## Cost Will Run \$15,000 to \$20,000

### Village Reassessment Bids In

President Gerald Stollenwerk opened bids for reassessment of the Village of Kewaskum during Monday night's meeting. Costs could run as high as \$20,000 and start as early as August 1, 1982, depending upon which bid the Village Board accepts.

Specifications were sent out to sixteen companies. Nine companies replied, three with "no-bid" letters because of already heavy workloads. Appraisal Services Company of Eau Claire was low bidder at \$15,275.00 with reassessing to start August 15, 1982, and complete by May 15, 1983; Bowmar Appraisal, Appleton, \$15,400.00, starting September 15, 1982, completion July 15, 1983; D. E. Erickson Real Estate Appraisers, Green Bay,

\$17,500, work to begin one week after contract award, complete May 31, 1983; James R. Laird Appraisal Consultants, Appleton, \$17,500.00 to begin August 1, 1982, ending June 1, 1983; AAFCORP, Madison, \$18,500, starting October 1, 1982, completion January 1, 1983; Ad Valorem of Hartford, came in with the high bid of \$20,000, work to start September 15, 1982, complete June 1, 1983.

Stollenwerk noted all the bids were base figures. Some of the bids also contained some additional service charges. Because of these added costs, the board decided to table action on selection of an appraisal firm until its August 2 meeting, thus allowing time for a closer review of all the bids submitted.

Village Administrator Dan

Schmidt presented the latest preliminary drawing for proposed remodeling of the Municipal Building. Schmidt noted several changes had been made. One revision was reduction of the new addition to the north by three feet. The room will be needed for installation of a storm sewer. Another change was an increase in the size of the proposed community room. Schmidt said this area was enlarged because, as of January 1983, the bank's community room would no longer be available to the public, this necessitating the need for a large meeting room which could be used by various groups and organizations such as the Woman's Club, Auxiliary Police, etc.

Schmidt asked for and

## Area Man Killed in Farm Accident

W. Allen Wendel, 54, of 9615 Cranberry Road, near Boltonville, Town of Farmington, was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital West Bend, on Monday afternoon. Death was caused by massive internal injuries received when Wendel was crushed between a tractor and a mobile home. The accident occurred at his home.

Wendel was attempting to crank start a tractor that was apparently left in gear, sheriff's deputies said. The tractor lunged forward and pinned Wendel between the tractor and the family's motor home, which was parked several feet away, deputies said.

Wendel was born July 17, 1928, on the Homestead at his present address. On Oct. 15, 1949 he married Bernice Wells at Random Lake. The couple lived at their present address

since marriage. Wendel had worked for 16 years at the Kohler Co. and for the last 16 years he and his wife had operated the Salt Box Antique Shop.

He was a member of the Wisconsin and National Antique Dealers Ass'n. And was a veteran of the Korean War. He was a member of the St. John's United Church of Christ Church at Boltonville; A member of Tringle B Legion Post and was currently serving as treasurer of Union Cemetery at Boltonville.

Survivors include his widow Bernice; one son, Daryl, of Slinger; one daughter, Susan, at home, and his parents, Wilmer and Luella Paulus Wendel of 9650 Cranberry Road, Random Lake.

Funeral services for W. Allen Wendel were held at 8:00 p.m. Wednesday at St. John's United

Church of Christ at Boltonville. Rev. William Kesting, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Union Cemetery, Boltonville. Friends called at the church after 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, until the time of service.

A memorial fund has been established in his name for St. John's Church. The Wilk Funeral Home, Random Lake, was in charge of arrangements.

The purpose of the Budget Hearing will be to review the proposed 1982-83 budget for recommendation to the Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting will follow immediately after the Budget Hearing. Resolutions to be acted upon at the Annual Meeting include acceptance of the Treasurer's Report, pay of school board members, and the adoption of a tax levy for 1982-83.

A special meeting of the School Board of Kewaskum will also be held on Monday, July 26, 1982, in the Kewaskum High School Multi-Purpose room. The meeting will begin after the conclusion of the Annual Meeting. Agenda items include action on kindergarten bus routes for 1982-83, approval of repair bid for the high school air conditioner, and approval of contracts for two part-time high school teachers.

## Steven Mertz, 6, Dies As Result of Pond Drowning

Steven W. Mertz, 6, of rural Allenton passed away at Milwaukee Children's Hospital Wednesday evening, July 14, as a result of a drowning accident at Kiwanis Community Park pond in Kewaskum the week before on Thursday, July 8.

The boy had been rescued after being in the pond about 10 minutes. He remained in critical condition until his death, Washington County Coroner Robert H. Boltz said that the attending physician reported the death to him and listed the cause as drowning.

Steven's mother, Kathleen Mertz, had noticed that he was missing at the park about 11 a.m. last Thursday and notified a lifeguard. The guard then cleared other swimmers from the pond, located the boy in the water and brought him to shore, it was reported.

The boy was administered mouth-to-mouth and cardiopulmonary resuscitation at the scene and was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital at West Bend by the Kewaskum rescue squad where he was placed in the intensive care unit in critical condition.

Steven was transferred to Milwaukee Children's Hos-

pital's intensive care unit Friday afternoon for further treatment. His condition never improved while he was at Children's.

Steven was born in West Bend on January 16, 1976, to Roger and Kathleen Thill Mertz. He had been a pupil at the Wayne Elementary School in the Town of Wayne.

Survivors include his parents; one sister, Julie, age 7, at home; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Thill, Route 2, Kewaskum; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Armond Mertz, Route 1, Allenton; uncles, aunts, other relatives and friends.

Visitation was at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, on Friday from 4 to 9 p.m. with a prayer vigil at 8 p.m. Services were Saturday at 10 a.m. at the funeral home, followed by a Mass of the Angels at 10:30 a.m. at St. Bridget's Catholic Church in the Town of Wayne, with Rev. Elroy Pesch and Rev. Robert Berghammer, concelebrant, officiating. Burial was in the Salem Cemetery, Town of Wayne, with the Rev. Ralph Maschmeier conducting graveside services.

received approval to go back to the engineering firm and ask for construction costs of the remodeling. Schmidt told the board the project cost would be broken down into phases. This would allow the village to do as much, or as little, as the village felt it could budget during any particular time, rather than having to do the entire remodeling all at once.

The board also approved the Plan Commission's request to contact firms for preliminary engineering costs on the TIF District priority projects (Well No. 3, the Roseland waterloop, and sidewalks along South Fond du Lac Avenue and Highway H).

The board recommended Schmidt contact the four engineers which had been interviewed for the Municipal Building project.

The board voted to adopt Ordinance 82-3, which will amend the Village's traffic code to be in accordance with the new state drunk-driving statutes. Attorney Gerald Kiefer noted he had written the ordinance so any future state traffic amendments would automatically be adopted by the village rather than having to have action by the board every

time a change was made.

The board approved the Plan Commission's request to spend \$875.00 for updating the Zoning Ordinance and purchase of new maps.

Bartender's licenses were approved for Karla Roberts, Eva Zimmerman and Scott Stoltzman.

The board then adjourned to closed session to discuss police contract negotiations.

**Rizzardi Attends  
Vo Ag Conference**

Dave Rizzardi represented Kewaskum High School at the 65th Annual Conference for Wisconsin Instructors in Vocational Agriculture/Agribusiness that was held July 12-16, 1982, in Madison. Approximately 400 attendees were welcomed to the University of Wisconsin by Dr. Leo Walsh, Dean of the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.

The theme of the Conference was "Adjusting to Change." The program emphasis was a reflection of instructor needs and the changing agriculture technology. Relevant topics for secondary and post-secondary instructors were discussed.

Floyd Doering, State Supervisor Agriculture Education, conducted a program for beginning high school agriculture instructors. Allen Linster and Cletus Fontaine, State Board of Vocational Agriculture Education, addressed the post-secondary instructors.

The keynote address was delivered by Ms. Amanda Smith, Management and Education Consultant in Sex Equity, Durham, North Carolina. She

spoke on "Working Partners - Men and Women in Agriculture."

Mini-workshops included Cooperatives, Wisconsin Jr. Dairymen's Association, FFA Alumni, Supervised Occupational Experience Programs, Professional Organizations, Post-Secondary Programs and Farm Training.

A panel moderated by Dr. Gary Rohde, UW-River Falls, and featuring Dr. Herbert Grover, State Superintendent, Department of Public Instruction, and Dr. Robert Sorensen, State Director, Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, addressed the topic "Issues in Vocational Education."

**'Express Lane' Will Again Be Available For Taxpayers to Pay County Treasurer**

An "express lane" will again be available to property taxpayers paying the second half of their real estate taxes in person at the county treasurer's office, Fredric A. Seefeldt, County Treasurer, announced.

"To qualify for the 'express lane,' a taxpayer must be paying the taxes on just one property, have his tax bill or tax key number in hand, and have this payment in hand, be it check or cash," said Seefeldt.

"Introduced last year, the 'express lane' was well received by homeowners as well as farmers and owners of multiple parcels. Those with simple transactions were quickly on their way and those taxpayers with complex transactions did not feel that they were holding

up someone else," Seefeldt commented.

"Slowdowns in the lines occur when taxpayers come into the office with insufficient information and we have to take time to look up their properties in our various indexes. This in effect penalizes the people who are prepared and are waiting in line behind them. The 'express line' helps equalize the situation," Seefeldt observed.

Seefeldt again reminded taxpayers that payments can be made in person or mailed to this office. The treasurer's office is Room 226, Courthouse, 432 E. Washington Street, (Hwy. 33, East), West Bend. Office hours are 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., Monday - Friday. The office will be closed Saturday, July 31, but walk in

payments will be accepted without penalty on Monday, August 2.

Payments by mail should be addressed to Washington County Treasurer, P.O. Box 518, West Bend, WI 53095. "However, all payments by mail must carry a July postmark to avoid an 8 1/2% interest penalty on the outstanding balance," Seefeldt cautioned.

## From the School Board President's Desk....

Why do we need a citizen advisory committee to aid in the search and screen procedure in selecting a new superintendent? Why are you the only one who selects the members of the committee? Isn't that illegal? These have been the most frequent questions I've received this week.

I'll address the committee selection method first. The method of appointing a committee is controlled by Internal Board Policy #8140.1 which received its final reading January 14, 1980. A portion of that policy reads as follows: "Committees of this type shall be authorized by the board. It shall be the responsibility of the President to appoint members to the committee from lists provided by board members." This committee was authorized by the Board July 12, 1982, all Board members were requested to submit names but not all did, and I am in the process of selecting committee members from the list of names submitted by Board members. I am doing the selection since, according to Board Policy #8140.1, it is my responsibility. To set up this committee any other way would be illegal. Incidentally, I was not the Board president when this policy was passed as you can see by the date, nor was I the person who initiated it.

That covers how the committee will be appointed, but now let's look at the why of the committee. Why do we need a citizen advisory committee? First of all, as I have mentioned previously, the Board realizes its limitations. We have people in the community who have valuable experience in executive search and screen. We have people who are professionally involved in working with credentials. Yes, we do have a consultant, but we pay him by the hour. Why pay him for doing things that some citizens are willing and qualified to do as a service for the district? Is the Board turning over all responsibility to these people? No, the Board sets the criteria for the new superintendent, and the Board does the final eliminating and hiring. We are just getting some highly qualified help along the way. The hiring of a superintendent is so important that I want to use all the available resources in our community to find the best qualified person for the position—and the citizens of our community have to be considered our greatest resource.

CPR is a life support measure combining artificial respiration and artificial circulation to restore heartbeat and breathing when a person goes into cardiac arrest.

When circulation stops the pulse disappears and breathing stops at the same time or shortly thereafter. CRP should be started immediately as an emergency procedure by persons who have been taught to recognize cardiac arrest and who have been properly trained.

The class is scheduled for 3 Wednesdays, starting August 11 and continuing on the 18 and completing on August 25. Class time: 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. at the West Bend Marine Bank.

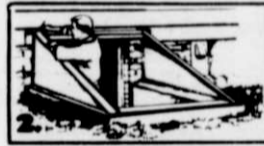

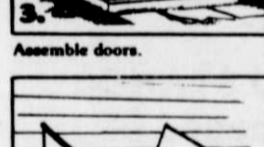

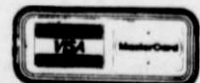

### Driver Exam Stations To Close on July 27 And Four Other Days

## Today's Medicine

### DENTAL EMERGENCIES

Two common causes of dental emergencies are toothaches and traumatic injuries to teeth. In either case, the accompanying pain can be severe. The primary goal of emergency treatment is the relief of this pain.

Toothaches can be caused by deep decay, an abscess, inflammation of the gum tissue or soreness at the site of a recent extraction. If you cannot be seen by your dentist, there are ways to ease the pain. A topical anesthetic (e.g. Anbesol) can be applied to the tooth or gum. This will numb the area for a short time. Swallowing an aspirin or Tylenol will also help to relieve the pain. Never hold an aspirin on the tooth or gum, as this can result in a chemical burn. Another soothing remedy, especially for gum soreness around erupting wisdom teeth, is a rinse of warm salt water held in the mouth. These treatments offer temporary relief of the symptoms. The cause of the pain remains.

During active summer months, injuries to the mouth are common. The injury to the tooth may just be a slight chip. If not painful, this does not require immediate treatment. A simple chip can be restored with a tooth-colored filling. If the tooth darkens, however, pulp damage has occurred, and a dentist should be consulted as soon as possible.

A broken tooth which exposes sensitive tooth structure can be quite painful, and requires immediate care. While waiting to see the dentist, it is best to keep air off the tooth. Depending on the severity of the break, different treatments might be required.

If a tooth is knocked out, any dirt should be lightly rinsed with water or the patient's saliva. Do not scrub the tooth. If possible, replant the tooth in the socket yourself. If this is not possible, do not let the tooth become dry. Place it in salt water or have a person hold it in his mouth until you reach the dentist's office. The sooner you or your dentist can insert the tooth, the better the chance of successful replantation.

Each flag is accompanied by a certificate verifying that it has been flown over the U.S. Capitol, Sensenbrenner, explained.

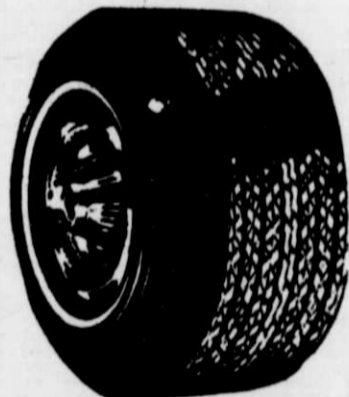

## Woolly Aphids Found on Silver Maple

NOTE — Dr. R. G. Edwards, Kewaskum, wrote to Dan A. Wilson, County Resource Agent, in regard to the aphid problem and received the following reply from Wilson. Dr. Edwards curiosity was satisfied after reading the article on aphids. Wilson's office is open to the public from 8:00 a.m. to noon and 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Large colonies of woolly alder aphids have been found recently on silver maples throughout Washington County. Heavily infested shade trees are conspicuous due to the white patches of cottony strands produced by the aphid colony.

This aphid is unique in that it requires two hosts, alder and silver maple. Eggs are deposited in the fall on the bark of maple trees. These eggs hatch in early spring and the young immediately seek out the underside vein of new silver maple leaves.

Young aphids are all female and reproduce asexually to form very large colonies which suck plant sap out of the leaves. As summer goes along, females develop into flying adults which migrate to alder trees where

they produce several generations.

The white fluffy material associated with woolly aphids is a mixture of wax and "skins" molted from the enlarging insects. It is often carried away by winds to cause a light "snow" at this time of year.

Honeydew is produced in large amounts by woolly aphids. This sticky "sap" drips out of trees onto grass, patios, cars, walls, etc., creating a mess. Sooty mold, a black fungus, is often an associated problem since it feeds on honeydew.

Woolly aphids are usually kept under control by natural predators like lacewings and ladybird beetles (ladybugs). However, due to our mild winter and lack of rain this summer, populations have exploded.

Controlling woolly aphids on silver maples is usually not practical because the aphids tend to attack large established shade trees. Besides, the adult insects will be flying on to alder shrubs by mid to late July.

Probably the best control is to spray infested trees with a jet of water to knock the aphids off the leaves onto the ground where they will usually die. Using water will also wash your honeydew problems away.

### Soil Service of County Hires New Student Trainee

The US Soil Conservation Service (SCS) has recently hired a new student trainee to assist the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District. Jane Hansen from Deerfield, Illinois, will be working with the SCS staff for the remainder of the summer. She will be trained in the methods of soil conservation as they are applied to soil erosion control, drainage improvement, animal waste management, and non-point source pollution management.

Miss Hansen is a senior at the University of Illinois studying soil conservation and land management. She chose the SCS position in Washington County for its landscape which is relatively rolling in comparison with the flat relief of Illinois. Washington County is also the area to which her German ancestors first migrated. She has several Fellenz and Kinzel relations throughout the county. Her favorite pastimes are biking, gardening, canoeing and shopping for antiques. She is especially anxious to meet and talk with the people of Washington County and looking forward to her stay in West Bend.

## New Bridge for Golfers, Snowmobilers

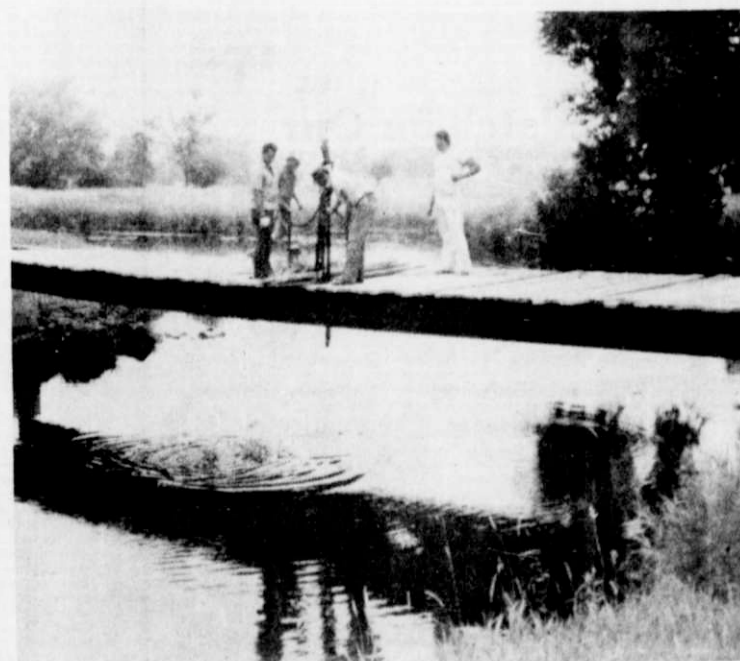
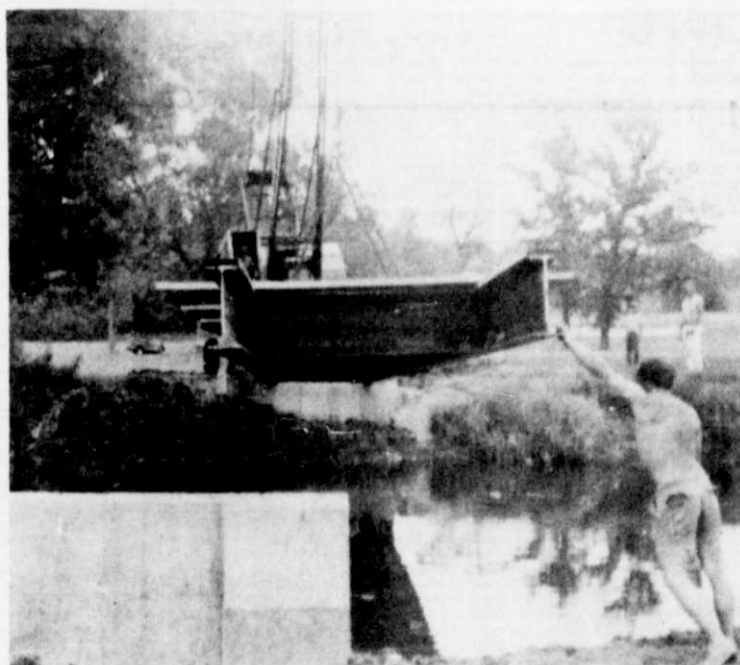
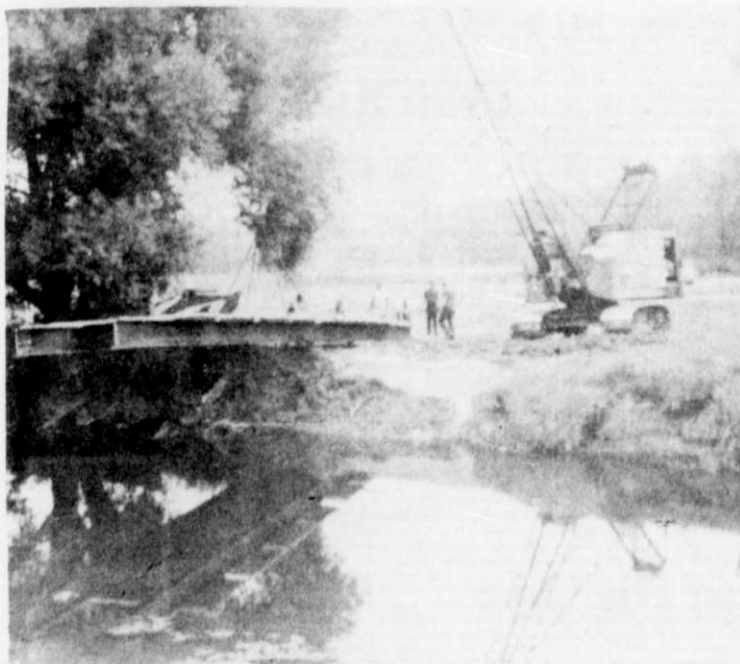
