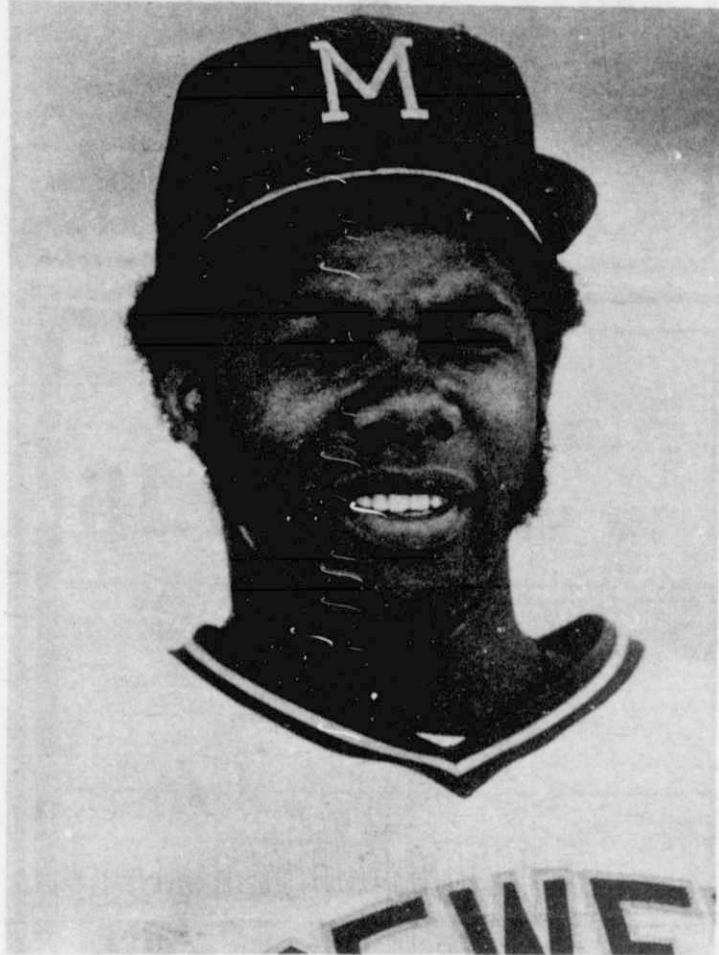

## Brewers' Cecil Cooper to Appear At Kewaskum's Baseball Night



Cecil Cooper, star Milwaukee Brewer first baseman, and Dick Hackett, Public Relations Director for the Brewers, will appear at Kewaskum's Baseball Night, sponsored by the Kewaskum Chamber of Commerce, on Monday, Feb. 13, at the Amerahn.

There will be a buffet dinner served at 6:30 p. m. The charge is \$3.25 per person and registration arrangements should be made at the Valley Bank by Feb. 1. Payment must be made at the time of registration.

The program, featuring Cooper and Hackett, is free and will begin at 7:15 p. m. They will be on hand to present a film and discuss the Brewer Baseball Club. Cooper will later autograph pictures for the youngsters.

Cecil Celester Cooper enjoyed his finest season in 1977, becoming the Brewers' first 300 hitter since George Scott (.306) and Davey May (.303) accomplished the feat in 1973. He not only led the team in hitting, but he also topped the club with 160

games played and 193 hits and ties for the team lead in runs (86) and triples (7). His 193 hits was a Brewer season record, surpassing the old record (189) set by Davey May in 1973. He needed one hit on the final day of the season to break the record and went out in style, going 4-for-4. He also set personal highs with games played, at bats, runs, hits, doubles (31), triples, homers (20) and RBIs. He spent three full seasons with Boston before joining the Brewers in the George Scott and Bernie Carbo trade in December of 1976. He hit .275, .311 and .282 with the Red Sox and upped his major league career percentage to .289. He led the league's designated hitters in 1975 with a .318 average. Born on December 20, 1949 in Brenham, Texas, Cecil and his wife, Octavia, are expecting their first child this winter. They are currently residing in Mequon during the off season, and Cecil is working for the Brewers in ticket sales and public relations.

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The body was cremated and interment was in Graceland Cemetery at Mayville.

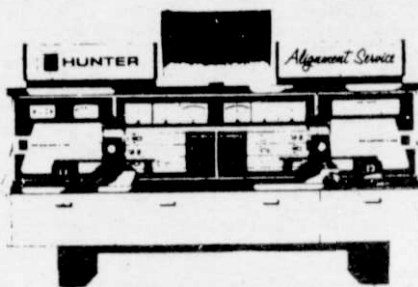
