Two Meetings Held; Citizens Voice Opinions

Board Denies Apollo's Lyre Dance Permits

In a closed session Tuesday evening, the Kewaskum Village Board voted unanimously to deny the Apollo's Lyre tavern any dance permits for an indefinite period.

Apollo's Lyre, located at 1310 Riverview Drive, featured live rock bands on Saturday nights. Several dances had been scheduled in May. According to ordinances and statutes, the village board has the authority to grant or deny the permits.

The closed meeting was called for at another special meeting on Monday night at the Valley Bank to hear all interested persons in regard to the Apollo's Lyre dance permit situation. The owner of the tavern Ralph Scott, and his two sons, Randolph and Robert, who manage the establishment, were represented by their attorney, Charles Hathaway. The village was represented by its attorney, Jerry Kiefer. A court reporter was also present to record nearly two hours of testimony.

Hathaway had suggested that the board might wish to de-

liberate with its own counsel before making a decision. The closed session to vote on future dance permits could legally be held according to State Statute 19:85 (1) (A) which permits "deliberating concerning a case which was the subject of any judicial or quasi-judicial trial or hearing before that governmental body."

At Monday night's public hearing, the citizenry, police, and representatives of Apollo's Lyre each voiced their views - pro or con.

Many of the citizen complaints were familiar - excessive noise from music and dispersing crowds, vandalism, littering, inadequacy of parking, and possible inadequacy of toilet facilities.

Dale Vetter, although recognizing the problems felt that the Scotts had been cooperative and attempted solutions. Vetter added that Scott had invited the neighbors to a Sunday get-acquainted session as a gesture of good will.

Jim Ostrom referred to the problems as a "totally unacceptable situation" and cited tree damage and noise. He later

Nominated for FFA State Farmer Degree

She will be attending UWWC next fall to major in Dairy Science and Ag. Journalism. Barbara earned the State Farmer Degree on the basis of a supervised occupational experience program, leadership qualities and responsibilities, cooperative activities and the operation and management in her occupational experience program.

David Rizzardi and Gordon Darmody are the high school vocational agriculture instructors and FFA advisors for Kewaskum High School.

An 11 mile course has been set up with the starting point being the Kewaskum Firemen's Park. The Kewaskum Chapter of the Jaycees will aid the Foundation in patrolling the course and manning the check-point stations.

Cystic Fibrosis, a genetic disease is a leading cause of death in children. In CF a thick sticky mucus clogs the lungs and airways creating breathing difficulties, high susceptibility to infection and lung damage. CF is still incurable but gains have been made in prolonging the life span of people infected with it.

Signs of lung damage disease include:

1. Recurrent wheezing
2. Persistent coughing/excessive mucus
3. Pneumonia more than once
4. Excessive appetite/poor weight gain
5. Clubbing (enlargement of fingertips)

Cystic Fibrosis signs may also include:

6. Salty taste of the skin
7. Persistent bulky diarrhea
8. Nasal polyps

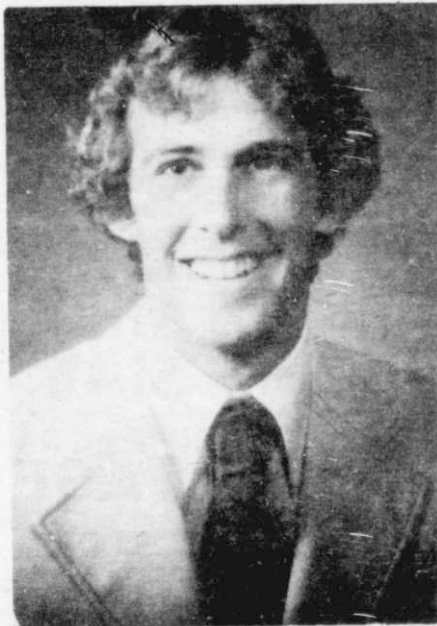
During the time of registration the cost of the license is 50c. After June 1, the cost will be \$1.00.

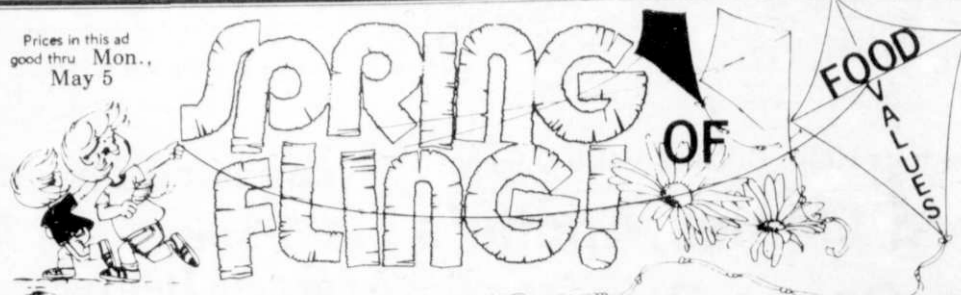

Grass Fires Plague Firemen

Tinder-like conditions last week sparked fires all across the state and caused numerous grass fires to plague firemen. Plymouth reported 21 grass fires in one weekend, Campbell-sport had 10 grass fires in one week, and most fire departments in nearby communities were also kept busy before a damp weekend relieved dangerous conditions.

Fortunately Kewaskum firemen had only one call. Shortly before 7 p.m. last Wednesday the firemen responded to a grass fire about a mile south of Kewaskum alongside the Chicago & North Western Railroad tracks adjacent to Hwy. 45. The fire broke out in several

places, spreading northward towards the Dairyland Seed buildings and jumped across County Trunk H. The blaze spread right around boxcars and had firemen worried.

The fire is believed to have been caused by a passing train heading north through West Bend and Kewaskum, which also caused two separate fires in the Town of West Bend. Spokesmen for the West Bend and Kewaskum fire departments said a hot box on the freight train caused the fires to break out. The West Bend fires were north of the city along Hwy. 45. That department also answered two grass fire calls the same afternoon.

referred directly to village ordinances prohibiting public nuisances such as loud and unnecessary noise, obstruction of the streets, and behavior which offended public morals. He felt most of these were being violated.

Dave Wietor, after complaining of noise audible nearly a block away, said, "I feel I have my individual rights that I'm entitled to as a taxpayer. I think they're being violated." Later, he commented that the basic question was "Is the facility built for this type of business?"

John Brandl felt there was more noise now than under the previous management. He said it also took 10 minutes for him to get into his driveway one night because the street was blocked by people and cars. He felt that limiting the consumption of alcohol by some patrons was the responsibility of the owner.

Scott Waranius said that the noise from the bands was over 50 decibels. He felt that boarding up the windows was not sufficient acoustic insulation. Later he added that a noise pollution code similar to Oshkosh should be looked into.

Many citizens complained of people urinating in their yards or against their buildings. Others felt that even though a petition was given to the owners and that certain attempts were made to correct some conditions, the owners merely glossed over the situation. Another person directly stated that dance permits should be denied to the tavern.

Chief of Police Don Hlavaty noted that the patrons of Apollo's Lyre are not primarily local; they come from Oshkosh, Watertown, Waupun, Fort Atkinson, Madison, Fond du Lac, Milwaukee and other communities. He said there had been over 100 official complaints and 27 arrests associated with the tavern over the last 10 months. Of 421 parking tickets issued in the village, 298 of them could be related to the tavern. He said that in any meeting with the management, the Scotts were always cordial and cooperative. However, he added, "We feel in the best interest of the village, dance permits should be denied."

Attorney Hathaway advoca-

ted a "get tough" policy to deal with obnoxious patrons. He felt that if these people were "educated" through fines or jailing, they would not return to Kewaskum for rowdiness. He referred to the situations as "intolerable" and said some patrons resorted to "animalistic behavior" outside and should be dealt with accordingly.

He also suggested the use of a decibel meter to monitor noise levels as well as set standards for the entire village. He felt that the tavern crew could help pick up litter the mornings after dances. Hathaway also felt his client should and would be willing to pay for any extra police needed.

Robert Scott, one of the co-managers, reported on past efforts to control the noise by boarding up the windows and installing air conditioners. He assured the group that all doors would be kept shut over the summer if there were any dances. He added that 18 or 19 hard core trouble makers are not allowed in the establishment. Dances have been limited to only Saturday nights. He said that he was not aware of the extent of the problems outside. Everything seemed under control on the inside.

Bob Scott also suggested some possible solutions in the future. He agreed that crowds could be limited to 300 and advocated a "no pass out rule" whereby people could not leave the premises and return without paying again. As for the loudness of the music, he said, "We'd turn the bands down or turn them off." The idea of extra officers was also acceptable to him.

Bob Scott continued that he and his brother were rock musicians and "very serious about our music." He also wished to let all the good kids into the establishment. As he looked over some of the patrons and bartenders that attended the meeting, he said, "They look pretty nice to me!"

Bob Scott continued that "if a get tough policy did not work, we'd just cut it out," referring to the possibility of running just a tavern and sponsoring wedd-

ing dances. He said that personally he had not much to lose, but that his parents "have their entire lives on the line." Commenting on his obvious worry about the business, he said, "Even when its quiet, I don't sleep."

Both Ralph and Bob Scott emphasized that they were willing to try anything.

The village board members asked several questions and expressed their opinions prior to the vote for a closed session. Trustee Don Mlodzik wanted to know if the citizens would be willing to go along with dances for two months if the same restrictions as additional officers were made as had been April 19. Brandl responded that he'd prefer no dance permits be issued until some steps were taken.

Trustee Raynor Herriges still claimed that parking was the essential problem. He also felt the building was "not equipped for this type of business." He continued that wedding dances were fine but if people come in from outside areas "we're asking for trouble and we don't need that in this village."

Trustee Carl Spoeth, who lives near the tavern, said that extensive measures were needed to control the situation but that the question really was "Should we have to do this?" His own reply was "I don't feel we should have to go through all this to control the situation."

President Jerry Stollenwerk said that if a permit was issued, at least temporary solutions to the problems were a requirement prior to Saturday, May 3, when a dance was scheduled.

Of course, now there is no need for temporary solutions as an edict from the board has apparently silenced Kewaskum's version of Saturday Night Live.



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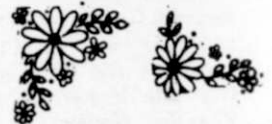

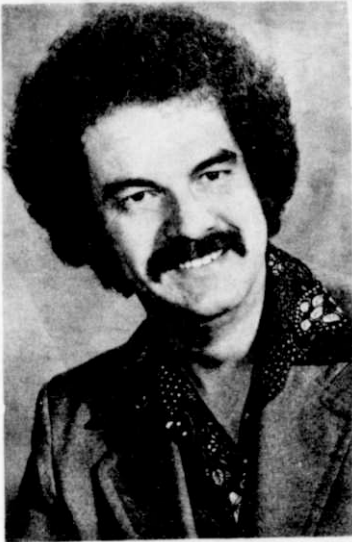

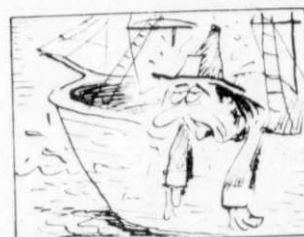

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Gerald Stollenwerk presided. All Village Trustee members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of March 17, 1980, were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee R. Herriges, seconded by Trustee P. Blumer. Voice vote was unanimous.

Parks and Recreation Chairman Spoeth presented a recommended list of summer employees to the Board. He mentioned there had been a total of 53 applicants and the basis for employment was village residency, qualifications and age. Motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee P. 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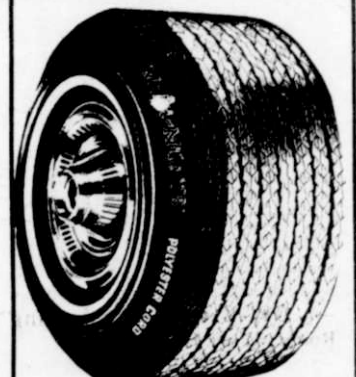

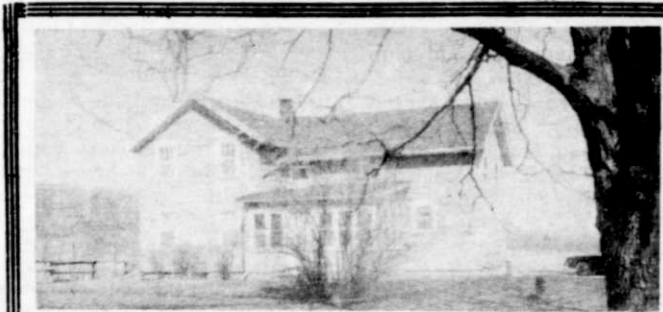
