Results of Study by Visiting DPI Team Presented to School Board

The results of a study completed by a visiting Department of Public Instruction team were presented to the school board Monday evening "as the final touches in assisting the Kewaskum School District in meeting local needs as well as fulfilling the state/federal statutes" in the area of special education.

While commending the district for taking care not to label children with learning problems or physical handicaps, the team strongly recommended care in identifying and implementing programs for those children with "exceptional educational needs." All school personnel who need to identify these children should have easy access to referral forms and communication with the existing Multi-Disciplinary Team already working in Kewaskum.

Other areas for consideration were: services for older children and adults in career evaluation, possible future charges of discrimination due to lack of special transportation and building equipment needed for handicapped persons' access, lack of more community inclusive in-service programs, and lack of a nursing service which alert

and educate parents to the (health care) needs of their children. A nursing program, however, should be established through joint efforts of the community, county, and parents and is not the sole responsibility of the local school district according to the D.P.I. Due to the amount of time necessary to the coordination of special services to those with physical, mental or emotional learning problems, the Division for Handicapped Children also urged that the board "consider the employment of a director of special education who would be reimbursed by the state at 70% of his salary" by the state. Although commended for his efforts, Richard Zarling, the present director, is unable to devote his full time to the area. A vacancy existing in the area of speech and language disorders should be filled as soon as possible, too, it was determined.

All findings of the division are public, and copies of the examining team's report are available through the superintendent, Floyd Brenholt.

The board stood firm on its present transportation policies, though Byron Gessner presented a motion for at-home pick-up for four families. (Continued on Page 2)

To Address County GOP Caucus

Fredric Seefeldt, Kewaskum Native, Prospective Sec. of State Candidate

A prospective Republican candidate for Wisconsin Secretary of State will address the annual caucus of the Washington County Republican Party on Monday, March 20. Fredric A. Seefeldt, Neenah, will meet with county Republicans at 8:00 p. m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, West Bend.

Seefeldt said that he is traveling the state visiting with Republicans to determine interest at the county level in his possible candidacy for the Republican nomination.

"The Wisconsin Constitution states that: 'The Secretary of State shall keep a fair record of the official acts of the legislature and executive departments of the state...' but in addition this important office provides many services to the small businesses that make up the main streets of our Wisconsin communities," said Seefeldt.

"I feel that my experience in our family business combined with my service as a

congressional aide would equip me to provide the service that the people of Wisconsin expect from their Secretary of State," commented Seefeldt.

Seefeldt, 39, is Secretary-Treasurer of A. H. Seefeldt, Inc., a family operated general insurance agency at Kewaskum. He has also been serving as Home Secretary to Sixth District Congressman William A. Steiger (R. Wis.) since June 1969.

A native of Wisconsin, Seefeldt was born in Washington County, and is a graduate of the Kewaskum Public Schools. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree with honors at Lakeland College, Sheboygan. He also holds a Master of Divinity degree from The Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

Seefeldt has been active in Republican Party activities since 1959 when he organized the first Republican club at Lakeland College. He has participated in the 1960, 1972 and 1976 Republican National Conventions.

lies most recently requesting winter relief for their children. Then John Tessar again stated that he would be willing to investigate further the possibility for changing certain situations when next year's routes are planned within the next two months.

Gail Filzen and Donna Johanson were granted leaves of absence after making personal appearances to answer questions from board members.

Clark Pearson was given permission to investigate the possibility of acquiring an intern teacher to assist in alleviating the heavy class schedule anticipated for next year's art classes. An intern could handle two classes each semester, according to Pearson, under the supervision of John Baitinger, the present art instructor at the high school.

The board also allowed Pearson to research the possibility of a half-time business education teacher which he felt might be available in the immediate community.

Pearson will supervise the replacement of the outer door of the girls' lavatory at the high school. Parent and visitor comments prompted a discussion of the subject, although girls' smoking in the lavatory, which prompted a removal of the door, is a problem still far from a solution.

Roy Esser and Clark Pearson promised stricter adherence to the rule of suspension for smoking. Charles Ogi said, "The board will go along with whatever is done as long as it's legal."

New choir robes — deep iridescent green with pale gold and white stoles — will

replace the high school choir members this spring if money can be found in the budget. The board tentatively approved the purchase pending Brenholt's research. The present robes being replaced are, according to Pearson, "fifteen to twenty years old."

Kewaskum Youth Hunger Fast

On the last weekend of February, fourteen 8th and 9th grade students of the Peace United Church of Christ gave up eating for 26 hours. They moved into the church with sleeping bags, music and enthusiasm for the event.

Their objectives were to know what it felt like to be really hungry, to make more people aware of the importance of the One Great Hour of Sharing appeal of the U. C. C. and to raise money to help the homeless, hungry, needy victims of disaster around the world.

Their efforts toward these objectives included distributing informational literature to each sponsor acquired before the fast, making banners for the sanctuary of the church portraying their version of Jesus' words concerning helping others, and bagging rice packets, with handwritten notes attached, to distribute to Sunday worshippers.

Dr. Monte Liebman Speaks to WCCL

"Schools," according to Dr. Monte Harris Liebman, psychiatric consultant and member of the board of directors of the Pregnancy Aftermath Helpline, "could play a big role in curbing the frequency of unplanned teenage pregnancies and abortions through courses emphasizing human biology and parenting roles." Dr. Liebman, speaking at the Wisconsin Citizens Concerned for Life meeting on March 9, also believes that "Good citizenship courses, incorporating the ideas of respect for life, individual responsibility, and the protection of human rights, would raise the consciousness of young people to see the need to respect human life at all stages of its cycle."

A large number of calls made to the Pregnancy Aftermath Helpline (1-445-2131) are from women in a crisis because of their depression and feelings of guilt they experience after having an abor-

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tion. One call was from a grandmother who is still suffering deep remorse 25 years after she had had her baby aborted.

Dr. Liebman emphasized that the mother is not the only one who suffers from having an abortion. It is a medical fact that the unborn child feels pain. He also cited incidences where staff workers in abortion clinics have left their position because of depression and guilt they feel in participating in killing the unborn.

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Husband Kewaskum Graduate Engeleiter Announces Candidacy



State Representative Susan Engeleiter (R-Brookfield) last week announced that she will be a candidate for the Ninth Congressional District seat presently held by Robert W. Kasten, Jr. Kasten announced last month that he will not run for a third term in Congress. He will seek the governorship in this fall's state wide election.

Representative Engeleiter made her announcement before a group of farm leaders from Ozaukee, Washington, Waukesha and Jefferson Counties. Family farmer and agri-business leaders representing the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation, Associated Milk Producers, Wisconsin Grange, Farmers Union Milk Marketing locals, Milwaukee Milk Producers, independent feedmill operators and various other related farm organizations were in attendance.

"I was one of Sue's first and most active supporters ever since she first decided to run," said Daniel Rodenkirch of Kewaskum, district director of the Associated Milk Producers (AMPI). "Sue Engeleiter's candidacy has been a topic of conversation at several of our recent board meetings. It is my opinion that Sue will have overwhelming support from AMPI members throughout the district. I know the other Republican candidates and I

feel she is the only one with a sincere interest in the problems facing farmers in particular and rural America in general."

Mrs. Engeleiter is presently serving her fourth year in the State Legislature representing the Town and City of Brookfield, Village of Elm Grove and a portion of the Village of Menomonee Falls. She was first elected to the Assembly in 1974 and acquired 43% of the vote in a seven-way Republican primary. Representative Engeleiter is a life-long resident of the Brookfield/Elm Grove area and graduated from the University of Wisconsin. Her husband, Jerry Engeleiter, grew up on a farm near Kohlsville, graduated from Kewaskum High School, and received degrees from Carroll College in Waukesha and the UW Law School. He is presently an attorney associated with the law firm of Quarles and Brady.

Indians Come Close to Upsetting Mayville in Tight Sectional Battle

The Kewaskum Indians, who were defeated quite decisively twice during the regular season by Mayville, battled the Cardinals all the way in a nip and tuck game Friday night before losing out in the WIAA Class B Sectional at UW-Whitewater. The Indians gave Mayville quite a scare as the two teams were still deadlocked at 45-45 with two minutes and 15 seconds to go, when the Cards spurted to a 53-45 victory.

The Mayville - Kewaskum tilt was the second game of the night. In the opener favored Elkhorn easily defeated Beloit Turner, 57-43, and advanced with Mayville to the Sectional finals Saturday night. In the championship game Saturday the Cardinals and Elkhorn battled in triple overtime before Elkhorn finally emerged the winner, 69-65. It was a heartbreaking loss for Mayville. As a result Elkhorn advanced to the State Tournament at Madison this weekend.

It should be remembered that Mayville, which has an 18-4 record and tied for second place in the Scenic Moraine, was a heavy favorite over Kewaskum, which has a 6-15 mark and finished second last in the conference. The Indians showed tremendous polish all through the tournaments and especially against Mayville. No doubt they could have made a respectable showing in the state meet. Even though they lacked size they gave Mayville fits with their 6-8 Dave Green, 6-3½ Brian Rindfleisch, 6-3 Terry Mueller and 6-1 Dave Mayer. Kewaskum's

poise and their patience against the Mayville zone was a sight to behold. They were impressive with their snappy passes and fine penetration.

The Indians outboarded the taller Cards, 29-23, with jumping jack Rezel grabbing 11. Westphal felt his team could win when they tied Mayville and even went ahead in the second half. But their height finally got to the Indians. Kewaskum rallied for 10 straight points to go ahead early in the fourth quarter, 41-39, after Tessar's jump shot. It was nip and tuck with the score tied at 45-45 with less than three minutes left when the Cards scored eight unanswered points to put it away.

Randy Zahn led Mayville with 13 points while Mayer contributed 12. The halftime score was 27-25 in favor of the Cardinals.

And so the season finally ends for the Indians, later than for the majority of the teams in the state.

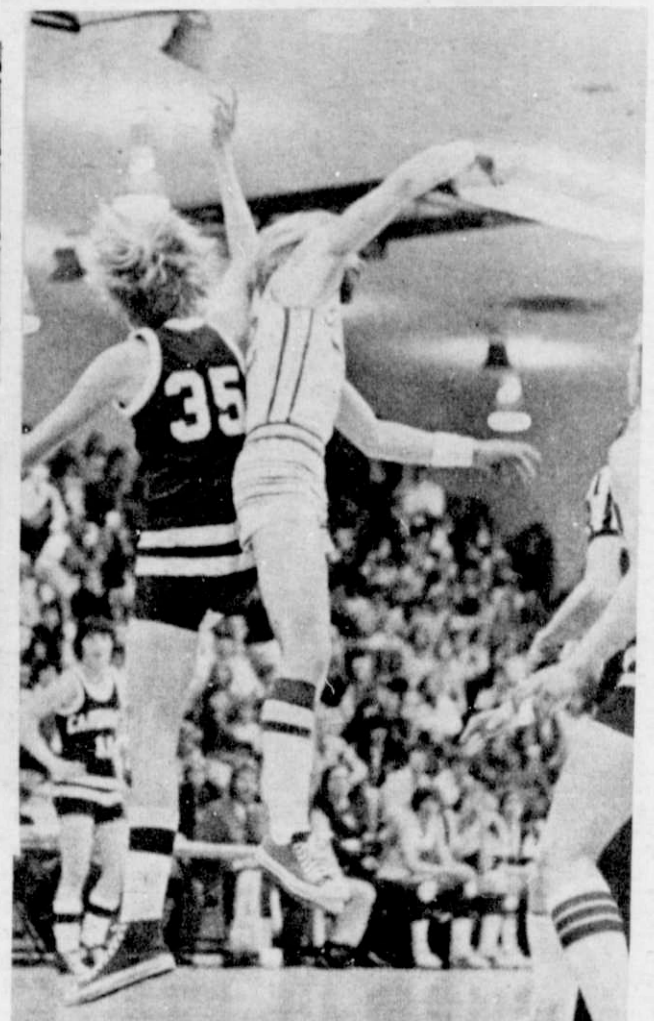
