Regal Announces Major Expansion in Production Facilities

James D. Reigle, President of Regal Ware, Inc., manufacturer of cookware and kitchen appliances, announced plans for a major expansion and renovation program at the firm's Kewaskum production facility.

The major thrust of this program will be the construction of a cast aluminum foundry at the Kewaskum plant. This new foundry will feature the most modern electric

furnaces available to insure production efficiency and employee safety. The entire project will involve over 40-

000 square feet, including some 21,000 square feet of new construction.

This expansion is a result of Regal's growing cast aluminum cookware business and the company's desire to increase capacity in this rapidly expanding segment of the market.

According to Reigle, the foundry will be in operation by September 1, 1978.

Regal Ware, Inc. has production facilities in Wooster, Ohio; Flora, Mississippi; Peoria, Illinois and Orangeville, Ontario, in addition to their plant and corporate offices in Kewaskum.

Park Committee Agrees to Place Bathhouse on Southeast Corner

The Park Committee Monday night agreed to place the proposed bathhouse for the new pond on the southeast corner.

The placement of the structure will be on an angle, "so that you can see the front end of the building when you drive in," according to Daniel Schmidt.

Another kind of shelter, proposed by Kewaskum's service groups was tabled until more firm prices could be obtained by the clubs involved from prospective contractors.

Augie Bilgo was given per-

mission by the board to investigate and list the areas of the village that have priority in this year's blacktopping needs. He may then advertise for competitive bids.

Culverts being considered by the board Monday night involved some pricing differences. In draining park runoff through the recently acquired easement adjoining the park, either 36-inch or 42-inch culverts may be needed to do the job. A difference of \$4.50 per foot in the price of the conduits was discussed, with the most expensive being \$26 per foot.

Second year letter winners in soccer included Michael Rinzel of Kewaskum.

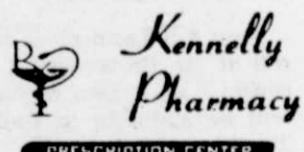

THE BEAUTIFUL BERRY

The strawberry is a member of the rose family. If you have ever looked at the strawberry flower or smelled the freshly picked fruit, you would readily recognize the resemblance. This is the time of year when the strawberries are at their very best in the Midwest. The best way to eat these berries is freshly picked and washed!

Strawberries are an excellent source of vitamin C. They are nearly as high in vitamin C as the citrus fruit. One cup of fresh strawberries contains enough vitamin C to meet the full day's requirement for the body. It is interesting that the human is the only animal that does not synthesize vitamin C in the body. Thus, we must have vitamin C in our diet each day.

Strawberries are also a low calorie food. One cup of fresh berries contains only 50 calories.

Of course, in making a fancy dessert, the calories can be greatly increased. Such as the Baked Strawberry Alaska.

1 baked pastry shell
1 quart strawberries, ice cream
1 pint fresh strawberries, washed, hulled and sliced
2 egg whites
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 cup sugar

Soften ice cream. Mix into cooked baked pie crust and freeze overnight. Just before serving time, prepare the meringue by beating egg whites, cream of tartar, and sugar. Add sugar and beat until glossy and stiff. Arrange strawberries on ice cream. Spread meringue over entire surface of pie including crust edge. Bake one hour in a moderate oven at 350° for 15 minutes. Serve immediately. Serves 8.

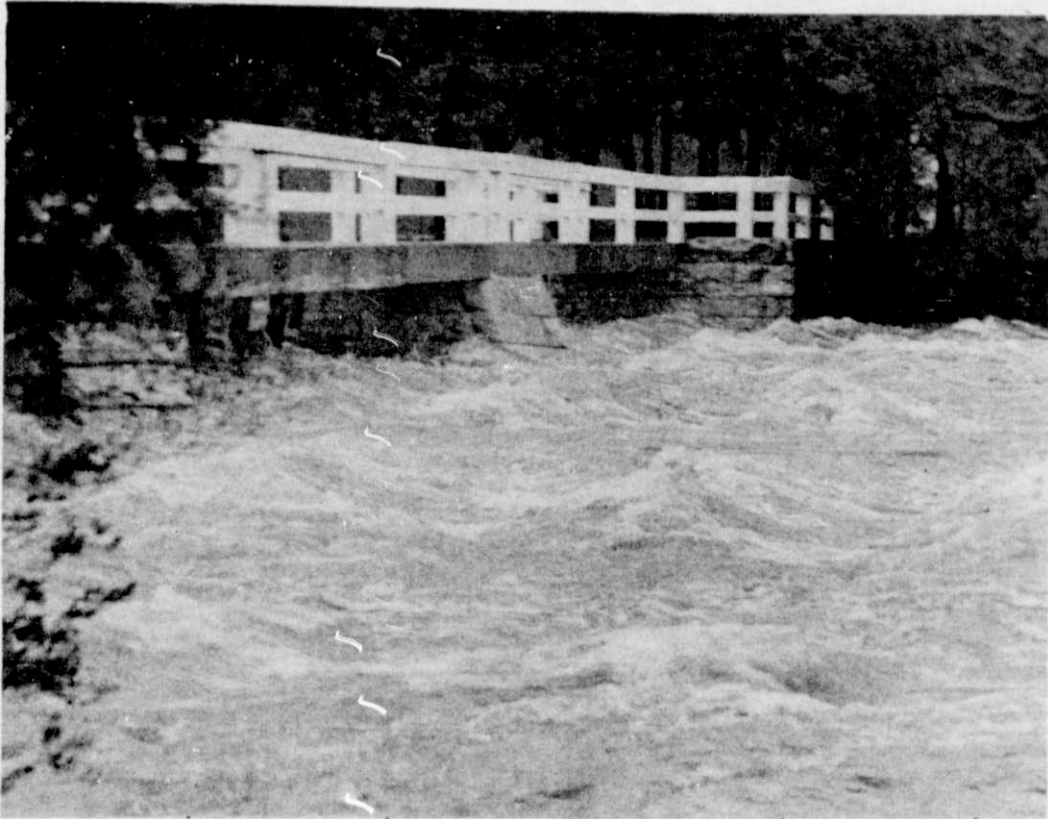

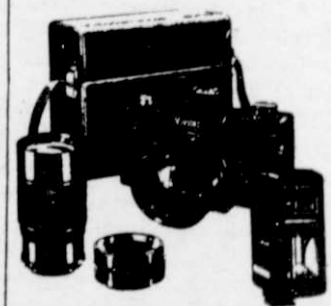
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Wahnschaffe - Marx

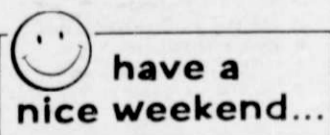

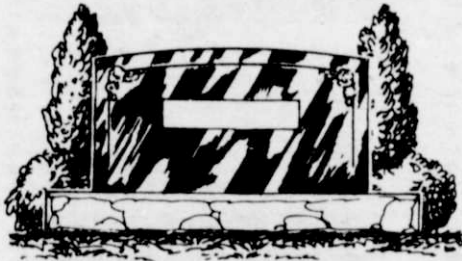

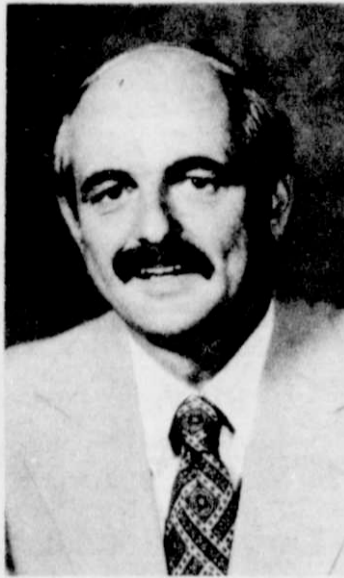
He succeeds James E. Olson, publisher of the Richland Observer, Richland Center.

To your readers,

On August 26, 1920, a news story broke that was to change the lives of women throughout the United States. It was the culmination of years of labor by a group of individuals dedicated to equality, fairness and the democratic system.

On August 26, 1920, the women of America got the vote. The 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified by the states and the Women's Suffrage Proclamation was signed by Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby.

It was the triumphant end of a long struggle which had meant protest marches, physical attacks and jail sentences for its leaders, but they were dedicated to obtaining a better life for all Americans.

It is an appropriate time to look back at that experience and focus on another challenge facing women of this country — the future of the Equal Rights Amendment. Proposed as the 27th Amendment to the constitution, ERA is designed to make women truly partners in American life. ERA is presently three states shy of ratification. It deserves your consideration.

It has come to my attention that many are still unsure of the meaning and content of this amendment, and in their uncertainty continue to be swayed by arguments both pro and con. If you are such an individual or would simply like to understand this amendment better, I strongly recommend to you the publication entitled "In Pursuit of Equal Rights: Women in the Twenties" (Pub. No. 321) available for \$1.50 from the League of Women Voters of the U.S., 1730 M St., Washington D.C. 20036.

Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Regular Meeting
May 1, 1978
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Charles F. Miller presided. Trustee Herges had asked to be excused and was absent. All other Village Trustee members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of April 17 were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Kral. Unanimous vote.

The application of John Foyse for a bartender's license was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee D. Nigh. Unanimous vote.

Upon the recommendation of the Plan Commission, the Certified Survey Map of Elton Liepert, a re-division of Parcel 1 of Certified Survey Map No. 1878, was approved by the Board. Motion by Trustee Danielsen, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik.

Roll call vote — 6 "Aye"
0 "Nay"

The list of committee appointments made by President Miller was made available to the Board Members the Press and the public, and was ordered to be made a part of the official record and be placed on file in the office of the Commissioner.

Donald Mlodzik was recommended as the Village Board representative on the Plan Commission. The appointment was ratified upon motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Kral. Unanimous vote.

Attorney Kiefer was advised that the village's engineering consultants had recommended that the direction of flow of the sanitary sewers and the storm sewers in the proposed Spoerl subdivision shall be toward Highway "H." Mr. Kiefer stated that such planning would require approximately an additional 1300 feet of sewer piping and asked if the village would absorb a portion of the additional cost that would be incurred by the subdivider. President Miller replied that at this point the village would not be in a position to give a firm answer. More detailed plans will be submitted by the subdivider in the near future.

The President and Com-

missioner were authorized to negotiate an easement with Dennis and Dorothy Sharpe for a storm sewer installation across the north fifteen (15) feet of their property located at 1127 Edgewood Road. Motion by Trustee Danielsen, seconded by Trustee Schmidt. Unanimous vote.

The transfer of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) from the village general fund to a village improvement savings account was authorized upon motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee D. Nigh. Roll call vote unanimous.

Supt. Bilgo was authorized to erect a sign at the Highway 45 driveway entrance directing the general public to the location of the village garage. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Danielsen. Unanimous vote.

Motion was made by Trustee Danielsen that the payment voucher for Arthur and Associates covering invoices dated April 28, 1978, in the amount of \$718.68 not be paid until such time as Arthur and Associates clarify what work was performed under these invoices. President Miller and Trustee Danielsen volunteered to obtain cost figures for the possible installation of sanitary sewer and storm sewer lines from the proposed Spoerl Subdivision eastward along Highway "H" to the Highway "H" village limits.

Trustee Schmidt reported that the 1978 funding request for the development of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park has been forwarded to Madison and that approval is expected in about sixty days.

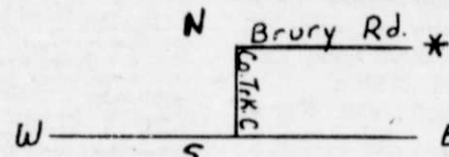

The Indian girls had placed second, losing by one point to Hartford in the County Indoor meet held at West Bend early in April. But this time out they weren't to be denied as they brought home the trophy.

Freshman Julann Zemlicka hit the tape ahead of Slinger's Lucy Schlagenhaft to give the Indians the win in the mile relay, the final event of the day. Zemlicka turned it on in the stretch for better than a 10 yard victory. Other members of the relay were Laurie and Barb Wilson and Diane Bremser, who were mobbed at the finish line.

While the Indians had only four firsts, they did have a first, second or third in all but one event, the high jump.

Other firsts were by Laurie Wilson in the long jump, the 880 relay with Katie Lightner, Pam Kemof, Jenny Schaub and Zemlicka, and Janine Prost in the shot put.

Along with her first in the mile relay, Barb Wilson added two seconds in the 880 and mile. Carrie Henke had a fine effort in the 110 low hurdles, placing second.

The Kewaskum boys wound up last in their meet with 40 points. Winning Hartford also won the county indoor meet earlier in the season.

The only places won by the Indians were a fourth in the pole vault by Steinhardt, a third in the 100 yd. dash by Pettit, a third in the 880 yd. relay, a third in the 880 low hurdles by Schaub, a fourth in the 220 by Pettit, and a fourth in the mile relay.
