Expansion and growth, during a period of economic lows, have been the key words for Kewaskum in the past year.

This development has not been one-sided in either type or location. Recreation has developed through completion of the new Kiwanis Park, located on the village's west side. The

park has seen several community organizations put hard work and dedication into its creation. A new fully equipped pool, bath house, basketball court, baseball diamonds, tennis courts and a walking trail are to be found here.

"Moraine Condominiums East" is the first development of its kind in the area. The first building has been completed and is in its final stages of landscaping. Bob Kirst, of Kewaskum Realty, stated response

has been very enthusiastic and he has several parties interested in becoming residents of Kewaskum's first condominium. Mr. and Mrs. Alan Kuehl and daughter have become the first owners to move into their new home in the ten-unit building. Anticipated construction of two more buildings in the future will complete this complex.

Industrial growth on the north rises in the form of Regal Ware Incorporated's 16th addition of its plant since 1945.

The impressive addition, which will house an added 22,000 square feet of factory and 7,000 square feet of office space, has been completed with departments moving into their new quarters since February and final transition expected to be completed by June.

Director of Advertising David Zoerb stated the new area will contain production departments which will supply some of Regal's own steel needs which have become increasingly difficult to procure from outside sources.

The added office space will allow for expansion in production offices along with a new, more convenient, walk-in personnel department.

Retail development in Kewaskum includes acquisition of the former Minz Supply store by Regal Ware. This building, located in the center of the village, has been completely re-modeled into a new outlet store. Zoerb noted this store is still another part of Regal's commitment to the community. There will be no major changes in personnel or items in the new store, but rather a rehabilitation and more efficient use of existing building and land. The additional parking area will not only benefit Regal's customers and its bus tours, it will also provide additional parking adjacent to many of Kewaskum's other businesses. The new store opened just recently and is holding its grand opening this Friday and Saturday, June 26

and 27.

Zoerb noted Regal Ware is one of the last cookware manufacturers who provide guided tours, with 2,000 to 3,000 people going through their plant annually.

Additional retail construction is evident on Kewaskum's south side. Another new phase of construction is the development of the village's first shopping center.

Tom Leitzke, co-owner of Kennelly Drugs, noted he has received many compliments on his very spacious and modern store which opened recently and is holding its 10-day grand opening at present. Kennelly's larger store in the shopping center has increased its employment from three to 5-7 fulltime and four parttime personnel. An added plus to the local economy.

The center has room for additional stores, including a supermarket, which will provide even more local jobs in the future.

The new Minz Supply store on Highway 45 south, opened for business last November and

held its Grand Opening in April. The new building, which is almost triple the size of the old store, is designed to house everything under one roof from hardware to lumber. Along with the increase in capacity, Ken Weddig, Manager, stated all lines carried by the store will be expanded to provide better selection and availability.

Weddig noted that eventually, Minz would like to increase personnel by another four or five employees depending upon business and economic conditions.

Kewaskum will soon see new construction on the village's southwest, as ground is broken for development of Meadow Creek Apartments. Developer Peter Knaup has stated bids have been let and construction should begin very soon. This complex will contain 25 units for elderly and handicapped and 12 units for single parent and low income families.

Another new business in Kewaskum arrived with the opening of the "First Step" Shoe Outlet, which opened recently in the store vacated by the Regal Ware Outlet.

Mexican Stand-off on High School Counselor's Position

At Monday evening's special meeting, the school board again failed to make a decision regarding filling the high school counselor position left open by the retirement of Ernie Mitchell.

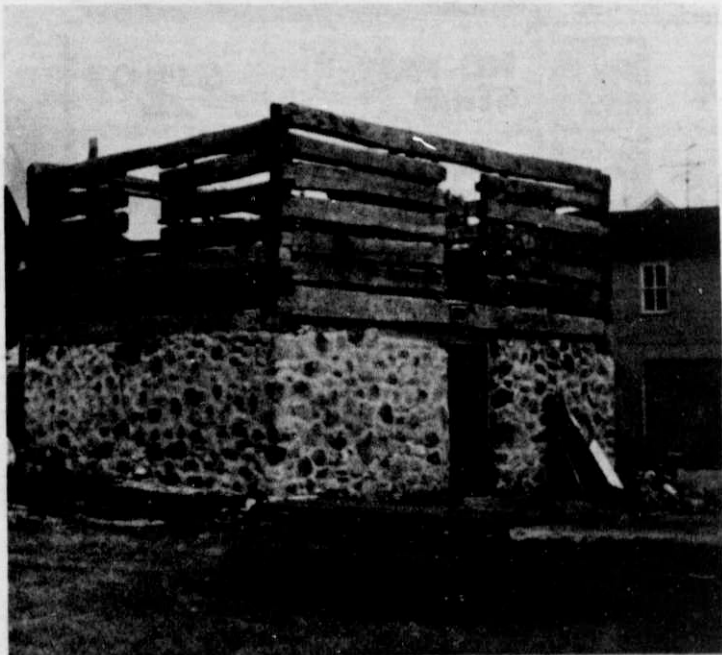
Two candidates, Milton Dickinson, Elementary Guidance Counselor, and Sharon Blank, a Kewaskum Elementary teacher, have applied for the position. School board member Jean Goeden again stated she wanted to see a woman in the high school guidance position. A parent, Mrs. Diane Buchel, stated "it's time we do have a female counselor, simply to give students a choice to talk to whomever they wish." Member Jerry Secor commented "we can't legally do it (hire a female)

unless they're more qualified."

Member Richard Theusch motioned to move Dickinson from the elementary to the high school guidance position, seconded by Jerry Secor. With the absence of Byron Gessner, the vote ended in a 3-3 tie. Members Tom Brigham, Dr. Ogi and Jean Goeden voted against, with Theusch, Secor and John Tessar voting for the motion, resulting in no action being taken. Since Gessner is on vacation for six weeks the question arose as to when the board will make a decision.

Tessar noted unless one of the members changes their vote they have reached a stalemate. Secor's motion at the board's last meeting to transfer Dickinson also died for lack of a second.

Ayer Selected to Participate in Classic Music Seminar in Austria

Peter Ayer, Associate Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin-Washington County, has been selected to participate in a Classical Music seminar to be held in Eisenstadt Austria this August. The Ayers reside southwest of Kewaskum and are members of the Kewaskum School District.

As a member of the 40 voice resident chorus, Ayer will perform in the Esterhazy Palace where Franz Josef Haydn was music director during 30 years of his life. The court orchestra of the ruling Esterhazy family became one of the celebrated ensembles in all of Europe. Debut performances of works by Beethoven and Hummel also added to the historical importance of this Austrian landmark.

Ayer applied and was accepted as a member of the resident chorus through a competitive audition process. The auditions are judged on technical and musical performing ability.

Ayer says that he and his wife, Carol, spent six weeks preparing the audition tape which had to present one art song and one aria from an oratorio or an opera.

In just under three weeks Ayer was notified of his selection from the international field of applicants.

As a member of the chorus Ayer will perform in a number

of public concerts in Austria under the direction of Dr. Don V. Moses, music director of the summer seminar and director of choral activities at the University of Iowa during the school year.

The seminar's primary emphasis is placed upon musical and academic studies and performances. In addition, numerous tours and sightseeing expeditions are provided the musicians to immerse them in Austrian culture and to enhance their interpretation and performance of classical music of that era.

Ayer is looking forward with great excitement to a uniquely enriching experience that he will be able to share with his voice students at UWVC for years to come.

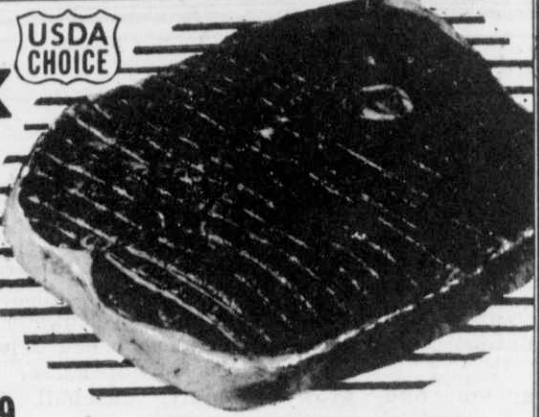

further, the board voted 4-2 against a motion by Brigham to go outside the district "to search and screen" for candidates to fill the job.

High School Counselor Dave Wietor then spoke up requesting the board to come to some decision as soon as possible. Wietor told the board there is just too much work to be handled by one person stating, "I don't know if I can physically do it." Wietor noted that is why there are two counselors. Wietor told the board if they don't take action quickly to get a replacement the district could be going into the new semester with many of Mitchell's duties such as the AFS program, freshmen orientation and student scheduling not done.

KES President Bob Getter asked Tessar what his plan was now. Tessar replied "it looks like we will have to call a special session."

In other action, the board discussed filling the position of middle school principal position vacated by Ken Erickson. Superintendent Brenholt suggested the board add 15 days to the contract of this position and include the duties of developing some type of computer science program for the students. Brenholt noted we need someone to

get us started and do some planning in this area. Mrs. Buchel asked if this person would have the qualifications to teach computer science or would it be just "fun and games." Brenholt stated the first year it would probably be a club or seminar type thing until the program got going. With the added 15 days, the teacher would have an opportunity to seek out programs which would help to qualify this person as a teacher in succeeding years. Ogi asked Brenholt, "shouldn't this person come in with a computer background?" Tessar stated, "Doc, if you want to go out and get a person with computer science background, you're not going to get him for what we pay." Brenholt noted it would be nice if it would happen however, with the demand from private industry for these individuals, it is highly unlikely. Brenholt also stated they have not been able to find any math teachers because they, too, are being lured away from the education profession by high paying private employment.

Brenholt felt the middle school principal position was a good place to add computer program duties since the enrollment has been steadily decreasing. In two years he feels the enrollment will drop from the present 310 students down to approximately, 230, resulting in more time for this position to develop this program.

The board voted to approve

the addition of 15 days and the computer program to the middle school principal's position on a one-year annual review basis.

The board also approved three teacher contracts and a request for a leave of absence from Victoria Marone, teacher-principal at the Beechwood School.

Business Manager Bob Borch received approval to order supplies for next year in the amount of \$168,000 as well as authorization to have the high school gym floor resurfaced at a cost of \$7,693.

The board approved a contract of 50 hours special education summer school for teacher Dan Meilahn.

Jerry Secor was appointed to represent the district at the CESA meeting August 10. Tom Brigham was appointed to serve on the board and as College Representative to the Special Education 94-142 Committee.

The board then adjourned to its second closed session.

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Petri Farm Bill Would Help Young People Meet the Rising Costs of Starting a Farm

WASHINGTON — Two House panels were urged last week to enact a bill that would help young people meet the rising costs of starting a farm.

Testifying before two agriculture subcommittees, Congressman Tom Petri asked the panels to approve his bill to make it easier for young people to pay back Farmers Home Administration loans. The bill would also earmark a certain percentage of FmHA loans for new farmers.

"In the last forty years, the number of family farms in this country has plummeted dramatically," Petri said. "One major reason for this decline is the inability of young people to afford the high startup costs that are associated with farming."

"Young farmers who have the experience to make a go of it, more often than not lack the necessary financial capitol. Typically, a young farmer faces startup costs that run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Petri told the panel his bill would allow new farmers to pay back their FmHA loans on a graduated scale, which calls for smaller early installments that gradually increase and then level off. The graduated loans would be limited to 2,000 during a pilot program, he said.

Additionally, the bill would require the FmHA to spend at least 40 percent of its farm ownership loans funds to help new farmers buy farms.

Currently, the Farmers Home Administration spends about 38 percent to 43 percent to help young farmers. My fear is that if programs such as the emergency economic loan program are abolished, the percentage of loans made to help new farmers will decrease.

"For that reason, Congress should set a minimum percentage for farm loans that will go to

new farmers," Petri said.

The bill wouldn't require additional administrative costs, he said. "The same personnel who administer the farm ownership program would continue to run this new one."

Also among its provisions, the legislation includes a "sun-set" provision that would put the new program out of existence in four or six years, depending on the popularity of the graduated loans, Petri said.

ASCS Encourages

'81 Acreage Reports

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office is scheduling farmers by township to report acres planted according to Donald E. Sampson, director of the county office. Producers are being notified by mail according to a schedule. Nearly 200 farmers have already reported with hopes another 1000 will report according to Sampson.

1981 is the final year of the 4-year Farm Bill as written in 1977. New legislation is now being written which will be in effect from 1982 thru 1985.

The major benefit now is the disaster provision which guarantees 60% of expected production of corn, barley and wheat. With the unusually dry conditions, many farmers may be concerned. By reporting acreages, another key benefit is the target price guarantees. According to Sampson, depressed prices next fall could trigger deficiency payments on program crops as reported.

Price support loans on all the major commodities will again be offered for 1981 crops. Producers will be offered entry in the Grain Reserve also at specific times to be announced later.

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Conservation Tillage Reduces Cost and Erosion

Almost 1700 acres of conservation tillage was applied on Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District Cooperator's farms this year. Farmers in every township use this practice to cut expenses and reduce soil erosion. Conservation tillage simply means planting corn or other row crops using the minimum number of tillage operations.

Allen Kazmierczak, a Germantown corn and soybean grower, chisel plows over 500 acres every year. Without hay in rotation, it is especially important to allow the crop residue after fall harvest to remain on the surface over winter. Dairy farmers Leo and Ralph Dornacker, Town of Addison; Ken Ramthun, Farmington, and Bill Puestow, Polk, chiseled more than 200 acres this year. Ted Moser, Wenninger Bros., Town of Addison; Jim Ziemer, Jackson; John Schuppel, Wayne Township; F.W. "Bill" Mueller, West Bend; Bob Zurn, Polk, and Victor Lucht, Germantown, chiseled more than 50 acres each. Jim Stuetgen, Richfield; Bob Melzer and Allen Schulz, Town of Wayne, applied 25 acres. Applying conservation tillage in lesser amounts were Jim Esselmann, Trenton; Harold Mueller, Al and Mark Proeber and Syl. Goeller, Addison Township; Art Filber, Wayne; Bill Gehring, Hartford, and John Bellin, Germantown.

The term "conservation tillage" includes a variety of different tillage systems designed to leave crop residue on the soil surface. The residue acts as a blanket protecting the soil from erosion.

However, a side benefit of conservation tillage is its ability to save fuel and avoid soil compaction by fewer trips across the field to prepare the seedbed and plant. One system known as no-till uses about 3 gallons less fuel per acre than conventional tillage, by eliminating fuel consuming operations like plowing, disking and harrowing. The no-till system instead plants the seeds directly through last year's residue.

The most widely used method of conservation tillage used in Washington County is chisel plowing with straight shank or twisted shank chisels. One pass each in fall and spring and plant is usually all that is needed. Some farmers substitute one chisel plow with a disk. No moldboard plows are used with this method.

Three 1980 UWEX-SCS demonstration plots in Washington County compared yields of chisel, no-till and conventional tillage. There was no

difference in yields. These plots will continue for three years. We believe that once farmers understand the advantages conservation tillage offers and they see how well it produces, it will become an accepted way to farm.

Presently about 20 percent of the state's grain-corn acreage is under conservation tillage. Almost 75 percent of this is done in the southern half of Wisconsin.
