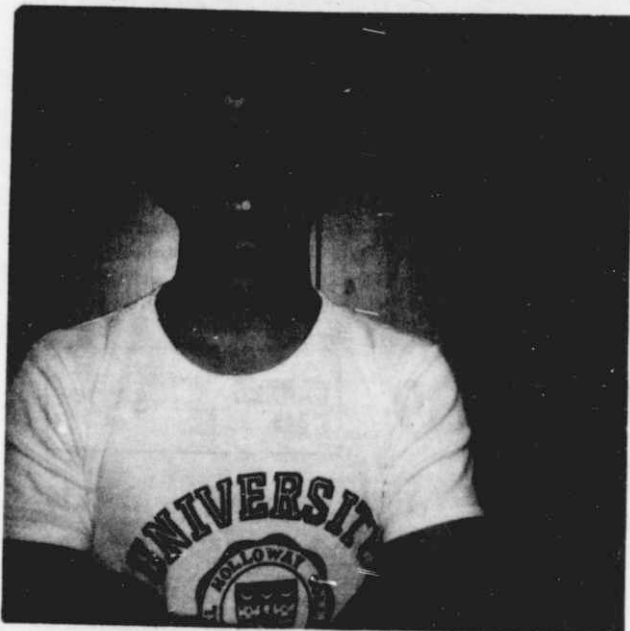

Returns From Summer AFS Exchange Program to England

Ken Scott, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Scott of rural Kewaskum, recently returned from an AFS exchange program to England for the summer.

Ken, who is a 17-year-old senior at Kewaskum High School, has one younger brother and two younger sisters here in Kewaskum. He is an excellent student who has been active in AFS and German clubs, the band and jazz band, newspaper staff, Key club, forensics, pit band for musicals, track, and National Honor Society. He also works part-time at the A & W Root Beer Stand.

His summer in England was spent with the Michael Wall family in a rural area, on a dairy farm. Ken's English family had one older brother and sister, and one younger brother and sister. The Wall family was very close-knit and lived a casual life style.

Ken was not too enthusiastic about the English weather. He said it was cool and wet most of the time, but he didn't see any London fog.

Ken arrived in time to spend several weeks in their schools. All students wear a uniform to school. Boys wear black pants, blue shirts, black blazers with the school emblem and black shoes and ties. Girls wear dark skirts and a sweater with a

blouse under it. They wear white stockings and black shoes. Jeans and tennis shoes are absolutely out.

Only one day of his stay was spent in London. The balance of his stay as a "Grockle" foreigner was as a part of the Wall family as a dairy farmer. He helped with all types of farm work. He learned how to scrap dung and even milk cows.

Ken, who is completely overwhelmed by his experiences, is ready to encourage any interested students to look into this type of exchange program. He feels it has built self confidence in him and he'd do it again. Ken feels he was able to fit into the family and it made it work. Little things, like learning to eat European style, helped him to become a member of their family.

Ken also warns anyone going to England — if anyone asks you if you have to spend a penny — don't get out your change — they're simply asking you if you have to go to the bathroom.

Career Planning Program at KHS

On October 15, all juniors at Kewaskum high school will have an opportunity to participate in a career guidance and educational planning program, the ACT Career Planning Program. This program is designed to help young adults make better decisions about their educational and career plans. Mike Theiler, counselor at Kewaskum high school points out that national studies reflect that 11th grade student rank ordered "help with career planning" as their most important need. Yet, in many school settings this need, currently, is not being addressed. It is in response to this need that Kewaskum high school instituted the opportunity to participate in the Career Planning Program.

Participating students complete the Career Planning Program assessment instrument which measures the students' career related interests, experiences, abilities, and plans. The information is developed into a report for each student to help them relate this information about themselves to career options and the world to work. The reports will be reviewed with students in group and individual counseling sessions following the administration of the program. Theiler stated that the Career Planning Program is more than an assessment experience, but rather a first step, or foundation for the start of each student's career journey.

About 48% of last year's seniors at Kewaskum high school said they were planning further education after high school. 17% were planning toward a technical/vocational program, and 31% were aiming for four years or more of college attendance. "The aim of the school's guidance program is to assist all of these students, regardless of their objectives, with the process of learning about and exploring career opportunities," said Clark Pearson, principal at Kewaskum high school. "We feel the Career Planning Program will help us accomplish that aim."

Bel Ric Residents Confront Board on Vandalism Problem

One of the major topics brought before the Village Board Monday evening was the continuing problem of vandalism and general misbehavior by a small group of 11-16-year old juveniles in the Bel Ric Acres subdivision. Vandalism ranged from damage to residences and cars to painting obscene comments on the curbing, along with thefts. Residents stated not all these children lived in the subdivision.

The spokesperson for the group of residents stated that while the police patrolled the area, it is difficult for one man to cover the entire village. This person also stated some residents were afraid to appear before the board because of reprisals against their homes and families.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated funds had been allocated for an unmarked car in 1979, but no funds had been set aside for 1980. The matter was turned over to the Protection and Public Safety Committee.

Other business included bidding for construction of a raft in the Kiwanis Park pool. The board voted to accept the low bid of Feldner Construction, St. Cloud, at a cost of \$27,600.00, with completion 45 days from the start of construction.

Acceptance of the bid was subject to two minor points. Work to begin by October 1 and

if Feldner is not in compliance, the contract would go to W.B. Construction, West Bend, with a second low bid of \$31,363.00.

A representative of the Kewaskum Sno-Chiefs asked for and received 1980-81 use approval for the club's snowmobile trails which enter the village.

A building permit was granted Regal Ware for "bringing to grade level only" footings and foundations for their proposed new addition.

A study is being made into increasing rates for the Water Department. After completion of the study, if necessary, application would be made to the Public Service Commission in Madison. The Water Department has been operating at a loss for the first seven months of 1980.

Discussion was held on the use of a pit on the Roger Neuman farm for the storage of sludge from the wastewater treatment plant. Discussion was tabled until other alternatives could be checked out.

Approval was given for storm drain ditch work in the Roseland Drive area. Cost of clearing these ditches into the creek would run approximately \$2,000.00.

Cable TV has requested a meeting in Kewaskum to be held September 29 at 7:30 in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

The board then went into closed meeting.

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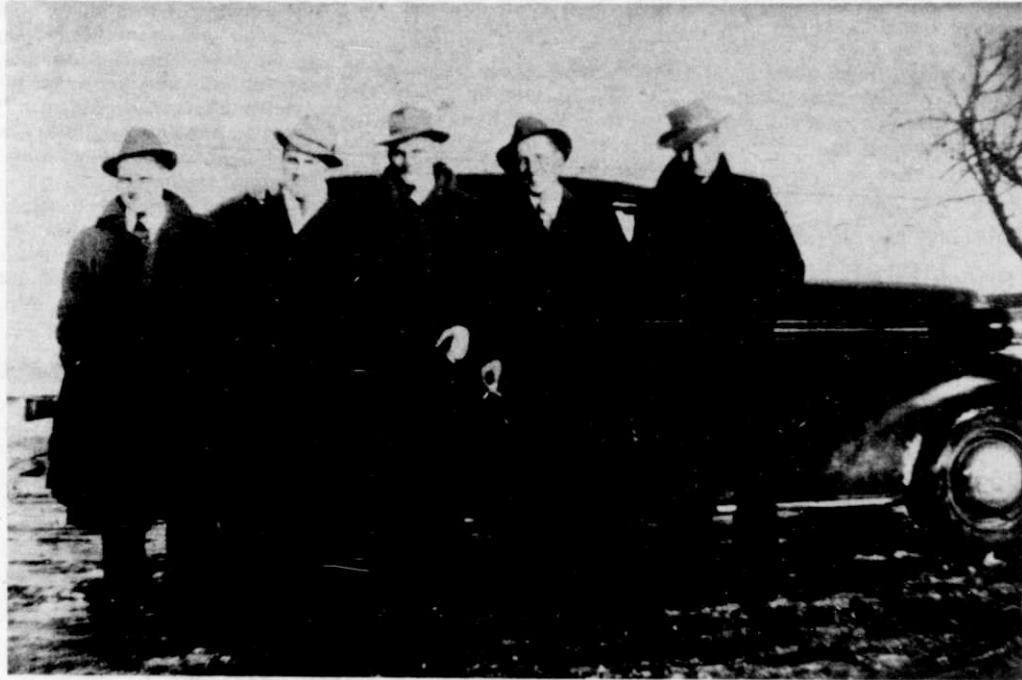

MPTI Offers Training Program For Farmers in Kewaskum

The Farm Training Program offered by Moraine Park Technical Institute is designed to meet the needs of those persons who are in the process of becoming established in the business of farming. Those who will find the program of instruction particularly pertinent are farm owners, managers, renters, hired workers, and/or those in a management authority or decision making role.

The yearly FTP consists of 30 hours of classroom instruction, 16 hours of group instruction as seminars or field trips, plus 14 hours of individual family on-your-farm instruction by James Scott, Washington County FTP

instructor. Enrollment is on an annual basis at a cost of \$28.40 for tuition and materials.

The FTP is conducted over a five-year period, offering a Vocational Diploma at completion. At least ten classroom sessions, plus group seminars and/or field trips, are offered to each student in one of these curriculum areas each year: Crops and Soils; Dairy Herd Management; Farm Management Principles; Farm Marketing and Law; and Farm Mechanization and Organizations. Each curriculum includes an update on crop management and farm taxation.

A very important aspect of the FTP is on-your-farm instruction scheduled between Scott and the farm family for instruction on subjects pertain-

ing to the interests, needs, and concerns of the student and the family farm operation.

Classroom instruction will be held November through March by Scott at Kewaskum, Hartford, Allenton, Slinger, or other locations within the West Bend Moraine Park Technical Institute District to accommodate the enrollees.

Dairy Herd Management, including nutrition, forage testing, balancing rations, herd health and reproduction, raising calves and heifers, and managed milking will be offered during the 1980-81 school year at all locations. Seminars, tours, field trips, and on-your-farm instruction will be scheduled between Scott and the students.

Enrolling in the FTP is done on an individual basis. Call Moraine Park Technical Institute, West Bend, at (414) 334-3413 or (414) 626-8008 before October 31, 1980. Scott will

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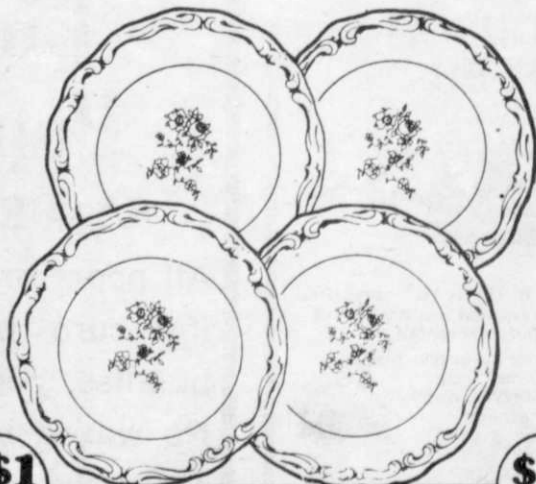
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Village of Kewaskum

NEWS NOTES

The Village Board would like to remind the residents of the village to two (2) topics covered in the Village's Municipal Code. The first topic is covered in Chapter 10, Public Nuisances; we shall refer to this problem as a health hazard. The village has undertaken several steps to improve the clearwater (storm water) discharge in the entire community, but yet people are not cooperating. We find that people cut their grass and catch it just to dump it in a designated clearwater collection point to help plug up and eventually cause water to back up during certain times of the year. The Village would ask that all residents keep their grass clippings and leaves away from the catch basins in the curb area. Also to refrain from dumping their grass clippings and leaves in ditched areas.

The second topic would be covered under Chapter 12, Licenses and Permits, specifically under dogs, cats and domestic pets. All residents are to have their dogs and cats licensed when they are five (5) months or older. These animals are not to run at large, pursue vehicles, assault or attack any person or persons, cause annoyance of any person or persons, kill, wound or worry any domestic animal and be infected with rabies. This means dogs and cats are to be vaccinated yearly for rabies, also dogs and cats are not allowed to litter on any public or private property. Thank you!

Public Hearing on West Bend Airport Improvements Oct. 7

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation will hold a public hearing about requests for state and federal aid for improving West Bend municipal airport at 7 p.m., Tuesday, Oct. 7, at the West Bend city council chambers, the department's bureau of aeronautics announces.

Proposed improvements include overlaying and strengthening runway 13/31 and adjoining taxiways; installation of

medium intensity runway lights (MIRL) and visual approach slope indicator (VASI) to the end of runway 13/31; installation of localizer beacon to runway 31; and the removal, replacement or movement of the beacon light to another location.

Interested persons are invited to attend and express their views about the project. The bureau's files and library are available to anyone wishing to prepare testimony.

Additional written testimony, if received within ten days after the hearing, should be sent to the Director of Bureau of Aeronautics, P.O. Box 7914, Madison, WI 53707.

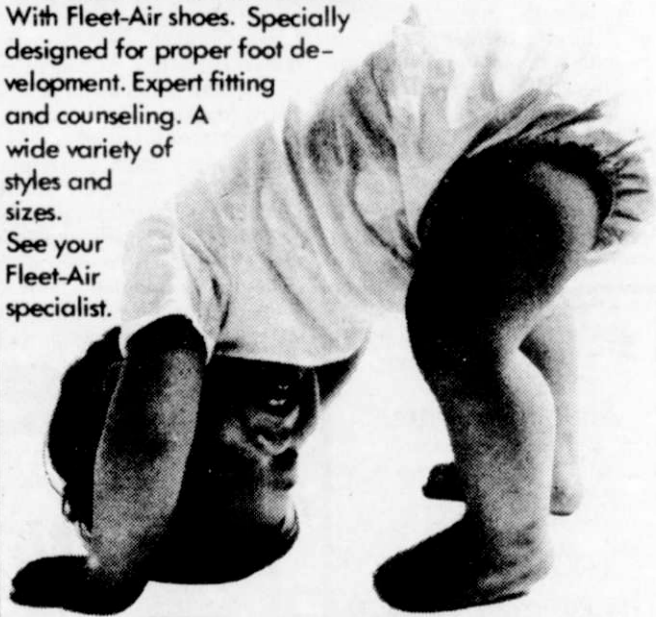

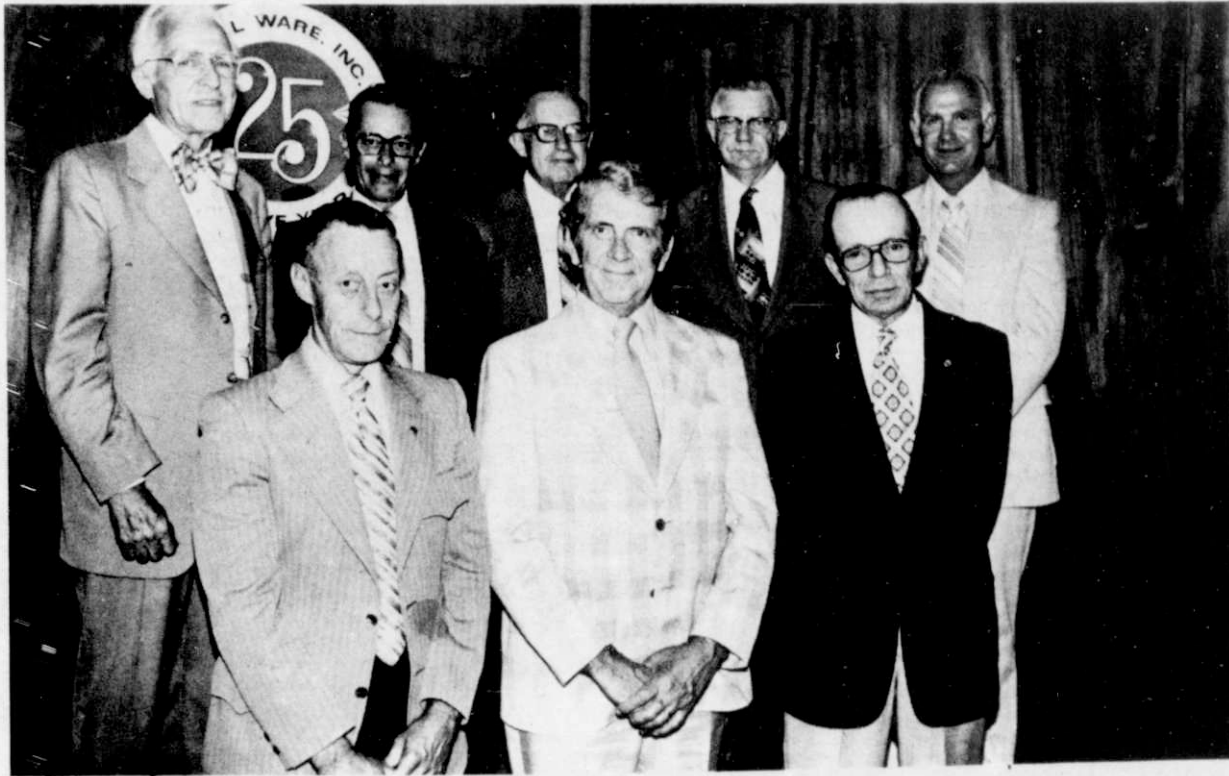

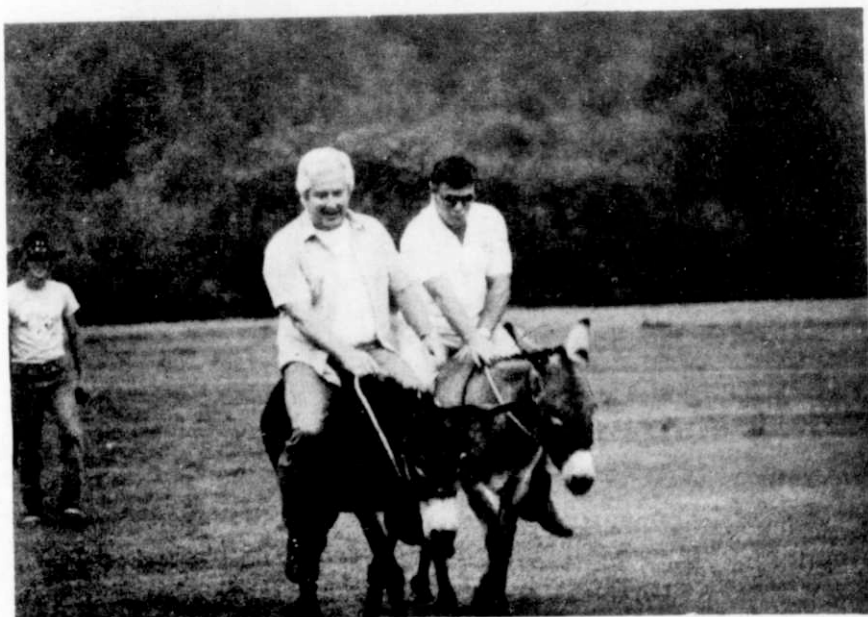
More thrills and laughs followed as the Fond du Lac County Association managed a last inning rally to beat Northern Kettle Moraine, 4-3, in a duel to the end.

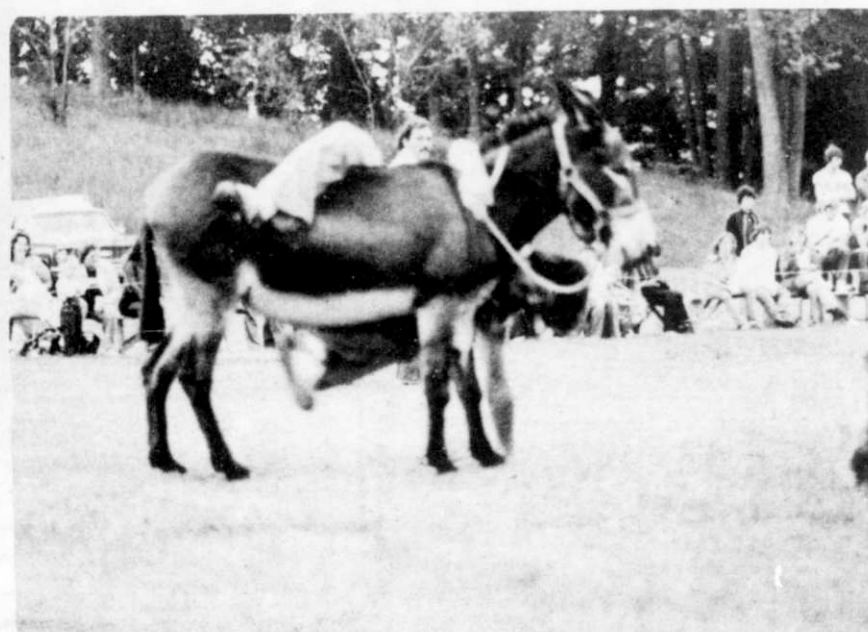

Fond du Lac County Manager Jim Greschidle accepting team trophy from VP Roger Heberer and President Martin Haack.



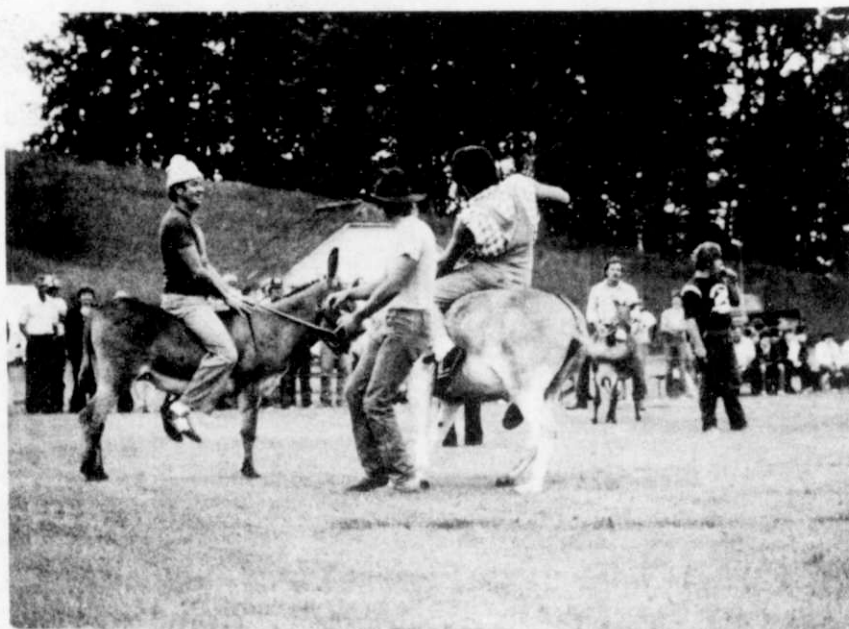
Art Sherren, AWSC; Bob Staehler, Governor's Council.

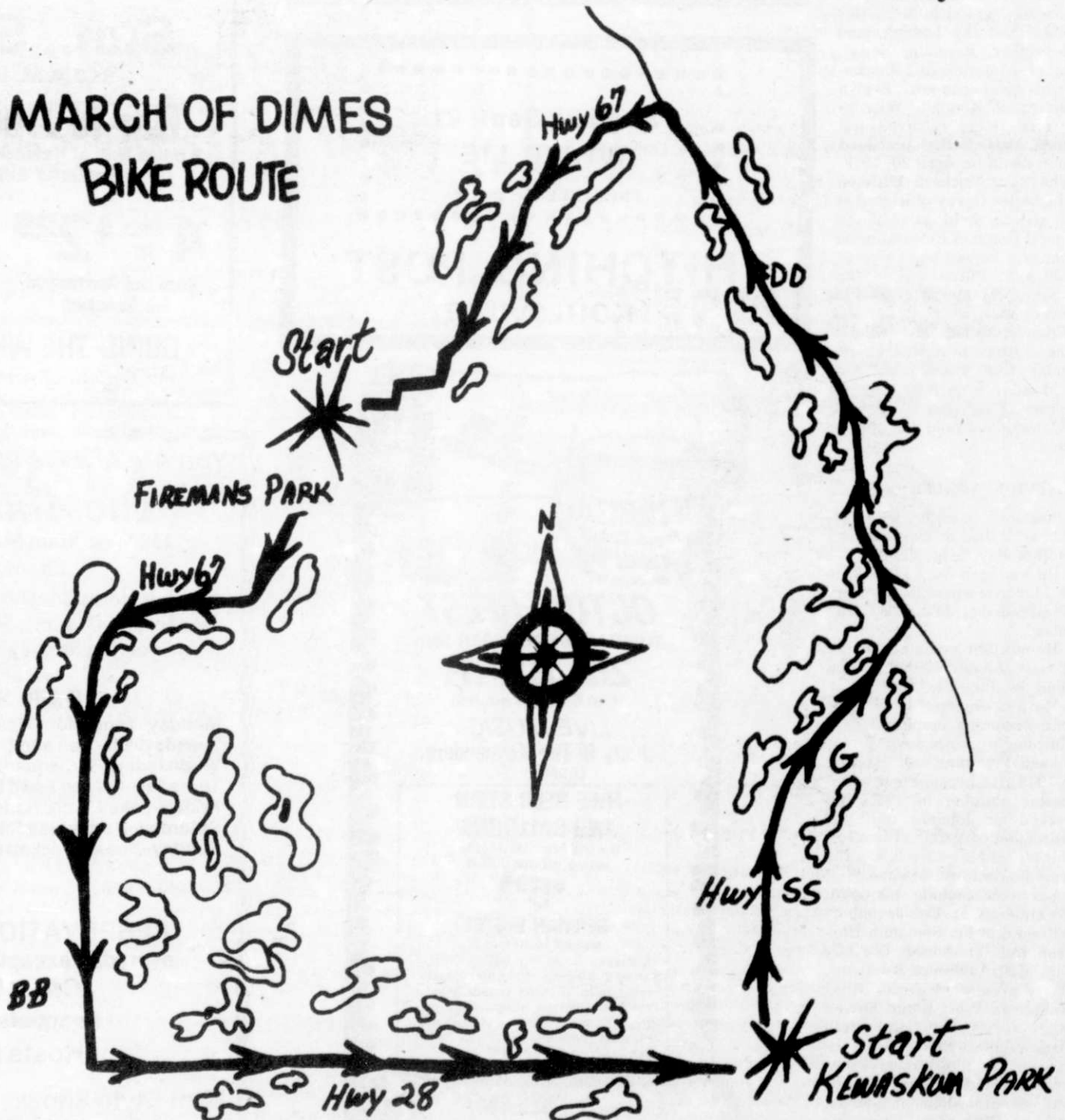
Kewaskum Starting Point for March of Dimes Bike-a-Thon Sunday

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Harvest Fruit Early, Store in Cool Location

Apples and pears harvested at the right time, handled carefully, cooled rapidly and stored properly will mean months of crisp, juicy fruit.

Wisconsin apples ripen from mid-August to late October. Varieties such as Duchess and Melba are early bearers, while Delicious and Jonathan apples are some of the last to reach maturity.

Most Wisconsin pears are Bartlett or Kieffer varieties. The Bartlett pear matures in mid-September and the Kieffer pear ripens about three weeks later.

Maturity (time lapse from picking to storage) bruises and punctures, relative humidity and the apple variety influence the storage life of an apple.

Apples are usually harvested when they're slightly immature because they'll keep longer than if they're harvested over-ripe.

The longer the time from picking to cold storage, the shorter the storage life of the apple. Apples remain alive after harvesting and continue to respire or "breathe." They respire more at higher temperatures and spoil more rapidly.

For example, McIntosh have a normal storage life of nearly four months at the optimum temperature of 30 degrees, but if they are left in the orchard for five days after picking at 70 degrees, their storage life is cut in half.

For ideal apple storage, the temperature should be close to 30 degrees with 85 to 90 percent humidity. Small or home storages seldom keep this humidity, so storing small quantities of apples in plastic bags with air holes is recommended.

Some apple varieties store better than others. Early ripening apples generally have a shorter storage life than those maturing later in the season.

Careful handling throughout harvesting and storing prevents bruises and punctures. Bruises speed certain chemical changes that reduce apple quality, and skin punctures allow decay organisms to enter the apple and cause it to rot.

Unlike apples, pears should be picked before marked ripening occurs—when the pears are fully grown and firm. Proper maturity is that time when skin color changes from a dark green to a light green or yellowish-green. The pear should separate from the twig with an upward twist of the fruit.

Careful handling and immediate cold storage of harvested pears prevents fruit waste. Pears deteriorate as much in one day at room temperature as they do in 10 days storage at 30 degrees.

You can wrap pears individually in paper or store them in bulk. Again, the best storage conditions for pears is in a place

about 30 degrees with 80 to 85 percent humidity.

When you remove pears from storage, let them ripen at room temperature. This takes about four days.

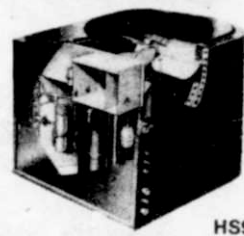
Free Concert on Summerfest Stage

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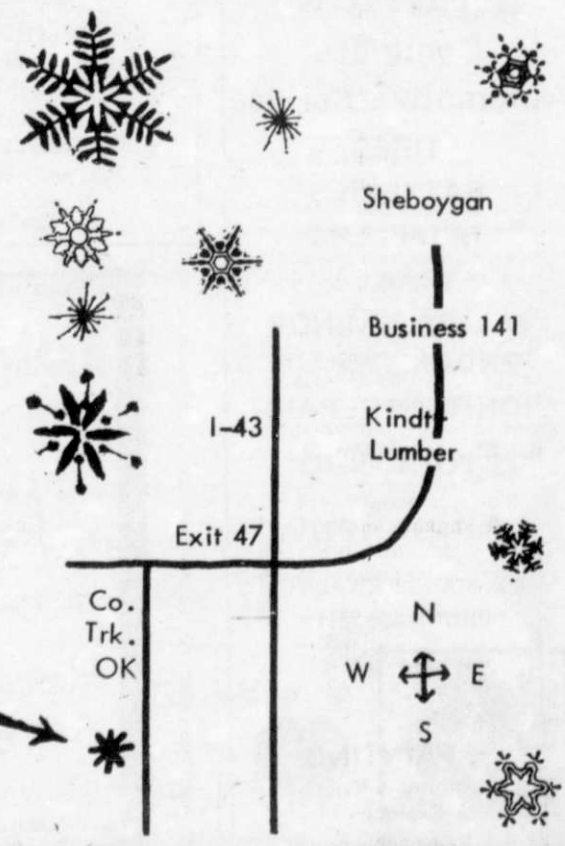

Students who began drinking orange juice a week before exposure to the virus developed virtually no cold symptoms. A few of those who began orange juice the day of exposure developed symptoms. Three-fourths of those on dummy pills developed normal symptoms of the common cold.

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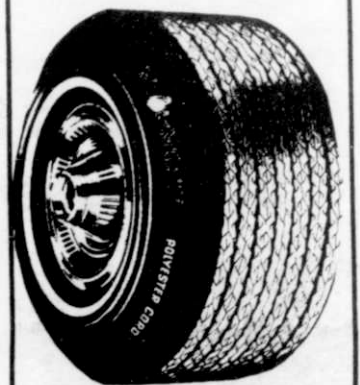

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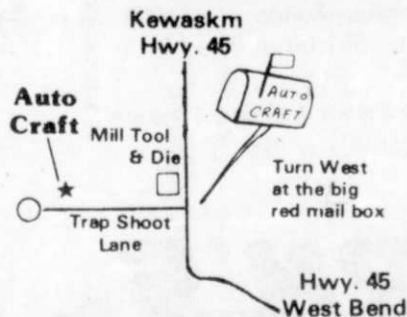

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Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Regular Meeting
Sept. 2, 1980
8:00 P.M.

The Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

President Gerald Stollenwerk presided. All Village Trustee members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of August 18 and of the special meeting of August 28, 1980, were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee Rohrer, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik. Voice vote was unanimous.

A delegation of neighbors of the area of John and Dee Kleinke's tavern were present to register complaints of loud noise and vulgar language on the streets after the legal closing time of the tavern. The complainants were advised that the Police Department had been pursuing a "get tough" policy in trying to alleviate the problem and would continue to do so in the future.

A public hearing was held on the request of Peter Knaup for rezoning the parcel of property west of Roseland Drive and to the east of Brooklane, described as Lot 2, Block 14, Assessor's Plat, (known as the Kilian Honeck parcel) from P-1 Park District to R-4 Multiple Family Residence District. The primary proposed use of the parcel is for an elderly housing development (approximately 2.62 acres). Mr. Knaup made a presentation on the proposed project and answered questions from the audience. A delegation of property owners from the area near the proposed project were present, not to object to the proposed project but to question whether or not the sanitary and storm sewers in the area were adequate to handle the additional load generated by the housing project. Administrator Schmidt interjected that the sanitary and storm sewers in the area had been checked by the village's engineering consultant and that it was the opinion of the engineers that the sewer lines were of sufficient size to handle the additional load. Motion was made by Trustee Mlodzik, seconded by Trustee Blumer that the hearing be declared closed. Voice vote was unanimous.

Motion was made by Trustee Rohrer, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik that the Board move to 8 (a) on the agenda to consider the rezoning request of Peter Knaup. Voice vote was unanimous.

Trustee Rohrer introduced a letter from the Plan Commission recommending to the Village Board that Lot 2, Block 14, Assessor's Plat, (known as the Honeck parcel) be rezoned from P-1 Park District to R-4 Multiple Family Residence District as requested by Peter Knaup. Motion was made by Trustee Herges that the rezoning request of Peter Knaup be granted and approved. The motion was seconded by Trustee Blumer. Voice vote was unanimous.

Police Officer Richard Knoeble was authorized to attend the Juvenile Retraining Seminar at Stevens Point on Sept. 24, 25, 26, 1980. Motion by Trustee Herges, seconded by Trustee Rohrer. Voice vote was unanimous.

The proposal of Roger Neumann to construct a sludge and

manure holding pit jointly with the village was tabled until the September 15, 1980, Board meeting.

The following building permit applications were approved by the Board and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permits upon payment of the required fees:

RESOLUTION - TEMPORARY MUNICIPAL BORROWING

RESOLUTION NUMBER 80-5

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin (the "Municipality"), is in temporary need of money in the amount of Forty thousand and no/cents Dollars (\$40,000.00) with which to pay its current and ordinary expenses; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Municipality deems it necessary to its safety and interest to borrow said amount for said purpose; Public works improvement - storm sewer system on Edgewood Road.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the governing body of the Municipality, that in order to pay the current and ordinary expenses of the Municipality, the Village President and the Clerk are hereby authorized and directed, pursuant to the provisions of s.67.12(1), Wis. Stats., to borrow from time to time from The Kewaskum Valley Bank (the "Lender") a total sum not to exceed Forty thousand and no/cents Dollars (\$40,000.00) and to evidence such indebtedness said officers shall make, execute and deliver to the Lender the promissory note of the Municipality to bear interest at the rate of seven (7) per cent (7%) per annum, be dated when issued and be payable on December 2, 1980, (with prepayment privileges at any time without penalty*); and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that to provide for the payment of the principal and interest of said note when due there shall be and there is hereby levied on all the taxable property of the Municipality, in addition to all other taxes, a direct, irrevocable tax sufficient for such purpose. Said tax shall be carried into the next tax roll of the Municipality (unless the note are sooner prepaid) and collected as other taxes are collected, as provided by law, and when said tax is so collected it shall be kept in a separate and distinct fund and be used for the sole purpose of paying the principal and interest on said note, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the amount of said loan evidenced by said note shall be used solely for the purposes for which they are issued, but may be temporarily invested until needed in legal investments, provided that no such investment shall be in such manner as would cause the note to be "arbitrage bond" within the meaning of Section 103(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or the Regulations of the Commissioner of

Internal Revenue thereunder; and an officer of the Municipality, charged with the responsibility for issuing said note, shall certify as to facts, estimates and circumstances in existence on the date of closing, which will permit the conclusion that said note will not be "arbitrage bonds"; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the municipal officials are hereby authorized and directed, so long as said note is outstanding, to deliver to the Lender any audit statement or other financial information as the Lender may reasonably request and to discuss its affairs and finances with the Lender; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said note shall be delivered from time to time, as necessary, to the Lender on or after the date of said note upon receipt of the principal amount of such loan evidenced thereby.

Motion for adoption of the resolution was made by Trustee Donald Mlodzik. The motion for adoption of the resolution was seconded by Trustee Jeffrey Rohrer. The resolution was adopted on a roll call vote of six (6) "Aye" and zero (0) "Nay."

The totals of all claims, as recommended for payment by Finance Committee Chairman Trustee D. Nigh were as follows:

TAKE NOTICE that the governing body of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, at a lawful meeting held on the 15th day of Sept., 1980, adopted an initial resolution, pursuant to Section 66.521 of the Wisconsin Statutes, as amended, authorizing the issuance at one or more times in one or more series of not to exceed \$2,000,000 aggregate principal amount of revenue bonds (the "Bonds") on behalf of Regal Ware, Inc., a Wisconsin corporation (the "Eligible Participant"). The purpose of the bond issue is to finance costs of providing a project to be located in the Village. The intended use of the project is for the purpose of manufacturing and warehousing of cookware products and would consist of a building addition and equipment (the "Project").

THE BONDS SHALL NOT CONSTITUTE AN INDEBTEDNESS OF THE VILLAGE WITHIN THE MEANING OF ANY STATE CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISION OR STATUTORY LIMITATION. THE BONDS SHALL BE LIMITED OBLIGATIONS OF THE VILLAGE PAYABLE BY THE VILLAGE SOLELY OUT OF REVENUES DERIVED FROM THE ELIGIBLE PARTICIPANT OR OTHERWISE PROVIDED FOR PURSUANT TO THE TERMS OF A REVENUE AGREEMENT TO BE ENTERED INTO BETWEEN THE VILLAGE AND THE ELIGIBLE PARTICIPANT.

The aforesaid initial resolution is a public document and may be inspected by any elector of the Village at the Village Hall, 204 First Street, during business hours.

TAKE FURTHER NOTICE that the electors of the Village of Kewaskum may petition for a referendum on the question of the Bond issue. Section 66.521(10)(d) of the Wisconsin Statutes, provides:

"(d) The governing body may issue bonds under this section without submitting the proposition to the electors of the municipality for approval unless within 30 days from the date of publication of notice of adoption of the initial resolution for such bonds, a petition, signed by not less than 5% of the registered electors of the municipality, or, if there is no registration of electors in the municipality, by 10% of the number of electors of the municipality voting for the office of governor at the last general election as determined under s. 115.01(13), is filed with the clerk of the municipality requesting a referendum upon the question of the issuance of the bonds. It is the finding and determination of this body that the Municipality will not control the design, costs, construction or operation of the Project; that no public moneys will be expended for the Project; that the Municipality will have no beneficial ownership in the Project; that the primary reason for requiring competitive bidding for construction of municipal projects is to protect the taxpayers against excessive expenditures of public funds and that such reason, although sound as applied to public works, is not applicable to the Project in which no general funds or tax revenues of the Municipality will be used or put at risk; that it would be more efficient and expedient for the accomplishment of the public purposes of the revenue bond issue if the Eligible Participant were to have complete control over the letting of contracts for construction for the Project; and that while an anti-discrimination policy such as that expressed in Section (11)(b)1. of the Act is supported by this body, public policies of that sort applied in the context of a bond financing are more appropriately effectuated by contract with the Eligible Participant. Therefore, the Municipality does hereby waive the provisions of Section (11)(b)1. of the Act with regard to the Project; provided, however, that the revenue agreement to be entered into between the Eligible Participant and the Municipality shall contain anti-discrimination clauses satisfactory to the Municipality.

In the second period the Cougars scored again. In their best drive of the night they moved the ball 77 yards in 12 plays. Pat Twohig then carried it in from the four.

With only minutes remaining the half, Kewaskum completed three passes in succession, two to Perry Kempf and one to Bill Heberer but then Hatch came

up with an interception on the 15-yard line and returned it all the way back to the 34.

Kewaskum played much better football in the second half. On their first series, helped by two 15 yard penalties, they moved the ball down of Campbellsport's 26 yard line. Then on fourth down Randy Heberer broke loose for a 26-yard run around left end for the Indians' only score.

The teams were quite even on first downs with the Cougars getting 12 to Kewaskum's 10. But in total yards the Cougars had it over the Indians, 312 to 201. Kewaskum completed only 6 of 17 passes to 7 for 13 for the winners.
