School Starts Tuesday In Kewaskum District

Tuesday, September 5, will be the first day of attendance for students in the Kewaskum School District. It will be a full day of school.

Lunches will be served on the first day. The cost of lunches for students is 70c per daily ticket. A five-meal ticket is \$2.65 for students in grades 1-6 and \$2.90 for grades 7-12 students. Adults tickets are 80c per daily, or \$4.00 for a 5-day ticket.

Those who are to receive bus transportation should have received notice of the approximate time for the pickup on the first day, as well as the location. If anyone has not received this notification, please call the bus terminal at 626-4414.

Starting times remain the same as last year. Grades 1-6 begin at 9:05, grades 7-12 at 7:45. Morning kindergarten classes run from 9:05 to 11:35, and afternoon kindergarten from 1:10 to 3:40. Parents are asked not to have elementary school children at the buildings before 8:45 or 8:50 in the morning.

Track to Be Blacktopped

Board Favors Remaining in Scenic Conference

As Kewaskum Will Become Class A High School

Funds for the blacktopping of the high school track were approved by the School Board at Monday night's meeting.

Don Hansen from Humphries-Hansen was present to answer questions on the track. A lengthy discussion was held whether to pass the proposal or to acquire other bids from different companies.

The existing cinder track proposed drainage problems on the south side. The new track will be constructed with three inches of crushed gravel, two inches of blacktop, and will consist of 42 inch lanes. There will be six lanes which covers 21 feet except on the west side which will add an extra lane for additional sprinters' space. Approximate cost is \$19,545 and construction is set for this fall, but will not be laid under 40 degree weather.

The pit for the high jump and the pole vault will be blacktopped also. The 16 x 16 foot areas will cost an additional \$600. The current problem is that the landing pads now lay on pallets that raise the pads from the ground which eliminates rotting.

Discussion was also held on the question of cheerleaders participating in sports during a season in the high school. Principal Clark Pearson explained

that a rule had been made that all students on JV and varsity teams cannot go out for sports except gymnastics. Gymnastics is a club sport and competition is not on a nightly basis. Freshmen will be allowed to participate in both activities so they may decide which they would like to continue in their remaining years.

Two parents have asked to make exceptions for golf and cross country, but the board felt that if they make exceptions it will not be fair for other students involved. Practices are after school and the student cannot be in "two places at once." The board voted to keep the rule as specified.

A question on a new conference was presented to the board. Teams would include Campbellsport, Lomira, Mayville, Pewaukee, Slinger, Dodgeand, Horicon, Laconia, Markesan, North Fond du Lac and Oakfield. A letter will be sent to other Scenic Moraine Conference members stating that Kewaskum prefers to remain in the current conference.

This is due to the smaller schools lack of some girls' sports and by the 1980-81 school year, Kewaskum will be considered a Class A school because of increasing enrollment. Schools are considered Class A after enrollment reaches 800 or more students.

A request was granted to a senior student to complete school at Kewaskum High School, even though she has just moved from the district. This is allowed, without tuition, by State Statute.

Requests from parents to have their children attend West Bend parochial schools were approved but that these students were to meet the bus at the designated spot without extending the routes.

Jane Ralph was approved as Middle School math and science teacher.

A parent transportation contract was approved for Mr. and Mrs. Merwin to transport a kindergarten student to St. Lucas.

The board adjourned into a closed session.

Dairyland Seed Has Open House

Dairyland Seed Company, Inc., located south of Kewaskum, is holding an open house at its research station at Clinton, Wis. The tours began August 25 and run through August 31.

The station covers 160 acres. Research is being conducted in hybrid alfalfa, hybrid corn, and soybeans. The day begins with tours through the soybean and alfalfa greenhouses, followed by wagon rides around the research plots on the station. There are some 7,500 alfalfa, 7,400 corn and 8,000 soybean plots all together.

Besides yield plots, there are phytotoxic testing plots and herbicide testing plots for the soybeans. In addition for alfalfa there are winter hardiness, bacterial wilt and phytophthora selection nurseries on the station. Material on hand includes plants which have been winter hardiness screened in Canada. There are also plants with weevil and aphid screening at the station.

Also on exhibit is Dairyland's specialized plot planting and harvesting equipment.

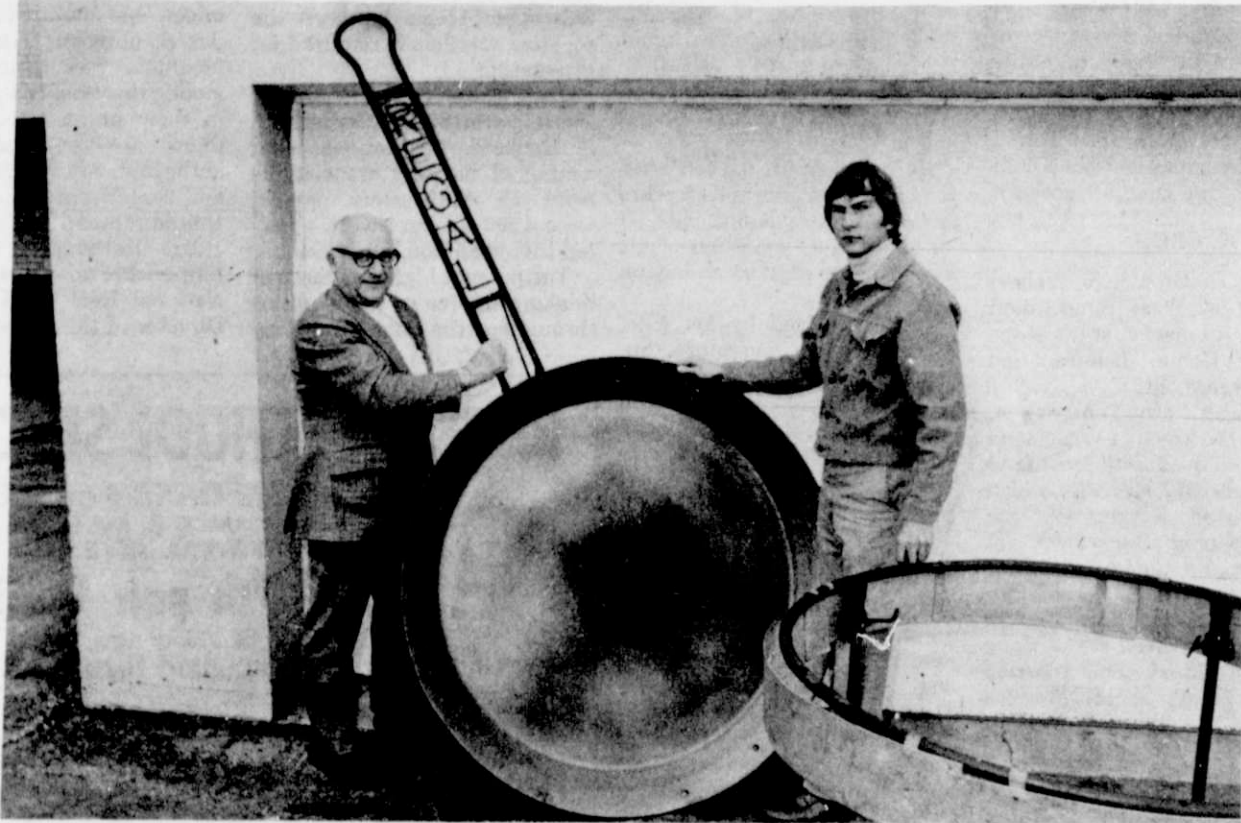
premium non-stick finish. Heat is supplied by a handmade gas "burner."

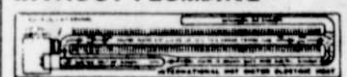

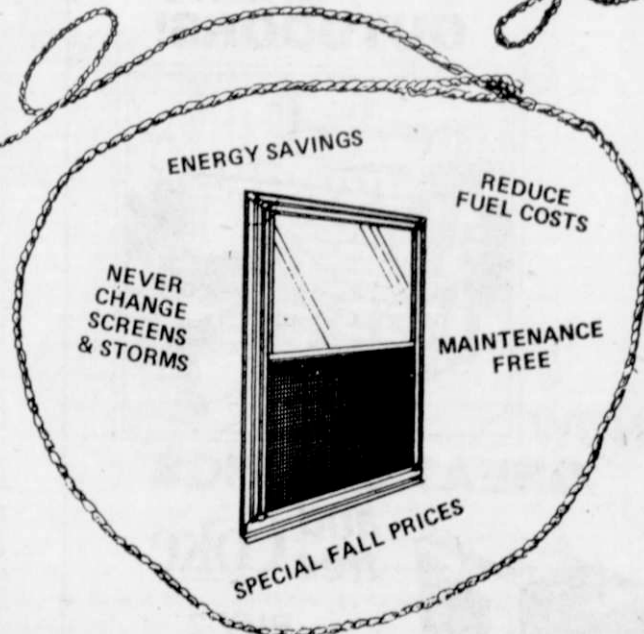

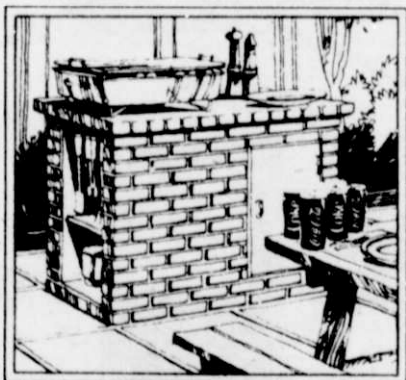

Recreational Activities Continue In Wisconsin During September

If you're looking for a place where interesting events and recreational activities continue around the calendar you'll find it in Wisconsin this September.

Labor Day weekend is celebrated in a big way at the Wilhelm Tell Festival in New Glarus, a southwestern community with strong Swiss ethnic roots. The festival is an annual event here, and visitors have come from across the nation and world to enjoy the pagentry of the Tell drama. The play is presented in English on Saturday and Monday, and in German on Sunday, and tells the story of Switzerland's struggle for independence in the 13th century. Swiss folk dancers, yodelers, flag-throwers and the Alpine horn blowers offer special performances during the festival also.

A little later in the month, September 16-17, it's time for Cheese Days in Monroe, 15 miles south of New Glarus, and also in Green County. "Gemuetlichkeit" is a German word meaning "geniality, coziness, hospitality and good fellowship" and the principles are perfectly exemplified in Monroe which holds Cheese in Days every other year. There's Swiss entertainment both days, plus an art fair, street and square dancing, a children's parade, drum and bugle corps contest, and a Sunday afternoon cheeseland festival parade. And, of course, plenty of Wisconsin cheese to sample.

There's plenty happening elsewhere around the state at Labor Day time, too. At Elkhart Lake the Trans-Am racers will be competing on the Road America four-mile circuit, September 2-4. Manitowoc, on Lake Michigan's shoreline, will be

holding a Salmon Fishing Derby, September 1-4. The Green Lake Legion will be the site of a Trout Boil, September 2. The big Rock River Thresheree will be September 2-4 in Janesville, and in Wausau there will be a Labor Day parade, one of many to march through Wisconsin's towns and villages.

The annual Cheese Festival in Blair is set for September 8-10. Activities include a tractor and horse pull, fiddler's contest, fireman's battle, the Miss Blair contest, live music and food stands, and a Sunday parade. September 9-10 there will be an Equinox Festival in Madison which will include theater, dance and mime performances, folk music and poetry readings, a senior citizen's area and children's workshop, plus ethnic food tents. Meanwhile there will be an Air Show, September 9-10, in Eau Claire, and a Little Britches Rodeo at the Lazy B Ranch near Port Edwards. September 10 is the date for the annual Watermelon Eating & Seed Spitting contest held in Pardeeville.

September 9 is the opening date for the major exhibition of original bird art at the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum in Wausau. Generally acclaimed as the finest collection of such art ever assembled, nearly 100 paintings and carvings from 50 of the English-speaking world's most distinguished bird artists will be on display for free public viewing. The paintings of Roger Tory Peterson will be honored at the exhibition, and in addition to the works of contemporary artists the work of Francis Lee Jaques, an influential bird painter of the early 1900s will be on display. The permanent collection of 100

Dorothy Doughty American and English birds from the Royal Worcester Porcelain Company of England will also be shown. The exhibition runs through October 22.

September 10 is the date this year for the annual "Starving Artist's Show" held at Mount Mary College in Milwaukee. More than 200 exhibitors are expected, and the hours of the show are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

In mid-month, September 14-17 are the dates for Gemuetlichkeit Days in Jefferson. On September 16, the University of Wisconsin-Madison opens its football season against Richmond at Camp Randall. In the northwoods, the colorama season should be in progress and a smorgasbord and self-guiding tours in Phelps, and a colorama dinner and guided tours in Winchester. On September 16-17 there will be colorama bus tours from Eagle River.

The next weekend, on September 23, the following events are also scheduled in connection with the fall colorama season: a beef feed and self-guiding tours from Arbor Vitae-Woodruff, a colorama dinner in Boulder Junction, venison stew and squaw bread and bake sale at

St. Anthony's Church in Lac du Flambeau. In Land O' Lakes there will be a smorgasbord, color tours and airplane rides, in Manitowish Waters an arts and crafts show and cranberry marsh tours and a muskie bake, while Presque Isle is planning general colorama activities.

In Gays Mills on September 23-24 they will be holding their annual Apple Festival. The land around the village is one of the major apple growing regions of Wisconsin.

Closing out the month, Delavan will celebrate their Oktoberfest on September 28-October 1, and on September 30-October

1 the Mid-Continent Railroad Museum at North Freedom will have an Autumn Color Weekend similar to their popular Snow Train weekends. Extra snow locomotives will be running, pulling the coaches through the central Wisconsin landscape and photo runbys, where photographers are allowed to get off the train and set-up for scenic shots of the hard-working locomotives, will be held during the two days.

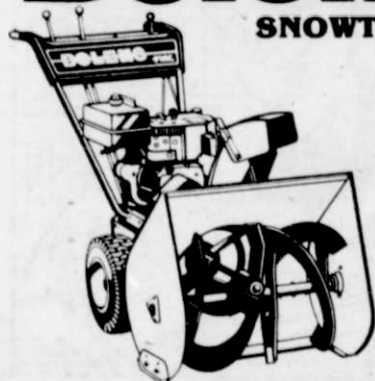

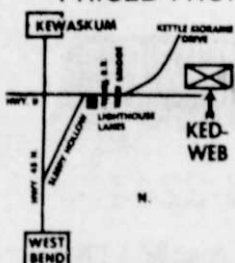

**McKenna Endorsed
By Labor Council**

State Senator Dale McKenna, Democratic candidate for Lt. Governor, announced the endorsement of the Washington County Central Labor Council this week.

McKenna said his top-ranked AFL-CIO roll call voting record, coupled with the fact that his 13th Senate district used to cover part of Washington County, contributed to the endorsement.

School District Announces Policy for Free and Reduced Price Meals and Free Milk

The School District of Kewaskum today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price for meals and milk served in schools under the Federal Child Nutrition Programs operating herein.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is within the levels shown are eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with special hardship conditions such as unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter or notice to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Application may be submitted anytime during the school year.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to receive such benefits the foster parents should apply on behalf of the child or contact the school officials about their eligibility.

Under the provisions of the School's policy, the Building Principals will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Floyd A. Brenholt, Superintendent, 1450 School Street, Kewaskum, Wisconsin 53040, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and criminal statutes.

In operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color or national origin.

Each school and the agency office has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

August 21, 1978
8:00 P. M.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in mid-monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Charles F. Miller presided. Trustee Danielsen had asked to be excused and was absent. All other Trustee Members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of August 7th were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Schmidt. Voice vote was unanimous.

September 18, 1978, at 8:00 P.M. was the date and time established for the opening of sealed bids for the installation of sewer and water lines on Werner Drive and for the installation of storm sewer on Columbus Drive. Motion by Trustee Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 78-3 ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN

SECTION 1.0

1.1 AUTHORITY

This Ordinance is adopted under the authority granted by Sections 61.35, 62.23(7) and 87.30(2) of the Wisconsin Statutes and amendments thereto. The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum does ordain as follows:

1.2 TITLE

This Ordinance shall be known as, referred to, and cited as the "ZONING ORDINANCE, VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN" and is hereinafter referred to as the "Ordinance."

1.3 PURPOSE

The purpose of this Ordinance is to promote the comfort, health, safety, morals, prosperity, aesthetics, and general welfare of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin.

1.4 INTENT

It is the general intent of this Ordinance to regulate and restrict the use of all structures, lands and waters; and to:

Regulate Lot Coverage and the size and location of all structures so as to prevent overcrowding and to provide adequate sunlight, air, sanitation, and drainage;

Regulate Population Density and Distribution so as to avoid sprawl or undue concentration and to facilitate the provision of adequate public service and utilities;

Regulate Parking, Loading and Access so as to lessen congestion in and promote the safety and efficiency of streets and highways;

Secure Safety from fire, flooding, pollution, contamination and other dangers;

Stabilize and Protect existing and potential property values;

Prevent and Control Erosion, sedimentation, and other pollution of the surface and subsurface waters;

Further the Maintenance of safe and healthful water conditions;

Prevent Flood Damage to persons and property and minimize expenditures for flood relief and flood control projects

Provide for and Protect a variety of suitable commercial and industrial sites;

Protect the traffic-carrying capacity of existing and proposed arterial streets and highways;

Implement those municipal, county, watershed, and regional comprehensive plans of components of such plans adopted by the Village of Kewaskum;

Provide for the administration and enforcement of this Ordinance; and to provide penalties for the violation of this Ordinance.

1.5 ABROGATION AND GREATER RESTRICTIONS

It is not intended by this Ordinance to repeal, abrogate, annul, impair, or interfere with any existing easements, covenants, deed restrictions, agreements, ordinances, rules, regulations, or permits previously adopted or issued pursuant to law. However, wherever this Ordinance imposes greater restrictions, the provisions of this Ordinance shall govern.

1.6 INTERPRETATION

In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this Ordinance shall be held to be minimum requirements and shall be liberally construed in favor of the Village and shall not be construed to be a limitation or repeal of any other power now possessed by the Village of Kewaskum.

1.7 SEVERABILITY AND NON LIABILITY

If any section, clause, provision, or portion of this Ordinance is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

If Any Application of this Ordinance to a particular structure, land, or water is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction such judgement shall not be applicable to any

other structure, land, or water not specifically included in said judgement.

The Village Does Not Guarantee, warrant or represent that only those areas designated as floodlands will be subject to periodic inundation or that those soils listed as being unsuited for specific uses are the only unsuitable soils, and hereby asserts that there is no liability on the part of the Village Board, its agencies, or employees for any flood damages, sanitation problems, or structural damages that may occur as a result of reliance upon, and conformance with this Ordinance.

1.8 REPEAL

All other ordinances or parts of ordinances of the Village inconsistent or conflicting with this Ordinance, to the extent of the inconsistency only, are hereby repealed.

1.9 EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall be effective after a public hearing, recommendation by the Village Plan Commission, adoption by the Village Board of Trustees and publication or posting as provided by law.

Because the proposal of Jack Walters & Sons Corp. seemed the most advantageous to the village, motion was made by Trustee D. Nigh that said proposal be accepted, that the President and Commissioner be authorized to enter into a contract with Jack Walters and Sons Corp. for the erection of such shelter and that the Village of Kewaskum contribute the sum of \$6,000.00 toward the

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

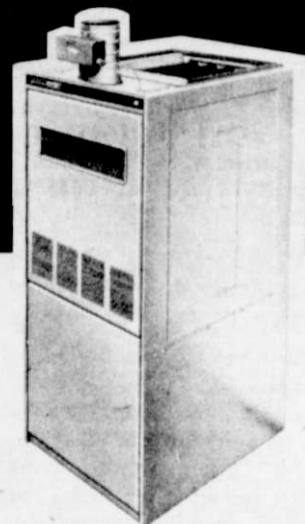

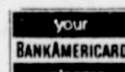
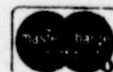
