## Plan Commission Discusses Proposed Development of 40-Acre Subdivision

The Village of Kewaskum Plan Commission met on Tuesday, July 31, to discuss the proposed development of a subdivision on 40 acres owned by Orval Behnke along Prospect Drive and the request of Bill Schaefer to fill near his residence on the Milwaukee River. No real action was taken on either item.

Primarily three property owners are involved in a possible annexation along Prospect Drive — Howard Laubenstein, Ted Meilahn, and Behnke. Laubenstein was present to tell the commission he was purchasing some land from Meilahn and would like to proceed on his own with annexation to avoid dealing with both the Town and Village of Kewaskum when applying for a building permit. Behnke was also present to ask about the process for annexation of the properties. It was stated that the property owners as individuals would inform the village of their intent to annex. This petition for annexation must be published as a class two notice in the local papers. According to Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling, both a legal description of the properties and the requested zoning must be included in the petition. A public hearing must then be held, most likely prior to a Village Board meeting. August 20 would be the earliest all of this could be arranged.

The major hitch in any annexations concerns the possible creation of an island — a portion of the Town of Kewaskum that would be surrounded by the Village of Kewaskum. The properties along Bonnie Lane would constitute such an island, and this situation is not permissible. It was indicated that Meilahn may not wish to annex his total property and that he had mentioned an alternative whereby only a 40 foot strip just north of the Behnke-Meilahn line would be annexed. This would make the properties contiguous with the Henry Timblin property to the west which is already in the village. Later, Village Attorney Jerry Kiefer stated that if two properties meet at two corners, this would qualify as being contiguous. He also said only a portion of Meilahn's may be annexed.

In another round of discussions and legal plotting, Aldwin Seefeldt represented Bill and Kathryn Schaefer in their effort to fill by the river for purposes of garage construction. Seefeldt stated that if the property lied below the 10 year flood mark, which defines it as lying within the flood way, construction was impossible. If the property was within the 100 year recurrence floodplain regulatory area, filling could be permitted if the

garage was considered an accessory structure. The problem is the exact location of the floodway elevations and the floodplain elevations relative to the Schaefer property. The 10 year flood lines was supposedly placed at the 935 foot level

(above sea level), and depending on which topographical map one looks at, it falls eastward or westward of the area where construction is desired. Once the location of the line is established, the procedure for al-

## Status of Village Finances Main Topic at Board Meeting

The main topic of discussion at the Kewaskum Village Board meeting on Monday, August 6, was the present status of village finances. The board also heard a question on assessment of land owned by Jean Backhaus. Renovation of the wastewater treatment plant was approved. An open meeting ordinance was tabled until September 4. There was a progress report on "Charlie Miller Day."

"Bill says we're solvent," President Bob Danielsen proclaimed in an obvious understatement about finances. Village Clerk and Treasurer Bill Martin then proceeded to elaborate on the various funds comprising the total available cash of \$501,637.50. The main fund is the General Fund used for day to day operation and payroll totalling \$91,185.59. The Contingency Fund is the other major fund and is comprised of monies left over at the end of the year. This amount is \$54,912.66. A Fire Service Fund gotten from fire contracts is \$25,700.79. Aid for the sewage plant from federal grants totals \$41,804.63. A Subdivision Open Space Fund is derived from \$200 paid per lot by subdividers for the development of neigh-

borhood park areas and totals \$45,599.72. Petty Cash remains constant at \$150. The Water Dept. Fund is for its day to day operation and totals \$18,684.80. The Dept. of Sanitation Fund derived from sewer usage is also for daily operation and totals \$17,857.15. A Sewage Depreciation Fund is from 2% of revenue set aside for replacement of equipment and is \$21,667.52. The Sewage Revenue Bond Fund of \$7,068.75 is to be used for payment of interest on bonds as they come due in August and February. The Park Development Fund is what's left over from the \$350,000 borrowed for the new park and now totals \$48,467.33. The Village Improvement Fund is now at \$26,038.56 and must be returned to \$50,000 by the end of the year. Some money was taken out of this fund to meet payroll recently. The Dept. of Sanitation Improvement Fund was set up to reinvest some monies in a certificate of deposit at 9 1/2%. Presently the fund is at \$100,000.

Martin noted that \$85,000 in postponed taxes from the county would be forthcoming in August. Also, the remainder of \$173,000 in state shared taxes would be received in November. About \$40,000 has already been

### Early Farm Days Aug. 19-20

The 5th annual Kewaskum Historical Society "Early Farm Days" will be held in the village park on the west side of the river on Park View Drive Saturday and Sunday, August 19 and 20, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

An added attraction this year will be a sweet corn boil on both days plus sandwiches, ice cream and soda.

## Fire Calls for Ammonia Spill And Hot Hay

The Kewaskum Fire Department received two calls on consecutive days the past week.

Shortly after 1 p.m. last Thursday firemen were summoned to Apollo's Lyre (formerly Jordans') at 1310 River-view Drive where a bottle of ammonia spilled, causing strong fumes. Brenda Wagner, 21, of 511 Indiana Ave., West Bend, who inhaled the fumes, was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by the rescue squad for treatment. Firemen used drying compound on the floor to quench the fumes and fans in the doorways and windows to draw them out.

At 10:03 a.m. Friday, firemen answered a call to the Alvin Panzer farm No. 2 on County Trunk V about one mile north of Kewaskum where chopped hay in a barn became extremely hot and began sparking. The hay was on the verge of bursting into fire, according to Chief Augie Bilgo. Firemen watered down the hay and with the aid of a backhoe removed the hay into a field. Twenty-five firemen responded to the call and remained at the scene about 2 1/2 hours.

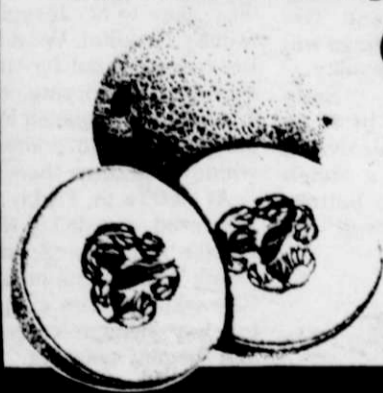

The dairy showmen was led

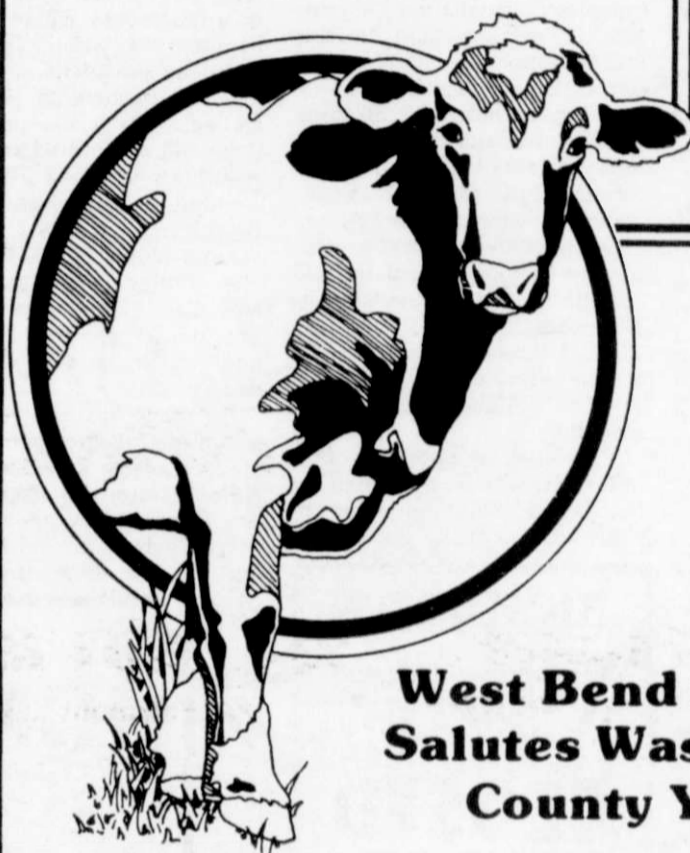

received. Although not referring to the immediate future, Martin warned that there's a "day coming when our expenses are going to catch up with our revenues." He also noted that increases in rates, as for water, do not mean increases in revenue. He cited, only as an example, that Regal Ware had cut water consumption from 25 million gallons per quarter to 12 million gallons per quarter under a new rate structure, and revenue was not therefore increased.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt also pointed out some areas of a Statement of Revenues and Expenditures that may be questioned. Due to the severe winter, the actual amount spent for snow removal was \$7,518.78, whereas only \$6,000 had initially been budgeted. Danielsen corrected this, saying that a rebudgeting had actually allowed for \$8,500. The actual amount expended for Recreation and Equipment Outlay concerned the new park and totalled \$70,837.90, although only \$5,000 had apparently been budgeted. Schmidt said panic was not necessary here, as the funds will come out of the Park Development Fund. Schmidt also stated that for insurance purposes, all equipment in the new park was valued at \$222,000.

More generally, the main revenues come from property taxes which total \$251,712.00 and shared taxes from the state. As far as expenditures, the largest amount goes for the principal of Long Term Notes at \$108,000 and the Police Department, presently at \$49,831.72 after 7 months up to a proposed annual \$83,000.

Trustee Dave Nigh had a question on the extend of, and the repayment procedure on, indebtedness for the sewage treatment plant. Martin eventually stated that \$200,000 was owed on the lab built in 1972 and \$113,000 was owed on the treatment plant built in 1955.

with \$50,000 paid each year.

Mrs. Jean Backhaus confronted the board about an increase of the assessment on two acres west of the Milwaukee River from \$650 to \$11,500. She mentioned that the land lied within the floodplain, and therefore its use is highly restricted. She claimed that the assessment was too high. Danielsen replied that it was too late to do anything this year, since the Board of Review, intended to hear such complaints, meets only once a year in May just prior to tax time.

The installation of block windows was approved along with new cabinets at the lab at the sewage treatment facilities. The board accepted a bid of \$7,848 from N & S Construction for complete installation of the block, caulking, and sealing required to close up the windows that presently promote heat loss. A bid of \$2,782 from L. Liegl was also accepted for new cabinets with lab grade formica tops. Supt. of Waste-water treatment Pete Albers also announced that the community that purchased the old coil filter was happy with it. Hennepin Paper Co. of Little Falls, Minnesota, paid \$18,000 for the device. Some of this revenue will go towards the remodeling.

A proposed open meeting ordinance will be examined by the board members prior to consideration at the September

4 meeting. Danielsen said "It's a good ordinance" that will delineate the format for an agenda, the procedures for adequate notice of five days to board members and of three days to the public. The proposed ordinance is also a statement of general intent to comply with the open meeting laws. It also specifies that closed meetings contain no business that could be taken up in an open session. The ordinance would restrict the use of secret ballots, prohibit exclusion of any board member, and require minutes and roll calls to be recorded and preserved.

Trustee Paul Blumer, as one of the members of the "Charlie Miller Day" committee, announced that the program is tentatively set for September 30 in the Kewaskum High gym. He stated that some speakers, possibly past mayors and present board members, will be on hand to honor "Charlie" for his 19 years as president of the village. Refreshments would be served. All service organizations will be notified as to their possible role in the affair. The committee comprised of Orv Behnke (Kiwanis), Homer Schaub (Lions Club), Paul Blumer (Village of Kewaskum), and Cy Wietor (Past Village Presidents) will meet again in mid-September to finalize the festivities.

In other action, \$800 was allocated for the purchase of office equipment for the Village Administrator. A bartender's license was easily approved for Jerry Buchel who will be working for the new Homestead

Supper Club. The liability insurance on the two ambulances was increased from \$300,000 to \$500,000 coverage while the premium remained stable at \$927. The emergency medical technicians were also granted liability insurance for any off-duty assistance they might give in an emergency. The premium for 16 technicians would be \$224. The fire contract with the Town of Auburn will be increased 4.2% to \$9,485. They presently contract for 10 fire calls, while the Town of Kewaskum contracts for 18 fire calls. The volunteer fire department members will also have their rate of pay increased from \$3.50 per hour to \$4.00 per hour for any calls beyond the limits of the contract. Raynor Herriges was appointed President Pro-Tem from August 12-26 as Danielsen will be out of town.

tion for filling can be made to the DNR. They may make any recommendations within 30 days before any action can be taken. It was agreed that Charles Miller would look into the matter and attempt to locate the data upon which the topographical map of the village done by Alster and Associates was based. Miller also noted that Donohue and Associates are presently re-mapping the floodplain areas of this part of the state. If no data can be located, a determination of the line may be made by the village which would then allow or preclude the filling.

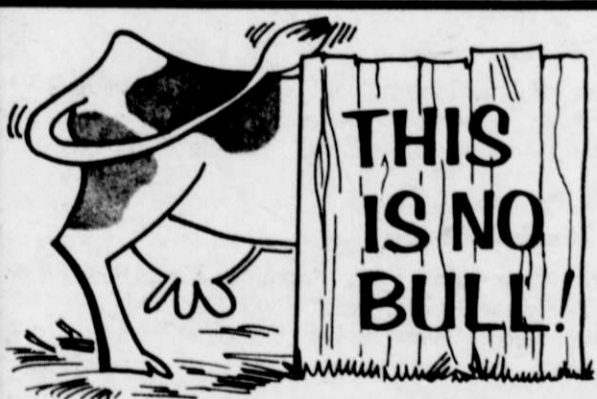
Seefeldt also questioned if 935 was the correct elevation for the 10 year floodway. The zoning ordinances do not specify an elevation. He said it seemed too high. The 937 foot level is in the middle of River View Drive and not since the early forties has the water risen much above the Schaefer's orchard land during the spring floods. Seefeldt wished to have the commission find out exactly where the line is so an applica-

**The FBI Needs Direction**

Many horror stories of illegal or questionable activities by the Federal Bureau of Investigation — break-ins, burglaries, unwarranted spying, etc. — have resulted in justifiable calls for strictly defined limits on what it can and cannot do in performing its criminal investigation functions. Last week I cosponsored legislation with the Chairman of the Senate and House Judiciary Committees — Senator Edward Kennedy and Representative Peter Rodino — to create a charter for the FBI to clearly define its powers for the first time.

If passed, this legislation will protect American citizens from a recurrence of past FBI abuses and violations of individual civil rights, while at the same time strengthening our top investigative agency to do a more effective law enforcement job.

The bill, which has been endorsed by the President, does several things. One, it specifically prohibits FBI spying on groups or individuals because of their religious or political beliefs, without cause to believe they have committed crimes. This is to curb the past indiscriminate spying on controversial political activists, like the late Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., the FBI conducted.

Two, it would limit the Director of the FBI to a single ten-year term of office. A limit on the term would prevent a

recurrence of the abuses and ignoring of Presidential and Congressional directives that happened in the past.

Three, it would more clearly define the roles and rights of informants and FBI undercover agents. In the past, for example, informants sometimes committed crimes in the guise of securing information for the FBI. That is wrong, and the proposed charter would make it clear that informants will be held fully responsible for illegal activities.

The FBI bill will be sharply debated, as it addresses many questions of the rights and powers of the Bureau vs. those of individuals. The balance between the two is very fine and fragile, so discussion will be lively.

The FBI needs guidelines and direction, so the American people will be assured that it will perform its duties effectively and fairly, without violating individual rights. The FBI charter bill I have cosponsored will accomplish that.

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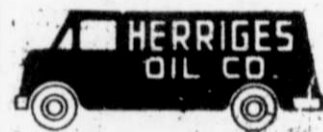

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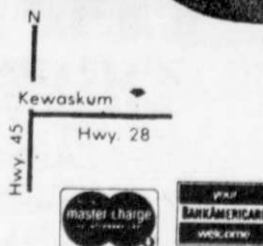
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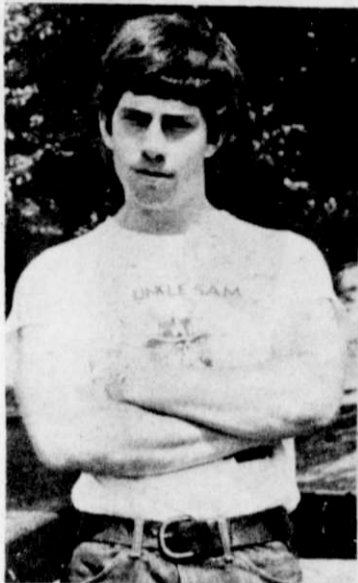

## State Aids for Local Recreation Projects Available

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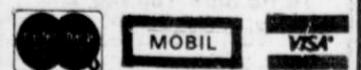

### Sugar Snap Peas Add Variety to Meals

A new variety of garden peas can add variety to summertime meals, says Mary Mennes, University of Wisconsin-Extension food service administration specialist. Serve sugar snap peas as a vegetable—whole or sliced crosswise—or use in salads or soups. They make interesting cocktail dippers, too.

Sugar snap peas are similar to snow peas. Both have edible pods, but the sugar snap variety is a bit larger and is still tender and flavorful after the peas are formed, says Mennes.

The pods fill with peas in about 70 days but are best for eating before they mature. Harvest sugar snap peas when the

peas are about 1/8 to 1/4 inch in diameter.

Keep sugar snap peas in the refrigerator. Wrap the pods in plastic wrap or store in a plastic bag. But don't wash them until serving time.

Maximum storage is about 10 days. After that, they begin to turn starchy.

To serve sugar snap peas as a hot vegetable, cook only four or five minutes—unless the peas are very tiny. For stir-fried dishes, cook about two or three minutes so they're just tender-crisp, says Mennes.

This summertime treat can perk up next winter's meals, too, if you put some aside. But

don't try canning sugar snap peas, says Mennes. Processing for safety would just turn them to mush.

Instead freeze them following these simple directions. First, wash the peas, then blanch for about one and a half to two minutes. Chill in ice cold water for five minutes. Drain well and package in moisture and vapor proof containers designed for freezing. For more efficient packaging, remove the stem end before freezing.

Sugar snap peas will store well in the freezer for eight to ten months, but you'll probably want to enjoy them long before the next crop comes along.

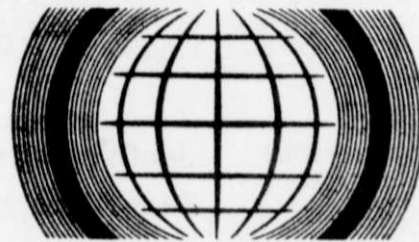
Over \$25,000 in prizes is being offered during the derby with the grand prize of a Hawaiian vacation to be determined by a drawing among the top five anglers in each cate-

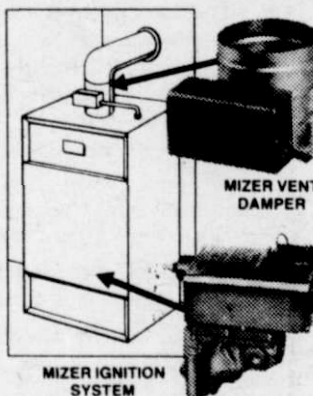
