## EASTERN WISCONSIN CONFERENCE STILL FAVORED

### School Board Hires New Football Coach

The report at a short Monday night School Board meeting showed Kewaskum still placed in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

Other conference alignments were changed but Kewaskum has remained in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. There was talk of trying to keep the Scenic Moraine together but Mayville stated they desired to go to the Flyway Conference and most schools did not stipulate their desire.

At a coaches' meeting held last Thursday afternoon, the coaches felt they should go to the Eastern Wisconsin because of the enrollment sizes. Their concern also was shown on the girls' sports programs.

John Tessar said that he doesn't like the idea of a seven school conference because Valders may drop from the Eastern Wisconsin.

On Tuesday, March 27, at Germantown, the schools had another conference realignment meeting.

A contract was approved for Michael D. Fifrick, who will teach three algebra classes, one geometry and one remedial math course in the high school. Fifrick will also be Kewaskum's new head football coach.

Fifrick, 27, is single and known as an enthusiastic young coach. He is a native of Kiel and attended college at Whitewater and Madison. He also played basketball at UW-Whitewater.

He coached football one year at Chilton High School, four years at Lake Mills High, where he was assistant under Coach Bob Petruska, and this year is assistant football and track coach at Nicolet High School. He also coached track at Lake Mills. Fifrick also was assistant coach for the North-South All-Star football game last summer and for the past two summers coached baseball at Kiel.

Fifrick will succeed Fran Charland, who will devote full time as head wrestling coach and remain as assistant football coach.

Mrs. Ervin Grandin's request for a foreign student to attend Kewaskum High School for the 1979-80 school year was approved. This student is not from the AFS exchange program. Marcela Barrios Espinosa, 18 years, from Bogota, Columbia, will stay with the Eugene Laatsch family.

The board then adjourned to a closed session for discussion on salaries, wages, and for personnel questions.

### KHS Sophomore Zweig Elected To YSB Board

Allen Zweig, a sophomore at Kewaskum High School, was recently elected to the Board of Directors of the Youth Service Bureau of Washington County, Inc.

YSB is a non-profit organization working to prevent and divert youth from breaking the law.

John Fulwider, Assistant Chief of Police for the City of Hartford, was elected President of the Board of Directors and Sue Baier, also of Hartford and a teacher at Washington High School in Germantown, was elected Vice-President.

Michael Bloedorn, West Bend, was elected secretary/treasurer. He is a unit supervisor at the Washington County Department of Social Services, and has served on the Youth Service Bureau board since 1975.

Youth Service Bureau projects in Washington County include: Project Payback, a restitution program for juveniles; a truancy screening committee to coordinate alternate ways of handling high school truancy; Career Assistance Program, to provide youth with an alternative to spending all their free time in school; and Youth Development Training Program to give youth leadership skills.

### Spring Election Tuesday

Tuesday, April 3, is Spring Election Day in Wisconsin.

Information to electors, including facsimile ballots, times and places of voting appear on the inside pages of this issue, except for school board members, which appeared in last week's issue.

Village voters will cast ballots for village officials, school board members, a state supreme court justice and on four referendum questions.

In the village, current trustees Daniel S. Schmidt and Robert A. Danielsen will oppose each other for the office of village president succeeding retiring Charles Miller. Three trustee candidates seeking office are unopposed. They are David E. Nigh, incumbent, and newcomers Paul Blumer and Gerald F. Stollenwerk.

There are three candidates for the two school board positions to be voted on in the school district. They are incumbents Byron W. Gessner and Gerald Secor, and Margaret McFadden, who is seeking office for the first time.

Candidates for Justice of the Supreme Court are Shirley S. Abrahamson and Howard H. Boyle, Jr.

The four referendum questions to be voted on appear on another page of this issue. They are on "Gubernatorial Succession," "Lieutenant Governor Vacancy," "Senate Presiding Officer" and "Making the 4-year Terms Understandable."

In the Town of Kewaskum, Chairman George Allmann will be unopposed for reelection. Incumbent Supervisors Jerome Herriges and Daniel Stoffel will be opposed by Donald Nowak. Barbara Hinz will be unopposed for reelection as Clerk. Treasurer Dolores Prost will be opposed by Marilyn Haug.

#### TOWN OF WAYNE

In the Town of Wayne incumbent Chairman Carl Hohlweck will be opposed by John A. Oelhafen, former Chairman. Supervisors Merlin Ernisse and Mark Strobel, Clerk Orville Kern, Treasurer Raymond Kuddek and Assessor Alvin Wiesner will be unopposed for reelection.

#### TOWN OF AUBURN

In the Town of Auburn Chairman Roger Schleif will be opposed by Richard Giersch. Supervisors Donald Stoffel and Ervin Seifert, Clerk Camilla Butzke, Treasurer Elmer Krueger and Constable Donald Hammes will be unopposed for reelection.

**SOURCES OF AN IMPORTANT VITAMIN**

The single best food source for thiamine (vitamin B<sub>1</sub>) is pork. The daily recommended allowance for thiamine is 1 to 1.5 milligrams. This is based on the maximum requirement. One cup of cooked pork or one medium pork chop will give half the daily requirements for thiamine.

Other foods rich in the vitamin thiamine are whole-grain and enriched cereals and enriched breads, soybean flour and dried beans. Three servings a day of cereal and/or bread will provide the same amount of thiamine as a serving of pork.

The need for thiamine in the diet is to aid the health of the nervous tissues. A mild deficiency can result in a numbness of the fingers and toes. A more severe deficiency does affect the heart.

In our country we seldom see the thiamine deficiency called beriberi since cereals and grains have been enriched with thiamine. It is most often found in alcoholics who have given up eating and in patients who have been unable to eat for a period of time. In these cases the vitamin B<sub>1</sub> supplement provides dramatic improvement.



## Conditioning of Waste Discussed By Village Board

The possibility of conditioning of waste from the water treatment operations was discussed at the Monday, March 19, Village Board meeting.

Don Voight from the Lane Northwest Company was there to present the reasons for conditioning waste. The conditioning operation is used because it saves man hours, energy and equipment. The concentrator reduces the sludge volume and therefore cuts down on hauling trips to the storage areas.

With the machine, the sludge is transferred into a thicker form which then can be stored as stockpiles until spring. At the current time the waste is in a liquid state which can cause problems during the winter months. The cost of this machine would be approximately \$30,000-\$35,000.

The board voted to have a waste sample analysis taken before deciding anything on the proposal.

Presentation was also made by Voight on a burglary system and a monitoring system for the village's lift stations for the new park.

The approximate cost of the system would be \$7,600, but the board wasn't sure if they could proceed with purchasing without soliciting for bids. The board decided to get a legal

opinion before proceeding with the matter.

Bartender licenses were approved for Harry E. Koch, Mark Groeschel and John Fischer. A remodeling permit was also approved to Robert Buddenhagen for an addition of a screened porch to the rear of the existing home located at 351 First Street.

OFFICE OF WASHINGTON COUNTY TO THE ELECTORS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a Spring Election to be held in the several wards in each of Washington, on the 3rd day of April, 1979, at which the officers named below shall be chosen.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where paper ballots are used, the initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot.

At a nonpartisan election, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of his or her choice for a candidate.

On referendum questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the answer which he or she intends to give.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector.

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show.

An elector may be assisted by election officials of different political parties in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability is unable to cast his or her ballot.

EXPLANATION Effect of Ratification. The Wisconsin Constitution presently provides that when death, resignation or removal from office causes a permanent vacancy in the office of governor, or when the governor is temporarily unable to act because of illness or impeachment, the lieutenant governor becomes 'acting governor' but does not vacate the office of lieutenant governor. When the lieutenant governor is unable to act because of any of the same reasons and the office of governor is vacant, the secretary of state becomes 'acting governor' until the vacancy is filled.

A 'yes' vote on this amendment would change these provisions of the constitution to provide that, in the event of a permanent vacancy in the office of governor as the result of death, resignation or removal from office, the lieutenant governor will become 'governor' and the office of lieutenant governor is vacant, in which event the secretary of state will become 'governor.' The officer succeeding to the office of governor will thereby vacate the office previously held. A 'no' vote on the amendment would continue to provide that when the governor is temporarily absent or unable to act because of illness or impeachment, the lieutenant governor will become 'acting governor', unless the office of lieutenant governor is vacant, in which event the secretary of state will become 'acting governor.'

Lieutenant governor vacancy. Shall section 10 of article XIII of the constitution be amended so that, whenever there is a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor, the successor nominated by the governor requires confirmation by the state senate and assembly before assuming the duties of the office?"

EXPLANATION Effect of Ratification. Where no provision is made in the Wisconsin Constitution for the filling of a vacant office, the Legislature may declare the manner in which the office may be filled. The constitution presently contains no provision for filling the vacant office of lieutenant governor, and current legislation provides that the officer shall be confirmed by appointment by the governor.

A 'yes' vote on this amendment would add a provision to the constitution which would require that when there is a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor, the governor must nominate a successor, who then must also be confirmed by the senate and by the assembly before taking office.

Senate presiding officer. Shall section 9 of article IV of the constitution be amended so that, whenever there is a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor, the successor nominated by the governor requires confirmation by the state senate and assembly before assuming the duties of the office?"

EXPLANATION Effect of ratification. The Wisconsin Constitution presently provides that the lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate, but may cast a vote therein only in the event of a tie, and that the senate must choose a temporary president when the lieutenant governor is 'acting governor' or does not attend as president.

A 'yes' vote on this amendment would eliminate the lieutenant governor's role as president of the senate and would provide that all presiding officers of the senate be chosen from its own members.

Making the 4-year terms understandable. Shall section 10 of article V and section 1 of article VI of the constitution be amended, and shall sections 1m and 1n of article V and sections 1m, 1n and 1p of article VI of the constitution be repealed, to make it more understandable that constitutional officers in this state have been elected to 4-year terms since 1970?"

EXPLANATION Effect of ratification. At the April, 1967, election, the electorate voted on a number of separate constitutional amendments of similar language which would create four-year terms of office for the governor and lieutenant governor, the secretary of state, the state treasurer or the attorney general, beginning in 1971. These amendments were passed as individual exceptions to the then existing two-year term requirement for all such offices. Since all such amendments were approved, the two-year provision is no longer effective.

A 'yes' vote on this amendment would allow changes which would make the four-year term provision in reference to such officers more understandable by restating it in positive terms and in fewer words.




Dear Mr. & Mrs. Harbeck:

In an effort to present my views on certain issues to the Citizens of Kewaskum, I would like to have the speech I made at the recent Voters' Forum run as a "Letter to the Editor."

To All Residents of the Village of Kewaskum:

I am running for election as Village President in order to carry on my goal of making our Village a better place to raise our families.

I feel with the experience I have gained these past three years as Village Trustee, I am capable of performing the duties required as Village President. I have also taken courses in "The Roles and Responsibilities of Elected Officials" and "Community Finance" sponsored by the State of Wisconsin and the University of Wisconsin to further my education and experience. I feel one of my greatest strengths is in Financial Planning and Budgeting, gained through my experience at the Bank and as Village Trustee. This past year I was Chairman of the Village Board's Finance Committee, and in that position kept constant watch on all of the Village's expenditures.

The last time I ran for election, I stated that I would keep a close eye on our Village tax rate. I am very pleased that the Village's portion of this year's tax levy was over \$66,000.00 less than last year's tax levy. And if you recall, last year's levy was over \$58,000.00 less than the previous year's tax levy. While we cannot realistically expect another decrease in the tax levy, with prudence and proper budgeting we can keep any future increase to a reasonable level. I firmly believe that there is no need to take YOUR Tax Dollars from you when we don't have a firm

purpose for their use.

A year ago I initiated a program to have the agendas for our Village Board meetings out earlier and have them posted at the Bank and Post Office, so interested Citizens would be aware of what would be discussed. To allow YOU, as concerned Citizens, an opportunity to take an active part in the issues before YOUR Village government. I feel that there have been changes in the openness of our Village government in the last year or two. However, I still feel we have much to do to improve in open decision making and active Citizen participation.

While many of us would like to see the Village remain as it is now, it is unrealistic to think we will not have growth. I hope to contribute to our Village a PLANNED AND ORDERLY GROWTH, so we might forego our past mistakes. One of my first objectives would be to have a Master Plan for our sewer system formulated so we can avoid in the future problems that now plague us. We should NOT promote nor advertise for growth; we should aid it when it does present itself, to insure compliance with our new zoning ordinance, and to utilize the Planning Commission, so the growth will be a betterment to Kewaskum.



### List Tornado Safety Rules; Alert April 5

When you receive word of a tornado warning for your area, you should take immediate shelter. Seek inside shelter if possible. If in the open, move away from a tornado's path at a right angle. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

In homes with basements, seek refuge near the basement wall in the most sheltered and deepest below ground part of the basement. Additional protection is afforded by taking cover under heavy furniture or a workbench.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning and destruction during strong winds, and should be abandoned in favor of a preselected shelter, or even a ditch in the open. Damage can be minimized by securing the trailer with cables anchored in concrete footing.

Personal preparations should include availability of a battery-operated radio, in case of power loss; knowledge of safety rules and how to tell if a tornado or severe thunderstorm is approaching; and change of family plans in order to remain near shelter during a severe local storm threat.

The first tornado alert will be Thursday, April 5, at 10:00 a.m. and every first Thursday of the month thereafter. The siren will be sounded at a steady pitch for three to five minutes. There will be no "all clear" siren sounded following the warning at any time. In case of severe weather, listen to your area radio stations.


