## Kewaskum Frozen Foods to Open 2nd Store Kewaskum School Dist. Receives \$21,800 Grant

Bob Beisbier and Dave Nigh, co-owners of Kewaskum Frozen Foods, have announced they will be opening a second store.

The new store, located at 301 South Main Street, Fond du Lac, will open on November 4. Beisbier and Nigh said the complete line of sausage

products will be carried at the Kewaskum Frozen Foods Sausage Outlet, which will also take orders for beef quarters and halves.

Customers will also be able to bring in their venison for processing into sausage.

For the present, the store will be managed and run with employees from the Kewaskum store. A Fond du Lac store

manager will be hired at a later date.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Herbert J. Grover, has notified the School District of Kewaskum that its application for federal handicapped education funds has been approved in the amount of \$21,800.

The money is made available under the Education for All Handicapped Children's Act, which is designed to provide a free, appropriate public education for children with exceptional educational needs (EEN), ages 3-21. About 130 EEN children in the School District of Kewaskum will be affected.

Approximately 130 applications during the 1982-83 school year will receive a share of the \$14,810,000 available under this program, which is administered by the Department of Public

Instruction. Seventy-five percent of the federal funds flow directly to the local school districts.

Through this program, a broad range of locally needed programs and services can be provided to children with exceptional educational needs. Funds may be used for salaries of instructional and support staff, purchase of special materials and equipment, bus purchases, specialized evaluations, vocational education activities, and comprehensive inservice training activities.

According to Richard Zarling, Project Director, "A very large portion of the funds will be spent on vocational education equipment and materials."

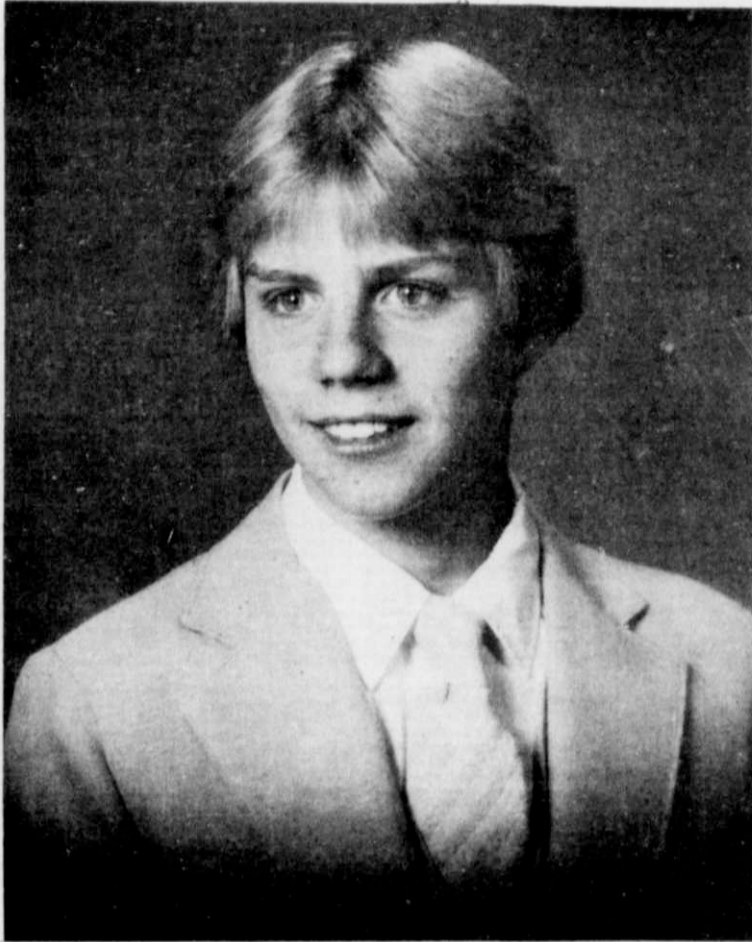

## County Wide Library Service — To Have Or Not to Have

READ ON --- No "user fee" required for you to read this article about County Wide Library Service. Do you know that you live in one of the three counties out of 72 in the state of Wisconsin which does not belong to a County Wide Library system? Surely the residents in the townships of Kewaskum, Farmington, Barton, Addison, Jackson, Richfield, Wayne, German-town, Polk, Erin, and Newburg, who are presently without library service, are keenly aware of it.

Participation in a federal demonstration grant which provided open access to all county residents from Oct. 1, 1980 through Sept. 30, 1981 revealed that 4,615 library cards were issued to previously un-served county residents.

Washington County had a County Wide Library Study Committee that worked out a plan for the county last year which was not accepted by the county board.

A state grant of \$75,000 and a Federal grant of \$21,000 is available until November 15, 1982, if Washington County

adopts a County Wide Library System. All libraries benefit from cooperative activities. Municipalities already supporting a public library would not have an additional assessment. The individual assessment would be about \$7.70 on a \$50,000 property (.144/1000 of equalized valuation) much less than the user or contract fees being charged at some libraries.

Whatever your opinion is on this issue and to help the County Board of Supervisors make a fair decision, it is suggested that you contact your supervisor before November 1st before this issue is acted upon.

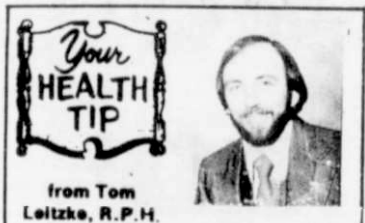

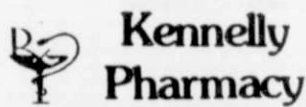

**From the School Board President's Desk....**

Do our children really need to know about computers? Why don't we have more computers for classroom instruction? Aren't you just teaching kids which button to push?

The role of computers in everyday living is one we all must examine, as these questions show. Discussion of computers is found everywhere. The full potential of computers is not known, but we do know that computers can make our work easier and that computers are continually changing, constantly improving. Computers seem to have some part in everything we do, from buying groceries to sending a letter to receiving a check. We can't ignore computers; they won't go away, and, therefore, we all must learn at least enough about computers to understand their role in our lives.

What better place to learn about computers than in our public schools? Kewaskum High School currently has four Apple II computers for instructional use. Is this adequate? No, it isn't but we are at least aware of the inadequacies. Kewaskum Middle School has none, and that is even more of a problem. Most Class A schools have computers in elementary, junior and senior high. We know we need more computers for classroom instruction, but the cost is high. We know we are going to have to spend money for classroom use, but economically speaking, there is no money for computers for administrative ease.

Effective computer usage is much more than knowing which button to push. Computers are basically dumb machines. They are limited to what they have been programmed to do, limited by the ability of the programmer. When I misspell a word, people can still understand what I'm writing (usually), but a computer can't. To say that computer usage is just button pushing is like saying that typing is just depressing keys—no thoughts, ideas, grammar, and spelling are necessary. It isn't enough to know which button to push—one also should have some understanding of the basic logic guiding computer usage. That is why math and computer expertise go together, and that is another reason we must upgrade our math offerings. We need computers for use in the math, business, and science areas.

Computers are increasingly influencing our lives, and we are all going to have to deal with them. Since the purpose of education to prepare students for society, our district must further examine methods of financing computers for our schools.

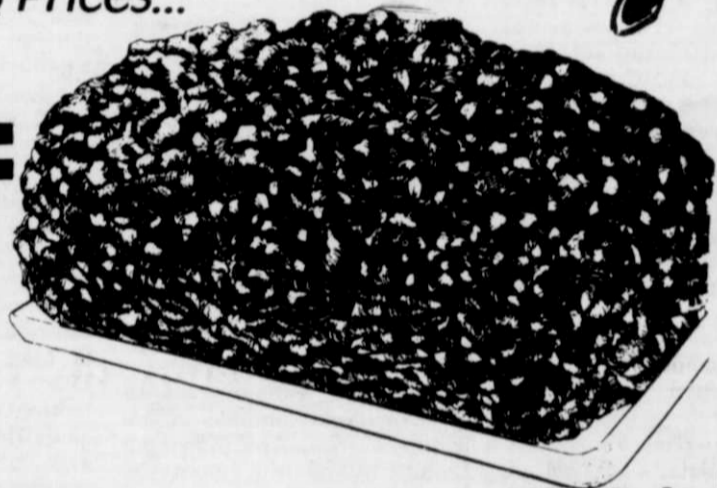

## Tops \$4.75 Million Goal

### St. Michael's Parish Achieves Top Percentage in Stewardship Appeal

The annual Catholic Stewardship Appeal went "over the top" of its \$4.75 million goal by more than \$30,000 for a grand total of \$4,780,376 from 112,883 donors, announced Msgr. Joseph P. Springob, general chairman. The figure for total gifts collected and pledged set an all-time record for the appeal which had the highest fundraising goal in its 49-year history. The average participation in individual parishes was 52% in comparison with last year's average of 53%.

Msgr. Springob added that contributions can continue to be given to this year's appeal until it officially ends on December 31. He noted that for tax reasons, many persons prefer to make their contributions at the end of the calendar year.

A report on parish participation in the Stewardship Appeal was published this week showing that all 269 parishes and 13 missions of the archdiocese received gifts totalling \$4,780,376.

\*St. Frances Cabrini Church, of West Bend in Washington county led the appeal with gifts totalling \$33,246.20.

\*Leading with the highest average gift amount was St. Hubert, Hubertus, with an average contribution of \$48.96.

\*The highest percentage of contributors was achieved by St. Michael, St. Michael's, with 77%.

Archbishop Rembert Weakland said, "Each year as we go over our goal, I marvel at the generosity of the people of the archdiocese. To me it is a sign, especially in these difficult times, that they are committed to maintaining the strength and vitality of their church."

Gerald M. Schaefer, director of development for the archdiocese said the more than

1,000 volunteers, and particularly the parish priests, were again responsible for the success of this year's appeal.

## Halloween Safety Guidelines Issued By County Sheriff

The recent cyanide tainted Tylenol incidents are also sure to spur copycat crimes across the country. Combine this with past incidents of trick-or-treat candy being tainted with everything from drugs to razor blades and our tiny ghosts and goblins can be facing some real danger on this Halloween. Parents should encourage their children not to eat any candy or other food items that are not in a factory sealed package. Even this is no guarantee that it is free from tampering, so strong considerations should be made by parents to allow their children to trick-or-treat only in their own neighborhood or where parents are familiar with those people handing out the treats.

Sheriff Schwartz also stressed safety on the streets during the Halloween period. This not only means that drivers should be aware of small children out and about and adjust their driving

accordingly, but also that parents should take precautions for their children's safety. Safety here should include not only instruction in crossing the streets properly and avoiding strangers, but also make sure they can see and be seen. Masks should not be used because they limit the child's field of vision. Light or brightly colored clothing should be worn, especially during twilight hours, or during overcast periods when it is difficult for drivers to see small trick-or-treaters.

In conclusion, the Sheriff highly recommends adult supervision of children during their trick-or-treat activities. Only adult supervision can assure a child's safety and prevent a tragedy during this Halloween period.

## Sheriff Clarifies Tavern Closing Hours

Twice every year there seems to be a great deal of confusion over the beginning and the end of Daylight Savings Time. An easy rule of thumb to help you remember when it comes time to set your clock is: "Spring - ahead" and "Fall - back."

"However, taverns have no such easy rule to remember for closing hours," advises Clarence Schwartz, Washington County Sheriff. This year's change from Daylight Savings Time back to Standard Time will take place on Sunday - October 31, 1982 (the last Sunday of October) at 2:00 a.m. So after a late Saturday night out, the clock will strike 2:00 a.m. (actually Sunday morning), and the bar is closed. At that time the clock is turned back to 1:00 a.m., and from that time on until April, tavern closing is at 1:00 a.m.

Here is where you can give the tavernkeeper a real break. Closing time means just that - closing. Under Wisconsin law, all persons must remove themselves from the premises by 2:00 a.m. during Daylight Savings Time, and by 1:00 a.m. during Standard Time; except for January 1st (New Year's) when closing is 3:00 a.m.

The Sheriff also reminds you that the tavernkeepers often have more than just a little difficulty getting patrons out when it rolls around to closing time. Although State Statute carries a penalty for patrons loitering on a licensed premises during closed hours, the penalty is no where as severe as what could happen to the tavernkeeper if he should be tried. In addition to a substantial fine and possible jail sentence, the tavernkeeper could also stand to lose his license, even if not convicted of the offense. With the loss of his license it goes without saying that his livelihood would be severely limited, possibly forcing him out of business.

Sheriff Schwartz further added, along the lines of tavern closing hours, remember that State Statute also prohibits the sale of wine, beer and liquor for carryout or consumption off of a licensed premises after midnight. So again, don't put your local tavernkeeper on the spot. If you do buy carryout beverages, buy them early.

## Highway Waysides To Be Closed for Winter by Nov. 10

Some 160 of the lesser-used highway waysides are being closed for the winter, according to the state Department of Transportation.

Restroom facilities at all waysides on the state trunk system will be closed by Nov. 10, because of the difficulty and cost of maintaining them during the winter season. However, parking areas at about 40 of the busiest-waysides, where the average daily traffic is 5,000 or more, will be kept open.

Thirty-one safety rest areas on the Interstate system and other freeways will remain open during the winter.

The department said the closures help reduce maintenance costs during the winter when there is less usage of the unheated facilities.

The closings will be accomplished around the state between Oct. 27 and Nov. 10. These facilities are normally reopened during the first two weeks in May.

## Hunter's Choice Permit Update

Overall, three out of every five hunters who submitted a preference application will receive a hunter's choice permit for the 1982 gun deer season in Wisconsin. Permits will be mailed to the successful applicants the first week in November.

A total of 194,000 preference applications were received for the 126,505 hunter's choice permits available in 90 deer management units this year. In 16 units, fewer preference applications were received than there are permits available, so the remaining 9,264 permits will go to hunters who already have applied for those units without preference. No more applications will be accepted. The undersubscribed units are 1, 6, 7, 11, 63A, 67A, 70B, 70C, 70D, 70E, 71, 75, 77A, 78, 81 and 82.

The percentage of success for preference applicants varies greatly by unit. Some of the units having very limited numbers of available permits have a success ratio of 18 to 22 percent ranging up to the undersubscribed units with a 100 percent success ratio.

The total number of hunter's choice applications received,

preference and nonpreference, is not known at this time. Only the preference applications have been counted.

# Today's Medicine

## TRANSPORTING YOUR PET IN AN EMERGENCY

By Charles J. Ogi, D.V.M.

In case of a serious accident or injury to your pet, you will have to get professional help as soon as possible. Keep your Veterinarian's phone number handy, and call ahead to his office to make sure that he is in, and waiting for you and your pet's arrival.

Stay calm and take particular care in how you transport your pet. If he is in great pain and shows a reluctance to be touched or moved, you may have to muzzle him for your safety, and his own good, tape, gauze, or a strip of cloth will do. Tie it securely around his jaws, but take care not to cover his nostrils. Never muzzle your dog if he's vomiting, gagging, or bleeding from his mouth or nose, or seems to be having difficulty breathing.

If possible, try to carry your pet on an improvised stretcher. A board, box or table leaf will do. Or you can use a folded blanket, or a rug as a sling in which to carry him. If nothing like this is available, try your best to lift him gently and carry him securely against your body, giving him the maximum of support. This will minimize the chances of your pet sustaining further injuries while on his way to treatment.

Would you please print this open letter to all dairy farmers.

Dear dairy farmer:

As a dairy producer, you are probably deeply concerned about the new federal dairy program slated to begin December 1, 1982. The new program mandates a 50c per hundredweight deduction for every drop of milk you produce...with an additional 50c per hundredweight deduction likely to begin next April.

The impact of this program is clear: for some of you it may signal the end of your dairy operation, for others it will mean you'll have to add more cows to meet fixed costs. But, regardless of how this program will impact your particular

farm, the change will not be for the better.

For most of you the new program will mean MORE WORK and LESS PAY.

That is why thousands of dairy producers across this nation are organizing a public protest of the new program in the form of direct comments to Secretary of Agriculture John Block. Mr. Block has requested public comment on the new program until November 8.

We ask you to join us in opposing the proposed MILK TAX.

There is still time to head off the new dairy program...BUT ONLY IF YOU ACT NOW. Secretary Block and Congress need to get the message loud and clear: Dairy men will not tolerate a direct tax on the production of milk.

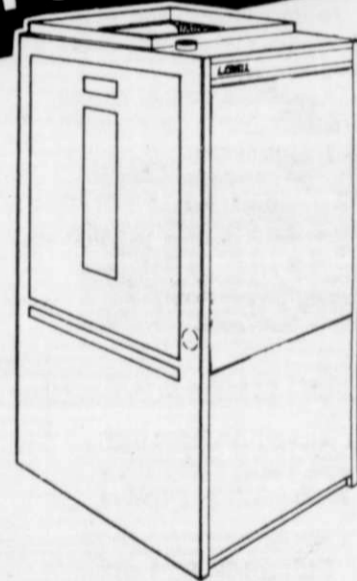

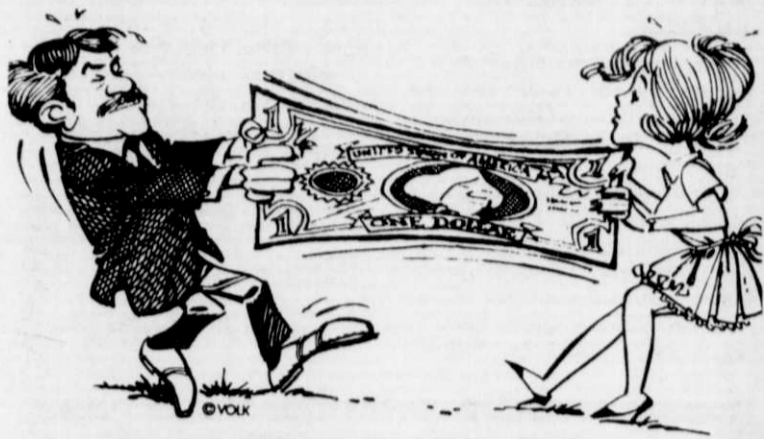

### COUPONS TRIM 10% OFF BILL WHEN USED EFFECTIVELY

Using cents-off coupons could probably trim 10% off your supermarket bill, but claims of whopping savings through coupon redemption are probably unrealistic for most consumers.

How can you use coupons effectively? Following are some recommendations:

1. If you have a coupon for a product you are going to buy anyway, use it.
2. Compare the price of the couponed product with a comparable store brand or generic product. If the non-couponed product is cheaper, buy it.
3. Use coupons to reduce the cost of a new product you want to try.
4. Don't let the fact that you have a coupon lure you into purchasing something you don't need, don't like or can't afford even with the price reduction.
5. Use coupons to reduce further the price of items on special.
6. Take advantage of double couponing when possible. Some stores double the cents off on certain days or for senior citizens. Stores cannot take two coupons for purchasing one product.
7. Trade coupons you don't need or intend to use with other coupon clippers.
8. Organize coupons so you can quickly find them when

preparing your shopping list. Check expiration dates.

9. Clip coupons to your shopping list so that you have them in hand when you get to the check-out counter.

#### ENROLLED JOINT RESOLUTION 29

To amend sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 14, 15 and 16 (1), (2), (3) and (5) of article XIV so as in effect to repeal said sections, and to amend sections 1 and 18 of article I, sections 3, 4, 5 and 30 of article IV, sections 1 and 2 of article X and section 16 (4) of article XIV of the constitution, relating to removal of obsolete provisions regarding transitions from territory to statehood, transitions in offices, legislative districting and elections, the school fund and masculine and feminine gender terminology (2nd consideration)

Whereas, the 1979 legislature in regular session proposed an amendment to the constitution by 1979 Assembly Joint Resolution 76 (Enrolled Joint Resolution 36) and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the 2 houses, which amendment reads as follows:

SECTION 1. Sections 1 and 18 of article I of the constitution are amended to read:

[Article I] Section 1. All ~~men~~ people are born equally free and independent, and have certain inherent rights; among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; to serve these rights, governments are instituted among ~~men~~, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

Section 18. The right of every ~~man~~ person to worship Almighty God according to the dictates of his ~~own~~ conscience shall never be infringed; nor shall any ~~man~~ person be compelled to attend, erect or support any place of worship, or to maintain any ministry, ~~against his~~ without consent; nor shall any control of, or interference with, the rights of conscience be permitted, or any preference be given by law to any religious establishments or modes of worship; nor shall any money be drawn from the treasury for the benefit of religious societies, or religious or theological seminaries.

SECTION 2. Section 3 of article IV of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 3. At their first session after each enumeration made by the authority of the United States, the legislature shall apportion and district anew the members of the senate and assembly, according to the number of inhabitants, ~~excluding soldiers and officers of the United States army and navy.~~

SECTION 3. Section 4 and 5 of article IV of the constitution are amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 4. The members of the assembly shall be chosen biennially, by single districts, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November, after the ~~adoption of this amendment in even numbered years,~~ by the qualified electors of the several districts, such districts to be bounded by county, precinct, town or ward lines, to consist of contiguous territory and be in as compact form as practicable.

Section 5. The senators shall be chosen by single districts of convenient contiguous territory, at the same time and in the same manner as members of the assembly are required to be chosen; and no assembly district shall be divided in the formation of a senate district. The senate districts shall be numbered in the regular series, and the senators shall be chosen alternately from the odd and even numbered districts. The senators elected or holding over at the time of the adoption of this amendment shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected and qualified; and after the adoption of this amendment all senators shall be chosen for the term of four years.

SECTION 4. Section 30 of article IV of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article IV] Section 30. In all elections to be made by the legislature the members thereof shall be by ~~roll call~~ vote ~~by voice, and their votes shall be entered on the journal journals.~~

SECTION 5. Section 1 of article X of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article X] Section 1. The supervision of public instruction shall be vested in a state superintendent and such other officers as the legislature shall direct, and their qualifications, powers, duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law. The state superintendent shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the state at the same time and in the same manner as members of the supreme court, and shall hold his office for four years from the succeeding first Monday in July. The state superintendent chosen at the general election in November, 1902, shall hold and continue in his office until the first Monday in July, 1905, and his successor shall be chosen at the time of the ~~judicial election in April, 1905.~~ The term of office, time and manner of electing or appointing all other officers of supervision of public instruction shall be fixed by law.

SECTION 6. Section 2 of article X of the constitution is amended to read:

[Article X] Section 2. The proceeds of all lands that have been or hereafter may be granted by the United States to this state for educational purposes (except the lands heretofore granted for the purpose of a university) and all moneys and the clear proceeds of all property that may accrue to the state by forfeiture or escheat, and all moneys, which may be paid so ~~an equivalent for exemption from~~ military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, and all moneys arising from any grant to the state where the purposes of such grant are not specified, and the five hundred thousand 500,000 acres of land to which the state is entitled by the provisions of an act of congress, entitled "An act to appropriate the proceeds of the sales of the public lands and to grant pre-emption rights," approved the fourth day of September 4, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one 1841, and also the five per centum 5 percent of the net proceeds of the public lands to which the state shall become entitled on bar admission in the year 1910, if congress shall consent to such appropriation of the two 2 grants last mentioned) shall be set apart as a separate fund to be called "the school fund," the interest of which and all other revenues derived from the school lands shall be exclusively applied to the following objects, to wit:

- 1. (1) To the support and maintenance of common schools, in each school district, and the purchase of suitable libraries and apparatus therefor.
  - 2. (2) The residue shall be appropriated to the support and maintenance of academies and normal schools, and suitable libraries and apparatus therefor.
- SECTION 7. Sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 14, 15 and 16 (1), (2), (3) and (5) of article XIV of the constitution are amended so as in effect to repeal said sections.

[Article XIV] Section 3. All ~~lines, penalties, or forfeitures~~ accruing to the territory of Wisconsin shall ~~be~~ ~~to~~ ~~the~~ ~~use~~ ~~of~~ ~~the~~ ~~state~~

Section 4. All recognizances heretofore taken, or which may be taken before the change from territorial to a permanent state government, shall remain valid, and shall pass to and may be prosecuted in the name of the state; and all bonds executed to the governor of the territory, or to any other officer or court in his or their official capacity, shall pass to the governor or state authority and their successors in office, for the uses therein respectively expressed, and may be sued for and recovered accordingly; and all the estate or property, real, personal or mixed, and all judgments, bonds, specialties, choses in action and claims of debt or whatsoever description of the territory of Wisconsin, shall ensue to and vest in the state of Wisconsin, and may be sued for and recovered in the same manner and to the same extent by the state of Wisconsin as the same could have been by the territory of Wisconsin. All criminal prosecutions and penal actions which may have arisen, or which may arise before the change from a territorial to a state government, and which shall then be pending, shall be prosecuted to judgment and execution in the name of the

Notice is hereby given of a General election to be held in the several wards in the County of Washington, on the 2nd day of November, 1982, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, in the sample ballots below.

#### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for

casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

If an elector wishes to vote for all candidates nominated by any party, the elector shall make a cross in the circle or depress the lever or button under the party designation printed at the top of the ballot. Unless a name has been erased or crossed out, another name written in, a cross placed to the right of a candidate for the same office in another column or a sticker applied, a cross in the circle at the top of the column is a vote for all the party's candidates listed in the column. If an elector does not wish to vote for all the candidates nominated by one party, the elector shall make a cross in the square at the right of or separately depress the levers or buttons next to each candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote, or shall insert or write in the name of the candidate.

On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the answer which he or she intends to give.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two ballot clerks or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed endorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her ballot, the elector shall leave the machine or booth, and where paper ballots are used, give his or her name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand the inspector his or her folded ballot to be placed in the ballot box, deposit any unused ballots in the blank ballot box, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability is unable to cast his or her own ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist in marking the ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope, or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before election day in the case of applications mailed to the municipal clerk, and 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election in the case of applications made in the clerk's office.

With one exception, the voter who wants to cast an absentee ballot must make a separate application before each election. Voters indefinitely confined to their home or care facility because of illness, age or disability need not file an application before each election; a special statement on the application form can be completed asking that an absentee ballot be automatically mailed to them before each election; if they fail to make and return the ballots sent to them in an election, they must complete another application later on.

Absentee ballots can be voted at home anytime after they arrive in the mail. They can also be voted right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case, the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.

Representatives from almost every snowmobile club in the area, along with clubs from throughout the state, attended a two-day workshop held in Stevens Point on October 22nd and 23rd. The program was sponsored by the Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile Clubs, Incorporated.

Jim Gescheidle of Fond du Lac, president of the AWSC, one of the largest and most successful snowmobile associations in the country, and his staff including Vice President George Lendved of Kewaskum and Executive Secretary Art Sherren of St. Germain, were on hand to welcome approximately 900 representatives to the meeting.

The two-day event began with an open meeting of the Governor's Snowmobile Council, chaired by Robert Staehler of Kewaskum on Friday night. Saturday morning, AWSC members heard a report from Pete Jensen, Deputy Director, Bureau of Aids, Department of Natural Resources, on the status of the snowmobile program in the state. Jensen said the program presently has approximately 9,200 miles of trail throughout the state, very close to the projected program goal of 10,000 miles.

Jensen noted, however, that the 10,000 mile figure was not a

set number and it was possible that more miles could be developed. "We'll be looking at new state trails, getting new counties involved in the trails program and checking out state parks to see if they are being operated in the most effective and efficient manner," said Jensen.

Jensen also told the audience, "Registrations are the backbone of your program, don't let up on non-registered sleds. Be assured, the DNR and counties will be going after those who don't register their machines." Jensen ended his presentation by stating, "I want to thank you, your clubs, association and executive secretary for making this snowmobile program the best in the United States."

After an afternoon of seminars on trail signing, tax status, trail cooking, safety instructor aids, trail development and a general question and answer period, the workshop was closed with a banquet. Guest speakers at the dinner were State Senator Marvin Roshell of Chippewa Falls, and Roy Muth, Chief Executive of the International Snowmobile Industry Association.

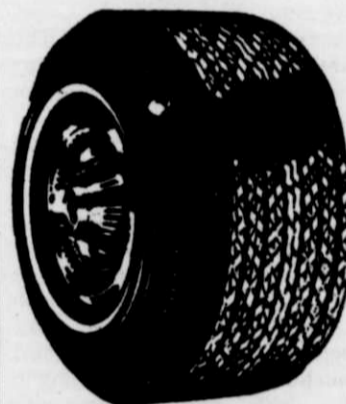

# Kiel Downs Indians for 1st Conference Victory

Winless Kiel, which came into the game with an 0-5 conference record, won its first and only EW game of the season by defeating Kewaskum there Friday night, 12-7. The Raiders thus ended their year with a 1-5 mark, while the Indians were 1-4 with one more contest remaining at Plymouth Wednesday night.

The Raiders were hungry for a victory over Kewaskum, remembering the Indians' 7-0 upset over them last year which knocked Kiel out of the running for the conference title.

With 18 lettermen back, the Raiders were pegged as a contender in the pre-season poll of Eastern Wisconsin coaches but had never played up to expectations until meeting Kewaskum Friday.

Kewaskum head coach Mike Fifrick wishes the Raiders had picked some other school earlier to get a good performance out of their system. Fifrick, who is a Kiel native, has had problems winning in his old home town. Two years ago the Raiders tipped the Indians 14-7 in overtime and Friday's game was again evenly matched. The Kiel field is named in memory of Fifrick's father, a former principal at the school.

Kiel was first to score when Boyd Manz kicked a 27 yard field goal with 27 seconds remaining in the first quarter.

In the second period, the Indians came right back with a 67 yard scoring drive with halfback Jim Braun hitting Dennis Butz for a six yard touchdown pass. The big play in the drive was a pass with quarterback Mark Follmann and tight end Jeff Squier joining up for a 43 yard gain to the six. The extra point try was good and Kewaskum led, 7-3.

The play was costly though for the Indians as Squier suffered a fracture in a small bone in his lower leg as the result of the tackle. Losing Squier, an important part of both the offense and defense, hurt Kewaskum's chances for a victory because it forced changes in the lineup.

However, the Indians still led at halftime, 7-6, as the result of a fine goal line stand just before the half forced the Raiders to settle for another Manz field goal.

The Indians were moving toward another score half way through the third quarter when a holding call brought the drive. Starting on the 50, Kewaskum picked up two first downs on strong running by Braun. Chris Harlow's gain would have meant a first down at the 24 yard line but the play was called back. A short run and two incomplete passes turned the ball over to Kiel.

The Raiders went ahead on a 27 yard Jim Linnabary to Jim Biem pass. Diem, who is 6-4, outjumped 5-10 Darryl Tews for the ball. Tews was filling in for injured Squier, who is taller, at safety. A key play on Kiel's drive was a 28 yard pass on third down.

The Raiders again got inside the Indians' 30 in the last quarter but an incomplete pass and a sack of Follmann ended up hopes for a win. Kiel then picked up three first downs and ran out the clock.

Rush was the game's leading rusher with 96 yards in 18

attempts. Kiel was credited with a good game with no turnovers and no big penalties.

The Indians ended their season at Plymouth Wednesday night. The Panthers were 2-3 going into the game, compared to Kewaskum's 1-4.
