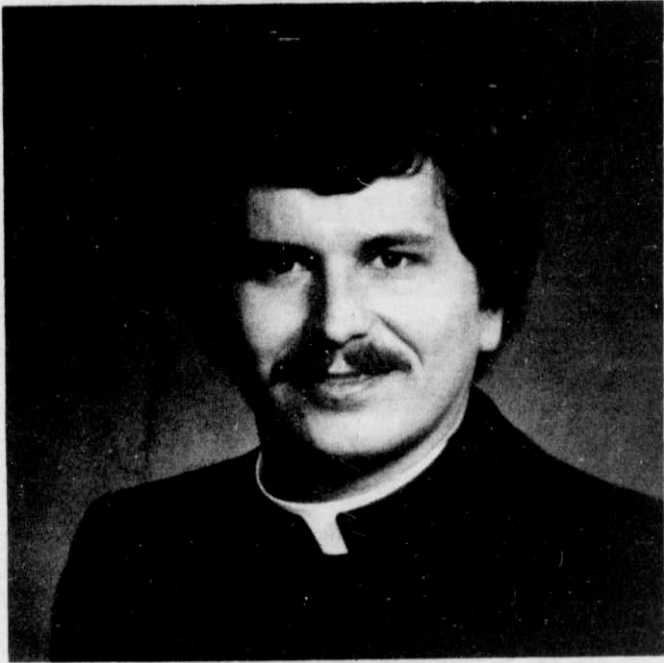

Archbishop Rembert G. Weakland was the ordaining prelate and concelebrants of the Ordination Mass included Auxiliary Bishop Leo J. Brust, Auxiliary Bishop Richard J. Skiba and retired Archbishop William E. Cousins.

Father Biersack is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Biersack,

Fr. Francis C. LaBuwi, former pastor of Holy Trinity Parish, Kewaskum, from 1941 to 1958, who retired from active ministry in 1971, celebrated his 50th anniversary in the priesthood Sunday, May 17, with a Mass and family gathering at St. Sebastian church, Sturtevant.

He was ordained May 31, 1931 at St. John cathedral by Archbishop Samuel A. Stritch.

He was born in Rubicon, where he attended St. John grade school; then attended high school at St. Lawrence seminary, Mount Calvary. He completed studies for the priesthood at St. Francis seminary.

Father LaBuwi served at St. Frederick, Cudahy; St. Aemi-

lian orphanage, Milwaukee; St. Mary of the Lake, Westport; Holy Trinity, Kewaskum; St. Mary, Racine; and St. John, Paris.

In retirement he lives in Racine.

## Neenah Man Killed in Area Crash

A 30-year-old Neenah man was killed Thursday night in a one-car accident in the Town of Kewaskum.

Gerald S. Erdmann of 1031 Cecil St., Neenah, died of massive head injuries after he lost control of his car as he was headed south on County Trunk B, southwest of Kewaskum, according to the Washington County Sheriff's Department.

Erdmann's car skidded to the left side of the road and hit a tree at about 11:15 p.m., according to the accident report.

Erdmann was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by the Kewaskum rescue squad, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

He became Washington County's 13th traffic fatality of this year.

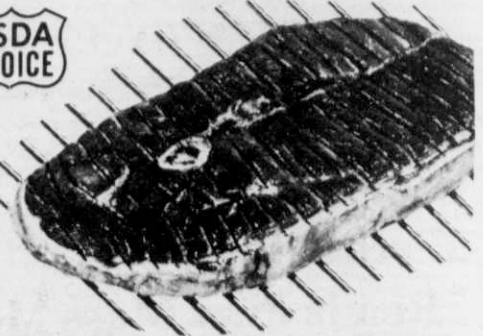

## Contractor Requests Replat and Rezoning For Condominiums

Building Contractor LeRoy Zipperer appeared before the Plan Commission Tuesday evening with a request to re-plat and re-zone three lots into two for the purpose of building condominiums.

Zipperer owns three undeveloped lots at the south end of Bel-Ric Drive in Bel-Ric Acres. If Zipperer receives approval, after a public hearing, he plans to build two single level side-by-side condominiums each containing two units.

The commission asked that a developmental plan be presented for their inspection and viewing at a public hearing to be announced.

Dan Thompson, of Action Associates, appeared before the commission in his final meeting with them before submitting his completed TIF "Optional Use Report," which is due June 1.

Due to conflicting schedules, Thompson will not be able to personally present his report and recommendations. However, Thompson told the commission he would like them to hold a special joint meeting of the Village Board and Plan Commission as soon as possible to review this report.

Thompson informed the commission that Amended Senate Bill No. 198 is being discussed in the State Legislature. This bill covering new guidelines and regulations for the TIF program could have a serious effect on the size and effectiveness of Kewaskum's proposed TIF District, if it is passed. Thompson suggested Kewaskum review his report and decide as early as possible, whether or not they want to implement a TIF District.

Thompson noted he did not know if or when the bill would be passed, but he felt the commission should know what could possibly be facing them in the future as far as the Tax Incremental Financing program is concerned.

A tentative joint meeting has been suggested for June 8, at 8:00 p.m.

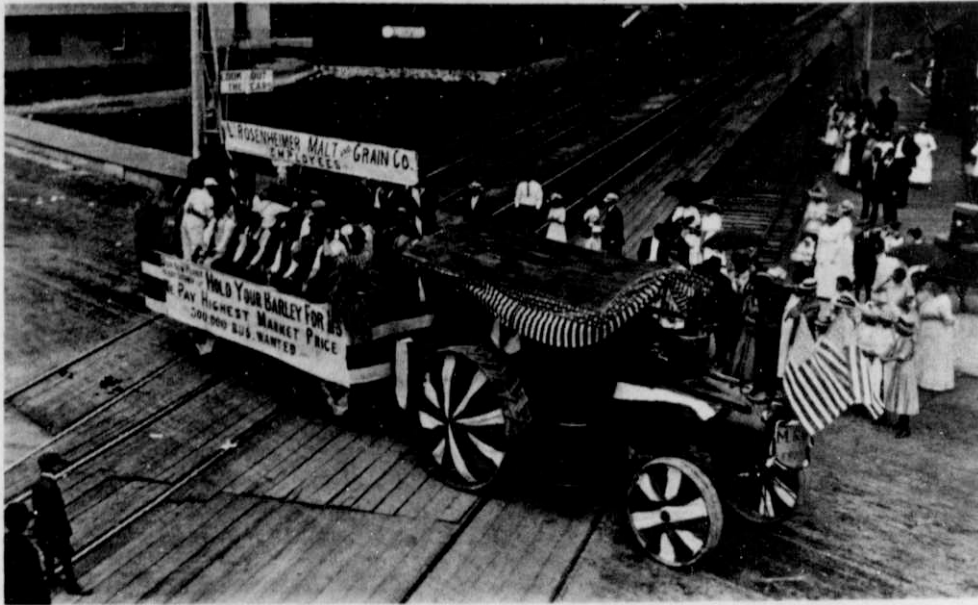

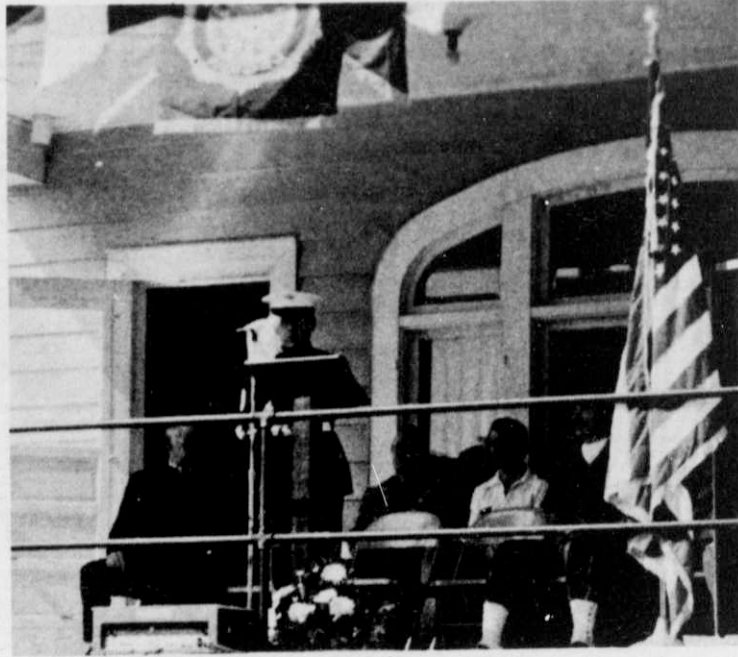

### ASCS Crop Loans Available to May 31

Farmers have until May 31 to obtain price support loans on their 1980 corn and soybeans, according to Hilbert Scheunemann, Chairperson of the Washington County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

Loan rates are \$2.28 per

bushel for corn and \$4.95 for soybeans.

"Farmers use the commodity loan program to obtain interim operating funds or to hold their grain for future delivery," Scheunemann said. The price support loans are available for approximately 10 months after harvest. The interest rate on 1981 crop loans is 14½ percent.

To satisfy their loan obligations, farmers may repay the money before the loan matures or forfeit the crop to the Commodity Credit Corporation if prices at loan maturity are below the loan rate.

Farmers interested in obtaining loans on their 1980 corn and soybeans should contact the county ASCS office before May 31.

Telephone Company Increases Rates

On May 14, 1981, General Telephone Company of Wisconsin was authorized by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin to implement tariffs providing higher rates on the firm's telephone instruments.

The increase will be twenty cents per phone per month with the exception of key system or BABX business phones.

The action, according to Wisconsin Area Vice President-General Manager Earl A. Goode, was sought by General Tel through a tariff filing with the PSC in November and was filed in response to Federal Communications Commission decisions injecting increased competition into the telecommunications industry.

The filing also recognized the changing life-span of existing telephone equipment, which is constantly being shortened through continuing technological advances, and acknowledges the company's need to more quickly recoup its investment in existing equipment if it is to meet customer demands for economical modern quality service.

Goode said the increase was designed to ease the depreciation problem and not to increase the company net income. The increase will appear on each affected customer's next bill.
