Bids on Kewaskum Overhead Opened

Apparent low bids totaling \$10.6 million were opened April 18 in Madison by the State Department of Transportation. Involved are 27 highway improvement projects in 17 counties.

Action will be taken on all proposals following engineering and computer analysis within the Department of Transportation.

Projects in Washington County included construction of a 213-ft., 3-span, steel girder bridge (Kewaskum overhead) and approaches on USH 45; existing structure to be removed. \$597,008.55 was the apparent low bid by Lunda Construction Co., Black River Falls.

West Bend Youth Loses Life in Area Accident

One 19-year-old West Bend youth was killed and another injured in a one-car crash late Wednesday or early on Thursday on Salisbury Drive about 2½ miles southeast of Kewaskum.

George A. Eisenmann, 1905 Barton Ave., was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, with internal chest injuries. Terry L. Glamman, 1773 Mapledale, was reported to be in satisfactory condition at the hospital the next day.

The Sheriff's Department accident report said Glamman suffered a fractured thigh bone, abrasions and contusions.

Glamman was believed to have been the driver of the car and Eisenmann a passenger.

The mishap happened just south of CTH H in the Town of Kewaskum. According to the report, Glamman apparently failed to negotiate a curve and braked in an effort to stop. The car skidded 96 feet on the road, then went off the road, struck a tree and went down an embankment.

The exact time of the accident is unknown but it is believed to have occurred late Wednesday night and was not discovered until early the next morning. Schmidt's ambulance was called at 5:31 a. m.

Flip of Coin Finally Decides School Board Clerk Position

With a final decision made on the flip of a coin, the Kewaskum Board of Education has the same line-up of officers this year as last.

Charles Ogi and Byron Gessner were the only nominees for the positions of president and treasurer, respectively, and received unanimous votes. However, with tie votes for the position of clerk, James Oelhafen and Richard Theusch were left in a quandry until Floyd Brenholt contacted Atty. Aldwin Seefeldt to clarify the legal position on breaking a tie vote. "You call it, Rich; you're older," quipped Oelhafen, and the coin tossed by Ogi declared Oelhafen the winner. Gerald Secor, who was absent from the board meeting, would have made the seventh vote, and a tie would have been impossible

without an abstention.

Some additions to Kewaskum's staff were approved by the Board at Monday night's meeting. By a 5-0 vote the Board added another teacher for the educable mentally retarded program. This move makes possible an additional class so that the 17 children who are anticipated for this program may be divided according to their levels of readiness for 'mainstreaming' into regular classes such as art and physical education according to Richard Zarling.

Another kindergarten teacher has been approved due to an increase in children of that age in the district. Although not specifically stated whether or not this will be two half-time contracts or one whole contract due to the uncertainty of actual placement, the teacher's salary

can be counted upon for next year's budget. Oelhafen said that last year's decision to bus children from the Beechwood area to Farmington School for kindergarten classes was tempered with "at least a verbal" agreement to consider busing Farmington children to Beechwood this year to even out enrollments. Byron Gessner said he felt a class was needed at Beechwood this year because of the projected enrollment of 13 for that area. Farmington has 45 potential candidates for kindergarten in 1978. Wayne has 24, and Kewaskum could have 99 kindergarteners as of this date.

Richard Zarling said that if no one could be found for the position of Director of Special Education he would "try" to carry on in that capacity for one more year. Floyd Brenholt said that he wanted some definite position from the Board as to whether or not he should continue looking for someone to fill that position at least on a part-time basis. Brenholt said he was in the process of investigating the possibilities of sharing a director with a neighboring district. Theusch and Tessar strongly recommended he seek additional information regarding that kind of "partnership," and Brenholt said he would do some more exploring in that area.

Brenholt said that the position of Reading Specialist, "in the paper" as "70% state fundable" is "regularly aided," and he wished to clarify that point. In remarks made at the April 10 meeting of the school board Brenholt had stated that next year's budget would not be greatly affected by adding the specialist. "We could get (additional) staffing without a big shot to the le-

VARYING SHADES OF GREEN
There are a dozen green leafy vegetables on your grocery's produce shelves and most of them are a form of lettuce. There are actually hundreds of varieties of lettuce. However, the most common is iceberg or head lettuce.
The roots of the lettuce family go back 2500 years. Five hundred years before Christ, lettuce appeared on the tables of Persian kings. Its medical property as a food was noted by Hippocrates, the Father of Medicine. It was one of the first plants cultivated in the American colonies.
The nutritional composition of all the lettuces are similar in that they are low in calories, carbohydrate and protein. They contain no fat. However, they are a power pack of minerals and vitamins. They supply the body with iron, calcium, phosphorus, sodium and potassium. The green leaves are particularly high in vitamin A and vitamin C. They also contain some of all the B complex vitamins.
When preparing the lettuce for eating, be sure and use the outside dark green leaves. They are richer in nutrients than the inside pale leaves.
Try lettuce with a hot salad dressing. Heat a zesty Italian salad dressing until it bubbles. Pour over tossed lettuce pieces. Serve immediately. It's great!

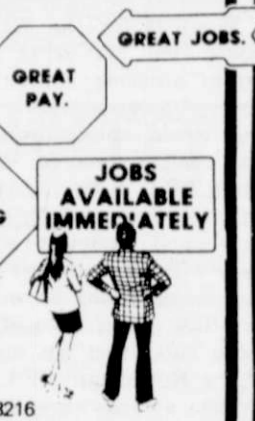
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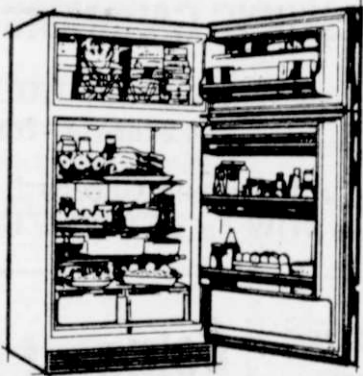
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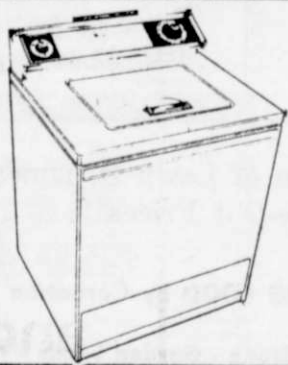
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State FFA Proficiency Award Winners

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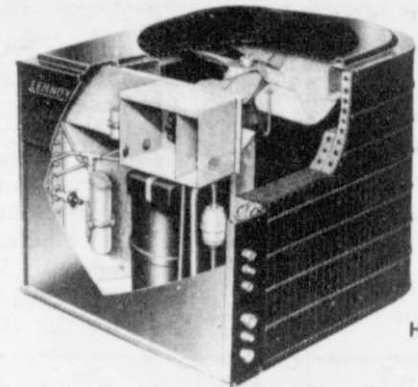
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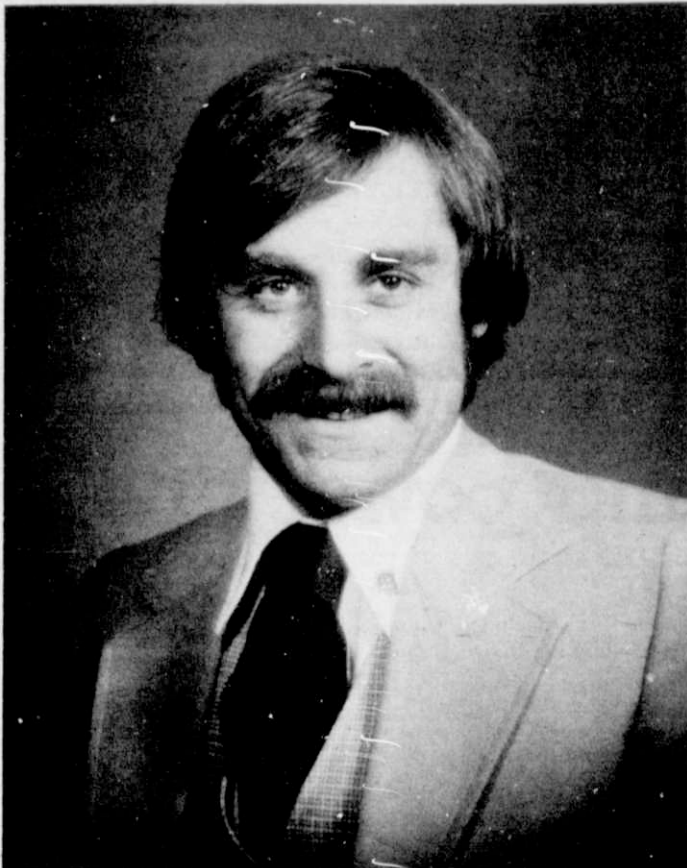

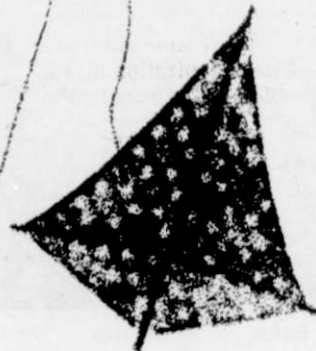
Play it safe around power lines.

Kite & model airplane fliers.

Kites and model airplanes can be flown in almost any field or open lot, so there's a special need to be watchful of power lines.

Kites, in particular, can pose a serious danger because of the great distances they travel. While there may be no power lines in the immediate area, there could be power lines between the kite flyer and where the kite might come down if the wind stopped.

Model airplanes can be especially dangerous because of the metal wires often used to fly them. If there are power lines in the area, stretch out your control wires on the ground to make sure your model is well away from the power lines. It's also wise to mark your position. Spinning around, you sometimes have a tendency to wander from your original spot.



Sailboaters.

Most sailors are aware of the danger their boat's mast presents in a lightning storm. But too often they forget about the danger of man-made electricity in power lines.

Don't automatically assume that a staging area is free of power lines. Look up before raising your mast or trailering your boat from a staging area to the boat ramp.

Even while you're on the water, watch for power lines. They often cross small bodies of water.

Sportsmen.

While most target shooters and hunters are conscientious and careful with their firearms, often a misdirected bullet will cut a power line or destroy an insulator. This kind of action is expensive and disruptive to the community and there are stiff penalties for persons caught shooting power equipment. But even more important, it can prove fatal to the shooter or some unsuspecting passer-by who might be hit by or unknowingly step on a downed line.

CB'ers.

If you're putting up an antenna on your home, look up first. Each year dozens of CB'ers are killed or seriously hurt because they didn't take the simple precaution of looking up to make sure they were clear of power lines. And don't forget to locate your antenna so that if it should fall, it will clear all electric lines. It's easy to play it safe if you just use common sense, plan ahead, choose your antenna location wisely and be certain to know and follow the F.C.C. legal requirements on antennas.

Gliders, balloonists & parachutists.

Airborne sports are becoming increasingly popular. Unfortunately, the number of enthusiasts coming in contact with power lines is also increasing. Next to the safety of your equipment, a clear landing area is an absolute necessity. Scout the area thoroughly, locate power lines and stay well away from them.



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Plan Talks on Solar Heat, Sludge

Tri-County Civic association will sponsor a talk on disposing of sewage sludge May 25 at the Fillmore Turner Hall. After a discussion at the home of Albert Schroeder, Tri-County president, about the problems of heavy metals in sludge and how they can be removed, the association decided a public meeting on the topic would be timely.

Preserving farmland and the problem of sewage disposal in new subdivisions were also mentioned at the Tri-County meeting. The Tri-County Civic Association is made up of members from Trenton and Farmington townships in Washington County, Fredonia and Saukville townships in Ozaukee County and Scott and Sherman townships in Sheboygan County. The organization meets four times a year to discuss problems common to the area.

The Washington County Environmental Council is a county wide organization; anyone in the county may belong. Dues are \$2 a year for a family. Topics discussed at the April meeting included a newsletter on Washington County parks to be sent to county organizations and individuals; the various recycling stations in the county; the problems of noise pollution, especially from motor bikes; preserving our floodplains; and the plan to remove the mill pond in Hartford on the Rubicon River. The council members opposed Hartford's plan to line the river with concrete, preferring a natural stream bank.

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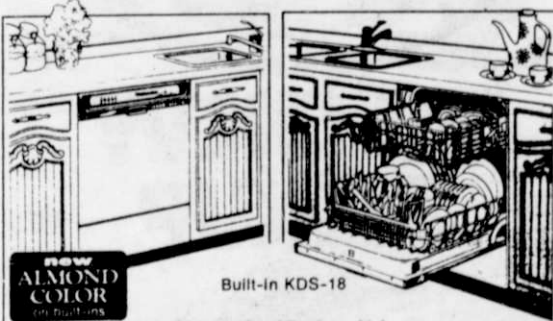

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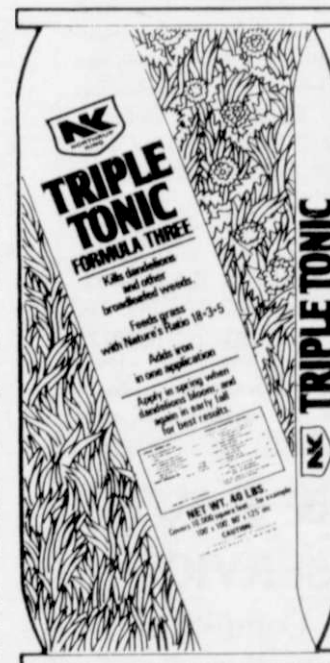
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Woman's Club to Hold Season's Final Meeting

Karyn points out that each year there is an encroachment on our natural heritage of a clean and healthy environment as our expanding population uses more and more open space for homes, factories, airports, roads and giant shopping centers. "Green trees, shrubs, grass, flowers and green fields improve the quality of our air and water," she says, "and with a little effort on our part we can have a world that is green and alive."

"Alice" urges citizens to work with youth in instilling appreciation and concern for growing things, to assure future generations a landscape filled with flowers, shrubs and trees rather than asphalt, buildings and concrete.

"Through the planting of more growing things, we will be assured of a better world --- but it is up to each of us," she concludes.
