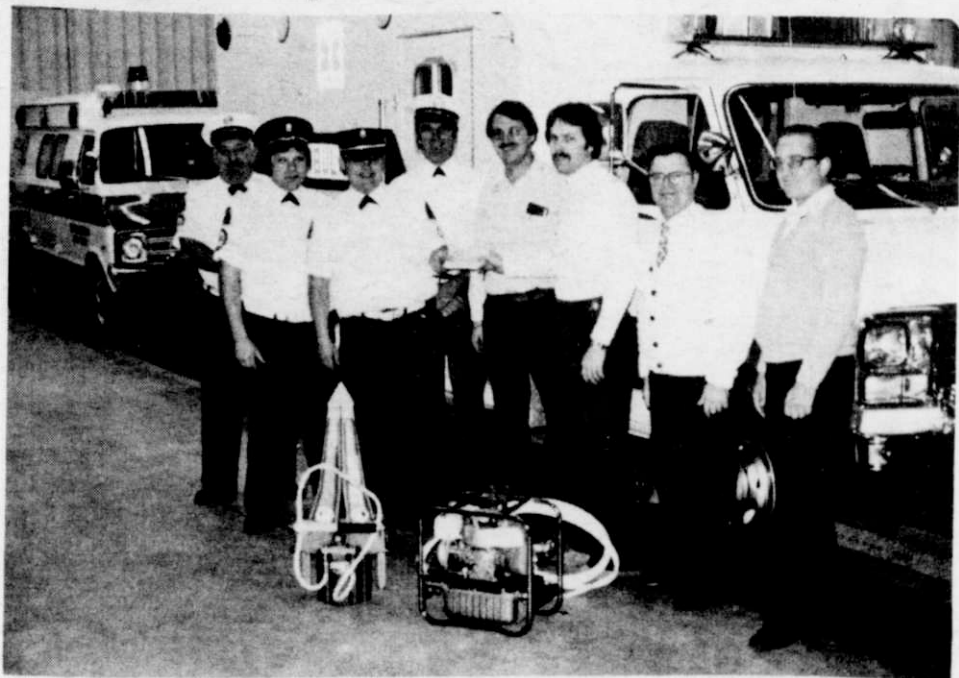

The Kewaskum Fire Department and Rescue Squad received a new safety and rescue tool on Thursday evening, November 15. The Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum donated the \$5,981 necessary to purchase the Hurst "Jaws of Life" extrication device which can save victims from the jaws of death when

trapped in a damaged automobile or other accident.

Rescue Squad Captain, Michael Fierke, was extremely enthusiastic and appreciative about the tool. He declared that the village's rescue team "is VERY grateful for this" and thanked the Kiwanis profusely. He noted that this was their second donation to the Fire Department, the first being for a "Resusci-Annie" with a re-

cording device for practicing CPR. For an official presentation of the check, the Kiwanis was represented by Dennis Connor, President; Ronald Johann, Treasurer; and Gene Bohn. Among the thankful firemen accepting the check were Chief Augie Bilgo, Assistant Chief Don Ehnert, Rescue Lieutenant Larry Williams, and Fierke.

NO PARKING FROM 2 TO 6 A.M.

Winter Parking Ordinance Approved by Village Board

On Monday, November 19, the Kewaskum Village Board approved a revised version of the new winter parking ordinance. Signs are being posted at the village limits proclaiming a parking ban during the hours of 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. from December 1 to April 1 to allow for more efficient snow removal. A period of only 3 minutes parking is allowed for actual loading or unloading of passengers during these times. The owners of illegally parked cars will be requested by the police to move their vehicles. A fine of \$15 plus any penalty assessment or court costs will be imposed and the car may be towed away upon the order of an officer when the vehicle directly interferes with snowplowing or hauling operations. The same penalties apply during a snow emergency when the parking ban hours may be extended.

The board heard at length a proposal from Permutit Co. to bring in a pilot project sludge conditioner for two weeks to demonstrate the effectiveness of the unit before a full-scale unit is installed. The board approved this method of guaranteeing the equipment's ability to maintain a consistency of sludge that could be hauled in a dump truck. It also endorsed testing the actual unit for 100 calendar days for mechanical soundness with Permutit agreeing to replace any parts and to remove the equipment if the village was not satisfied.

The proposed 1980 village budget involving a total of \$1,665,574 was explained by Administrator Schmidt. The taxpayers will be responsible for a total of \$963,497. A budget summary is published in this week's Statesman, and a public hearing and possible acceptance of the budget will occur on Monday, November 26, 1979, at 7:00 p.m.

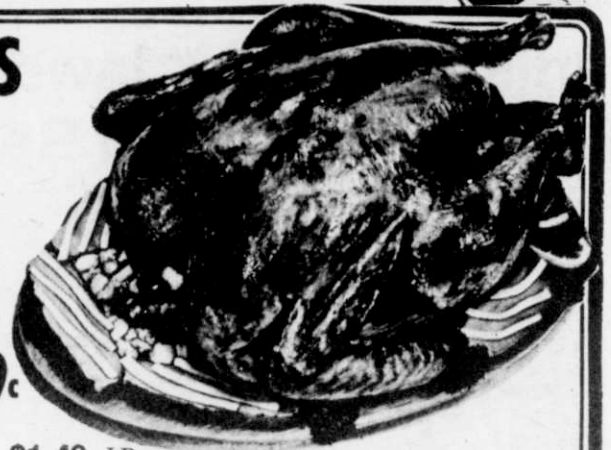

**Cyclist Dies of
Crash Injuries**

Daniel R. Metternich, 21, of 4090 Lake Drive, West Bend, died Saturday, November 17, at Hartford Memorial Hospital as a result of injuries received in a car-motorcycle accident along Lake Drive in the Town of West Bend. Metternich died after his motorcycle struck a pickup truck driven by Mark R. Zabkowitz, 32, of 3943 Oak Avenue, West Bend.

Sheriff's deputies said Zabkowitz was driving eastbound on Lake Drive when the driver of a vehicle in front of him motioned him to pass. Zabkowitz did so but then continued in the wrong lane. He was stopping for a mailbox when Metternich's motorcycle headed towards him from over a hill crest. Deputies said Metternich

attempted to stop but struck the right front fender of Zabkowitz's truck. Metternich died of massive internal injuries at 3:30 p.m.

Metternich was born in West Bend on April 30, 1958, and grew up in the Town of West Bend and lived there until his death.

He graduated with the Class of 1976 from West Bend West High School and was employed as a construction worker at Hahn Construction Company in Hartford.

Survivors include his parents, Robert and Shirley (Boden) of West Bend; one sister, Nancy (Robert) Beske of Kewaskum; one brother, Scott of West Bend; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Hildegard Boden of West Bend, and other relatives and friends.

He was preceded in death by a brother, Stephen G. on February 16, 1969.

He was a member of the West Bend Aqua Club.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at the Schmidt Funeral Home, West Bend, to St. Frances Cabrini Church for Mass of Christian Burial at 8 p.m. with Fr. Leo Lambert, celebrant. Burial was in Washington County Memorial Park on Wednesday morning.

Visitation at the funeral home was from 4 p.m. on Tuesday until the time of services.

Firemen Become Familiar With Operation of New 'Jaws of Life' Device

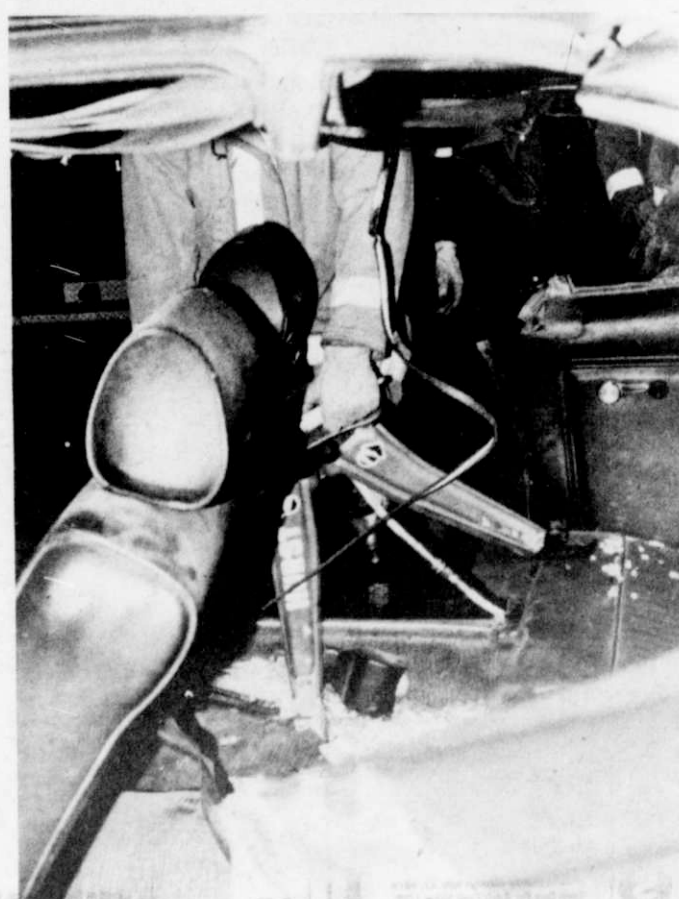
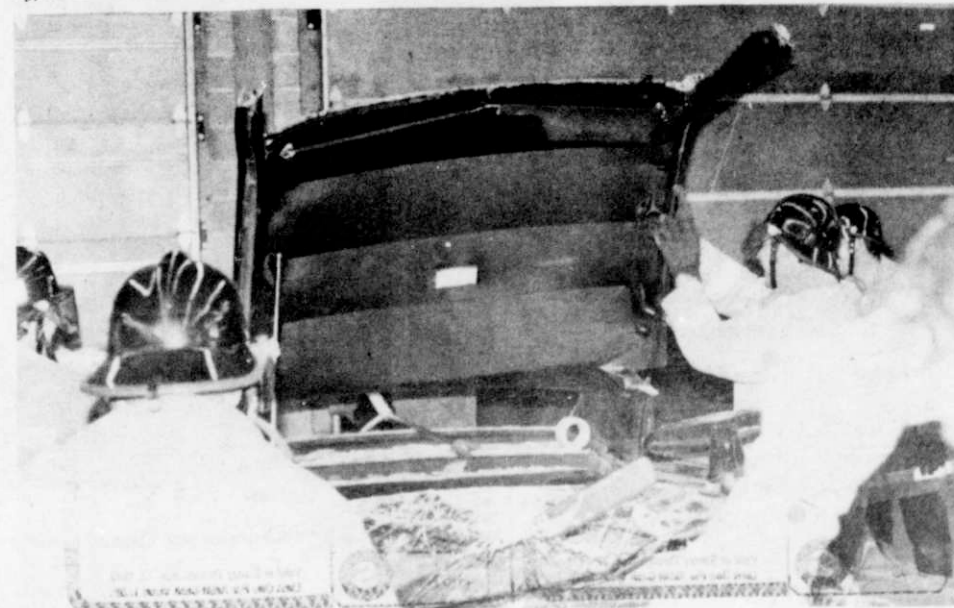
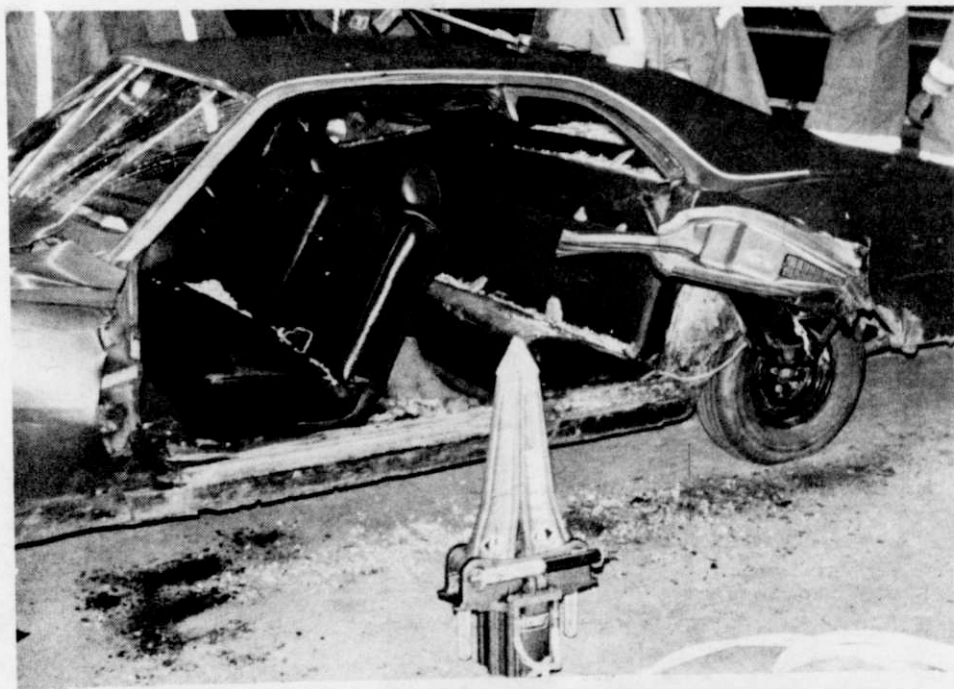
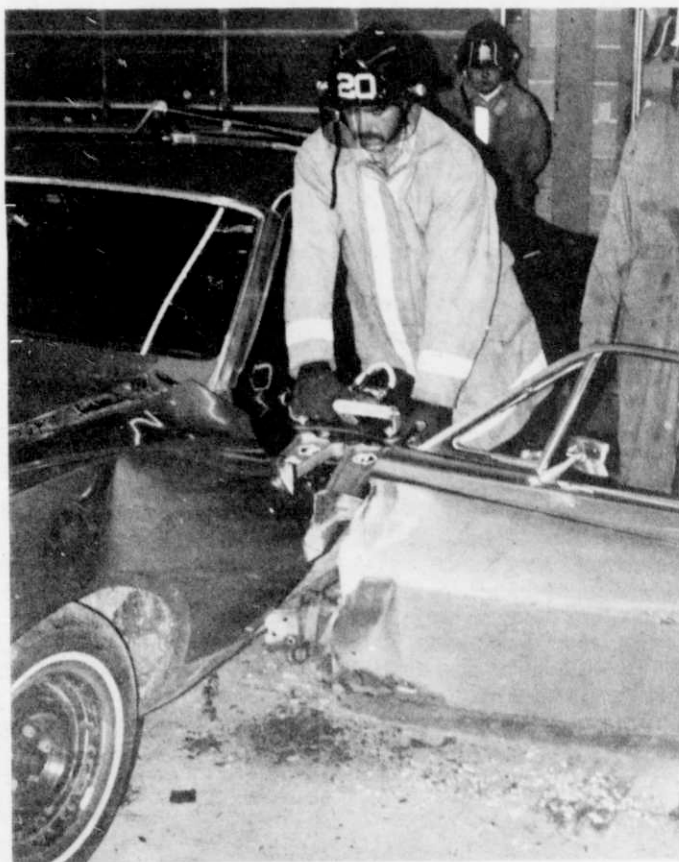
Ron Naab, of the Hurst Safety Products Division, explained the operation and uses of the deceptively small device which can rip off a car door, cut off a car roof, or cut into metal like a can opener. The equipment consists of a power unit with a 5 horsepower Chrysler engine and a rescue tool unit of 2 - 2 foot titanium alloy "jaws." When the jaws are held much like a chain saw and braced against the thigh; a rescuer can outwardly direct a virtual irresistible force of 12,000 pounds per square inch, in a pincer motion to perform whatever rescue tasks he may desire. This immense force is achieved through a hydraulic system that generates and maintains a pressure of 5,000 p s i. The engine and pumping unit is connected to the jaws by a 16-foot double hose. Four to five quarts of aircraft hydraulic fluid are used within the system, although any liquid could be used.

Various attachments allow the "Jaws of Life" to perform many rescue operations, some of which were later demonstrated on a junked car in the fire station. The regular tips are used for prying or otherwise opening a space up to 32 inches. The jaws can be directed towards bolt heads of door hinges and easily break it off to allow entry or can be plunged into a concrete block wall, and through its outward pressure, gouge out a 32-inch hole for ventilation or escape. The unit can also act as a jack to lift machines or cars off of victims. A cable and bar cutting attachment which fits between the

jaws can shear off 8-inch rods or the roof supports of a car when the pressure is directed inward. As was demonstrated, the roof can then be bent back by 2 or 3 people to allow access for rescue. Another tip allows the jaws to cut out a 1-inch strip in one direction for entry through a steel building, granary, or a locked fire door. The jaws can be hooked between two chains - one around the car's steering column and the other around the car's stabilizing rods - and generate an inward force to pry the steering wheel upward and away from a victim's chest. Most of the above rescue tech-

niques were performed on an unsuspecting Ford Falcon amid the discordant creaking and crumpling of steel and the throbbing of the small engine.

Naab saw that each fireman present had a chance to use the tool and encouraged them to use the "Jaws of Life" in a creative manner to overcome obstacles during a rescue as quick as possible. As an observer, it was very reassuring to know that this equipment is available for a rescue within the Kewaskum area. We are indeed fortunate to have only the third "Jaws of Life" within Washington County.

1980 WISCONSIN CALENDAR NOW ON SALE



The vibrant purple and white flowers of the violet, Wisconsin's floral symbol, are pictured on the cover of the 1980 Wisconsin Calendar, published by the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. The Calendar is now available in book, gift, drug, and retail stores and newsstands throughout Wisconsin.

The 1980 Calendar has several new features. For this year's black and white photographs the Calendar editors turned to the Society's collection of nearly one million historic photographic images of life in the upper mid-west. Included is a photo of Calvin Coolidge celebrating his fifty-sixth birthday in Brule in 1928 with a coat-and-tie canoe trip. Another historic photo shows the Alma Milling Company fire which occurred on April 6, 1899. President Franklin Roosevelt is pictured visiting a Milwaukee manufacturing plant in 1942.

Along with the historic photos, the Calendar carries notes of historic dates in the progress of Wisconsin from the first sale

of public lands, in 1834 (November 10); the day the first issue of Wisconsin's first newspaper, The Green Bay Intelligencer and Wisconsin Democrat, appeared in 1833 (December 11); to the date the State Constitution was adopted by the voters in 1848 (March 13).

The contemporary color photographs were selected from more than 6700 submitted by 636 photographers and chronicle the life of Wisconsin. There are scenes from Wisconsin's ever changing and contrasting seasons and scenery. People and animals at work and at play are present in both the historic black and white photos as well as the contemporary color pictures.

The Wisconsin Calendar has been published each year since 1948 and continues in its traditional 6 by 8-inch format. It includes a separate appointment page for each week of the year, and record-keeping and personal directory pages.

The calendar costs \$3.50. If not available locally it may also

be ordered postage paid, by mail from Department M, State Historical Society of Wisconsin, 816 State Street, Madison, 53706. Information is also available on discount rates for purchases of 12 or more. Community fund raising groups, businesses, and professionals may also order quantities of the calendar printed with their own message or greeting.

Calendar sales augment the Society's publications budget, which is only partially financed out of state tax revenues.

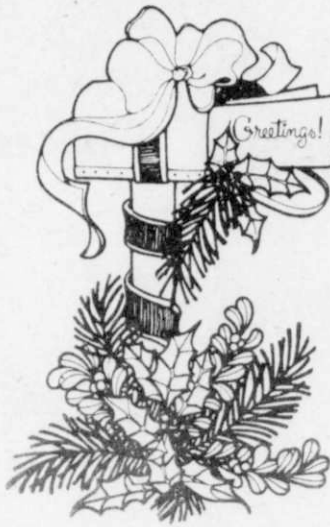

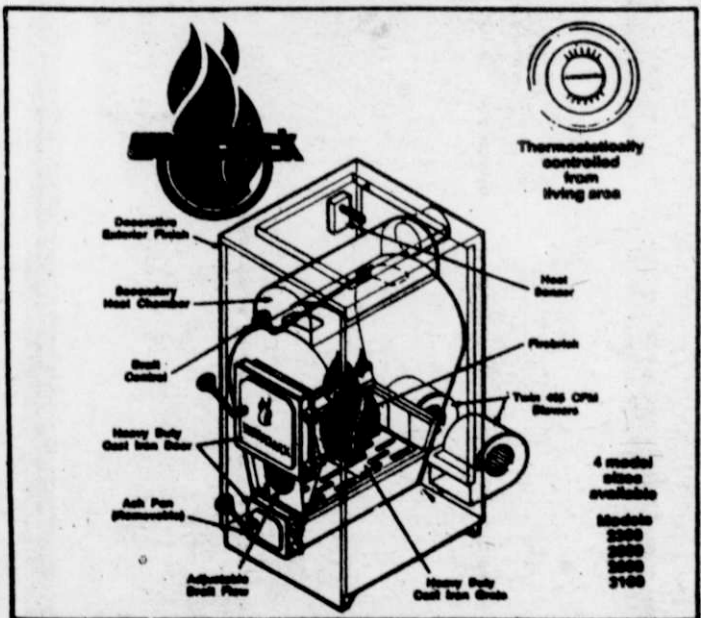

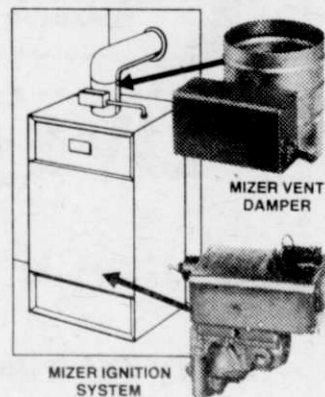

Farmers Expand Storage Space

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) helped 48 county farmers add much more storage space to their farms during the 1978-79 period. Many others are to be disbursed after completion.

Ira A. Oelhafen, Chairperson of the ASC committee, said funds are still available for farmers who wish to build additional facilities or to expand their present storage structures. Loans are also available for building high-moisture forage and silage storage space and solar grain drying systems.

"Adequate on-farm storage and drying facilities provide farmers with greater crop handling and marketing flexibility at harvest time," Oelhafen said. Farmers can reduce field losses by harvesting when the crop is ready, and can store crops in good condition until prices rise.

ASCS will loan farmers up to \$50,000 on structures adequate to store two years' crops, with 15 percent down and 10.5 percent interest. Loan payment terms allow for a maximum of seven equal annual installments over a period of eight years.

Oelhafen further pointed out that farmers will probably want more storage in years to come because the ability to hold on to

grain may prove the difference between profit and loss.

Last year in Scenic Moraine

Indians to Host West Bend East In Opener; 8 Lettermen Back

The Kewaskum Indians will open the 1979-80 basketball season next Tuesday night, November 27, when they take on West Bend East of the Little Ten Conference in a home game. Following this they will play at Plymouth Friday, November 30, and at St. Mary's Springs, Fond du Lac, before opening the Scenic Moraine Conference season at Slinger December 7.

This will be Kewaskum's last year in the Scenic Moraine, which is made up half of Class A schools, and the Indians would like to bow out with a bang. The Scenic Moraine will be broken up at the end of this school year and Kewaskum will join the Eastern Wisconsin Conference next year. The strong Scenic Moraine added more laurels and prestige late in summer and this fall when Hartland won the state baseball title, Slinger's Cathy Branta won the state cross country title (best time in both Class A and B), and Germantown was a state finalist in the football playoffs.

Indian Coach Jim Westphal is also optimistic, having eight letter winners back from last year's team, four of them starters, but the 1978-79 team had a dismal 3-17 record. The Indians' only victories were over Pewaukee and Grafton in conference, and Campbellsport

in the regional tournament. But they gave everyone a battle in the second half of the season, including Hartland, co-champion with Mayville.

The Indians' improved play in the second half was attributed to the return of Tom Kern, who suffered a severely sprained ankle early in the season. Kern, a 6-3 senior, will be a three-year starter. He averaged 11 points a game.

Another top returnee will be 5-7 guard Henry Schilter, who averaged 13 points per game. Also available is 6-3 senior forward Bob Nigh, who started every game last season. Three seniors, 5-11 Joel Herriges, 6-2 Randy Gust and 6-0 Scott Brendemihl, shared the other forward spot last year.

Other senior letter winners are 6-0 forward Todd Schultz and 5-7 guard Al Dominguez, whose older brother, Ray was the only starter lost to graduation.

The Indians size will be better and they will be deeper with two players at every position. They were basically a junior team last season.

Two newcomers who may help are 6-1 sophomore Brian Larsen, who has been impressive, and 5-10 junior guard Jim Rohlinger, high scorer on last year's JV team. Other squad members are Perry Kempf, Tim

Kougl, Jim Geldreich, Ken Schuette, Mike Geidel, Todd Schultz and Kevin Stautz.

Westphal, starting his sixth year, picks Hartland Arrowhead to repeat as conference champion. They shared the title last year with mainly a junior team. "They're big and tough," Westphal said they'll miss the rivalries in the Scenic Moraine

but its awfully tough when you're playing these big people in the big schools all the time. We think Germantown will also be tough with their colored star, Jerry Vance, and tall Mike Franolucci back to lead the way. Vance, the Milwaukee Sentinel's football "Player of the Year," an all-state prospect, is one of Wisconsin's outstanding

prep stars.
