Students of the Kewaskum School District will have a few extra days' vacation this summer before school starts. Starting date will be after Labor Day. Teachers report on August 30. However, this will mean a few extra days of school in June. The last day will be June 7, unless snow days have to be made up.

At Monday night's Board of Education meeting several bids were accepted as follows: Strobel Oil — fuel oil; Shafond Oil, Inc. — gasoline, and John Engelhardt and Sons, Inc. — milk.

The part-time secretarial position was changed to a full-time central office secretary-library aide job. The person holding this position was working full-time hours without full-time

benefits.

Mrs. Hron gave a report on the work of the reading committee. One of the goals is to make reading a number one priority and to develop a good lifetime reading habit. This report was accepted in general by the board.

Kewaskum participation in the CESA 13, Federal Special Education In-service program was passed unanimously.

Several contracts were discussed. The Spanish position at the high school will be filled by Linda Bullette. A request of a six week child care leave was granted to Diane Marschner. Also, a resignation of Ann Pokel was accepted.

No action was taken on the water conditioning at Beechwood.

The Annual Staff Breakfast will be held on August 31.

Preparation of Bidding for Park Projects Considered by Village Board

Preparation of bidding for the 1978 park projects was considered by the Village Board at Monday night's meeting.

James Arthur was present to point out various items up for bidding. Items included service drive, bike racks, tennis courts, a basketball court, and volleyball nets and standards. No action was taken because these were just preliminary plans for equipment for the new park project.

A question was raised to Police Chief Hlavaty on the problem concerning traffic congestion at Hillside and Brooklane. It concerns all four directions of this intersections. Hlavaty will check into this matter.

The board voted in favor of refunding the money to Roger Turchany for his claim of incorrect assessment on his 1977 taxes.

Permission was granted to Chief Hlavaty to attend the Wisconsin Chiefs of Police Conference at Fond du Lac on August 14, 15 and 16.

The purchasing of a 350 foot metal culvert pipe was approved for Columbus Dr. and Knights Ave. and also a building permit application for Elton Liepert on Werner Drive.

The issue of the sewer and water service on Werner Drive was approved by the board. All parties involved agree to share the costs.

Several clubs of the village have requested the building of a new shelter house in the old park in which they asked the village to help purchase part of. The cost will approximately be \$10-13,000. The board felt that there would be considerable use by everybody so the board

agreed to budget between \$5-6,000 with all other clubs dividing the remaining costs.

The board decided to take further action on a business operating in a residential area. The party involved was notified several times but has failed to comply.

They also approved to have all patrolmen and employees fill out a daily time sheet which would indicate each individual's schedule.

Regal Installs New CBX Telecommunication System

On Monday, July 31, Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, gained a greatly expanded ultra-modern telecommunications access facility, as its office and plant employees began placing and receiving calls through a new Computerized Branch Exchange (CBX) telephone switching system.

Supplied by General Telephone Company of Wisconsin, the system boasts 200 lines, 12 central office trunks, and 3 special circuits for WATS and foreign exchange use, according to Regal Ware's Administrative Service Manager, John Tessar.

Tessar explained that the CBX System, requiring approximately four months to install and the first of its kind placed in service in Southeastern Wisconsin, will offer the firm numerous benefits. Most notably, the system's ease of operation has reduced from two to one the switchboard attendants on duty.

Other features include the automatic routing of all outgoing, long distance calls on the most economical calling pattern, the introduction of Touch Calling and advert Automatic Call Detail Recording - a cost accounting benefit permitting

the tracking of all calls to the station from which they originated.

According to Tessar, "We expect this new CBX telecommunication system, supplied by General Telephone Company to benefit many phases of our business. TRAVELIN' DOGS



A hot dog can be made from any type wiener, frankfurter, sausage or wurst. These are beef and pork. You can also buy wieners made from, and labeled as, chicken meat. Frankfurters with a combination of beef and pork are a good source of protein because they supply a balance of amino acid proteins.

I recently saw a listing of hot dogs for each state:

North Dakota Hot Dog is a cooked frankfurter with mustard and wrapped in a slice of rye bread.

South Dakota Hot Dog is a "Rushmore Dog," prepared by arranging 1-inch pieces of frankfurters with mushrooms, pineapple chunks, and stuffed green olives on a skewer. Soak with pineapple juice, broil, place in bun, and remove skewer.

Minnesota Hot Dog, known as "Twin Dog," is a frankfurter split in half, broil and serve on bun with catsup on one side and mustard on the other.

Iowa Hot Dog, a "Curry Dog," is on a bun and topped with hot cream-style corn.

Nebraska Hot Dog — a "Corn Husker," of course. Dip frankfurter on a stick into cornmeal batter. Fry in deep fat at 375° for 3 minutes until golden brown.

Wisconsin Hot Dog, called "Say Cheese Dog," is a cooked frankfurter on a bun, topped with grated cheese and broiled to melt the cheese.

The clothing revue, which includes crocheted and knitted garments, as well as sewed garments, is the climax of a judging experience held prior to the fair itself. The articles that have been constructed by the girls are judged on the total appearance of the garment, on the person, along with construction of the garment.

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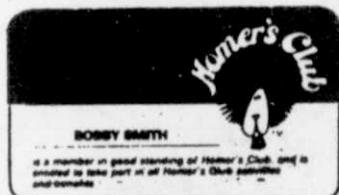

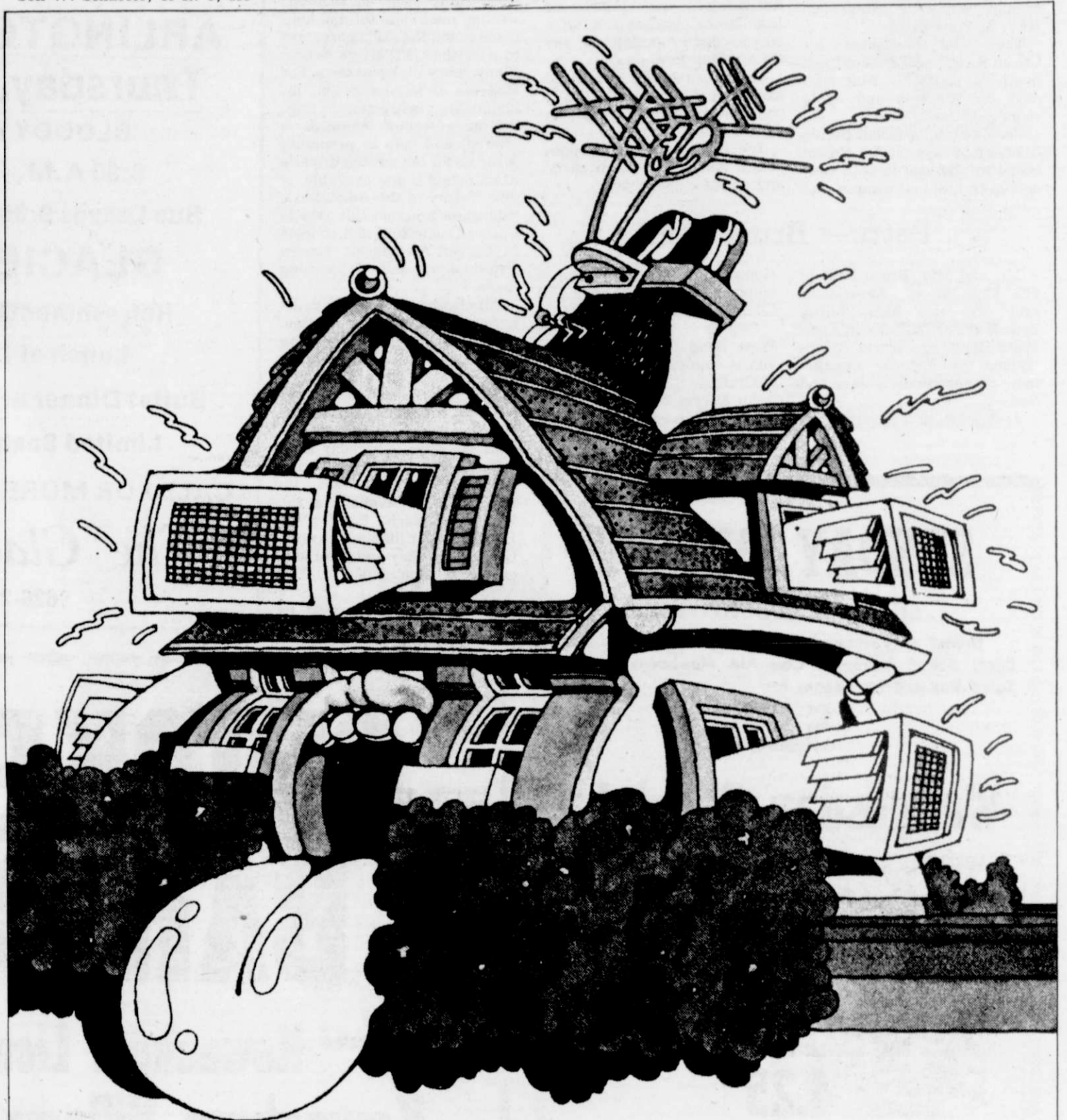

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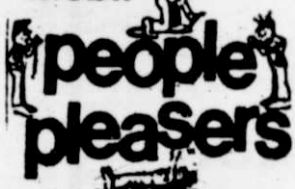
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Stagedoor Players at Linden Inn

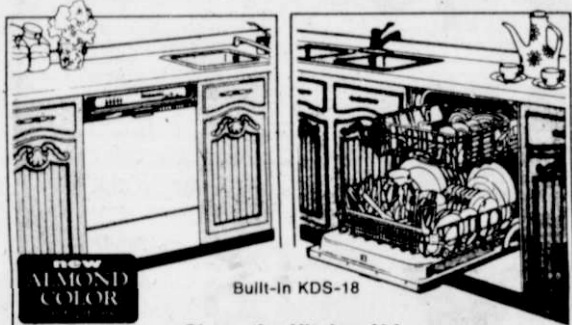

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U. S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election if applying in person, or 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before the election if applying by mail.

Absentee ballots can be marked at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be marked right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths.
