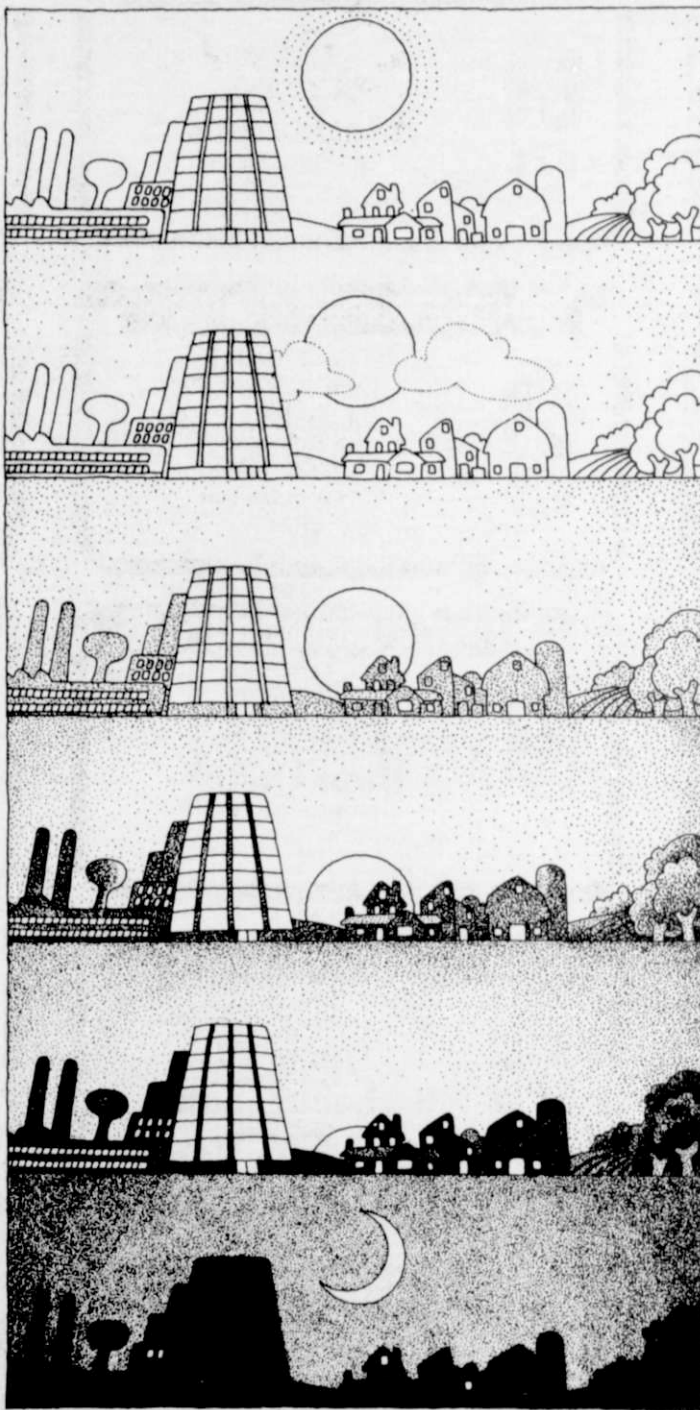

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

One correction was noted to the minutes of the June 20th meeting. The bids for the proposed park improvements will be acted upon at the July 18th meeting.

The updated Flood Plain Ordinance was scheduled for a public hearing on July 18th, 1977, at 7:30 P. M. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building upon motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Unanimous vote.

Upon the recommendation of Superintendent Bilgo and the Equipment Committee, the Village Board accepted the proposal of Honeck Chevrolet, option No. 6, for the furnishing of one (1) new 1978 truck chassis complete with a 20 cu. yd. Pak-Mor refuse packer box at the amended cost of \$19,942.66. Motion by Trustee G. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Daniel-

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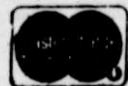

Art finished the round with a 41.

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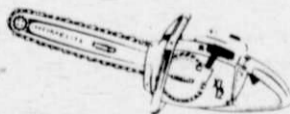

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On The Line...

One-To-One

By Gene Anderson



In a recent "Speaking One-to-One", I listed some of the advantages of reporting service or billing problems direct to the telephone company of Wisconsin. I also alluded to the delays and inconvenience which can stem from filing complaints with the State Public Service Commission.

In this column, it seems appropriate to carry the theme of complaint treatment just a bit further. According to Lewis T. Mittness, Executive Secretary of the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin, the central message should be that customers with complaints related to utility firms "have to proceed through rules".

What are the rules? First and foremost, when a telephone-related problem arises, you — the customer — should immediately report that problem to the Company. Reporting service maladies is a simple matter; merely dial the Repair Service number listed in the front of your directory and explain to the service representative the nature of the problem.

In their effort to pinpoint service abnormalities, the Company representative will ask a series of 'tracer' questions. The most complete answers to these questions will speed diagnosis of the problem, allowing the serviceman repairing your phone to be fully equipped to complete the job. Time obviously is saved when the first trip is the final trip.

Regarding billing discrepancies, merely notify the Company of the mistake by circling the call and accompanying data (amount, date, destination of call) on your monthly statement. State that the message was erroneously billed. While payment is expected for all calls you place or mistake, you will not be charged for that call, pending verification of the mistake. The Company is under State Public Service Commission guidelines requiring correction of telephone problems within a specified, reasonable period of time. Believe me, we make every effort to improve upon those guidelines, providing the highest quality telephone service possible.

Occasionally, however, a problem will persist and perhaps a second customer report is required. I have a suggestion: Call General Telephone's Customer Service Bureau. It is established for just such a situation and you will get a prompt response. We will handle the problem. To the finish. And right from the start.

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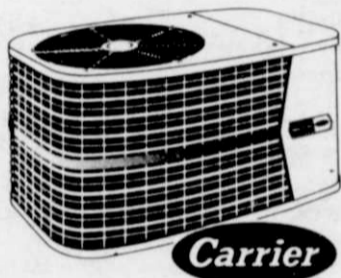

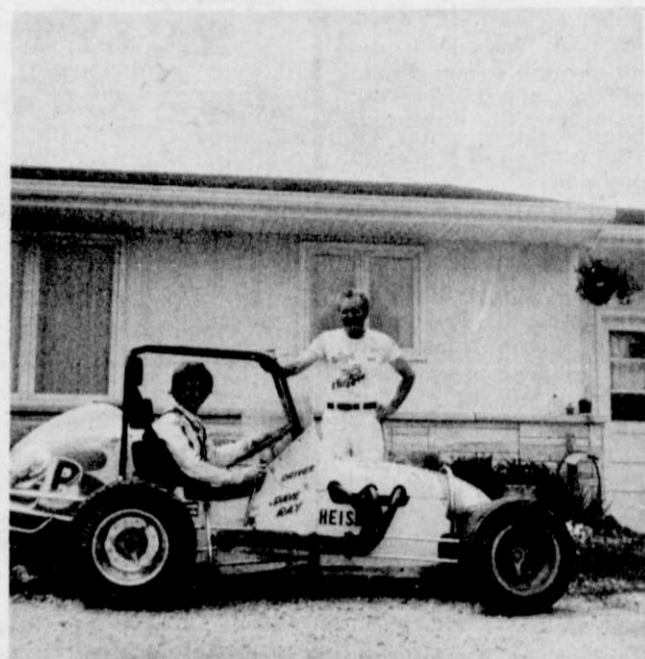
