Girls Second in State

Team Feted at Program, Parade, Dinner

Beat Denmark in Semifinal, Lose To Portage in Championship Game

The Kewaskum girls basketball team isn't the No. 1 Class B team in the state but they are No. 2.

This is quite an accomplishment, being second best out of 116 Class B schools in the state. There is only one team better and 114 teams worse.

The Indians were defeated by an excellent Portage team in the WIAA State Tournament final Saturday afternoon in the University of Wisconsin fieldhouse in Madison, which was televised on Channel 18, Milwaukee, as were all the final games.

Kewaskum advanced to the finals by coming from behind to defeat Denmark Friday afternoon, 57-52 in the semifinals. In the championship contest Saturday afternoon the Indians were downed by Portage, 52-36.

In our opinion, Portage had the best team in the tournament, including the Class A schools, most of whom they could have beaten. They had the size, led by 6-3 center Sharon Harp, and the experience, having played in the state tournament last year when they reached the semifinals. Also Portage had one of the best

guards in the state in Jane Lobenstein, a 1,100 point scorer (22 per game). Lobenstein is being sought by many colleges.

On the other hand Kewaskum has one of the best centers in junior Linda Larsen. After watching Larsen score 24 points against Denmark, Coach Ed Zydowsky concentrated on stopping her and had his Warriors double and even triple team her. Their effort was successful and their stingy defense checked her almost completely with a mere two points in the entire game. This left other players open for shots but they couldn't pick up the slack, although Jill Yearling came through with 14 points.

This was the Indians' second trip to Madison, having last played in the state tournament five years ago, in 1977, when they lost to state champion Cuba City.

Portage's undefeated state champs finished the season with a perfect 25-0 record.

Six busloads of Kewaskum students, band members and adult fans made the trip to Madison Friday and five busloads went Saturday. Many others drove in private cars.

The high school band and hundreds of fans really whooped it up for the Indians, and were one of the most enthusiastic groups in the fieldhouse. Well over 400 tickets were sold at the high school to say nothing of those who purchased them at the tournament.

Portage has won 76 of its last

79 games and has the best offensive record in the Class B field.

A fact worth mentioning is that all the members of the Kewaskum girls' team are on the honor roll scholastically.

The Kewaskum girls received a huge send off Tuesday in the form of a pep rally (with Mr. Ammel and his pep band) before leaving for Madison Wednesday morning. Friday's high school classes were called off so students could attend the tournament.

The girls arrived in Madison

around 11 a.m. Wednesday and had dinner at 1:40 p.m. They held a 40-minute practice at the fieldhouse and then went to their hotel rooms at the Sheraton Motor Inn. The girls then had an hour practice session at a local high school gym before returning to their hotel for swimming.

Wednesday evening there was a banquet for all 16 teams. There were a few guest speakers and the coaches each introduced their teams. The teams were all separated so they could

A Rare Occurrence

Indians' Linda Larsen and Brother Brian Both Lead Conference in Scoring, 2nd in Rebounding

Linda Also Player of Year, Unanimous All-Conference Choice

A rare sister and brother combination achievement took place on the Kewaskum High School girls' and boys' basketball teams this year.

Center Linda Larsen of the girls' team and her brother, forward Brian, of the boys' team both led the strong Eastern Wisconsin Conference in scoring and both were also second in conference rebounding. Linda was also named Player of the Year in the Eastern Wisconsin and was a unanimous

choice on the all-conference team. She was the only junior named on the all-conference team.

Linda, 6-0, ended with 216 points, an average of 18.0 points per game, and shot 47 percent from the floor in 12 conference games. She finished second in rebounding with 170, 12 behind Jackie Genke of Sheboygan Falls.

Brian won coveted league scoring honors with 288 points and a 24.0 average,

taking the title with a 41 point performance in his last game against Sheboygan Falls. Larsen, 6-2, fell just seven rebounds short of Plymouth's Mark Comerford, 6-4 center of the conference champions, and third highest scorer.

Here is the best part. Linda is only a junior and will be back next year to torment opposing players.

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

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Fire at Claas Home

1982 Sewer and Water Budgets Approved

TWO WRITE-IN CANDIDATES FOR VILLAGE BOARD

Proposed 1982 budgets for the Water and Sewage Departments were presented at Monday evening's Kewaskum Village Board meeting.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt presented a proposed budget of \$107,112.00 for the Water Department in 1982. After a brief review, Schmidt noted a rate review hearing is expected to be held some time during April in Madison. The Public Service Commission will review Kewaskum's proposed budget at that time and establish rates for the village. Schmidt emphasized that the village has no control over rates and it must use figures set by the PSC.

In other action the board approved the proposed 1982 budget of \$242,006.00 for the Sewage Department. An initial 1982 figure of \$249,890.00 had been presented, however, Schmidt thought two reductions, one in repair and maintenance and the other in

electrical power purchased, could reduce this figure by approximately \$8,000.

Schmidt noted that upon receipt of the 1982 sewer budget, Dr. Raymond Kipp would begin work on determining proposed sewer rates for the village. Schmidt informed the board that the Sewage Department has been running in the "red" since 1974. Calculations for last year's rates showed the village would have had to increase its rates by 65% to make the department break even. The board, however, felt at that time rates should be increased gradually and therefore, approved only a 27% increase.

Schmidt stated the proposed budget of \$249,890 reflected a 51% increase over last year's revenue of \$165,000 for the sewage department. The major areas responsible for the large increase over the 1981 budget are, increased costs of chemicals, increased rates for purchased electric service, and repairs on grinders in the

treatment plant.

Waste Water Treatment Superintendent Pete Albers noted one chemical alone increased 23.5% in just one month. Repairs to the grinders resulted in a \$13,000.00 one-time increase under maintenance and repairs. Albers said the grinders had not been repaired for 20 years and work done on them should make them serviceable for another 15. Schmidt noted the electric company had informed him anticipated rate increases would be around 18%. However, Schmidt said the last two bills showed increases of 17% and 38%, averaging out to 27%. The 27% was used to figure anticipated electric costs.

Schmidt will present the proposed sewer rate recommendations as soon as they are available.

Schmidt informed the board that Cablevision will energize its line on April 15 and is planning a demonstration at the village hall between April 15 and 19. Seventy per cent of the wiring is installed, the remaining 30% is underground installation which will

not be completed until summer. After Cablevision's demonstration next month, service will be available to its customers.

The board approved hiring of Kitty Hlavaty as part-time assistant librarian. Trustee Dick Schmidt noted there was only 1/2% difference in scoring between the two top applicants, Mrs. Hlavaty and Sandra Remmel. Schmidt said 25 individuals applied for the job.

The board approved requests for the hiring of part-time summer employees for the Water, Sewer and Parks Departments.

Winter parking restrictions have been lifted as of March 16. Administrator Schmidt informed the board there will be two "write-in" candidates for the April 6 Village Board election. They are Howard Laubenstein of Route 2, Prospect Drive, and Travis Canfield of 202 Forest Avenue.

The board adjourned to closed session to discuss litigation in the Scott lawsuit.

The large groups will be doing music that they will be performing at the large group contest on Saturday, March 27 at Grafton. The Swing Choir and Jazz Ensemble will be playing music of a popular idiom.

The band is directed by Robert Getter and the Choirs are under the direction of Dave Bertelsen. The public is invited to this free concert.

Lions Club Son and Daughter Banquet

The Kewaskum Lions Club is hosting a son and daughter banquet at the Glacier Inn on Tuesday evening, March 23.

Entertainment following the dinner will be a portrayal of Mark Twain by Walter Garbisch of Greenfield, Wisconsin, son of Gladys Garbisch of Kewaskum and the late Edward Garbisch. His portrayal will include vibrant stories of Twain that reflect to the surge of a growing land of the 1800's, along with humor and seriousness mixed together in the Twain style, scope and imagination. There will also be stories from life on the Mississippi, Huckleberry Finn and Tom Sawyer among others.

Garbisch is a twenty-year driver for Greyhound Bus lines and a past president of Toastmasters.

The girls were disappointed with the loss but Coach Soerens said there was no reason to be because there was only one Class B team better than them and we are better than 114 other teams in this class.

The Indians girls received a large trophy and individual medals for their fine efforts.

At a pep rally Sunday afternoon a good segment of the Kewaskum community was on hand in the school gym to welcome back the girls' team from their unsuccessful bid for Class B state champs. Despite their loss in the final game of the state tournament to Portage, everyone was in great spirits and proud of the team.

Athletic director, Dave Wietor, acted as master of ceremonies. After a hearty

congratulations for the team's accomplishment, Wietor called upon coaches Ken Soerens, Milt Dickinsen and Keith Amundson for a few comments about the team. Head coach Soerens commented on the excellent season the girls had and the great effort put forth in attaining their runner-up state status. He also talked about each player individually.

School superintendent Floyd Brenholt and school board representative John Tessar also were on hand to offer up their congratulations on the fine representation the girls made of their school and community at the tournament.

Finally Village Administrator Dan Schmidt, in behalf of Village President Gerald Stollenwerk, said a few words on how proud the community was with the girls' basketball accomplishments.

Tri-captains Brenda Fuller, Jill Yearling and Michele Rodenkirch presented their runner-up trophy to high school principal Clark Pearson and thanked the coaches and fans for their months of loyal support and encouragement.

Following the program the girls found two fire trucks waiting outside to give them a ride through village streets and

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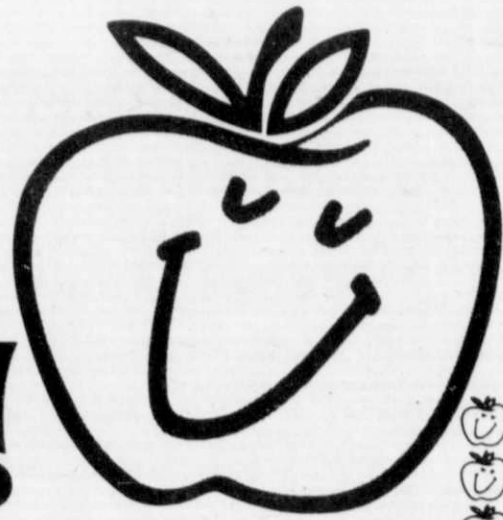
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Couple Sues to Get Village Liquor License

Ralph and Henriette Scott of 402 Elm Street, Slinger, are suing the Village of Kewaskum in an effort to overturn its decision of last February which denied the couple a liquor license.

The Scotts, owners of a tavern at 1310 River View Drive, Kewaskum, are contending the village board violated their constitutional rights and their rights to due process by denying the license. The couple had been issued a license on July 1, 1979, later that year, the tavern business was transferred to Scott's sons. The business was run under the name of Apollo's Lyre featuring live rock bands. Operation of the tavern was then taken over by John and Diane Kleinke of Kewaskum who operated it as John and Dee's.

Area residents attended the February 2nd hearing, as well as several other meetings, voicing their opposition to issuance of the license. The residents felt the same type of

operation might result with vandalism, fighting and noise in the tavern area. Ralph Scott noted at the February meeting his sons would not be allowed to get bartender licenses to work on the premises. Village attorney Gerald Kiefer, however, noted Scott's sons would not have to obtain licenses if they worked in a family-owned business.

Kiefer also noted the board should take into consideration only the time the tavern was run by Scott and not be influenced by situations which occurred when the license was held by other operators. Village Police Chief Donald Hlavaty also recommended the village deny the license, noting there had been 26 complaints during the time Ralph Scott held the license. The Scotts say the denial is based on hearsay, and therefore filed a lawsuit in Circuit Court.

Attorney Richard L. Zaffiro of Milwaukee is representing the Scotts, while the village will be represented by the firm of Kasdorf, Dall, Lewis and Swietlick.

Engineering Firm Recommended For Municipal Building Project

Chairman Donald Mlodzik and his committee reviewed letters from three engineering firms interested in working on a proposed repair and remodeling program for the Municipal Building.

The firm of R.A. Smith submitted a bid of \$1,000.00 to do preliminary layout and engineering work. Ruekert and Mielke quoted their fee as not to exceed \$1,500.00 and would work on an hourly basis. Graef, Anhalt and Schloemer's fee was \$4,000.00. Foth and Van Dyke, the village's general engineering firm, was not considered because it would not provide any free preliminary plans and their fee for preliminary layout work was \$8,300.00.

After a short discussion, the committee agreed to recommend Ruekert and Mielke. Although theirs was not the lowest bid, they are a well-established firm and they presented a plan and program closest to the recommendations of the Public Works Committee. Village President Gerald Stol-

lenwerk suggested the committee ask for a specific outline of what the village can expect for its \$1,500.00 before a formal commitment is made.

Mlodzik and his committee said they wanted the public to know that this was not a recommendation to go ahead with the entire project. All three firms recommend plans which can be done in phases. Trustee Paul Blumer said, "we have to do something, the building is in serious need of repairs." "We have to have a game plan," said Administrator Dan Schmidt. The committee felt the village has to secure a definite blueprint plan that will allow the village to get started on a small scale and continue the project as economic conditions allow.

Trustee Dick Schmidt commented, we don't want to spend \$20,000 on roof repairs now only to find out two years from now it will be ripped out when the next phase is begun. With a definite set of plans, the committee feels repair and remodeling of the Municipal Building can be accomplished in affordable stages with each step working into the next.

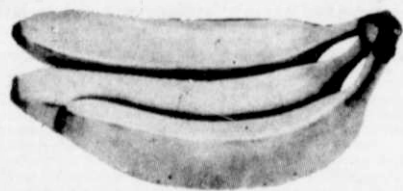

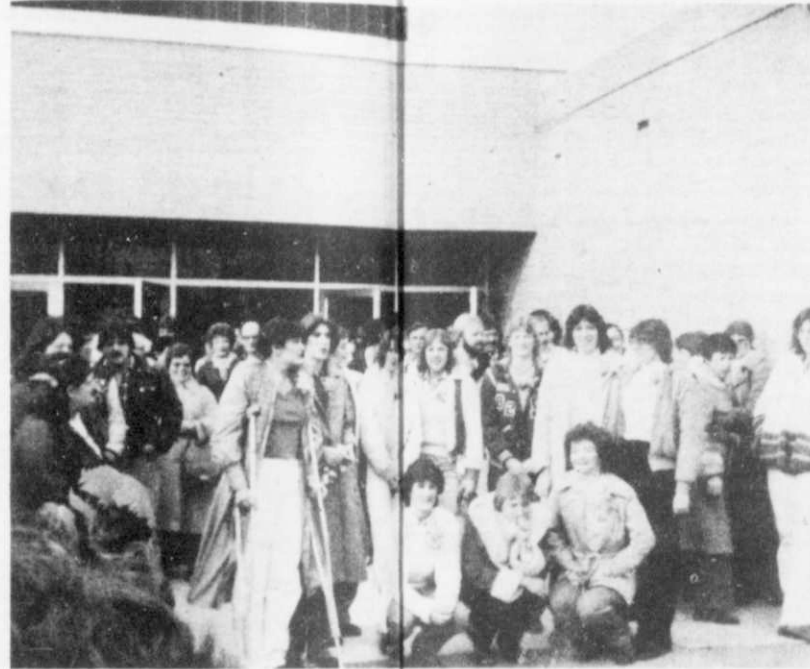

It has come to our attention that many of the able-bodied voters in our school district have failed to vote in past elections. This fact disturbs us deeply since there is a very important school board election coming up on April 6 which will fill two seats on the board. The people who fill these two seats will play an important role in future administrative decisions which will affect both the students and the taxpayers. It is crucial that these two seats be filled by

competent people.

Basically there are two opposing groups in this year's election. In one group there appears to be two candidates who support reasonable tax cuts that will not affect the quality of the education in our schools. They stand for cutting costs in other expenditures of the school district rather than in the educational part of the budget. These above mentioned candidates stand for high quality education at current reasonable costs.

The other group consists also of two candidates one seemingly more radical than the other. Both of these men insist on more and more budget cuts with the more radical one wishing to cut out the so-called "frills" which are currently entertaining us students. So far, the only thing we have heard these two say is cut the budget, but we have yet to hear how they will maintain or improve the quality of our education, which is the most important aspect of school.

Of all the free-willed, competent people who could adequately fill the two seats on the board, two of them are on the ballot for the spring election. One is Gerald Secor, who has been a member of the school board for almost 12 years. Mr. Secor has done so much to make this district one of high quality education benefitting both the students and the taxpayers. The fact that he has been an asset to this school would make it a shame if he were not reelected.

Another candidate who would be of great service is Joan Rosenberger. She is a graduate of Marquette University and was a journalist for the Milwaukee Journal for some time. All of this tends to reassure a person that she is well-educated, open-minded, and knowledgeable of the latest developments affecting the school. She is also the one who suggests the school district look into cutting utility costs instead of educational costs. She would be a great addition to our school board, but she can only help us if she gets our votes of support.

In the opposing group we

have Ralph Horner and John Spoerl. Mr. Horner wants more budget cuts to be made. We would like to know where he is planning to make these cuts. If too many cuts are passed, what will happen to the quality of our education? Why should we even have to make large cuts in the budget if our school will be debt free within two years? When this debt of approximately 350,000 dollars is payed off, what will we do with the money coming in that would normally have gone to pay this debt? At the current tax levy, this would be about an extra 100,000 dollars per year that could be used, instead of cutting some from the budget! So why then must we continue to make budget cuts?

Finally, there is John Spoerl. Mr. Spoerl, a former janitor of the school district who was fired just over a year and a half ago because of discrepancies involving his punching in about 1 or 2 hours before he actually started working, advocated the following items:

(1) The return to having only reading, writing and arithmetic, and

(2) The cutting of the "frills" that entertain students. We realize that the three R's are important to a good education, however, in this world of computers, Space Shuttles, and other technologies, a student will not be able to compete unless he can take a business or technical course. If we were to follow Mr. Spoerl's plan of action, the class of 1995 probably wouldn't be educated enough to even enter a college or technical school, let alone trying to get a job right out of school.

Secondly, what are these "frills" that keep us entertained? As seniors, we can not for the life of us figure out what these "frills" are. If we knew what these "frills" are that have been entertaining us for the past 13 years, maybe we could enjoy them before the year is out. As of now, we don't even know of any "frills."

It is up to the voters to make sure that we have two compe-

tent, open-minded people filling the two posts available on the school board and not two people who will be mere "puppets" of another school board member. We feel Mr. Secor and Mrs. Rosenberger would make very competent board members because they have down to earth ideas and support having quality education without making drastic cuts in the budget. They deserve to be reelected and elected respectively. Mr. Horner and Mr. Spoerl should not be elected because the ideas they support, we feel, are unfounded and radical. We urge all registered voters of the district to vote for Mr. Secor and Mrs. Rosenberger in the election. Your votes could determine the quality of your children's education.

Staging a complex musical with an amateur, unpaid cast and crew can indeed be a challenge. And in order to meet that challenge, the play's director must tap many professional resources if the musical is going to live up to its billing.

This is precisely what Carl Barnhart, theatre director at the University of Wisconsin Center in West Bend, has done. With the aid of musical director Professor Albert Asch and vocal directors Ms. Jo Hoffmann, Barnhart has set out to stage a blockbuster "West Side Story." The addition of James Patrick Malone as the play's choreographer seems to insure that Barnhart will present the best rendition of this Broadway musical West Bend has ever seen.

Malone is employed full-time as a dancer with the Bauer Dance Ensemble in Milwaukee. Barnhart has been impressed with the Bauer dance group and has brought them to West Bend to perform at UWWC fine arts events. The match was made and Malone began coming to UWWC two nights a week to work with the "West Side Story" cast. Malone admits, "I was concerned at first that novice dancers couldn't pick up the difficult skills and techniques that "West Side Story" calls for. But some of the

things we're doing are very complicated, and they're getting it." He attributes this success to the fact that everyone wants to do a good job with the numbers. Their enthusiasm knocks me out!"

Malone has worked with students before. He has taught tap at UWM and has helped choreograph summer workshops for the Milwaukee Ballet Company. He holds a bachelor of fine arts degree in dance from UWM and has studied under Merce Cunningham in New York.

WHAT CAUSES BACK PAIN?

Aside from headache, backache is America's most common health complaint.

Mr. Jone's car was bumped from behind. He suffers back pain. Mr. Miller lifted a heavy box at work. He suffers back pain. Mrs. Boswell is expecting a child. She suffers back pain.

Not all back problems are due to severe strains or dramatic accidents. There are times when a relatively innocent act such as stepping off a curb or lifting a pencil can cause back pain and sciatica. This is because the pain may be the symptom of a spinal disorder compounded by structural weakness.

Pains of mysterious origin may be caused by brain insults. Sometimes the symptoms of the back problem appear immediately, allowing the victim to correlate cause and effect. However, sometimes days or even months pass before pain appears, causing the victim to seek treatment for conditions other than the causative spinal disorder.

Persistent or recurring aches in the lower back and limbs may suggest a possible lower spinal or pelvic problem. This often requires a structural correction of the spine in order to relieve the condition. Although drugs may hide the pain temporarily, the spine and sacroiliac must be aligned to its proper position for normal function.

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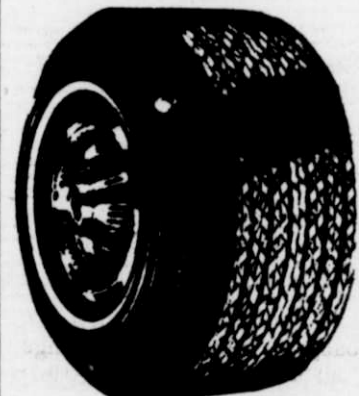

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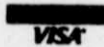
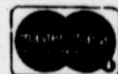

Get registration information from the high school Vo-Ag teacher or the County 4-H Office.

Training is a good idea for young people working on their parents' farm as well. Time spent in the 4-H tractor project or high school vocational agriculture courses can apply toward the certification requirement.

Training is only a small part of safety awareness, however. The farm situation presents a lot of hazards.

West Bend Judo Clinic Held

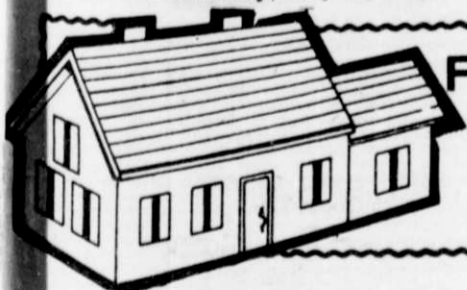

Highlights of the clinic included work on the drive leg theory of Judo throwing along with combination throws. Arm bar techniques for both Judo competition and self-defense were also practiced.

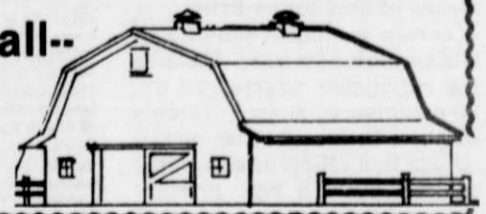

Kewaskum was honored by having two of the six players selected on the Eastern Wisconsin all-conference basketball team named last Tuesday night. Not a single guard was named to the first unit this year.

This year's team was a tall one, not only in stature but was a big one in scoring honors and rebounding as well.

Veteran Mark Comerford of Plymouth was named 1982 Player of the Year in the balloting against Kiel's Chris Konz and Brian Larsen of Kewaskum.
