It's on to the state tournament in Madison for the Kewaskum High School girls' var-

sity basketball team.

After a very successful season, the girls reached their goal — a trip to the Class B State Tournament.

This will be the Kewaskum girls' second trip to the state

tournament. The Indians made it to Madison five years ago, in 1977, when they were defeated by the state champions, Cuba City.

In their opening game of the state tourney, Kewaskum will face Denmark Friday at 2:05 p.m. Denmark advanced to state by beating Little Chute in overtime Saturday in their sectional final. The winner of the Kewaskum-Denmark game will face the winner of the Portage

(23-0) vs. Durand (21-2) game on Saturday. Denmark, 22-1, has a Kewaskum but the Vikings have not faced the stiffer caliber of competition that the Indians have.

The Indian girls go into the tournament with an 18-3 record. They placed second in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference behind champion Two Rivers, a Class A school. Their only three

losses were to Two Rivers twice and to another Class A school, Plymouth, in their final game, when ace Jill Yearling was out with an injury, and they already had second place clinched.

Kewaskum advanced to state by beating Mayville's then state ranked Flyway Conference champions, 55-48, in the regional opener here, easily eliminating an awed Laconia team, 60-37, at Laconia in the regional final, overwhelming St. Francis

in the sectional opener here, 52-29, and ousting Jefferson handily, 51-35, in the sectional final at Whitewater Saturday. St. Francis is the team that knocked Kewaskum out of tournament play in the sectional last year and then advanced to state.

During the season the Indian girls defeated two conference champions — Mayville, Flyway champs, Little Ten, and West Bend, in double overtime.

The Indians are led by star center, 6-0 Linda Larsen, only a junior, who will be back next year, and 5-10 senior Jill Yearling, the team's second highest scorer. As far as we know Larsen was the Eastern Wisconsin's top individual scorer this season.

The girls will have a large following of Kewaskum fans at Madison.

Five student and spectator buses will be making the trip to the State Capitol to see their Indians play and up to Wednesday evening around 400 tickets had been sold to Kewaskum fans. Tickets are still available and can be purchased by calling Betty Mertzig at the high school office. Many fans will also drive to Madison in cars.

The Indians team left already Wednesday morning at 9:30 a.m. for Madison to get in some practice for the tournament.

Good luck, girls, in your second try at state.

# Administrative Raises Averaging 8% Approved

With the possibility of saving between \$38,000 and \$40,000 in bussing costs from the 1982-83 budget, the recommendation of all-day kindergarten was again considered at Monday night's school board meeting.

After reviewing a seven-page report prepared by Superintendent Floyd Brenholt and more than an hour of lively discussion between parents and the board, no decision was made on whether to stay with the present half-day kindergarten or switch to the all-day, alternate day program suggested.

As noted in Brenholt's report, it appears to be a "six of one, half dozen of the other" situation. There appeared to be just as many parents interested in trying the all-day approach as there were parents who were against it and felt it would be detrimental to their children receiving a sound foundation for establishing future learning habits and skills.

Brenholt told the meeting that several studies and trial programs conducted could not conclusively prove that one system was more effective or better than the other. "I can supply information to support either view," said Brenholt. There really is not enough research to come up with a definite basis recommending either program as being better.

In a Campbellsport survey of their all-day program, 54 parents felt all-day was doing at least as much as half-day would do. Forty-five did not. Sixty-nine parents liked the convenience of the schedule, 35 didn't. Fifty-seven said they would vote for all-day, and 47 said they would not. Seventy-one said the program had generally worked out well for their youngsters, but 34 said it had not.

A parent noted he had also checked into the Campbellsport program. His finding was, that while bussing costs were reduced, additional aides had to be hired to assist in the all-day schedule. He felt this point alone would cause a considerable reduction in the anticipated \$40,000 savings. Brenholt was asked to check on the added aide cost involved.

Board member Tom Brigham asked to have his motion for all-day kindergarten tabled until the April 12th meeting when it will be brought up and discussed further.

The board heard the report and recommendations of the Late Bus Committee. High School Principal Clark Pearson stated the committee would like to run two late busses on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday to cover the entire

district. The recommended charge would be \$15.00 per family per quarter (9-week period).

Pearson noted the committee was not sure at this time whether that charge would be adequate to make the late bus self-sufficient. It's such an "iffy" situation stated committee member Joan Rosenberger. We don't know if the late bus will run and for how long. This is what makes it difficult to get a commitment from parents to use the service. School Board backing of the late bus would help in determining how many families would use the bus.

The committee suggested using money from the "user fee" to subsidize costs if necessary. "We're hoping to get enough people to use the bus so that we won't have to subsidize it with approximately \$2,000 of the user fees."

Some of the board members questioned whether user fee money could be used for the bus service. Rosenberger reminded the board she was the person who originally wrote to the board about having a user fee and using part of it for transportation. If the students don't have the late bus, there won't be many participating in the extra curricular activities. Pearson and Rosenberger recommended coordinating schedules in an effort to make the late bus accessible to more students. Board member Jean Goeden recommended running the bus by the grade school so fifth and sixth graders participating in intramurals would be able to ride the late bus also. Rosenberger noted that while almost all the participating students live in the eastern outskirts of the district, a late bus west must be considered if the board agrees to lend its backing. Service to the entire district must be considered. Business Manager Bob Borch was asked to check his records for participant numbers from the western area and report back at the next meeting.

In other action, the board approved a motion to change the high school class period schedule. For the 1982-83 year, the high school will switch from the six hour day, seven day rotation schedule to a five-day,

seven hour period day. This will result in a student attending the same class the same time every day rather than rotating each day and dropping one class each day. Pearson noted the change would eliminate freshmen confusion and would make it more efficient to locate students at any particular time.

Administrative raises for 1982-83 were approved by the board. Increases range from 2.9% to 8.5%, averaging out to an overall 8.0% increase including fringe benefits. The board noted that due to economic conditions, the wage steps of the business manager, reading specialist and middle school principal have been indefinitely frozen. These positions were not increased one step on the salary scale, just given a straight per cent increase.

The Superintendent's salary has been increased \$2,748 to \$37,096 plus \$733 fringe benefits, Business Manager \$2,130 to \$27,186 plus \$614 benefits, Reading Specialist \$1,968 to \$25,125 plus \$583 benefits, High School Principal \$2,423 to \$32,706 plus \$671 benefits, Assistant H.S. Principal \$2,347 to \$31,690 plus \$656 benefits, Middle School Principal \$742 to \$25,648 plus \$350 benefits, work days for this position were also reduced from 220 to 205, Kewaskum Elementary Principal \$2,180 to \$29,435 plus \$624 benefits, Beechwood Principal-Teacher in Charge \$50 to \$1,800, Farmington Principal \$1,030 to \$13,904 plus \$301 benefits, Wayne Elementary Principal \$926 to \$11,822 plus \$280 benefits, Psychologist \$1,950 to \$20,750 plus \$578 benefits. This results in a total 8% increase of \$23,788 from \$297,268 in 1981-82 to \$321,056 for 1982-83.

The board also approved closing the high school Friday, March 12, so students and faculty may attend the State Girls Basketball tournament in Madison where the Kewaskum team will be competing in Class B competition. The elementary and middle schools will use the day as a make-up snow day.

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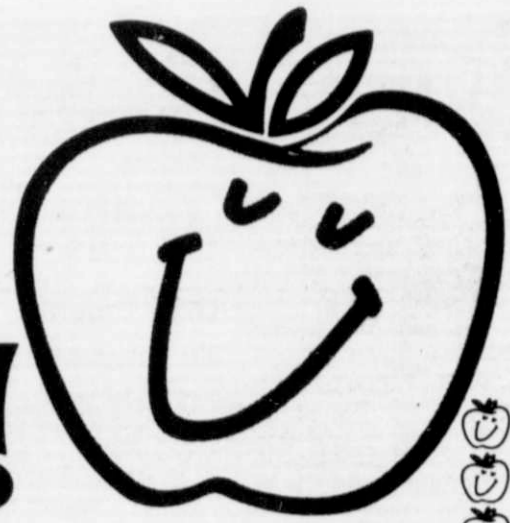
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**School Counselors

Dear Editor

It appears Mr. Horner and Mr. Spoerl, both candidates for the Kewaskum School Board, have become masters of political rhetoric. Their claims that "if elected," they will be able to cut the school budget without lowering the quality of education is what most voters want to hear. Unfortunately, I feel they are either deceiving themselves or the voters.

If they had studied the facts they would know that according to a report from the Public Expenditure Research Foundation comparing schools with enrollments under 2,500, Kewaskum had the lowest costs in every category, i.e. teachers salaries, food service, administration, etc., except transportation. This latter item reflects the disadvantage of having a district 144 square miles in size, compared to 91 square miles for West Bend and approximately 100 for Random Lake and Ozaukee Unified. However Kewaskum's cost per mile for transportation was third lowest out of the 34 schools in CESA 16.

Kewaskum's student to teacher ratio was also the highest of 25 comparable Wisconsin schools at 17.11 to 1. To equal the other schools' ratios, Kewaskum would have to add from 2.68 to 32.56 teachers to its staff.

Since the other candidates think they could cut costs, I'd like to see some indication on their part where they intend to make these cuts. The only place I can see where I feel we could possibly find a saving would be in energy consumption. As an active conservationist for 20 years, I feel that I have some expertise in this area. I also have names of people who could help look for energy losses in the district.

To say that the present school board has not tried to hold down costs is simply not true. When the inflation rate is between 11 and 12% and the school budget is held to an 8.5% increase, it isn't too hard to determine that the budget was cut.

If you vote for me on April 6 I promise to take a common sense, moderate approach to school problems and to be open to all suggestions.

This is in response to the letters in the Statesman from the two school board candidates. Mr. Spoerl's letter reminds me of the old adage, "Don't bother me with facts—

my mind's made up." If he had read the Statesman's report of the Feb. 22 school board meeting, he would have been aware of some of the following facts.

1. The primary purpose of the CESA 16 computer contract was for accounting, scheduling and grading.

2. There was no attendance program in the CESA 16 contract.

3. The main reason for purchasing the in-house computer was to save money. Other than some delays in budget balance updating, the administration indicated that they were satisfied with the services from CESA 16. The administration felt that the potential \$100,000 saving over the budgeted life span of the system warranted the extra effort required to initiate the in-house computer.

4. The decision was not casually made. Two local citizens employed in data processing management volunteered to help evaluate the systems. Three board members visited the IBM installation at Hartford and spoke in favor of it.

5. The computer purchase was not "rammed through." It was on the Jan. 11 agenda although the meeting was postponed until the 18th. It was discussed again on Jan. 28, at which time we knew a decision would need to be made by the first of March if we hoped to obtain the equipment to change over on July 1st.

The majority of the school board, after considering the facts, has tried to save the taxpayers' dollars without cutting into the educational program.

To Mr. Horner's letter, I, as another concerned citizen of the Kewaskum School District and also as a parent of six children (one attending high school and five having graduated), am fully aware of the need for a quality education for our children.

I do not hide behind the "quality of education" slogan. To me, my tax dollar is an investment in education, which, be preparing our children for higher paid employment, will be returned many times over as a result of those higher earnings.

In my opinion we have been doing a good job of holding costs down. In last year's budget study, on a cost per pupil basis, we were 8.5% less than the average for the 20 school districts our size. Our staff was 14.7% less and our central office staff was 30% smaller.

Where does Mr. Horner want to make the big cuts necessary for a significant tax saving? Is it imaginative to cut the elementary guidance counselor? Who would then aid the disturbed student caught in today's breakdown of the home? Just to keep it in prospective, a \$20,000 budget cut would save ap-

proximately \$7 per \$1,000 of your school tax.

I want to continue the thorough and efficient job the Kewaskum School District has been doing in the past. I ask for your vote on April 6th.

Letter to the Editor:

On February 12th, Ralph Horner wrote a letter regarding the Business Manager's salary

in relationship to the In-House computer.

Mr. Horner listed salaries for seven years assuming a 14% increase each year. Mr Horner included fringe benefits in his salary figures. Let's be realistic!

First, not many of us would ever include our fringe benefits in our salary increases, because they don't show on our paychecks. It is very hard to accept a figure with this included. Even Mr. Horner, who works at the Gehl Co. where office personnel did not get wage increases due to the economic conditions, would have to say he received a raise, because his fringe benefits changed.

Second, we cannot assume anyone is getting an increase until contracts and salaries are decided on. Mr. Horner probably assumed his salary would increase at the last salary review, too, but it didn't happen.

Mr. Borch is an educated man who is hired to do a job for which he was trained. He was hired at a base salary of \$18,000, to be increased over several years pending board reviews of performance, to a point of approximately \$25,000.

Our school board saved us money over these past four years, by not starting him out at the \$25,000 figure, but working up to it in yearly segments. The 1982-83 increase will be an 8.0% raise.

As Tom Brigham commented at a board meeting several weeks ago, "This man is not sitting around.... he is very busy."

Maybe a few more people should take the time to find out that Mr. Borch is working extremely hard to keep our budget as low as possible, and to make certain we are in the running for any available funding or grants. With his help, we are getting tax savings. I for one want a professional handling our \$4.5 million school budget.

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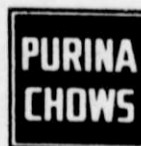
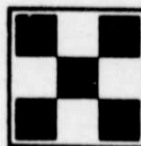

The OBJECT of looking into owning your own computer WAS TO SAVE THE TAXPAYERS MONEY. Over a seven-year period, the district could probably SAVE approximately \$100,000 in processing costs. During that period, projected costs for CESA are expected to run \$251,000 (this projected cost figure was not challenged at the meeting by CESA representatives), while in-house costs would be approximately \$150,000.

Your accusation that the computer purchase was "rammed through" is absurd! The following facts substantiate this:

- there was an approximate 2½ hour discussion of the purchase pros and cons prior to the purchase motion; in addition to prior Board Meeting's discussions

- the service bureau representatives (CESA) were in attendance and presented/discussed their system

- the in-house representative (EMI) was present and presented/discussed his companies equipment and services

- the decision to go in-house or remain with a service bureau, advantages vs. disadvantages, were discussed with knowledgeable Data Processing personnel

- and finally, some Board Members visited Hartford to check out their in-house system.

Instead of criticizing the "five member majority" (as you call them) of the School Board, one should question the ability, concern, and constructive participation of the other Board members.

One final comment in regards to your plan to hire three

secretaries to replace the Business Manager's position; have you ever heard of the ERA?

Thirdly, I propose an eight period day. This would enable students to take more classes, thus better preparing them for their future.

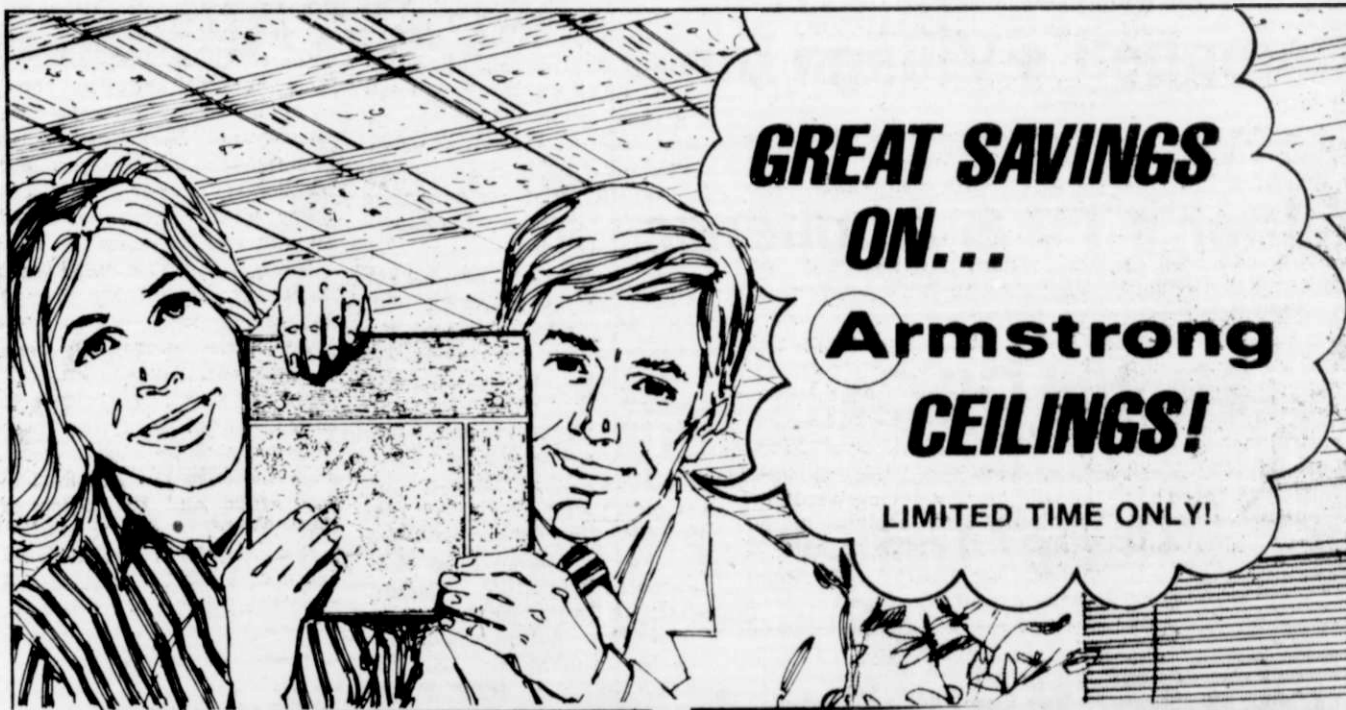

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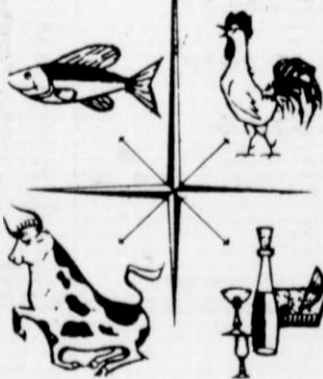

Regular Meeting  
March 1, 1982  
8:00 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Gerald Stollenwerk presided. All Trustee Members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of February 15, 1982, were approved as printed upon a motion by Trustee David Nigh, seconded by Trustee Raynor Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

Mr. Robert J. Anglim, the State Chairperson for YOUTH ART MONTH explained youth art potential and brought along some examples of art work, with the youth artist. President Gerald Stollenwerk then read a proclamation as follows:

**PROCLAMATION**

Whereas, Youth Art Month has been observed nationally since 1961 and has gained wide acceptance; and Whereas, children are our most priceless asset; and Whereas, childhood is the time to develop interests, skills and aptitudes that will last a lifetime; and Whereas, the importance of art in education is recognized as being necessary for the full development of all children; Now Therefore, it is proclaimed that each March be observed as Youth ART MONTH. President Stollenwerk thanked the Jaycees and wished them continued success in the future.

Superintendent of Wastewater Treatment Albers reported briefly on the meeting with the DNR on the WPDES Permit.

Superintendent of Public Works Bilgo reported on the new communications system and the definite benefits provided by the system along with the quality of the system.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the balance sheet for year ending 12/31/81. It was noted that if all estimates go as projected after the audit the village should have a balance in the black.

Administrator Schmidt also reported that the Police Commission meeting that was tentatively scheduled for March 2, 1982 has been changed to March 16, 1982, at 7:00 p.m.

After the review and discussion on the building permit

application of Jan Rosenthal for an addition to the existing home at 711 Moraine Court, a motion was made to approve the issuing the permit after the payment of proper fees by Trustee Raynor Herriges, seconded by Trustee Donald Mlodzik. Voice vote was unanimous.

The totals of all claims, as recommended for payment by the Finance committee Chairman Trustee David Nigh, were as follows:

**HERNIA OR RUPTURE — WHAT IS IT?**  
by R. G. Edwards, M.D.

Today I shall try to relate to you some of the facts about this very common disorder. The definition is given in our surgical text books as follows: A hernia is an abnormal protrusion of an organ or a portion of it, through the containing wall of its cavity beyond its normal confines. The usual meaning of the term will be restricted today to the abdomen, the "hidden area," so named by the Greek scholars. There are several kinds and locations of herniae, but today I will dwell on the inguinal hernia.

The males are affected exclusively by this disorder because, as the fetus develops inside the mother's womb, the power of nature forces the small, ball-shaped testicle out of the abdomen of the fetus, into the scrotal sac, shortly before birth. Why? Because the spermatozoa must have the coolness of the scrotum to maintain healthy activity. The heat of the abdomen kills the sperm cells and often causes the undescended testicle to become cancerous.

The pathway of the descending testicle becomes the pathway for the intestine to be forced into by a sudden unexpected great increase in the intra-abdominal pressure. Examples of such pressure: severe cough, excessive strain due to lifting or pushing, or occasionally present at birth. When a rupture is caused by strain or cough, the man will only have a slight twinge of pain and will find the bulge of tissues appearing 3-4 days later.

In America today there are nearly one million uncured such disorders. We know about one million trusses are sold annually. The truss is designed to hold the sliding, slippery mass of tissue inside the abdominal wall. This treatment doesn't work well at all, and can be a cause of the fatal incarceration and strangulation of the intestine. Therefore, the cure method as advised by the medical profession is a good surgery by a competent surgeon.

## 30 Years Ago

March 7, 1952

The old clock in the tower of Holy Trinity Church is silent. After 47 years of constant service to the community, it perhaps deserves a rest. For more than a year now, it could not be depended upon for correct time. The parts had become hopelessly worn and since clocks of this type are no longer manufactured, they cannot be replaced. Besides this there was increasing danger that the tremendous weights which worked the pendulum might at anytime come crashing down the building. Realizing the danger and at the same time remembering that the clock was originally purchased with contributions given by the villagers, it was with real regrets that the congregation voted recently to stop the clock.

Judge August C. Backus, 75, who was born and raised in Kewaskum, one of Wisconsin's most distinguished lawyers and jurists and a former publisher of the Milwaukee Sentinel, died March 6 at his home in Milwaukee. The achievement for which Judge Backus perhaps was best known was the fathering of the adult probation system, which has been the means of saving many thousands of first offenders from prison. Nearly all the states

have followed his original idea. Judge Backus had many relatives in Kewaskum and vicinity and occasionally he returned to his old home town to call on them as well as his numerous friends here.

Four youths from this area enlisted Friday for service with the United States Air Force. They include Norman Koepke, 19, of Route 1, Kewaskum, and Wayne Sramek, 18, Charles Miske, 19, and Ferdinand Buchel Jr., 18, all of Adell.

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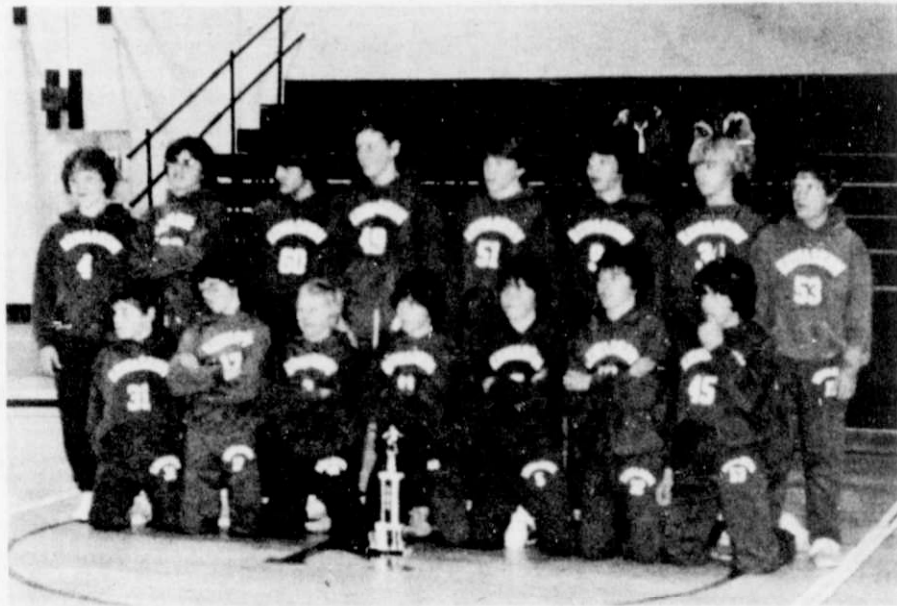

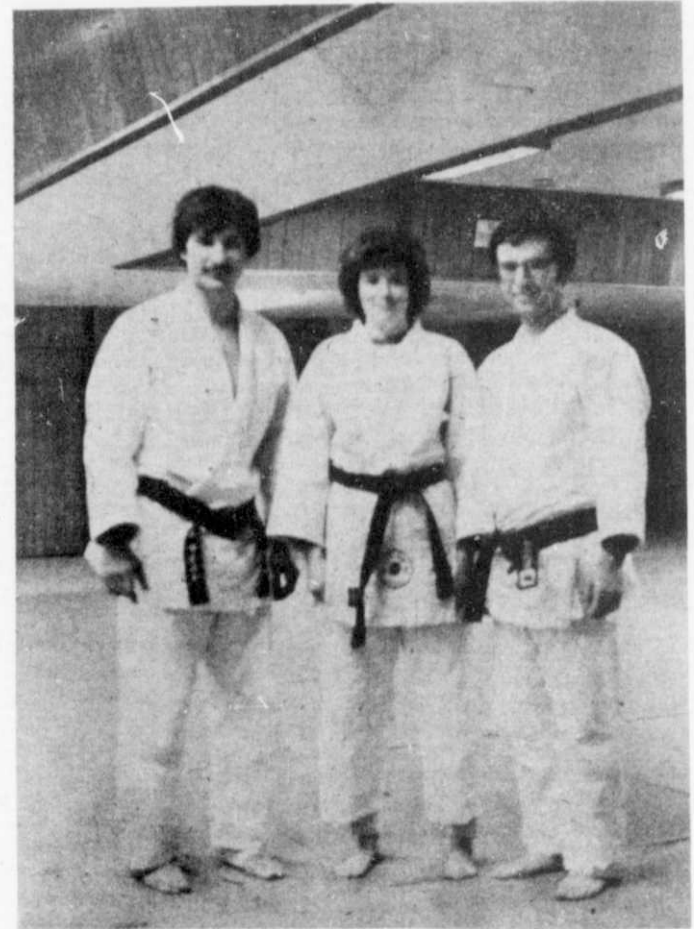

Kewaskum's Annette Jandre came the closest of going to state with a sixth place in the floor exercise with a fine mark of 7.45. She led the event for quite a while until the girls from Fall River and Shorewood competed, and both schools were very strong in this event.

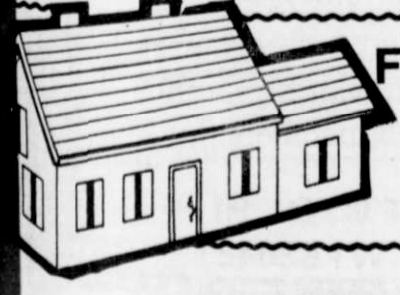

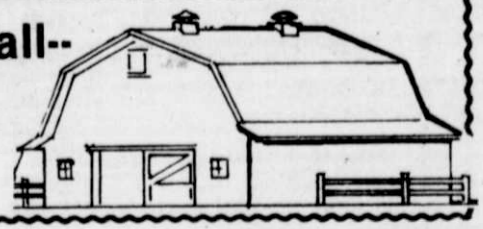
